Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake laughs at the idea that he threatened Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes over redistricting, as Robert Spellings, executive assistant to Barnes. charged Thursday

Spellings said Clayton threatened to call Barnes before the House General Investigating Committee unless the redistricting board changed house districts to suit Speaker Gus Mutscher.

"I was in no position to threaten anyone," Clayton said.



McDONALD LIKES LITTLEFIELD SQUARES

Dancing Keeps Him Young

By NILAH RODGERS

When the square dance caller puts on his record that gets the squares on the floor and intones: "Square 'em up boys, get on that floor, get your little doll, we need one more" nobody has to tell John McDonald (Johnny Mack) twice.

Johnny Mack first square danced when he was eight years old. Sixty-eight years later he is still at it. Does he mind telling his age? "I'm 76," he said. "Dadgumit!" he added.

If there is a secret to longevity it must be to work all day and dance all night, because that's what Johnny Mack does. He moved to Portales 65 years ago and he's been there ever since. He started his own trucking business in 1935 and even though he sold out several years ago, he still drives a butane transport truck for Portales Butane Company almost every

day. "I dance three nights a week one week" he and four nights a week the next week," he said. He averages driving 300 miles going to and from each dance, or 560 miles a week

When Littlefield's Circle Eight Square Dance Club meets every first and third Thursday, McDonald isn't introduced as a guest. He is a member. When dancers from Levelland, Lubbock, Muleshoe and Brownfield clubs are asked to stand up, McDonald could stand up for everyone of them, because there isn't a good square dance club around that he doesn't belong

During WWI McDonald quit dancing for a while, but since 1945 he has averaged two dances a week. He goes alone. Mrs. McDonald died eight years ago. "She was a good square dancer," McDonald said. "I'd say 'let's go' and she'd be ready. We raised our two kids in the back seat of the car. I've got a belt given to me for not years.

In the winter or when the weather is bad, McDonald goes to clubs close to Portales. Close that is for those who call the 160 miles between Littlefield and Portales just a hop. In the summer, McDonald said he likes to get out and around and visit with all the clubs he can.

AUSTIN-Another federal court ruling -voiding the new political filing fee law jarred state officials and posed the possibility of an emergency special legislative session soon.

While an earlier decision invalidating the old filing fee law was still on appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court, three judges in Dallas knocked out a back-up statute passed last year.

If rulings stand, Texas will be without any method of financing its May and June party primary elections. The filing deadline is Feb. 7.

In the original 1970 decision on the old law, fees were declared unconstitutional because they were used for revenuecollecting and were an absolute requirement to get on the ballot.

Legislators in 1971 passed a law effective Jan. 1, setting maximum filing fees amounting to four per cent of a candidate's term salary. Another provision provided for getting on the ballot by pauper's affidavits of inability to pay, together with a petition signed by 10 per cent of area voters. This, too, was invalidated by a federal court last Thursday.

State is now enjoined from implementing any fee system for financing the primaries.

Gov. Preston Smith and Secretary of State Bob Bullock have expressed hope courts will stay the latest order until the Supreme Court rules on the first case. Circuit Judge Homer Thornberry advised party county and state executive committees to make new rules for

carrying out the latest ruling. Since there is no authority for state financing of the primaries, a special legislative session apparently would be necessary to provide for that before May. One suggested alternative is voluntary contributions to pay the election bill - an estimated \$1.5 million statewide.



When we no longer care how we look, or how we act, or what we do; we are no longer living, but just existing.

WE KNOW HOW IMPORTANT, how very important, "wholesome pride" is to us in our personal lives, in our work and in all other facets of the life pattern.

Therefore, it should be easy enough to realize that the community in which we live; being nothing more than the extension of the lives of the people who dwell in it; benefits from wholesome 'civic pride'

WORTHY MEMBERS of a community will be actively and altruistically interested in the community. This is "civic pride". Just as the person who loses personal pride deteriorates into a dreary. discouraging state of existence; a city, in which the people lose a sense of civic pride, deteriorates.

It soon becomes less than it has the potential to be, and may even go down to a point of no return.

FROM THE PRACTICAL viewpoint, such considerations as property values; retail sales; physical growth; capital improvements; etc. are related to the level of civic pride.

All persons who have money invested in a community should be actively concerned with community betterment. There may be some elements of selfishnesss in this attitude; however, it is not totally selfish and is more than justified; because everybody benefits from such interst.

CIVIC PRIDE is also important from the aesthetic standpoint. In fact, there is a broad overlapping of the practical and the aesthetic in a knowledgeable approach to the most worthwhile community situation.

It is a costly mistake to try to maintain one without the other. A community appeals to people largely on the basis of how it looks to them. These are the first impressions, and have some effect upon all other impressions.

THE FEELING OF INTERST in the city where we live is one of the sure signs that we are aware of the many blessings of community life, and that we are also grateful for these blessings.

We will accept our fair share of responsibility to give all we are able to give to build up and beautify the place where we live. This is "civic pride"

WE MUST NOT try to force this good attitude upon each other, but we can certainly encourage one another.

