## Baccalaureate Services Today

OLTON'S GRADUATES will have their baccalaureate tonight at 8 o'clock in the Olton High School Auditorium. Commencement exercises for 53 Olton graduates is set for Friday, May 26, at 8 p.m. in the school auditorium.

SPRINGLAKE-EARTH graduates will have their baccalaureate at 8 p.m. today in the Springlake-Earth High School Auditorium. Forty-five SE seniors are candidates for diplomas. Commencement is set for Saturday, May 27, at 8 p.m. in the SE auditorium.

SUDAN SENIORS hear their baccalaureate address tonight at 8 in the Sudan High School Auditorium. Twenty-four Sudan seniors are candidates for graduation at exercises set for Friday, May 26, at 8 p.m. in the Sudan High Auditorium.

ANTON'S SENIORS will have their baccalaureate at 8 o'clock tonight in the Anton High School Auditorium. Commencement for 23 Anton seniors will be at 8 p.m. Thursday, May 25, in the Anton school auditorium.

WHITHARRAL GRADUATES will have their baccalaureate tonight at 8 in the Whitharral Baptist Church. Thirteen Whitharral seniors are slated to receive diplomas in commencement at 8 p.m. Thursday, May 25 in the Whitharral Cafeteria.

auditorium. Commencement for Spade's five graduates will be Tuesday night, May 23, at 8 p.m. in the school auditorium.

AMHERST SENIORS will have their baccalaureate next Sunday, May 28, at 8 p.m. in the Amherst High School Auditorium. Sixteen Amherst seniors are slated to receive diplomas at 8 p.m. Monday, May 29, in the school auditorium.

## Four Persons Injured In Two-Car Crash

All four persons involved in a two-car crash were injured when two Mustangs collided on the 84 by-pass on the west side of Littlefield Thursday afternoon.

A Littlefield man, Nathan Don Wheeler, 36, and three Dallas residents, Harold Bostich, 49, his son, Billy Frank Bostich, 17, and another 17-year-old, William Jesse English, were all taken to the Littlefield Hospital by a Hammons ambulance.

The Littlefield man was going east on

a county dirt road west of the west side of Marshall Howard Blvd. Wheeler crossed the first two lanes and the median and hit the northbound car in the east line of traffic, according to Chief of Police James Cox. Cox estimated that both cars are total losses.

Wheeler was admitted to the hospital for treatment of bruises and abrasions. Harold Bostich and English were admitted for treatment of head injuries, and the younger Bostich was treated for minor injuries to his head and arms and released.

City police have cleared two cases of breaking and entering, which occurred Wednesday and Thursday of the past week.

Two juvenile boys admitted breaking windows in a house on West Sixth, and are to pay damages.

## City Insurance Policy Discussed

Littlefield city councilmen discussed proposals as submitted by three insurance companies for insurance policies for city employees, during their regular meeting Thursday night.

The proposals are being checked out, and a selection is to be made in a special meeting this week. Councilmen were informed that the old policy will be out June 1, and that a new one must be in force by that date.

Councilmen heard a report on the progress of the Bull Lake lease. Attorneys are reviewing the lease contract, and the official signing of the contract will be made later.

The new road to the lake, which begins west of the old entrance, is now open, and is being improved with a caliche filling.

Apartment and home building financing, as provided through Farmers' Home Administration, was discussed. Mayor J. E. Chisholm requested that councilmen explore the different types of financing available, so that information may be available to the Chamber of Commerce for enclosure in folders and brochures.

Councilmen discussed a request from persons interested in the Lamb County Library, concerning the receiving of financial aid. Councilmen took no action on the matter, but agreed that they would consider the request if other cities in the county considered it.

In other routine matters of business, councilmen approved the minutes of the last meeting and approved payment of bills.

## Earth Artist Welding Way To Fame With Pipe, Baling Wire, Copper

Always a cowboy at heart, Bobby D. Green of Earth never really liked farming.

Even as a freckle-faced kid, Green got in his share of bareback riding and piddled with pocket knife carvings.

Later he tried some paintings. Then a few months ago he was messing around with some old pipe, baling wire and an acetylene torch. "It was all just an experiment," Green said.

When someone offered him \$250 for one of his "experiments" he sold it, and he's been making a living from his artistic talents since January.

Green resembles an Ace Reid cowboy with his western hat pushed back on his reddish hair and smoke curling up from his cigarette. His wooden and metal figures reveal some of the characteristic weathered lines seen in Green's own features.

Green's paintings, carvings and metal sculptures have home on the range flavor Green soaked up in his years of part-time cowboying on Earth's Halsell Ranch.

A cowboy sewing up a hole in his sock, skin and bones horses, fence posts and owls find their way into his works.

