

Cotton Total Near 75,000

Afternoon Roy Wilson at the Employment Commission surveyed gins in Lamb County and found that of 74,766 bales have been tagged. Most ginner reports that the cotton crop is 90 to 95 per cent out, the crop year goes down as a big disappointment for cotton producers. In the cotton harvest almost complete, the final bale count has fallen to half of the projection farm lists predicted in August. A wet weather set in in September, yield was estimated at 140,000 bales. Yields have tumbled each time a figure has been issued. MRS. EMFINGER IS 84 TODAY

She Didn't Like Plains

By NILAH RODGERS When Mrs. Mary Emfinger came to Lamb County in 1924 she thought if she could just live through the rest of the year she would go back home to Coke County.

Mrs. Emfinger is celebrating her 84th birthday today and she still lives in Lamb County, 48 years after the day she thought she couldn't stand this country any more.

The late J. W. Emfinger was among the farmers who land agent Smith brought to Lamb County from the San Angelo area. Emfinger paid \$30 an acre for a quarter section east of Littlefield, and the Emfingers loaded all their belongings onto a freight car. In addition to the family furniture and housekeeping equipment, they shipped all their stock, two teams of mules and the farming equipment.

"It took us all day to drive our Model T from Blackwell to Lubbock," Mrs. Emfinger said. They spent the night in Lubbock. When they got near Littlefield the next day they found that all their things had been piled off at Yellow House Switch.

"I don't know what we'd have done if it hadn't been for Ellis Foust," Mrs. Emfinger said. "He had an old house a little ways from where we bought. He had cotton stored in it, but he took the cotton out of one room and we stayed there."

"Talk about being blue, oh I was blue. We had an old bachelor heater in there. There wasn't enough room between the stove and the wall to put the mattress on the floor, but we put it there anyway and that's where all four of us slept. I didn't sleep that first night. I just thought if I live through this year, I'm going back home. We lived in that room four weeks until Daddy (her husband) got the half dugout built."

Mr. and Mrs. Emfinger and their children Norman and Vilas lived in the half dugout a year, then moved into a house there on the old home place. Even after they moved into the new house on the Lubbock Highway 14 years later, sandstorms were so bad that Mrs. Emfinger had to rake sand out with a hoe after a big storm.

Hard work has been Mrs. Emfinger's way of life. "There wasn't anything I didn't do," she said. "I hoed, plowed, drug

20 Seek Littlefield's Advance At Chamber's Retreat In Clovis

Twenty members of the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce attended the "retreat" at the Holiday Inn in Clovis, N. M., Tuesday night and Wednesday, and came back to Littlefield with several ideas for improving Littlefield.

The "retreat" was held in an out-of-town atmosphere so that the Chamber members could detach themselves from the city and give it an overall look, Chamber Manager Bill Payne said.

The first session began with a Tuesday night dinner, when Rev. David Hamblin and newly-elected C-C president Doyle Patton introduced the plan of the "brainstorming" sessions that were to come.

Patton welcomed the group and mentioned the new color brochure which is currently being published for the advertisement of Littlefield, and is being sponsored by the Board of City Development. Patton mentioned other possibilities of telling the Littlefield story throughout the country.

Members agreed to distribute letters about Littlefield through their out-of-town mailings, and an advertising program through some of the larger papers in the United States was discussed.

REV. HAMBLIN began the thinking on the brainstorming sessions by calling for ideas the members wished to discuss during the meeting.

Subjects brought up included: payroll problems; community pride and attitude; advertising the assets of Littlefield; housing; problems; surveying mineral resources in the area; getting diversified agricultural business; assisting the

present industry; and recreational facilities.

Following a broad discussion of these topics, Rev. Hamblin read a letter from Rev. Clem Sorley, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, regarding people and jobs available in the community.

Rev. Sorley suggested that:

- 1. There are many jobs in Littlefield and area for which no people can be found. 2. There are many people, on and off welfare, who cannot, have not, or do not find jobs. 3. Many people who are on welfare, or who are unemployed, need not be, if they would be employed in the jobs which are available.

"The basic idea which comes to my mind is this: List the jobs available, publish the list among the people who are

seeking jobs and in the public, and thus solve both problems. This seems oversimplified. If it were this simple we would have no jobs which need doing, and no people unemployed in our community," he wrote.

He also suggested the possibility of the creation of a "Job Available Center" and a "Labor Pool" to help in some way to eventually reduce the welfare rolls.

FOUR DISCUSSION groups were formed of the 15 persons who attended the Tuesday night session. The first group discussed industry, group two discussed community pride and attitude, the third group talked about housing, and the fourth group discussed advertising and mineral survey.

