Snow Piles Up In Area

Heavy Fall Stalls Traffic

Seven inches of snow, accompanied by sharp winds, brought the Littlefield area to a near standstill Saturday morning.

The blowing snow came only five days before the first official day of the spring season.

Travel was virtually at a halt at mid-day Saturday as snow drifted into piles on streets and highways, blocking traffic in some instances.

The Texas Highway Department warned that persons should use area highways only in emergencies.

Numerous vehicles stalled during early hours Saturday, but no serious traffic mishaps were reported.

Sleet and snow rode into the area Friday night, along with sub-freezing temperatures. By noon Saturday, the mercury had risen to 31 degrees, but snow was continuing to fall.


Road conditions were expected to go from bad to worse with a temperature drop expected Saturday night.

General Telephone Company reported unusually heavy loads of phone traffic Saturday morning, but to that time the company had no communications problems.

State highway maintenance crews began working on highways at 3 a.m. Saturday

A spokesman for the h. Tvay department said conditions were extremely hazardous on Highway 385 all across Lamb County, but from Castro County north, less snow had fallen.

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The answer can be found in the comment of a U.S. writer Rebecca Tarshis, recently returned from the Soviet Union, who had an opportunity to visit the headquarters of Pravda. official newspaper of the Soviet communist party.

IN AN ARTICLE in the Portland, Oregonian, she says, "Pravda...is not attractive by our standards. It has no comic strips, advice to the lovelorn, household hints, recipes, advertising, or any of the numerous other features that brighten American newspapers.

She was told the primary

function of Pravda is to crusade for the principles of communism. It is published in a giant government printing establishment. Its profits are turned over to the communist party.

THERE CAN BE NO free press in Russia, since there is no free enterprise to support it. The color and diversity of the U.S. press- and its independence- are products of the very things we hear criticized often-advertising, promotion, private enterprise, the free market, competition, profits-things which do not exist in Russia.

And without which there would be no free press. That Pravda is dull should come as no surprise.

MUCH THAT IS HAPPENING today is calculated to break or destroy the human spirit.

These multiplied efforts are for the purpose of discouraging, downgrading, degrading, frightening and otherwide devitalizing us.

IF WE CARE about ourselves, our condition of life; about our children, their welfare; about our country and its future; about our cherished and necessary institutions; homes, churches, schools and such like; the human spirit must be upheld.

THIS SPIRIT INCLUDES our courage, our willingness to work, our readiness to sacrifice, our willingness to put first things first, our recognition of and adherence to wholesome and upgrading moral standards, and our sensible concern for our fellowmen.

The foundation for all of these great elements of the human spirit is in our trust in God, our Creator; properly expressed by

The God or gods we worship will affect our spirit. The objects of our devotion can and will make a difference, too. Self-control or lack of self-control will have much to do with our spirit.

Self-control is essential to a strong, vibrant spirit. Self-abandonment will completely corrupt the spirit.

WE MUST NOT PERMIT the overwhelming technological accumulations to depress us. The ease of living which seems to be so much the aim of most people is damaging to us, too.

In fact, easy-living causes degeneracy. The feeling of personal insignificance, which is another real possibility of technological pile-up, can weaken us; but we must not let this happen.

MATERIALISM, THE SOCIAL and political climate in which we live, does much to stifle our spirit.

Its influence tends to distore

Westmoreland is fortunate to have seven beige mutations. Beige chinchilla is the newest color to hit the market and is bringing the highest price.

The beige is so rare that only enough beige animals have been pelted to make one coat and this one is being premiered throughout the world.

Westmoreland took seven animals to the Fort Worth show and won five ribbons. "Any new color commands a promium price the first several years after it comes out," he said.

Chinchilla is a precious fur and comparable to mink. The national average for one chinchilla pelt is about \$20. One hundred to 125 pelts are used in one coat. "At this price it isn't hard to tell where the precious fur for the precious few! slogan originated."

