

Roosevelt Upends Wildcats In Bi-District

Littlefield's Wildcats came to the end of a comeback trail Friday night in a 27-7 victory over Roosevelt in a bi-district match at Lowrey.

Wildcats from the state play-offs after they captured the District 3-AA championship in the regular season.

"You could check across the state and not find very many teams—maybe not any—that came from a 1-9 year to a district championship. You just can't say enough for these kids, they gave it everything they had," the coach said. "Naturally, they're disappointed and we are too. But you can't knock the effort they

gave all year. They did a fine job, and we're proud of 'em."

THE ROOSEVELT game, Blakely said, was a case of "too many big defensive mistakes. Of course we were having our troubles offensively, too. You can't turn it over five times and expect to win."

The coach said the Wildcats' inability to throw kept them from coming back from a 13-0 first quarter deficit and was a factor in Roosevelt being able to run up its margin.

"We probably could have stayed closer if we had stuck to our ground game, but we were trying to catch up and win," he said.

"Roosevelt simply played a tremendous game. They have some great talent at the spots that you have to have it, and they are quicker than anybody we've played."

THE WILDCATS had come back from early deficits in the last four games this year, but it wasn't in the cards Friday night.

Roosevelt broke out to a 13-0 lead when the Eagles turned a fumble and a pass interception into touchdowns.

The Eagles' 9.8 sprinter David Vasquez put the Cats against the wall early with a 47-yard run to the Littlefield 19.

The Cats then held at the 10, but three plays later fumbled and the Eagles' Walter Mann recovered at the Cat 13.

Two plays later two yards, but a pass interference call gave the Eagles a first

down at the one. On second down QB Ricky Hightower sneaked for the TD.

Jim Matsler, the Eagles' fine 200-pound tackle, kicked the extra for a 7-0 lead with 5:04 left in the first quarter.

The Wildcats drove back to Roosevelt territory when QB Jay Trammell threw the Cats' only pass completion of the night to End Larry Birkelbach at the Eagle 43.

But the Cats couldn't make it on the

Prizes Total \$100 In Christmas Contest

Points are being awarded by judges on artistic merit, originality, lighting techniques and ingenuity for this year's Christmas home lighting contest.

Four prizes, totaling \$100, are being provided by Southwestern Public Service Company, sponsor of the event in cooperation with the Chamber of Commerce.

First place winner in the contest will receive \$50; second place winner will take the \$25 prize; third place a \$15 prize; and fourth place, \$10.

All persons living within the city limits of Littlefield are eligible to enter the contest, and persons wishing to compete are invited to clip the entry blank in this issue, fill it out and mail it to the Chamber of Commerce, Box 507, Littlefield 79339.

A score of 30 points is attainable in the "artistic merit" category, when design, composition and arrangement of elements, and the color scheme are considered in the judging.

Twenty points are possible in the "originality" portion of the judging sheet. Considered are new ideas or effects, new ways of using standard devices such as luminous plaques, candles, cutouts, wreaths, and shapes formed with Christmas tree lamps.

"Lighting techniques" could bring a high score of 30 to the ingenious Christmas lighting artist, if he figures a good use for regular Christmas tree lamps, spot and flood lamps (with or without filters), or other lamps such as fluorescent, circling, reflector color lamps, 25 and 40 watt enameled lamps.

FATHER DESIGNED FIRST DOME

Doctor Writes Biography

A Littlefield doctor's father is credited for the revolutionary structure of the world's first domed auditorium, the Will Rogers Coliseum in Fort Worth.

Dr. Herbert M. Hinckley Jr., a physician at the Littlefield Hospital, had a story to tell about his uncompromising, ambitious, inspired engineer father. So he wrote a book.

UNDER THE DOME is a sweeping, intimate tribute to the man whose initiative and genius is responsible for not only the gigantic domed tribute to Will Rogers, but because of his tenacity and struggle to achieve the innovations of the structural dome design, there now are many real monuments to the elder Hinckley's genius.

Or, as Dr. Hinckley ends his book: "In Fort Worth is a dome coliseum... and in New Orleans there is a dome coliseum... and in Lubbock there is a dome coliseum... and in Houston there is the Astrodome... and in Charlottesville there is a dome... and..."

and in Charlottesville there is a dome... and..."

