

Mobile X-Ray Here Friday

The Texas Area of Texas Tuberculosis Respiratory Disease Association has concentrated campaign to have as many as possible x-rayed by the Texas Seal Mobile Unit of the association.

The unit will be in Littlefield Friday, May 21, in two different locations. It will be parked at the Junior High School from 8 a. m. until noon; and at the National Bank from 1 p. m. until 5 p. m.

Over 368 x-rays were made in the past year, and 13 abnormalities were discovered.

The mobile x-ray program discovers many abnormalities other than tuberculosis. In the past year, it located emphysema cases, lung cysts and cardiovascular abnormalities.

The association bears the cost of having the x-rays read and reported to each person surveyed.

There is a fee of \$1.50 for the film and a post card is mailed to those who have a normal chest film. Those who have an abnormal reading are notified by a class letter which urges them to see their private physician, or the health officer for further examination.

It is urged to keep the card with the number of his x-ray and the date taken. The films are stored at the office of the health officer. If some trouble develops in later years.

Persons under 12 years of age are too young to be x-rayed on this type unit, but it is urged to take advantage of health surveys.

Farmers Due Weather Loans

Farmers Home Administration State Director J. Lynn Futch has revealed that Lamb County has been designated by the Secretary of Agriculture for the making of emergency loans to farmers and ranchers who have sustained substantial losses on account of the drought.

This designation continues in effect through June 30, 1972, and will authorize emergency loans to be made to those persons who suffered substantial losses from any adverse weather conditions, such as high winds, hail, or flood, that have occurred or might occur during the period of this designation.

Funds are available and applications for such loans may be made at the FHA County Office located in the basement of the Post Office Building in Littlefield.

Both Sides See Win In Weather Balloting

Both sides claimed victory in the referendum on the weather modification vote Tuesday.

Those for cloud seeding said the issue carried in the target area, and those against modification claimed an overwhelming majority vote for their side.

County-wide, Lamb voters rejected the issue of changing weather by seeding clouds, with 703 voting against and 436 balloting for the proposal. One thousand six hundred sixty-one voters cast ballots in the May 18 constitutional amendment election, and of this number 522 did not state their opinion on the cloud seeding issue.

The straw ballot was sponsored by Farmers and Ranchers for Natural Weather an opposition group to Better Weather, Inc. which is a group of farmers favoring seeding clouds to prevent or reduce damaging hail storms.

The referendum was conducted in 10 counties along with the regular constitutional amendment vote. And while the referendum is not a legal nor binding election but an expression of opinion, a spokesman for the Natural Weather group said plans call for the vote to be used toward getting an injunction against Atmospherics, Inc., the firm hired by the Better Weather group to seed clouds with silver iodide.

Frank Moore who heads the Plainview-based Better Weather, Inc. said the issue passed in the hail suppression target area.

Areas in Lamb County favoring weather modification by seeding clouds were voting precincts at Amherst, Earth-Fieldton, Hart Camp, Springlake and West Springlake.

Moore said the boxes where the issue was defeated did not represent the target area proposed for this year.

Moore said only four of the 16 boxes turning in votes in Hale County represented Hale's target area, and that nine boxes in Hale's target area did not have anyone present to take ballots on the issue. The referendum in Hale County was taken and counted by the Natural Weather advocates without a Better Weather representative, he added.

Ross Lumsden, president of the Natural Weather side in Lamb County, said his group was pleased with the referendum results, adding that the vote went about the way that group expected it to go.

Earlier this year Natural Weather representatives secured 1,000 names representing more than one million acres of land in a 12-county area. This petition was taken to Austin to a meeting of the Texas Board of Water Development (TBWD) in an effort to prevent a permit from being issued to the California-based firm that seeded clouds in last year's hail suppression experiment.

Those for natural weather contend that clouds were broken up before there was a chance for rain in their area, and they said they'd rather have hail and rain than no rain at all.

