Thursday morning's surprise snow storm was blamed for three wrecks in a two-hour period

Highway patrolmen were called to the first accident about 7 a.m. when an cast bound truck-tractor operator lost control of his vehicle on a curve a mile and a half east of Sudan on U.S. 84. The truck tack-knifed across the median into the west bound lane where it came to a

Dan Davidson of Roswell was the driver, and he was not injured. The truck cab, door and diesel tank were damaged

At 8:30 a.m. Thursday, a car driven by David Mansel, 33, of Lubbock skidded off the right side of the road and hit the enbankment and rolled over on its top The accident occurred after the driver lost control on ice coated U.S. 84 four miles east of Sudan.

Mansel complained of bruises on his arm and shoulder. Damage to the car was estimated at \$800.

Present for that meeting were 1,200 of the 4,871 Texas CowBelles. Several other chapters have been organized since

The Hereford group has only recently

helped organize a chapter at Dimmitt and at Plainview, and are working on organizing a chapter in Fort Worth-widely known as "Cow Town"

According to Marn Tyler, president of the Hereford chapter, their group will help with getting the Littlefield by-laws and other necessary items-and they'll get some "Brownie Points" for doing it.







In 1922 we went to Mangum, Okla. to
visit my parents. At that time Neil was a
young boy working in a bank at Willow,
likia. His father was president of a bank.

Nell married my sister, Aima, and Mr Duffy told my husband he wanted to find a bank for Neil and asked my rusband if he would like to go in with them.

He was 10 years older than Neil and then he was in the bank in Biggs, Oklawhich then was a booming town during the oil boom.

Mr Duffy got an old friend of his to scout around and to see if he could find a town needing a bank. Mr. De Arman heard about W. E. Halsell taking a part of the Mashed O Ranch for a farming community and the town of Amherst, Texas.

Mr. Duffy decided there was the place for their bank. Only one large building was completed, so they took a part of the first floor in it to make a small bank. In later years, they built the bank that is now in use. The school was not completed, so the children went to school in three small frame houses.

Mr. Duffy, Sr. became the president of the new bank but remained in Mangum, Okla, where he was president of a bank. My husband, Rogers Willett, became active vice president. Neil Duffy was cashier and they had one young lady, Mary Copeland, who was, the only other employee.

We lived there until 1954, when my husband died and I moved away to live near my children who had married and lived in other places. I lived in Amherst 29 years and it will always have a large place in my memory.

I've taken the Lamb County paper for a number of years and would hate to do without it. I can keep up with all of my friends there—in Littlefield and Sudan that way.

Olton Residents Looking At Plans For New City Hall

Olton's city council is considering the building of a new city hall. Drawings of the exterior and floor plan of the proposed structure were presented to the council Tuesday night.

A site between 8th and 9th on the Anton highway has been selected for the location. The proposed building would cost an estimated \$182,870 for a total of 6000 square feet. This includes the cost of the site, paving and walks, building costs and miscellaneous fees, excluding furnishings.

The ground level floor would accomodate city offices, with storage and vault, the Chamber of Commerce office, council and corporation court room; restrooms and lobby.

An elevator will have to be included because of a law governing public buildings which designates that an elevator must be provided if there is more than one floor.

The lower level will have an estimated 2000 square feet which will serve for a


