Census Survey Slated Here

Local representatives of the Bureau of the Census will interview a sample of households in this area the week of July 15-19 to obtain information on employment.

The Bureau is part of the U.S. Department of Commerce's Social and Economic Statistics Administration. Interviewer who will visit households in this area will be Ina Mae Starnes of Littlefield. Percy R. Millard, director of the Bureau's Data Collection Center in Dallas, said the households are among 50,000 across the country that have been scientifically selected to represent a cross section of the American people.

The survey, which the Bureau conducts each month for the U.S. Department of Labor, provides a continuous measure of employment and unemployment for the Nation. For example, the May survey showed that employment was 96.0 million, up slightly from the 95.8 million at which it had stood since January. The unemployment rate edged up to 5.2 percent from 5.0 percent in April, primarily because of a rise in joblessness among teenagers.

Information supplied by individuals participating in the survey is kept confidential by law and results are used only to compile statistical totals.

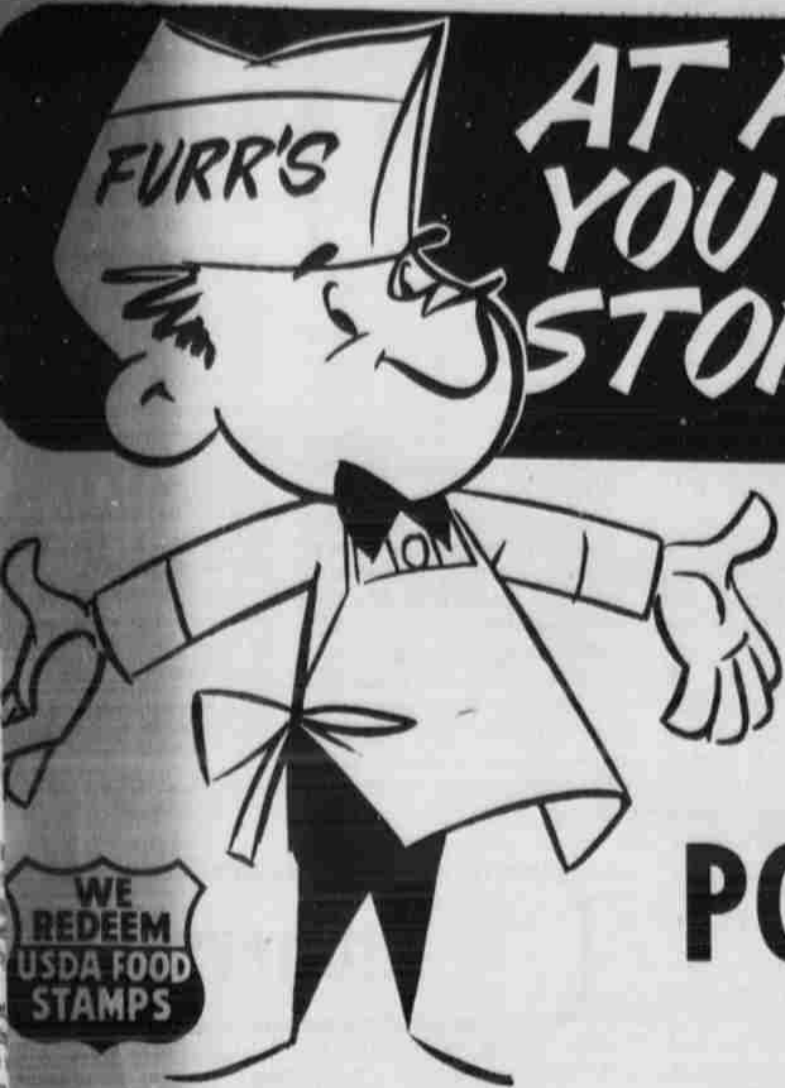

Communications Workers Ratify Contract With GTE

Communications Workers of America Friday, July 5, announced ratification of a three-year contract with General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

L. Gray Beck, president of General Telephone, and Donald A. Reek, vice president—personnel, will meet with T. O. Moses, CWA representative, W. Tyson Phillips, president local 6179, and W. W. Bean, president local 6180 in August to officially sign the new three year agreement.

The company and union announced June 14 they had reached tentative agreement on the contract that would increase wages and benefits approximately 27 per cent or \$12.5 million. The company and union began negotiations May 15 on the existing contract that ended June 27. The new agreement calls for new wage schedules to become effective retroactive to June 23. Increases over the three year period range from

72 cents to \$1.38 an hour, including cost of living increases. Wages also will be increased for a number of employees located in designated towns. Other improvements in the settlement include an additional holiday on the employee's service anniversary date; increased premium pay for working undesirable hours; substantial improvements in board and lodging expense payments for employees working out of town; improvements in life insurance; hospitalization plan and vacations; expansion of incidental leave of absence from 30 to 45 days and a variety of improvements in the company's pension plan and pension benefits. General Telephone serves more than one million telephones in over 400 exchanges in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Arkansas. The union represents around 6,100 craft employees in the company's operating territory.

Child's Check-Ups Important Before Entering Public School

Child is verbal and can understand simple directions. "Look at it this way," Fisher says. "Vision is the single most important sense modality for the human being. It leads learning. Any problem with vision and learning is automatically interfered with. A child can have perfect eyesight, 20/20, and still have a vision problem which interferes with learning. Vision is a very complex thing and it doesn't have only to do with whether a person is nearsighted or farsighted. The Snellen eye chart test one gets from the school nurse tests one thing more or less—whether the child is nearsighted. Chances are the nearsighted child may learn to read well and may do very well in school, whether his nearsightedness is recognized or not. He can see his book fine.

begun to realize that the first dental exam needs to come before the child is four. 'See your dentist twice a year.' Very effective slogan. Now I'd like to get a campaign started on the need for a vision check with a qualified optometrist. "How does the child begin to learn? Much or most of it through reading. First through third grade, the child learns to read. From fourth grade on he reads to learn. Naturally he reads with his eyes. If he is having difficulty, he may not be dumb—although that's the way it is often interpreted—he may only have a vision problem." Might not parents be afraid that an optometrist will put glasses on a child unnecessarily?

questions that Dr. David Rose, head of the Committee on Children and Youth for the Wisconsin Optometric Association, recommends asking: Do you make near point vision tests on children? Do you make visually related perception tests? Do you provide vision learning care for children with learning problems? Will I get a report from you? Will you see my child again during his first school year to ascertain progress?

In reviewing the plans of the Pampa group, Clotile (Mrs. Fred) Thompson indicated that the Aug. 5 auction was just one of many activities planned by the group, but that it was an important one in that almost all of the funding for the Gray County celebration will come from the sale of the commemorative coins.

Sales of the coins have been going well, she said, but the auction of the first ten numbered sets in each category should bring in considerably more money than regular prices.

Mrs. Thompson also revealed that the plans for the Art Show and Sale of coins, which will be held at M. K.