The fact is, if it hadn't been for Herbert Hinckley Sr., there might not be an inside coliseum with an unobstructed view.

During his life time, the senior Hinckley never received recognition for his revolutionary idea. He always worked under someone else and praise of his work was reluctantly given. Only after his death, in his memories in the American Society of Civil Engineers, was he given credit as the creator of the dome concept and design.

Dr. Hinckley wrote UNDER THE DOME to make up for this slight and because he believed that the story of his dad's life, struggles and accomplishments should be written down so that an important link in the history of engineering would not be lost.

The Will Rogers Memorial Coliseum, the masterpiece of the engineer's creativity, brought him success, but exacted its cost,

too. In 1938, Herbert Hinckley Sr. died at the age of 40, the victim of a heart attack.

Dr. Hinckley said the idea of a domed structure came to his father's mind one night when his dad took him to watch a wrestling match in an old auditorium in Fort Worth. The man and his namesake arrived at the arena late and had to sit behind some columns that obstructed their view. The elder Hinckley was frustrated by the experience and remarked to his son that someone should design a building without posts.

So in 1934 when Herbert Hinckley Sr. was given the job of designing a tower and coliseum in Fort Worth for the Texas centennial celebration to be held in 1936, he did just that.

Although the building wasn't completed in time for the centennial celebration, Dr. Hinckley remembers the throngs of people who went through the building while it was being worked on and their amazement at