Westmoreland has polygamous cages, five high and eight long, set up inside the building which houses the chinchillas. A long hallway allows one male access to all eight cages in his Martinez and Ramon Ysasaga.

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

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

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

Women Just Not **Given Credit!**

Are Lamb County women freer than their husbands?

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Is their life one of relative leisure, with plenty of time each day for luncheons, card games, back fence conversation, naps and general time killing?

That's what the men think. But, according to their wives, that is a very distorted picture. Actually, they claim, they are so busy with their household tasks that they have very little more free time than their husbands have.

To sort out these conflicting views and set the record straight, the University of Michigan's Institute for Social Research conducted a survey among a representative sampling of people in each section of the country. It sought to find out just how the

average married person spends his day, On the basis of these general

findings, it appears that the typical working man in Lamb County devotes 9.2 hours per day to work-connected activities.

This includes eight hours actually on the job plus about 3 4 of an hour on work breaks. The rest of the time is taken up with traveling to and from his place of employment.

If he drives to work, it takes about 20 minutes, on average, but nearly twice as long as that if he uses public transportation.

According to the latest government statistics covering Lamb County, less than one percent of the people use public transportation to get to work.

As for the average housewife who has no outside employment, her household chores take 5 1 2 hours a day, with 30 percent of the time taken up with cooking and dishes, 40 percent with cleaning, 25 percent with laundry and 5 percent, miscellaneous. Then there is marketing, mending,

caring for the children and incidental duties

For the 1,490 or so working wives in Lamb County, equivalent to about 26 percent of all married women



Don Beck May Not Be At Olton Next Year

Olton may or may not have Coach Don Beck back for another football season.

The highly-successful Mustang mentor submitted his resignation at Tuesday's regular meeting of the school board. It was accepted.

But a turn of events took place following that, and the board met in special session Friday night. Out of the meeting came a two-year contract offer for Beck, with a salary increase from \$9,004 to \$9,300. This board vote was unanimous on the contract.

Beck said Saturday he had verbally accepted the Sunray job, but when the contract was mailed to him to sign, the arrangements were not as agreed in a previous telephone call.

"I have called Sunray back, and they have told me that everything can be worked out like we talked about," Beck said. "I am supposed to meet with the Sunray board Monday night." Beck said he was unsure Saturday

afternoon about his decision, "but I'll know by Tuesday morning."

locally, their time is apportioned differently.

Because of their outside employment, although many of them work part-time, they spend two hours less per day on housework. They make up for it, to an extent, on Sundays.

After accounting for the amount of time spent in sleeping and in personal care, the general conclusion reached in the survey is that the average housewife with no outside job has only about one hour more time per day for leisure than her husband has,

The Olton coach said he felt like his verbal commitment with Sunray was null and void after the mailed contract varied from arrangements agreed to by telephone.

The Sunray board chose Beck after a two-week study of applicants. No salary offer has been learned by the Leader-News, but it is known that Sunray pays its classroom teachers \$1,000 above state scale.

Sunray is a Class A school located northeast of Dumas in Moore County.

Beck, 33, is a native of Canyon. He was graduated from West Texas State in 1957.

Rumors had come out of Olton that a few Mustang fans were unhappy with Beck after his two District 3-AA teams had gone undefeated through regular season the past two seasons, and then lost to Denver City in bi-district.

His three-year record at Olton is 24 wins and 7 losses. Combining this with his four-year carding at Wellington. which was 17-12-1, his career record stands at 51 wins, 19 losses and one

Olton Superintendent, Ray Schultz when contacted by the Leader-News, was outspoken in his opinion about Coach Beck. "I want him, and Olton needs him," he stated.

Beck confirmed there had been criticism from "four or five people in Olton" after the Denver City loss, but that after news broke of his resignation, "we had a jillion calls from people backing us up.

Beck said the reaction had convinced him and his staff that the "large majority" of Olton fans supported him and his coaching staff.


