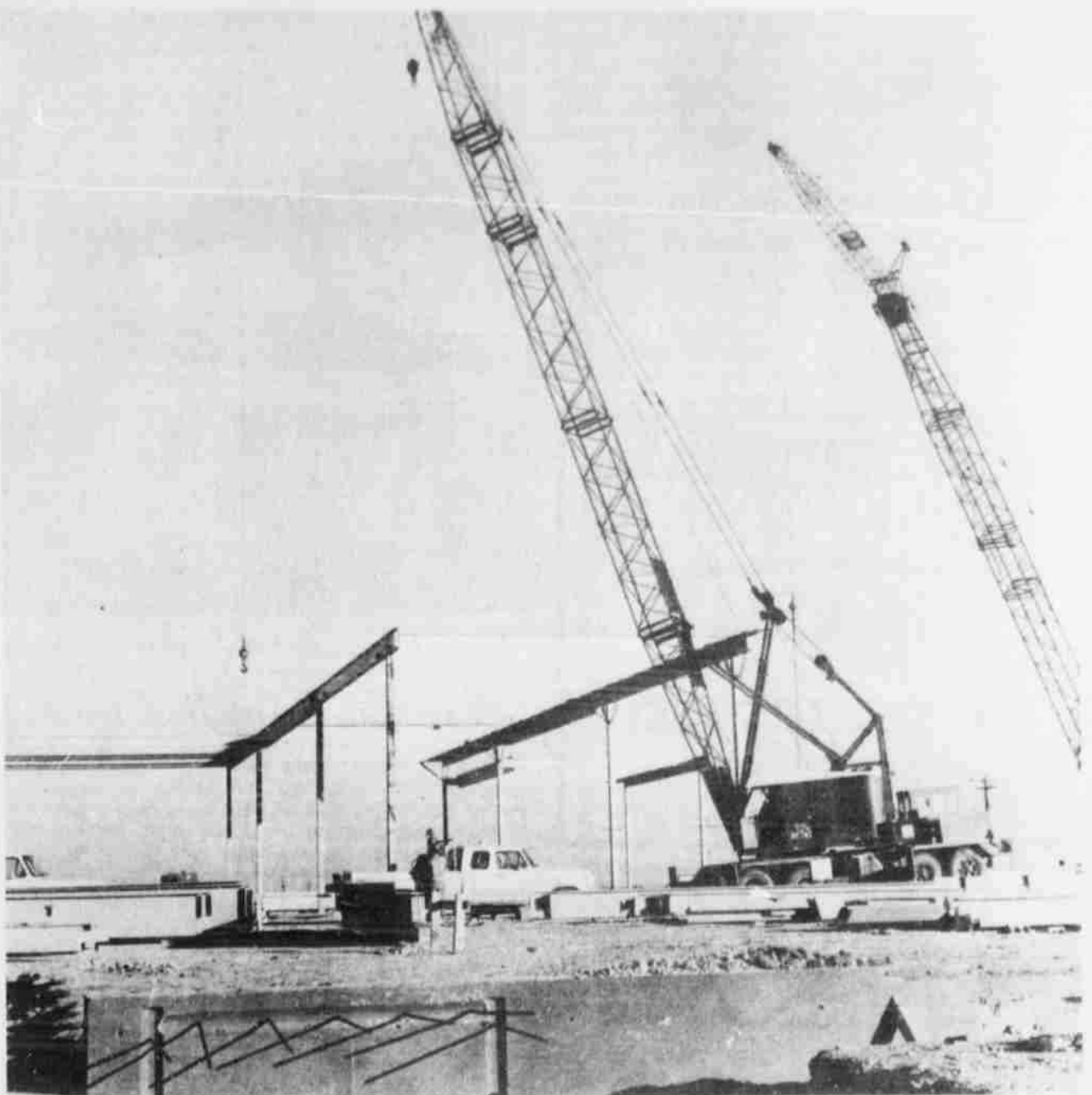

Post Office Advises Shop, Mail Early

"Shop early and mail early," advises Littlefield Postmaster George Thompson.

Thompson says the Postal Service can't guarantee all holiday mail delivered by Christmas Eve if the advised mailing times are observed and proper preparation is adhered to.

8 - International surface greeting cards to Canada and Mexico.

9 - Airmail greetings and parcels addressed to Armed Forces in Canada, Greenland, Iceland, Newfoundland, the Republic of Liberia and the Azores. Also international air parcels to Africa, the Middle East and the Far East.

