1969, and that since a black background would not be very reflective, the new letter and numeral color was chosen by the Texas Highway Department.

The reflectorized material, which the highway department buys from Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing, does not work in a black background, and has to go in a color that can be reflectorized.

A spokesman for the Texas Highway Department said the blue letters and numerals could be changed to some other color, perhaps red, in 1971, or reverted

The highway department does not have any statistics, but believes reflectorized license plates have prevented

Among some of the safety factors involved in avoiding accidents include: abandoned autos on the highways with reflectorized plates can be seen at some distance in the dark when headlights strike the plates, and in cases where one headlight is out on an auto, the reflectorized plate on the approaching vehicle reveals that it is an automobile instead of a motorcycle.

License plates without reflectorized material bonded to them cost 12.4 cents a pair, but reflectorized plates cost 42

The plates are made by convicts at the state prison in Huntsville and saves the state thousands of dollars on labor costs.



They Are 'Do-Right' Boys

There's an Angel and a Parson

watching Lamb County motorists. When a county resident is involved in an accident, the Angel and Parson are among the first to arrive at the scene to comfort and aid victims.

They also dispense justice to motorized law breakers.

The Angel is Highway Patrolman Bill Angel, and the "preacher" is Highway Patrolman Weldon Parson. "Or pole cats, the do-right boys, or stripped legs," Angel said. "We know all the names-fuzz, cops, and worse. We've been called everything, but usually not to our faces.'

Angel and Parson have been with the Department of Public Safety (DPS) for a total of more than 27 years.

Angel, whose surname sounds like an endearment or suggests heaven, has been a highway patrolman over 16 years. He has spent almost 10 of these years in Littlefield.

Parson has been with DPS 11 years and has lived in Littlefield six years. These public servants work when most persons aren't working. All holidays are

just another workday to them and they are on call 24 hours a day. In their line of duty they see the ruesome side of life as well as the lighter,

Speeding leads the list of traffic offenses and the excuses drivers give for speeding provide these two officers with many laughs. One woman stopped for speeding told Angel that her gas tank was almost empty and she was trying to get to a service station before she ran out of gas.

"I stopped one lad for speeding," Angel said. "When I asked him if he had a good reason for driving so fast, he said, 'I sure do, I left my wife in Dickens." Angel said the young couple was headed for California. The man was driving while his wife slept in the back seat. When he stopped at Dickens for gas, his wife got out and went to the rest room. They had clothes hanging in the back seat, and he didn't miss her until he got to Clovis, N.

"Don't you think it might be better if

you just went on to California?" Angel

The most common excuse for speeding given to Parson is that they were in a hurry to go to the bathroom. "I usually just follow them right on in," Parson said, 'and give them a ticket.'

Parson has found that drivers who weave down the highway aren't always

drunk. "Sometimes they are about out of gas and are sloshing fuel from side to side trying to make it to a gas tank before running out," he said. "Oh, gracious!"

Of all persons stopped for various violations, women give more excuses. Women may be the weaker sex," Angel said, "but not when it comes to talking."

Angel doesn't go along with the idea that women are poorer drivers than men, either. "Statistics show this. Men get the most violations," Angel said. "That's been my experience.'

Angel and Parson say teenaged boys aren't a big problem either, although insurance companies penalize male

Tickets issued to adult men account for one-half or more ticketed traffic violations in Lamb County. Women and teenagers get about 25 per cent each of the total tickets issued in enforcing highway laws.

Angel and Parson give 60-75 tickets a month, or close to 1,000 tickets each

May, June, July and August are peak traffic months. Out of state vacationers and tourists run up the total in the summer months. Local traffic is heaviest during the fall, or from the time school starts until about Jan. 1.

Angel and Parson enforce general highway laws on every public road outside incorporated towns in Lamb County. They assist towns outside the county if called on.

There are 300 miles of paved roads to cover in Lamb County, and Angel and Parson investigate about 120 accidents each year. Ten to 15 per cent of the accidents in Lamb County are on dirt roads. "Mostly at intersection," Parson said, "when people forget to look to see if another vehicle is coming."

In investigating wrecks, the patrolmen help clear the road and direct traffic. About two or three hours are required to work most highway wrecks.





In 1966 a small band of American pilgrims tried. Let's see

AMISHMEN DO NOT BELIEVE in much of what we consider modern and civilized and necessary, such as electricity, automobiles and ornamented attire.

how they made out.

In 1949, fleeing the engulfing tide of materialism and sophistication in Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Indiana, a group of them migrated to the Arkansas

Each family bought 150 acres of rocky soil at \$6 an acre. With horse-drawn equipment and bare hands, they cleared the land and developed productive farms.

THEN WHEN THE STATE decreed that they must send their children to public schools, which they considered worldly and incompatible with a religious life, they decided it was time to move

In 1966, out of step with the mores, morals and laws of the United States, a tiny band of Amish pilgrims left our country to seek "freedom" in the primitive jungles of Central America.

EIGHT OF THEM took their families to the virgin interior of western British Honduras.

They bought 3,640 acres in the foothills of the Maya Mountains near the Belize River. Each family built its own house and, hacking back the jungle manzanas with machetes, cleared an average 30 acres for each.

ON THIS ACREAGE they now raise cattle and truck crops. The climate is warm and wet, excellent for some breeds of beef cattle.

They are growing such tropical-adaptive foods as yams, citrus fruits, beans and corn. All they want of pineapples, mangoes, bananas, coconuts and rice grow

wild or with minimal assistance.

HAVE COMMUNICATED indirectly with the colony and have heard no complaint of illness from among them. The colony appears to have adjusted to the climate and the different culture. They have complete military exemption and their own schools.

One communication mentions thievery by natives, so there's still a serpent in Eden, but the pilgrims are so comfortably at home in their new land that their experience has inspired further Amish migration to Central America.

AMISH GROUPS from the United States and Canada are participating in or planning major migrations.

In 1967 a group of Amish families from Orange County, Ind., migrated to Paraguay. Eight families purchased an entire village

Last year other Amish families moved to Paraguay.

A HALF-DOZEN families from the United States are pioneering in a colonization and mission project in Costa Rica, "making good progress." They are beginning farm operations in the Arenal region, recently purchasing 250 head of beef cattle.

Amish settlers in the remote region of Chaco in Paraguay are not alone. In that area, once a vast wilderness occupied only by nomadic Indian tribes, are now 12,000 Japanese settlers and 100 farm families from Switzerland, but Mennonites from Canada first tamed the Chaco bush.

OVERPOPULATION of overdeveloped countries will motivate an increasing tide of emigration to the underpopulated Latin-American frontier, but it is sad to see American pilgrims leaving America seeking, of all things, religious liberty.



Owens led in rebounds for the Cats with 8, while Holt had 7 and Hutchins had 6.






