The board will be made up of persons appointed by the court for staggered four-year terms. If possible, these persons will include at least one representative from the Littlefield-Spade area, one from Springlake-Earth, from Amherst, Sudan and Olton.

The board will submit an annual budget to the Commissioners Court and, subject to review and approval of the court, establish policies and programs for the library. The board will cooperate with other public and private groups in advancing the best interests of the library, and make recommendations regarding the library to the Commissioners Court. These recommendations will include a librarian or assistant librarian and recommended salary for such employees.

The board will set fees for regulatory purposes, and deposit money from fines, donations, memorials and such sources in a fund for the Lamb County Library.

Multiple Sclerosis Campaign Underway

The Woman's Club of Littlefield is again this year working with the South Plains Chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society in conducting the annual MS Hope Chest Campaign.

"This year, with the help of the Olton Study Club and the Study Club in Anton, we are working as a team to contact not only Littlefield, but the people of Lamb County and adjacent communities," stated Mrs. Tena Wicker, chairwoman of the Lamb County MS Drive.

"Multiple Sclerosis is a neurological disease attacking the brain and spinal cord. It most often attacks young people between the ages of 20 and 40 years old," Mrs. Wicker emphasizes. "Its cause is unknown as yet, though considerable progress has been made through the efforts of medical research. The course of the disease is uncertain from day to day with periods of remission, or no change. The age group most often involved are the young in the midst of family, home and professional planning. Many of these peoples' disease is sufficiently mild that they can continue with their work and do well, but for many this is not the case. In either event, considerable adjustment in the plans of the home, emotional attitude and financial planning must be made," she continued.

"There are an estimated 500,000 people in the United States with Multiple Sclerosis. The National Society started in 1946 and in 1948 only \$62,368 in funds for research were available. Now, on the National level there are more than \$24 million available. Internationally known physicians have been quoted as feeling that a breakthrough in information as to the cause of this crippler of young adults should be forthcoming.

"Without knowing the cause, a cure is unlikely. These physicians also state See MS CAMPAIGN, Page 4

Former Amherst Man Owes Life To Machine

Amherst, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Nichols of Amherst, and now a Lubbock resident, might consider Galveston his home away from home.

In January of 1973, James went to the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston as a patient with chronic renal failure. In April of that year he received a kidney transplant.

His new kidney, donated by his brother, worked well for 19 months but subsequently rejected and had to be removed in November 1974.

James, a man not discouraged easily, then undertook a new method of treatment of his renal failure, and with enthusiasm and good spirits, started training at the Chronic Home Dialysis Center in early January of 1975. During the intensive training period, James learned the medical and technical machine in order that he may manage his own life-saving treatment at home.

Lu Ella, James' wife of 12 years, also received instruction at the center. She will serve as her husband's "back-up", or Chief Assistant, helping out when

After getting settled at home, James hopes to return to Commercial College in Lubbock where he was enrolled in a computer programming course. He hopes to enter that field when he finishes

Lu Ella, formerly employed at the Cooper School in Lubbock, plans to be a housewife for a while, take care of their two daughters, Lucretia, 10, a fourth grader; and Stephanie, 7, a first grader, and she plans to raise a garden. Perhaps in the future she will go back to work.

Census Bureau Slates Survey Here Next Week

How many people are supplementing their regular pay check with a second job? How many people are enrolled in adult educational courses or are taking vocational training?

Percy R. Millard, Director of the Bureau of the Census Regional Office in Dallas, has announced that information or these subjects will be collected during the week of May 19 from a sample of households in this area. The questions are in addition to the usual ones asked in the monthly survey on employment and unemployment conducted nationwide by the Bureau of the Census for the U. S. Dpeartment of Labor.

Interviewer who will visit households here is Rosemary McNeese of Rt. 1, Amherst.

Results of this monthly survey provide a continuing measure of economic conditions in the country. In March, total employment (as measured by the monthly survey of households) declined by nearly 200,000 to 83.8 million. This marked the sixth consecutive month of employment reductions, which have totaled 2.6 million since last September.

Households in this survey are among the 50,000 nationwide that have been scientifically selected to represent a cross section of all U.S. households. All information they supply is held confidential by law and is used only to compile statistical





IT'S THAT TIME AGAIN!



THE MONTH OF MAY is one of the worst for tornadoes in a season that normally lasts in Texas from February through June. But the destructive winds don't necessarily follow the rules or the calendar, and an insurance executive advises readiness at all times.

"Whenever and wherever a tornado is spotted," says J. O. (Jim) Smith, Jr., chairman of the Texas Insurance Advisory Association (TIAA), "immediate action can save lives and property."

Texas is a favorite resting spot for twisters- and the penalty comes in lives and property lost. Companions in destruction are lightning, a frequent killer, and flash floods.

Last year in Texas there were 116 tornadoes, the lowest since 1966 but no guarantee there won't be this many or more in 1975. June and October were leading storm months.

Of several already this year, there has been considerable destruction and more deaths from tornadoes than all of last year. Lefors in the Panhandle and Yancey near San Antonio have felt nature's fury and nearly every area of the state has been under numerous watches.

"Last year was bad enough- one only has to remember the wipe out of Xenia, Ohio- but 1975 looks as grim, as the experience in Nebraska suggests." Smith says.

In 1974, there were nearly 1,000 tornadoes across the nation, causing more than \$1 billion in property damage.

In the first three months of this about 200 tornadoes have already caused problems nationally- and this is more than twice what occured in the same period of 1974.

"Knowing what to do before a tornado touches down can save lives and property," Smith says. "Knowing what to do after can reduce damage, too."

-Get in a bathroom or closet near the center of the house on the ground floor. At least get under a table or other protective covering to avoid injury from falling debris.

-Avoid buildings having large and relatively lightly anchored roofs, such as auditoriums and gymnasiums.

-In open country, move at right angles to the tornado's path. Lie flat in the nearest ditch, ravine or other depression if trapped.

-No matter what, don't stay in an automobile.

-Anchor or tie down mobile homes, frequently victims of the worst damage. -Keep a battery-operated radio on hand for the latest advisories.

—High winds cause the most damage by pushing in walls and windows and tearing off roofs. Flying debris is also

Strict observance of a set of basic tornado-safety rules could to an interior hallway on the result in a significant drop in windstorm-related deaths and injuries.

Weather service spokesmen emphasize the need for un derstanding the various rules and tornado statements issued by NWS.

A "Tornado watch" indicates that weather conditions may produce severe thunderstorms or tornadoes in the area. In dividuals should begin formulating plans in the event that conditions worsen.

When a "tornado warning" is issued, a funnel cloud has been sighted in the area visually or has been indicated by radar. When a warning is issued, it is time to prepare to carry out plans on seeking safety.

Other safety rules to keep in







And to the biologist the toothy fish represent voracious predators capable of checking muskie which is more adaptable the populations of the largest of rough fish which might threaten to choke an inland lake.

On May 5, Jack Crabtree, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department regional fisheries supervisor in northeast Texas, arrived back in the state with 90,000 muskie eggs and 10,000 "norlunge" eggs- a hybrid between the northern pike and muskellunge developed by the State of New York.

Obtained at no charge from the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, the two species of

Parks and Wildlife Deparement's Heart of the Hills Research Station outside of Kerrville.