10 - Surface parcels within the United States except in Alaska and Hawaii.

11 - Airmail greetings and parcels addressed to Armed Forces in Belgium, Canada, Denmark, England, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Italy, Norway, Portugal, and Spain. Also international air parcels to Europe, Africa, and Central America.

12 - International air greeting cards to Africa, the Near East and the Middle East.

13 - Surface greeting cards to the United States, including Alaska and Hawaii. Also international surface parcels to Canada and Mexico.

14 - International air greetings to the United States, Central and South America.

15 - International air greetings to the United States, Central and South America.

Dec. 20 - Air greetings and parcels to Alaska and Hawaii.

Thompson said the two main dates most people will be concerned with are the Dec. 10 deadline for surface parcels mailed in the United States and the Dec. 15 deadline for surface greetings in the United States.

He also wants to remind holiday mailers that there is no longer any airmail within the United States. All first class mail is being handled as airmail, Thompson said.

The post office has also gotten numerous questions about the new postal increases. They will not take effect until Dec. 28 so they will not affect Christmas mail.

Thompson also offers a number of tips for those preparing their parcels for the holiday mail.

A single item in a package should be cushioned with shredded paper, excelsior, ressed tissue, cloth or expanded plastic foam.

If two or more items are mailed in the same carton or box, Thompson advises that cushioning material should protect all items from contact with each other, and each item should have its own individual inner carton.

Fiberboard containers, including large soap, or cereal boxes, larger than the gift being mailed should be cut down to about the size of the gift to minimize shaking and breaking in transit, Thompson said.

Fragile articles must be individually cushioned and all sides of the container should be padded with cushioning material.

Tape used to seal containers should be durable and should cover and firmly secure all flaps, Thompson said.

Paper for the outer wrapping should be at least equal in quality and strength to the kraft stock used for grocery bags. "Incidentally, such bags, in good condition, provide excellent wrapping when trimmed to the proper size to fit the package snugly," Thompson said.

Wrapped packages also should be secured with strong twine, not ordinary light string, Thompson said. Twine should be knotted at several intersecting points to keep it from loosening. Reinforced packaging tape also is suggested.

Thompson said that all packages containing delicate articles should be marked "fragile".

Each package should contain the name and address of the person to whom it is being mailed inside the package as well as outside. An address inside is insurance that it will be received promptly even if the outside address should become lost or obliterated.

The postmaster said mailers should be sure to put their return addresses on the package.

And finally, Thompson said address the package correctly and legibly. Be sure to include the ZIP Code. And be sure and put only one mailing address on

the outside of the parcel. Do not address on more than one side.

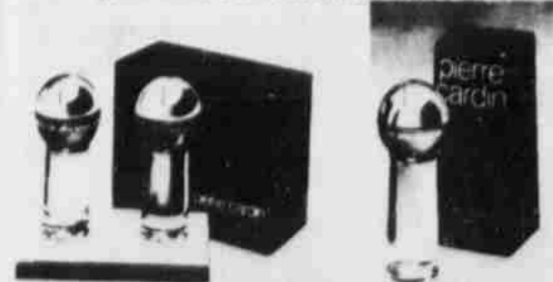

On the other hand, we have great need for ideals to help us make of ourselves the worthwhile, useful people we wish to be. Therefore, we must learn to blend idealism and realism by a generous application of honesty and knowledge. We can do this, and do it very well. The result will be the best of living for us.

Unfortunately, there are some established practices in our culture

which impose upon many people to some extent, ideals entirely too far out of the reality. For example, there is the ideal that people marry and live happily after. Of course, a marriage is a good one, and many are, but the best ones are less than perfect. There are the many persons who enter into marriage with the assurance that success is inevitable. With an unrealistic attitude, disillusionment and discouragement often result in marriage.

THERE ARE MANY possibilities open to us, and many desirable things are available. We are thankful, but we must be realistically realistic, and this view of life places for the "utopian dream." The perfectibility of human society is impossible. We do our very best, and this continuing action, but we will attain the perfection of our ideal.

Some realities will never change. These must be accepted, even if we prefer them to be otherwise. You do some things, but there are limitations. Of course, we must keep up until we are sure that we have all possible. In this phase of life, we must be guided by justified hope along with our genuine interest in ideals. This is the life-balance which enable us to live effectively, and with satisfaction.