The artist's ideas are all original. Green won't even go to showings of others' exhibits. "If I saw an idea I liked, it would be hard not to do something similar to it," Green explained.

Green will have his own exhibit soon. His wife took one of his metal tree sculptures to the House of Alexander in Lubbock. They took one look at it and asked for 10 or 12 pieces to put on display on a consignment basis.

Green got his display ready and loaned it to the Earth bank. Before he could get it to Lubbock, two more of the three dimensional works sold.

Green's works are unlike the artist who takes a solid block of metal and cuts figures and scenes with a torch. Neither will his artistic pieces lend themselves to a mold. No two works are ever alike. He wouldn't want them to be. "I couldn't make two alike if I wanted to," he added.

Time spent on a sculpture varies. Those with great detail take a week or two. Sometimes Green spends a whole day working on facial features. He is his worst critic. If something doesn't please him, he starts over.

All of Green's raw materials are junk except for the copper. "I try to use what no one else would want," Green said. "And buying copper is like buying gold," he added. Every drop of metal, each little wire is added one at a time.

Green was planning to get out of farming, any way. "My wife and friends kept telling me my artistic work was good," he said modestly. "So I just thought I'd try it and see."

The hostesses gift of extra pieces of Noritake China, was displayed among the many other gifts.

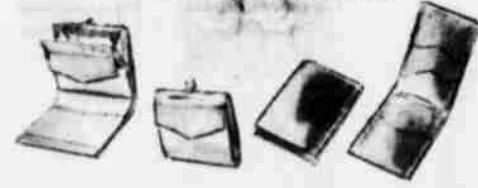

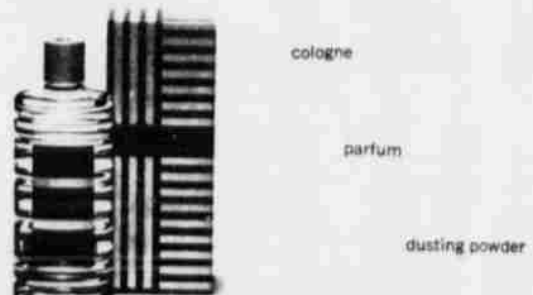
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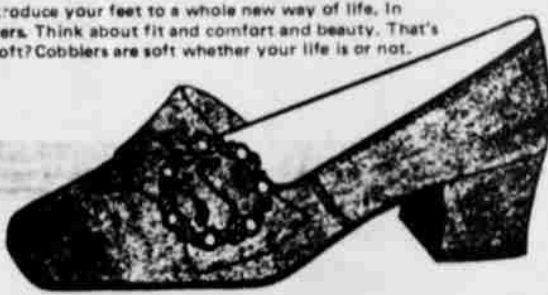
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# Anderson-Hutson Vows Read Saturday

### As We Please

DOING AS WE PLEASE is probably the most certain way to create the situation in which it is impossible to do as we please.

The kind of unrestrained and misguided action this attitude of mind produces is the source of the worst possible social climate.

PERMISSIVENESS IS the principal degrading element in this grossly false, and obviously destructive life style.

It is the most perverted concept of personal freedom and personal rights, and it will, in time, destroy the most cherished and useful rights of humankind.

LIFE OUT-OF-CONTROL is not life, not life that is of any value to anyone. In fact, it is too close to death to be called "life."

All uncontrolled and misdirected power is destructive, and the life-power uncontrolled is perhaps the most destructive of all.

TO DO AS WE PLEASE is not the true liberty which provides the best for the living experience.

It is a view and a practice which will, in a little while, bring misery and despair to us. This is not liberty, but slavery.

"FALSE NOTIONS of liberty are strangely common. People talk of it as if it meant the liberty of doing whatever one likes — whereas the only liberty that a man, worthy of the name of man, ought to ask for, is to have all restrictions, inward and outward,

removed that prevent his doing what he ought." — Robertson.

This foolish notion, that we should be able to do as we please, is associated with some very dangerous companions. It is always closely associated with the worst kind of insecurity.

This insecurity, on its own, can practically destroy the vitality which is so essential to living. The sense of meaninglessness increases until nothing seems worthwhile.

There is a nagging feeling that something has gone wrong, and it sometimes becomes a state of panic. Everything goes wrong, including the impossibility of a satisfactory association with other people.

WE ARE ANTI-SELF, and anti-social when we assume the unwise view that we can do as we please. Such a wrong life-course will work against both what is best for us and for the social order of which we are a part.

We are working against our own best interests, because we have set our course on the lonely road of diminishing returns.

THERE MUST BE GUIDANCE, control, discipline and restraint in the successful action of everything. We can see all of these at work in the physical universe, and in the development and use of all resources.

Can we imagine what the universe would become if it should throw off all controls, restraints and guiding power?