Director Balloting Is Moving Slowly

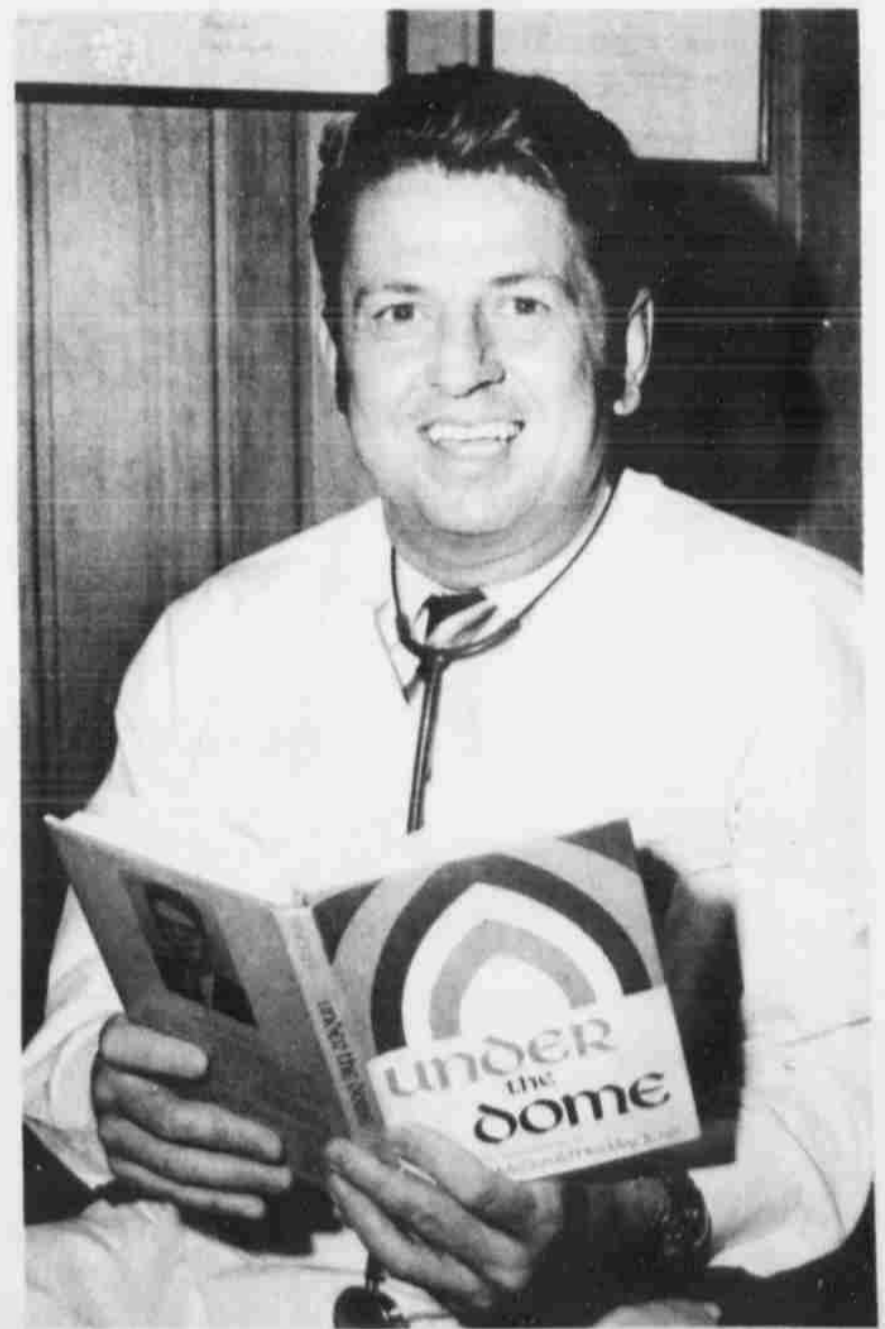

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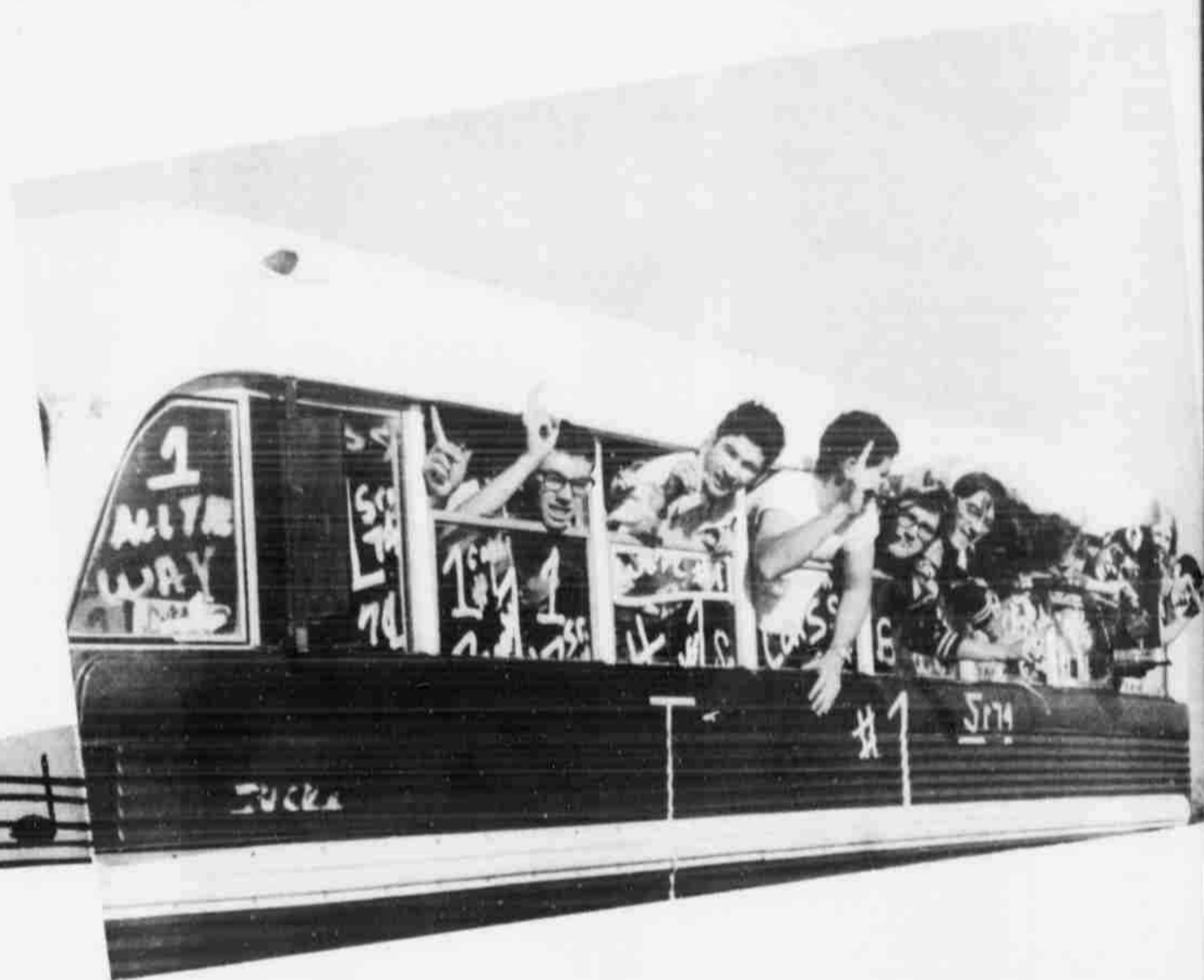