"Civic pride" is contagious. Some people may be more susceptible than others, but when those who care the most begin to act; many others will be encouraged to act, too.

"CIVIC PRIDE" is the life spirit of a city. It can be weak or strong. We decide which.

One truth is self-evident; no one is going to do for us what we can and should do for ourselves

The Olton area leads the bale count with 19,630 bales ginned at the Circle, Jack Straw and Olton Co-op Gins.

Five gins in the Earth area totaled 14,686 bales when the survey was made Friday. Littlefield's three gins and the other

REGISTRATION CONTINUES

First Voter List Near

Those who have not registered to vote by closing time Monday will be placed on the supplemental voters registration list. Persons who complete voter registration by Monday will be placed on the initial

registration list. The traditional Jan. 31 deadline for registering to vote is no longer in effect. Under the new Texas law, voters may register year round. However, a person must register at least 31 days before an election to be eligible to vote.

Persons moving within a county may transfer their voter registrations from one

precinct to another at least 31 days before an election. Voters moving into another county must live there six months before they become eligible to vote.

A person may vote absentee in the county where he is registered during that six months, though.

Voters registering this year will be registered for a period of three years. Registration is automatically extended when the voter casts a ballot in a primary, runoff or general election during that period.

GUEST EDITORIAL 'My Responsibility To Freedom'



AUSTIN-Another federal court ruling voiding the new political filing fee law jarred state officials and posed the possibility of an emergency special legislative session soon.

While an earlier decision invalidating the old filing fee law was still on appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court, three judges in Dallas knocked out a back-up statute passed last year.

If rulings stand, Texas will be without any method of financing its May and June party primary elections. The filing deadline is Feb. 7.

In the original 1970 decision on the old law, fees were declared unconstitutional because they were used for revenuecollecting and were an absolute requirement to get on the ballot.

Legislators in 1971 passed a law effective Jan. 1, setting maximum filing fees amounting to four per cent of a candidate's term salary. Another provision provided for getting on the ballot by pauper's affidavits of inability to pay, together with a petition signed by 10 per cent of area voters. This, too, was invalidated by a federal court last Thursday.

State is now enjoined from implementing any fee system for financing the primaries.

Gov. Preston Smith and Secretary of State Bob Bullock have expressed hope courts will stay the latest order until the Supreme Court rules on the first case. Circuit Judge Homer Thornberry advised party county and state executive committees to make new rules for carrying out the latest ruling. Since there is no authority for state

financing of the primaries, a special legislative session apparently would be necessary to provide for that before May. One suggested alternative is voluntary contributions to pay the election bill - an estimated \$1.5 million statewide.

OIL ALLOWABLE DELAYED

Texas Railroad Commission decided to delay setting the February oil allowable pending further study.

Major purchasers, the commission explained, report inventories are higher than needs, although crude stocks are at a four-year low mark

Seven of 14 major crude oil purchasers requested a larger oil allowable factor for February. Two requested a small one, and five proposed to keep the January factor of 67.5 per cent of potential. The U.S. Bureau of Mines predicted demand in February would be 3,530,000 barrels a day, or 10,000 less than January.

WHOLESOME PRIDE is a reasonable or justifiable self-respect. When this dies, we have lost one of the essential life elements.

When we no longer care how we look, or how we act, or what we do; we are no longer living, but just existing.

WE KNOW HOW IMPORTANT, how very important, "wholesome pride" is to us in our personal lives, in our work and in all other facets of the life pattern.

Therefore, it should be easy enough to realize that the community in which we live; being nothing more than the extension of the lives of the people who dwell in it; benefits from wholesome "civic pride"

WORTHY MEMBERS of a community will be actively and altruistically interested in the community. This is "civic pride". Just as the person who loses personal pride deteriorates into a dreary. discouraging state of existence; a city, in which the people lose a sense of civic pride, deteriorates.

It soon becomes less than it has the potential to be, and may even go down to a point of no return.

FROM THE PRACTICAL viewpoint, such considerations as property values; retail sales; physical growth; capital improvements; etc. are related to the level of civic pride

All persons who have money invested in a community should be actively concerned with community betterment. There may be some elements of selfishnesss in this attitude; however, it is not totally selfish and is more than justified; because everybody benefits from such interst.

CIVIC PRIDE is also important from the aesthetic standpoint. In fact, there is a broad overlapping of the practical and the aesthetic in a knowledgeable approach to the most worthwhile community situation.

It is a costly mistake to try to maintain one without the other, A community appeals to people largely on the basis of how it looks to them. These are the first impressions, and have some effect upon all other impressions.

THE FEELING OF INTERST in the city where we live is one of the sure signs that we are aware of the many blessings of community life, and that we are also grateful for these blessings.

We will accept our fair share of responsibility to give all we are able to give to build up and beautify the place where we live. This is "civic pride"

WE MUST NOT try to force this good attitude upon each other, but we can certainly encourage one another.

"Civic pride" is contagious. Some people may be more susceptible than others, but when those who care the most begin to act; many others will be encouraged to act, too.

"CIVIC PRIDE" is the life spirit of a city. It can be weak or strong. We decide which


