Tense moments of anticipation during judging, happy faces on the winners of top places and top prices for their prized animals, and disappointed expressions during the sifting in the ring were among the various moods expressed by area FFA and 4-H youngsters during the annual Littlefield Area Junior Livestock Show and Sale here Friday and Saturday.

Although the competition was keen, youngsters from Amherst, Littlefield, and Sudan learned much from their judges as they presented critiques on each animal and informed them as to how the animals could be improved.

Three area youngsters walked away with the grand championship trophies and banners. Rodney Logsdon of Littlefield 4-H won the grand championship lamb honors with a 102-pound middleweight Hampshire lamb. Tracy Bowling of the Sudan FFA won the grand championship trophy in the swine division with a Duroc pig; and Danny Carter of the Amherst 4-H Club won the grand championship trophy in the steer division with an Angus-Hereford crossbreed steer.

Showing the reserve grand championship animals were Troy Wayne Moss of the Sudan 4-H Club in the lamb division with a middleweight Hampshire lamb; Davy Trotter of the Littlefield FFA in the swine division with a middleweight cross pig; and Brian May of the Sudan 4-H Club in the steer division with a lightweight Hereford steer.

Winning the showmanship awards in the various animal categories were Rodney Logsdon of the Littlefield 4-H, lamb; Lynnette Spencer of the Littlefield 4-H, swine; and Jim Fields of the Sudan 4-H Club, steer.

Serving as judge for the sheep this year was Ed Garnett of Amarillo. Swine judge was Lanny Tucker of Hart, and steer judge was Jim Jenkins of South Plains College at Levelland.

Weather Conditions Blamed For Wrecks

Thursday morning's surprise snow storm was blamed for three wrecks in a two-hour period.

Highway patrolmen were called to the first accident about 7 a.m. when an east-bound truck-tractor operator lost control of his vehicle on a curve a mile and a half east of Sudan on U.S. 84. The truck jack-knifed across the median into the west-bound lane where it came to a stop.

Dan Davidson of Roswell was the driver, and he was not injured. The truck cab, door and diesel tank were damaged.

At 8:30 a.m. Thursday, a car driven by David Mansel, 33, of Lubbock skidded off the right side of the road and hit the embankment and rolled over on its top. The accident occurred after the driver lost control on ice coated U.S. 84 four miles east of Sudan.

Mansel complained of bruises on his arm and shoulder. Damage to the car was estimated at \$800.

About 9 a.m. Thursday another truck-tractor jack knifed on the icy pavement one half mile west of Amherst. Howard Fulbright of Lubbock was driving the vehicle when he lost control and the truck went into the right bar ditch. Damage to the cab was estimated at \$350.

Highway Patrolmen Weldon Parson and Harry Keyes investigated the trio of weather-related accidents.

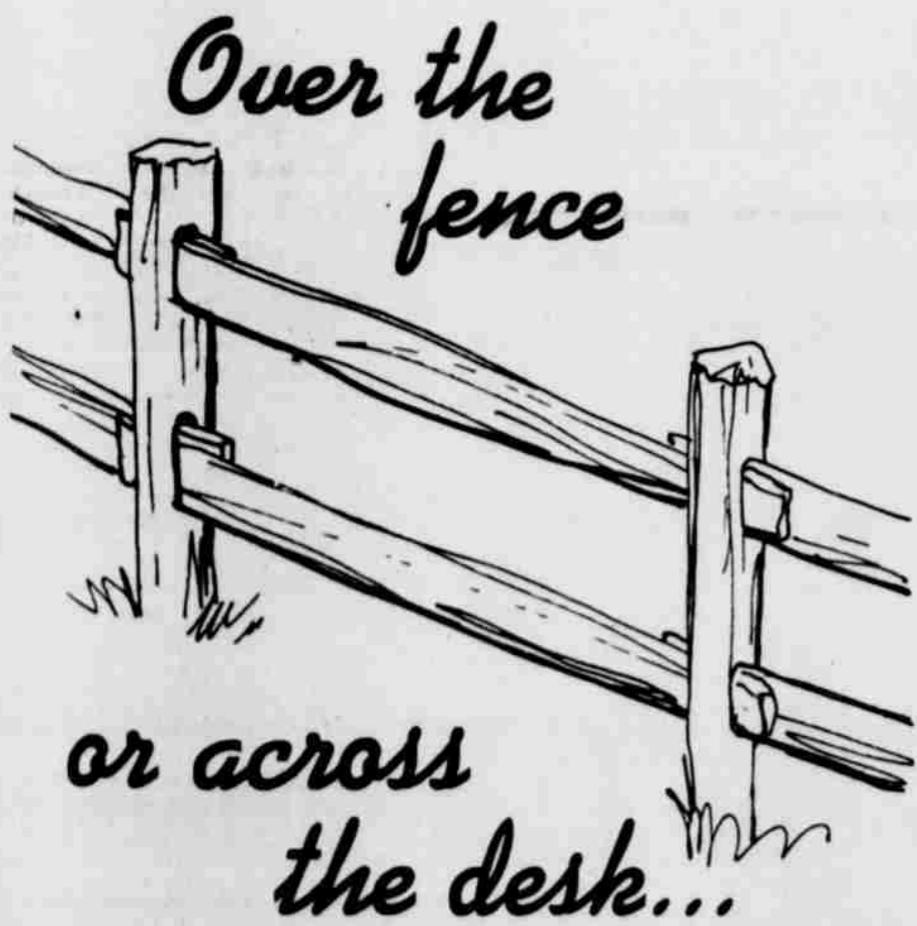

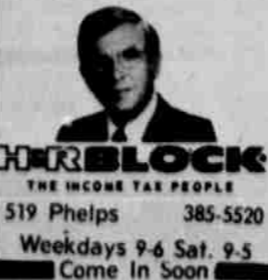