Come to the library and use it. If we don't have what you need, we will do our best to get it for you.

Nihilistic Night



By BOB WEAR

NIHILISM IS A CURSE which people bring upon themselves. It is old, old, old; but there is an upsurge of it, in varying degrees, in our time.

It is so widespread that its evil effects touch all of us in one or more ways. Many persons have gone far into the nihilistic night of despair.

NIHILISM IS THE VIEW that traditional values and beliefs are unfounded and that existence is senseless and useless.

It is also the concept which denies any objective ground of truth and, in particular, moral truth.

THE MOST DANGEROUS threat to the most people is in the view that conditions in the social organization (establishment) are so bad that destruction is desirable for its own sake, independent of any constructive program or possibility.

Terrorism is often the insane companion of nihilistic attitudes. The strife, turmoil, disorder, bombings, widespread vandalism and senseless destruction are the symptoms of the growth and evil influence of this spirit of "nothingness."

SELF-ABANDONMENT and personal despair are part of this old curse. Many people, who could bring their own lives into a state of good order and meaningfulness, let the challenges and difficulties of life

push them into the mire and darkness of nihilism.

The excuses these people use for their retreat into "nothingness" make them appear to be cowards and simpletons. The apologists for "nihilistic night" say that it represents the rebellion which is a "protest" in the name of moral perfection against a hypocritical society.

Yes, there is some hypocrisy and many imperfections; but these protesters gain nothing by going from "bad" to "worse."

PEOPLE UNDER this curse, oftentimes self-imposed, are the most immoral segment of humankind. This is true now and has been true in each generation of recorded history.

They use the flaws they see as excuses to make themselves worse, and do nothing constructive.

IT IS STUPID to expect perfection in individuals or in a social order.

It is even more stupid to sink off into the night of "nothingness", and refuse to accept the obligation and opportunity to be useful and helpful.

DEFENDERS OF the growing "nihilism" say that "The excess of Christian morality has turned to fierce immorality."

It may be that misconceptions and perversions of Christian morality have

JET-AGE SEWING

Jumpsuit For Men

By FRANK

THE HOME SEWER is making garments for men today. There are several reasons for this.

Men's styles are becoming less traditional and softer and are therefore easier to make. The pattern companies will supply you with patterns when you begin to ask for them.

Why not start with the jumpsuit? Make it of a firm knit and it will become the favorite garment of the man for whom you sew.

The pattern you find may be more like a body suit and you will have to change the zipper application and also make your own pocket patterns so the garment will be more like those bought ready made. I will help you with these later.

TO ALTER the pattern for correct fitting check these body measurements and alter the pattern accordingly: shoulder width; sleeve length; total length from center shoulder down the front to the hem over the instep; distance around the leg at the bottom and thigh; waist measure (add 3 to 4 inches for ease); chest measure (add 4 or 5 inches); hip measure (add 4 or 5 inches); distance on back and front from center shoulder to waist for correct location of belt and back-waist elastic; total crotch length from back neckline between legs and on up to front neckline (add 4 to 6 inches).

This last measurement will be longer than the tape measure so use a long strip of firm tape and measure the tape.

Make the pattern conform. If fitting is a great problem it may be advisable to make a sample garment of an old sheet for testing before you cut into the cloth.

STUDY THE ZIPPER situation. Many patterns will have a centered application and you probably will want the lapped application because it is more trim and tailored.