Those for the hail suppression program said a permit has already been issued for

cloud seeding again this year and they don't think the straw vote will affect the TWI's decision any more than the petition.

The vote was expected to reflect people's feelings about whether or not they thought seeding clouds resulted in a loss of rain over parts of the area.

But many said what it really amounted to was a minority poll on whether man or Mother Nature should have a say-so in weather affairs.

Voters Approve Water Bonds

Lamb County voters--1,661 strong--joined other Texas voters in voting down three of the four Constitutional Amendments and passing another by a mere 14 votes.

Amendment Four, regarding the issuance of \$100 million in bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes, was approved by county voters to the tune of 624 for and 610 against.

Downed at the polls were the amendments on raising welfare; allowing the legislature to propose amendments to the Constitution in called as well as regular sessions of the legislature; and setting up a code of ethics for those in government connected to recommendations for legislators' pay.

Voters were against Amendment One, regarding ethics, 967 to 268.

The Easier Amendments proposal was downed 963 to 262.

Voters decided to keep a ceiling on welfare, by a vote of 824 to 421.

All boxes in the county defeated Amendments One, Two and Three; while seven of the boxes went all the way to defeat the water amendment too.

Precincts which voted against the water amendment were Spade, West Littlefield, Sudan, Fieldton, Beck Gin, Hart Camp and absentee.

If Barton attends A&M he will be following family tradition. His father is an Aggie grad, and his grandfather is an Aggie, and a number of cousins hail from Aggieland.

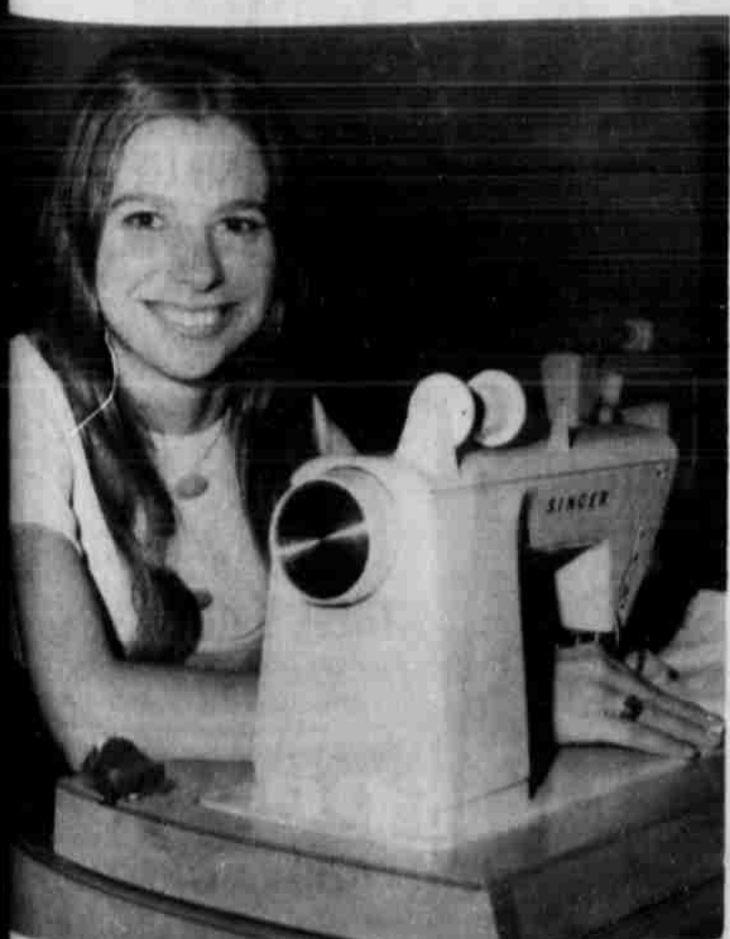
But whichever school he decides on, he will consider an education major or some other field that relates to people--possibly politics or maybe a preacher, because he likes to talk.