WE DO NOT have the right to do as we please, until and unless we please to do what is right.

LITTLEFIELD IS the city it is, because we, the people, are what we are. If the changes and improvements we want made in our community are ever made, there must be some changes and improvements in us.

It is not a justified position, because all of us can help beautify and improve Littlefield. When we do this, we are working for ourselves; because we are Littlefield.

SOME PERSONS, because of background and training, may be able and willing to do more than others. This is as it should be; however, each one of us can help.

If we can do nothing else, we can be generous in the encouragement of the people who are working. We can help and encourage each other. Let us do this.

WITH OUR PRESENT work of "clean up," "fix up," and "paint up," we must include practical plans to "keep up" Littlefield.

WE ARE LITTLEFIELD, and should plan and work accordingly.

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## Highway Patrol Checks Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of April, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in five persons injured. The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of 1972 shows a total of 26 accidents resulting in one person killed, and 23 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for April, 1972 shows a total of 445 accidents resulting in 44 persons killed and 232 persons injured as compared to April, 1971 with 454 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 276 persons injured.

## COTTON TALKS

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC.

The schedule of premiums and discounts for eligible qualities of 1972-crop upland cotton, to be used this year by Commodity Credit Corporation in making loans to producers, was released May 5.

According to an analysis by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., premiums and discounts "are generally narrower than those in effect for the 1971 crop," reflecting spot market prices for cotton recorded over the nine-month period from August, 1971 through April of this year.

"This will be the third year of a trend toward smaller differences between loan values for higher and lower qualities and longer and shorter staples," notes Donald Johnson, PGC Executive Vice President, adding that this is a "natural

result of the supply-demand relationships for the various classifications."

Until recent months the supply of shorter staples and lower grades of cotton has been somewhat restricted, while the supply of higher white grades of medium and longer staples has been relatively plentiful.

"However the final quality distribution of the 1971 crop has reversed the situation to some extent," Johnson said, "and the narrowing of differentials may well end with 1972."

The base loan rate for Middling 1-inch cotton, basis 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire and net weight at average location, for 1972 is 19.5 cents per pound, the same as for 1971.

The loan rate for this base quality at Lubbock area

warehouses, excepting Floydada, for the past several years has been five points below "average location," or 19.45 cents per pound. The Floydada loan rate has been the same as the average, 19.5 cents.

But USDA has indicated there may be some minor revisions in the 1972 location differentials because of increased transportation costs.

The extent of these revisions is not yet known, which means calculation and publication of physical loan prices for High Plains cotton at this time would be premature.

## Short Season Cotton Is Being Evaluated

The cost of producing narrow row short season cotton in West Texas farming operations will be evaluated by the High Plains Research Foundation this year.

The evaluation, sponsored by a \$29,000 research grant from Cotton Incorporated will be made at the Foundation near Halfway and on farms east of Lubbock, near Ropesville, north of Aiken and North of Springlake.

According to Dr. Doug Owen, agronomist in charge of the study, evaluations will be made from cotton fields covering at least 50 acres each. "This way we can better determine the costs on a farm-size basis."

Cotton varieties best adapted to the four locations will be planted in row spacings from 10 inches to 32 inches in width and under irrigated and dryland conditions.

"What we will be looking for is the system or systems that will produce the highest yields at least cost for each of these areas," Dr. Owen said.

The study will include all production costs from the shredding of the stubble of the previous crop through harvest of the 1972 cotton crop.

Dr. Owen said the total study area would include approximately 550 acres over a large portion of the South Plains cotton production area.

Study cooperators include ACCO Seed Farm, Aiken; Lockett Seed Co., Ropesville; Ray Joe Riley of Springlake and Robert Melcher, Lubbock.

### FEDERAL LAND BANK NAMES NEW CHAIRMAN

W. H. McCown, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Littlefield received word this week that Herbert H. Decker, president of The Federal Land Bank of Houston, has been named chairman of the bond committee of the 12 Federal Land Banks. This committee is responsible for marketing the bonds which fund the lending operations of this nationwide farm credit system.

Last year the 12 banks loaned a total of 1.6 billion dollars and on December 31, 1971 had over 400,000 loans outstanding for 7.9 billion dollars.

McCown stated that the local association makes and services loan in Lamb County, and at the present time has 797 loan outstanding for approximately eleven million dollars.

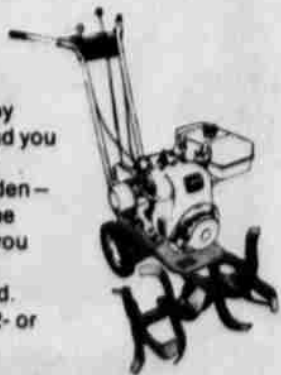