If the front facing is not cut-in-one with the garment, take the facing pattern and

Defensively, the Cats got good performance from linebackers Matt Giles, J. E. Johnson and Cornerback Carter. Allen

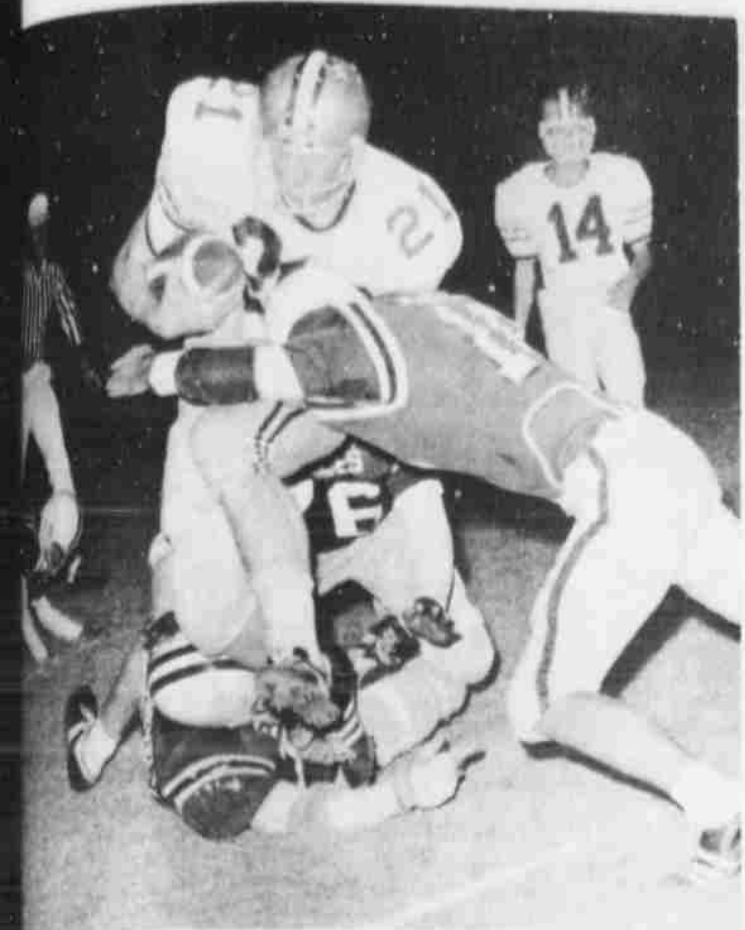
Grisham showed well at defensive end until going out in the second quarter with a dislocated shoulder.

Anton, the District 3-B champions, will battle Wilson, the District 4-B champs at Wilson, Thanksgiving Day at 7 p.m. for bi-district.

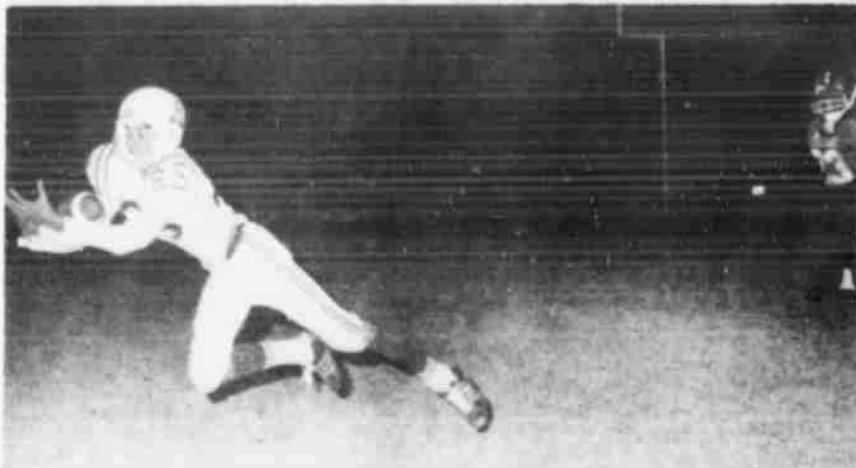
Anton is undefeated for the season and Wilson is 4-0-1 in district and 6-2-2 overall.