Arthur Duggan started the Wednesday morning general session with a report on water in the area and what the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is promoting in conserving and supplying water for this area.

TWO GROUPS were formed Wednesday to make recommendations on industry and community projects.

Those in the industry group recommended that a committee of four persons be asked to contact General Telephone Company and see if the company would maintain its operations in Littlefield, rather than move them to Levelland with the coming of Direct Distance Dialing service.

That group also suggested that six persons be asked to serve on the existing industry committee to see if the Chamber of Commerce can do anything to help them.

the flu virus.

A little sugar and flour was about all the groceries the Emfingers bought, and Mrs. Emfinger's egg and cream money paid for these staples and the clothes for the family. "We even made our own meal," she said. "I used to go down to the crib and set there and shell corn by hand, but Daddy finally got me a sheller at a farm sale. We'd grind a big old sack full of meal. It would be so hot we'd have to pour it out on the kitchen table and let it cool."

"We'd kill hogs and render the lard, and I'd make crackling bread. Oh, it was good. I'd take the head and cook it and make some meat—put pepper and sage in it and pack it in jars and pour vinegar over it. When it was cold we'd slice it off. I wish I had some good old sausage meat right now."

"We sugar cured the hams. You can't buy good old meat like that. I drove nails up in the smoke house and hung sausages all across it. That was good, too. We'd hang half a beef on the windmill tower. I wonder now how did we keep all that meat from spoiling. But it didn't."

"Before we had refrigeration, I got up many a Sunday morning before daylight and dressed a chicken and fried it for dinner. People don't know what hard times are. They called those the good old days, but I don't call 'em too good."

Littlefield was just a wide place in the road when the Emfingers came here. "Lots of times we'd get in a mud hole and have to be pulled out coming to town," she said. "Everybody knew everybody. Every Saturday night we'd have ice cream at one house or the other."

Farm sales were another diversion. "I used to go with Daddy," she said. "People would sell dishes, pots, pans, farm equipment, dogs and everything. They'd cook a great big washpot full of red beans—West Texas strawberries. I think they called them—and people would stay all day."

The Emfingers have been active in the 9th Street Church of Christ since they moved here in 1924. He retired from farming 15 years before his death. "We celebrated our 60th wedding anniversary before he died," Mrs. Emfinger said. "I guess that's a long time, but it didn't seem so long."

In the past 17 years Mrs. Emfinger has missed church only two Sundays. "Once there was a big snow," she said, "and I missed one Sunday about three years ago. I think that's a pretty good record."

Mrs. Emfinger still does her own housework and does all her yard work except mowing the grass. "I've always loved my home and worked hard to keep my house clean. My children fuss at me for not having someone come clean for me, but I still do a pretty good job for someone my age. I tell them I'm not old yet!"

JET-AGE SEWING

Sewing Armhole

By FRANCES JONES

WITH EVERYTHING ready, turn the garment wrong side out and the sleeve right side out. Slip the sleeve into the armhole and pin it to the garment at these four key points: the side notches, the underarm seam, and the shoulder seam.

There is always a dot or a notch at the top of the sleeve that should match with the shoulder seam of the garment, unless fitting has caused you to change the set of the sleeve.

You must know that these key points may miss each other by a thread or two but not by a mile or two. Figure A.

THE TOP SEAM may need a bit of trimming too but when it is turned into the sleeve it must be wide enough to support the top roll. In some cases it helps to notch out some of the fullness in the top of the sleeve seam allowance. Figure C.

Do not press the armhole seam open. Place the garment side on the ironing board, wrong side out, and use the tip of the iron inside the sleeve to flatten any bulges. Turn the seam toward the sleeve.

LOOK INTO the sleeve and slip the sleeve cloth in or out to make it fit the armhole. Hold the work with the two smallest fingers, leaving the thumb and forefinger free to manipulate the cloth.

Remember the rule—distribute the fullness evenly.

It is possible to crowd so much ease in one spot that a bad "pouch" or bulge is produced and yet not have a real pleat.

FIRST, pin in a slight amount of ease in the very top of the sleeve. Very little can be put in here without making a pleat but some is needed to produce the soft roll along the top and prevent a drawn look.

Pin at the center between these and the next pins. Repeat the process of pinning in centers between pins until the pins are quite close together. Pin at right angles to the seamline.

Keep the raw edges even. The sleeve will tend to slip out past the armhole, but do not allow it. Never pin in 1-2-3 fashion around the circle or you will surely have trouble with bunches of extra cloth.