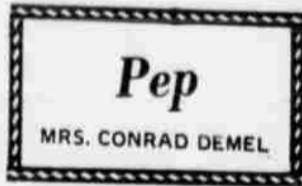

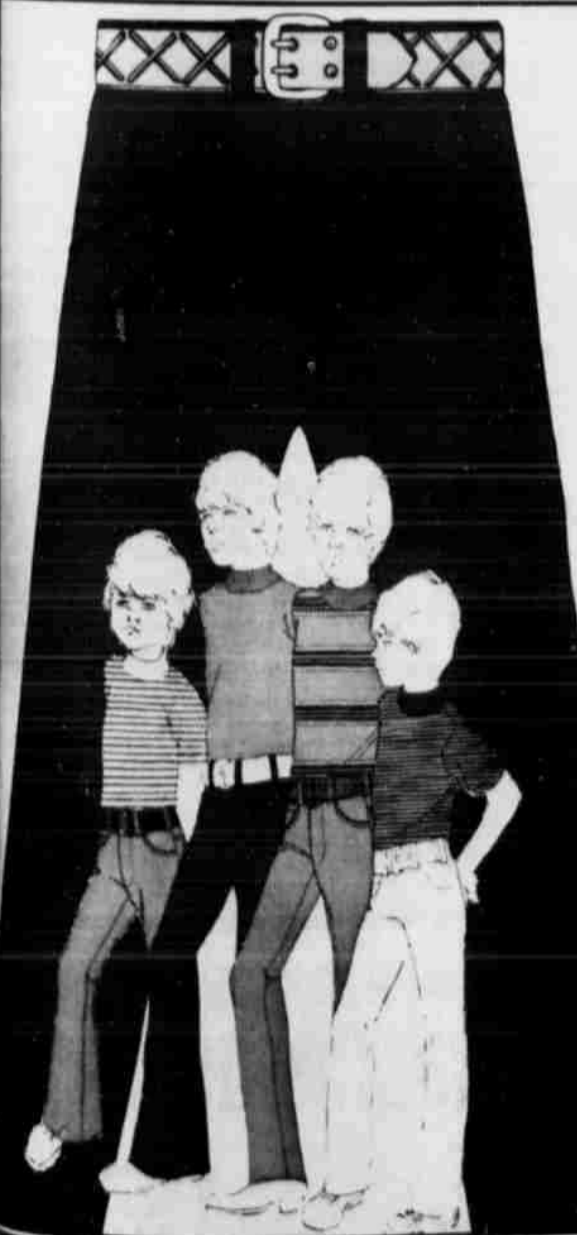

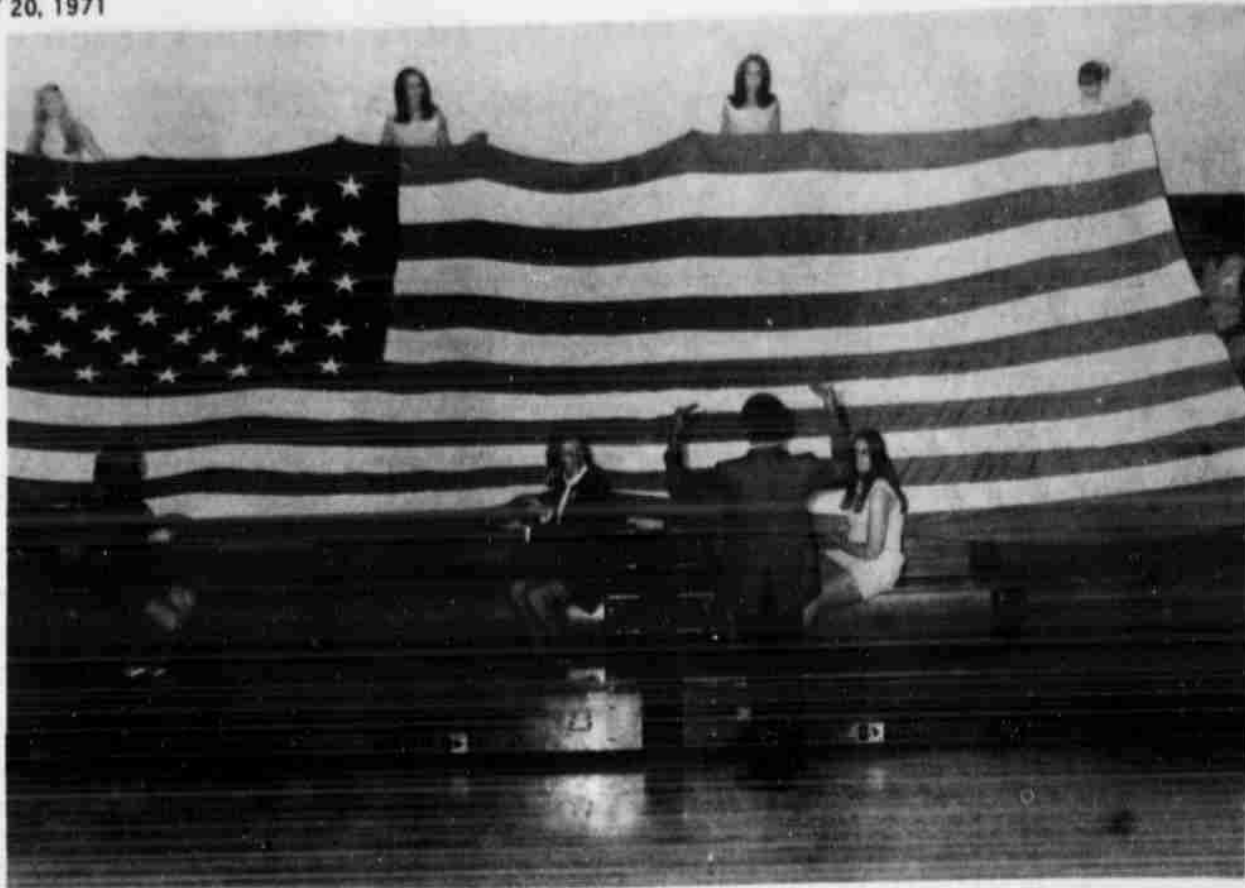

agreed that faulty motives will prevent the potential joy in what we do.

WE MUST EXAMINE our motives for the purpose of making all of our behavior the very highest quality. "If I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but have no love, I am nothing. If I give away all I have, and if I deliver my body to be burned, but have not love, I gain nothing." -Bible.

This has the force of saying that the motive for what we do is the deciding factor in the evaluation of what we do.

"THE MAINSTRINGS behind all of life is motive. This being determined by the point of view and the sense of values." -Adler.

If the point of view is wrong, or the sense of values faulty, the motive will be wrong.

LIFE RESERVES the richest and most enduring blessings for those whose motives are altruistic. When we find that our expended energy and effort are not bringing any lasting joy, we must always examine our motives.

Historical Marker Placed

OLTON--Olton Pioneers remember Mrs. Dimple Baker McGavock, who lived in Olton while the county seat was here.

Residents of Lockney paused for an hour Friday afternoon to reflect on the town's history and to commemorate one of the Panhandle-Plains' earliest mercantile establishments with a Texas Historical Society plaque.

The 77-year-old J. A. Baker Store once served as bank.

general store and post office for pioneer residents of Floyd County and was the first business in Lockney.

In his dedication address, Dr. Kline Nail, an English professor at Texas Tech University, said, "The years of this store's existence have been the times of the greatest chances of all history in speed, in morals, in manners, in economics; but through these years this store has remained constant."

Baker's store is currently operated by Mrs. Dimple Baker McGavock, one of the six daughters of James and Alice Baker and the store's original proprietors. Baker died in 1917 and his wife died 50 years later at the age of 100.

The second of the Baker's 13 children, Mrs. Nell Deavenport, 88, of Boulder, Colo., was six when her father parked their covered wagon on a 160-acre tract of prairie land destined to become Lockney.