Highland has a highly touted back, also. Loran Krejci packs the biggest sting for the Hornets.

The offensive lineup for the teams is almost equal. Bula averages 165 and Highland has a 162 average. Bulldog coaches Lloyd Halbrooks and Pat Risinger invite fans to be at Sudan to back the Bulldogs.

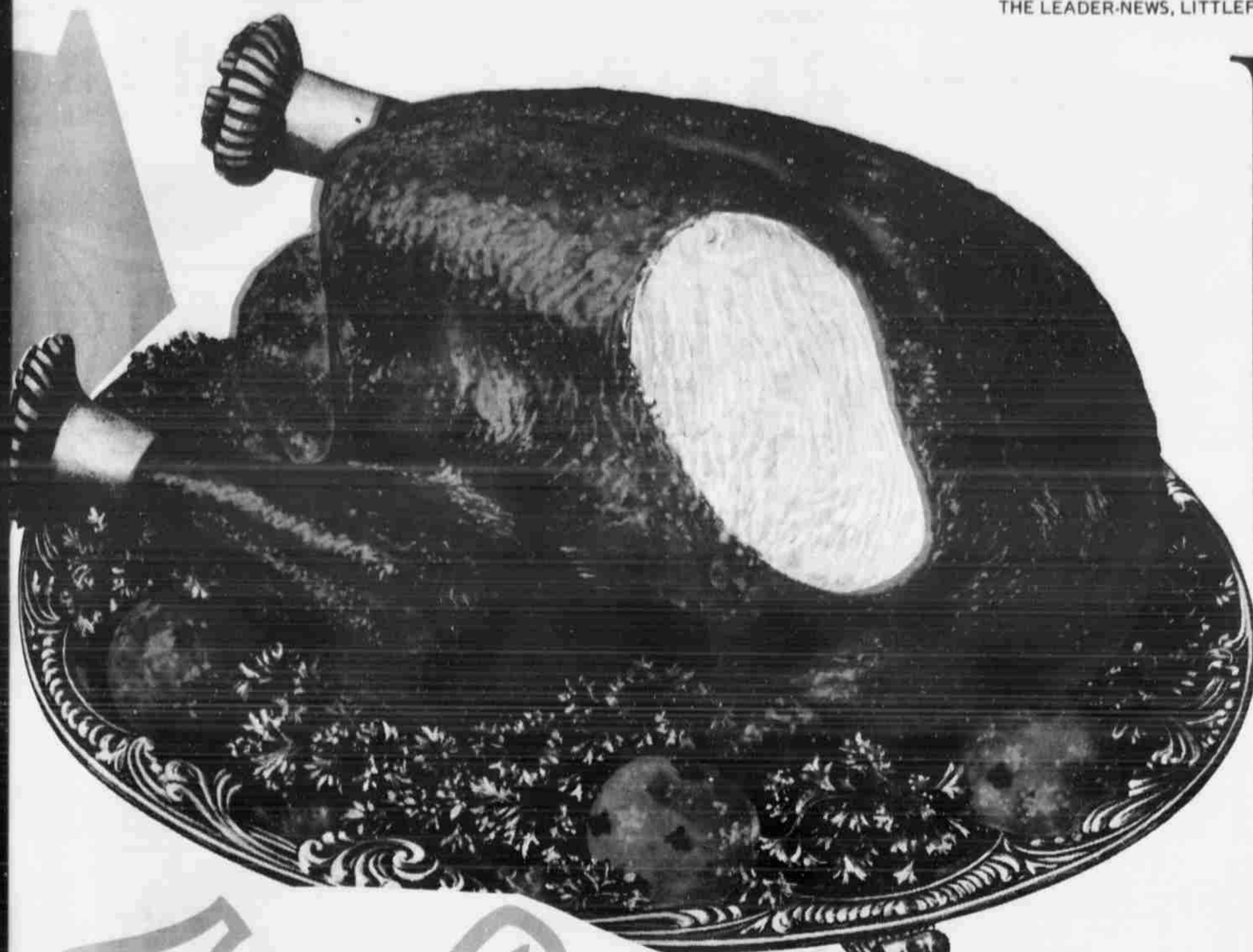