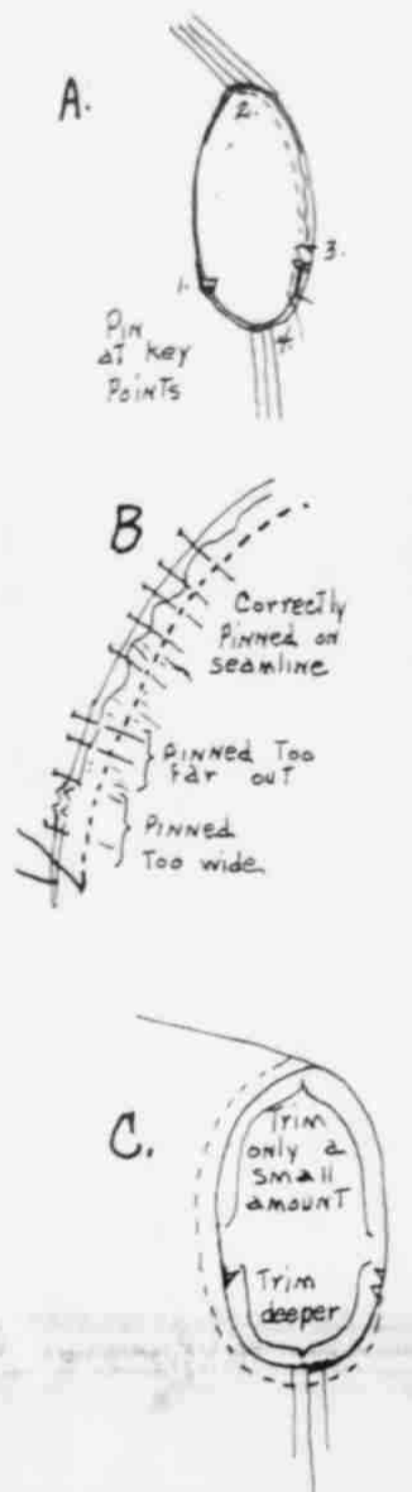
ANOTHER fine point is to practice picking up a small "pin stitch" of cloth right on the seamline so it will hold the cloth in place when you stitch. In difficult cases the pins may be as close together as 1/4 inch. Rub a finger along the stitching line on the sleeve side and see if you can feel a pleat. If so, work it out before you begin the machine stitching. Figure B.

Leave the pins in place while you sew the sleeve in, remembering to "walk the needle" over them to prevent breaking a machine needle. Good pin basting is equally as good as thread basting.

BEGIN THE ARMHOLE seam in the underarm area with the presser foot inside the sleeve. Sew on the seamline, which is also the seamline. You will be sewing in a curve so hold the work accordingly.

If a pleat forms, stop right there and work it out. Take care that the shoulder and underarm seams are opened when you sew across them.

Inspect the work when you finish and remove any easeline stitches that show on the right side. Trim the seam to about 3/8 inch on the underarm curve to make the garment more comfortable.

What this friend doesn't understand is that the selling of snake oil cuts across all levels of society. Whether you're selling patent medicine from the back of a covered wagon or in front of a TV color camera via satellite, the ingredients remain about the same and the percentage of suckers remains unchanged. If you're selling books, the vocabulary of the audience widens but the gullibility percentage remains constant. This is known as the first law of human nature.

According to an article I remember reading in a newspaper a few weeks ago, there were 35,000 different books published in the United States last year, or nearly 100 a day. Since this is many times more than

any one person could read in a lifetime even if he didn't watch television, slept very little, and didn't even subscribe to the Leader-News, naturally the few books that do get bought in the thousands require some of the selling techniques inherited from the men who sold from the backs of covered wagons.

If the writer who said he interviewed Mr. Hughes in cars all around the country really did, it looks like some fingerprints would have been left somewhere. If Mr. Hughes really wanted to remove all doubt about his denying the interviews took place, all he'd have had to do was speak via television or in person instead of by telephone.

I don't usually get off on literary topics as this, and for all I know everything may be on the up-and-up in this matter, but it is well to remember that flim-flam is an ancient art not limited to politics and international affairs, and the more advanced man becomes the better it works.

maintain or expand their present business or facilities.

The group also recommended that a committee of 12 men be available to call on prospective new industrial personnel, to answer questions or supply information about the community when needed.

Those in the community group recommended that committees be established to come up with recommendations to be presented at a later meeting of the retreat group, board members and other committee members. That meeting will be held Tuesday morning, Jan. 18, at 7 a.m. in the XIT Room of the Security State Bank.

The first committee appointed was a beautification committee. The Green Thumb project and urban beautification with city and county involvement were discussed.

A housing committee was recommended, to study poor living conditions in some areas, and to come up with some possible solutions to the problems.

A community response committee to make a survey to find out what is not available in our community, and to stimulate business to supply those items. That committee would also work on suggestions to improve relations between the farmer and the businessman.

Members decided that an appreciation barbecue for farmers in the trade area would help improve the farmer-businessman relationship.

A community awareness committee is to make recommendations to stimulate personal attitudes and involvement in the community.

A cultural and recreational committee will seek to make recommendations on getting a museum in the city, working on something for the teenagers, and working on entertainment and information for tourists who visit our area.

Chamber of Commerce officials have taken these suggestions and have already begun working on solutions to some of the problems.

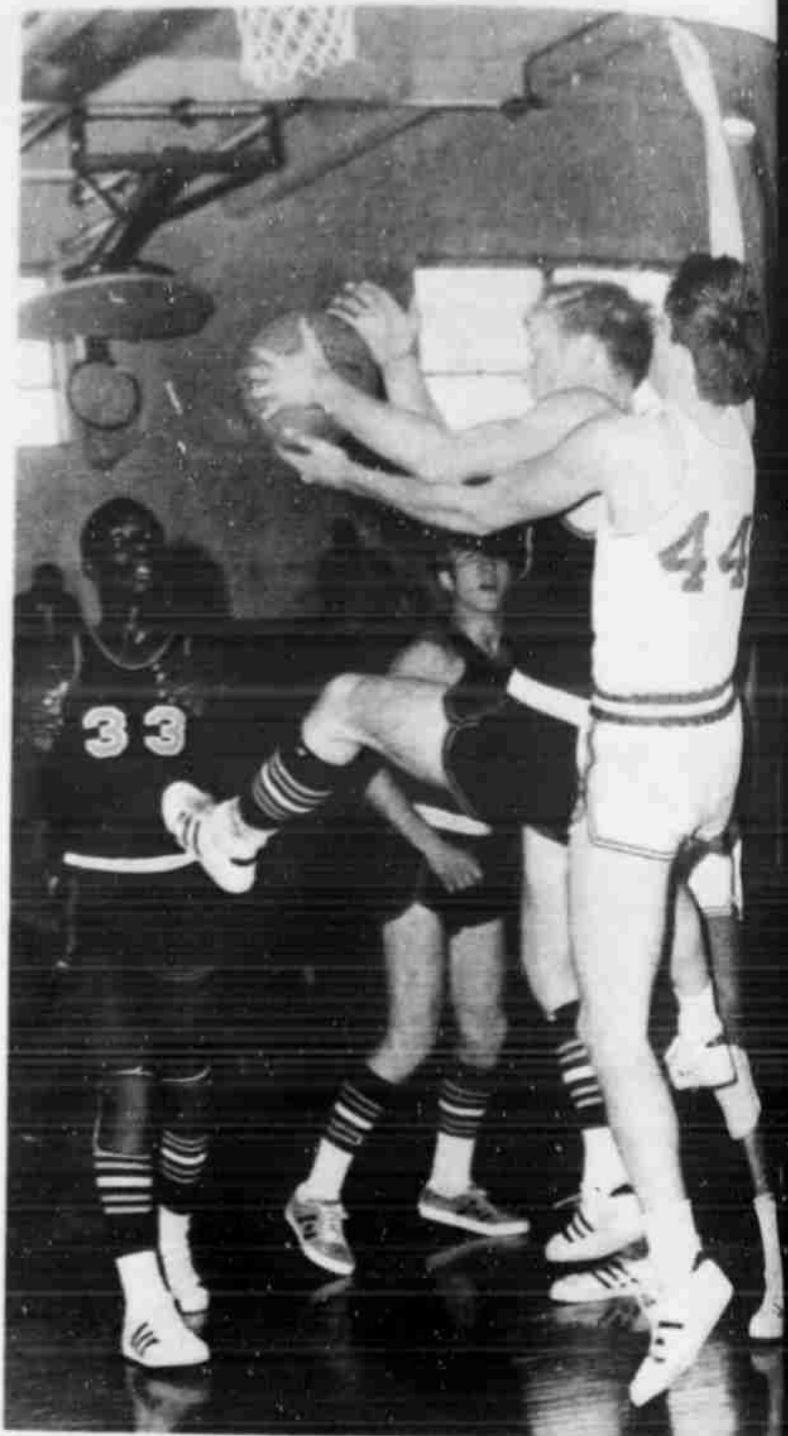
