Library Buys Trucks, Creates Advisory Board

The board will be made up of persons appointed by the court for staggered four-year terms. If possible, these persons will include at least one representative from the Littlefield-Spade area, one from Springlake-Earth, from Amherst, Sudan and Olton.

The librarian will be an ex-officio, non-voting member. The board will submit an annual budget to the Commissioners Court and, subject to review and approval of the court, establish policies and programs for the library. The board will cooperate with other public and private groups in advancing the best interests of the library, and make recommendations regarding the library to the Commissioners Court. These recommendations will include a librarian or assistant librarian and recommended salary for such employees.

The board will set fees for regulatory purposes, and deposit money from fines, donations, memorials and such sources in a fund for the Lamb County Library. Commissioners opened bids for a pickup for Hubert Dykes' precinct 4 and a truck for Jack Peel's precinct 3. Five competitive bids were turned in for the pickup, and the court accepted a bid of \$3,667.49 from Thompson Chevrolet.

Multiple Sclerosis Campaign Underway

The Woman's Club of Littlefield is again this year working with the South Plains Chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society in conducting the annual MS Hope Chest Campaign.

"This year, with the help of the Olton Study Club and the Study Club in Anton, we are working as a team to contact not only Littlefield, but the people of Lamb County and adjacent communities," stated Mrs. Tena Wicker, chairwoman of the Lamb County MS Drive.

"Multiple Sclerosis is a neurological disease attacking the brain and spinal cord. It most often attacks young people between the ages of 20 and 40 years old," Mrs. Wicker emphasizes. "Its cause is unknown as yet, though considerable progress has been made through the efforts of medical research. The course of the disease is uncertain from day to day with periods of remission, or no change. The age group most often involved are the young in the midst of family, home and professional planning. Many of these peoples' disease is sufficiently mild that they can continue with their work and do well, but for many this is not the case. In either event, considerable adjustment in the plans of the home, emotional attitude and financial planning must be made," she continued.

"There are an estimated 500,000 people in the United States with Multiple Sclerosis. The National Society started in 1946 and in 1948 only \$62,568 in funds for research were available. Now, on the National level there are more than \$24 million available. Internationally known physicians have been quoted as feeling that a breakthrough in information as to the cause of this crippling of young adults should be forthcoming.

"Without knowing the cause, a cure is unlikely. These physicians also state See MS CAMPAIGN, Page 4

Gas Priority Hearing Begins Today

A hearing by the Federal Power Commission concerning the lowering of natural gas from priority No. 3 to No. 2 is scheduled for 9 a.m. today and tomorrow in the Federal Building, 205 Texas in Lubbock.

"All interested persons are urged to attend the hearing," stated Rad Richardson, president of the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture,

"for a show of strength may be the only thing that will change their minds."

The Chamber has been in contact with Congressman George Mahon expressing our concern according to David Jones, agricultural vice president of the Chamber. "Apparently, the FPC is being a bit stubborn about the matter," Jones said.

In a recent letter to constituents, Mahon referred to the FPC action as "intolerable" and said: "I have been in contact with FPC officials on numerous occasions urging them to provide information on appropriate procedures for people in our area to seek some type of relief."

In addition to the Lubbock hearing, the FPC also has granted requests for field hearings at Albuquerque and Phoenix.

Jones said the Board of Directors

passed the following as the Chamber's official position concerning agricultural energy supplies which would also apply to the priority change:

"The Littlefield Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture takes the position that any restriction upon the potential production of our agricultural producers is detrimental to our local economy as well as the national interests," he said. "We are therefore against any restriction in energy supplies which might have both short and long term effects upon this region's capability to supply food and fiber for use by the nation and world.

"We realize that in an arid region such as ours is, a short duration of water curtailment can be disastrous upon crop production and national interest. We are strongly opposed to any See GAS HEARING, Page 4

Former Amherst Man Owes Life To Machine

James Nichols, originally from Amherst, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Nichols of Amherst, and now a Lubbock resident, might consider Galveston his home away from home.

In January of 1973, James went to the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston as a patient with chronic renal failure. In April of that year he received a kidney transplant.

His new kidney, donated by his brother, worked well for 19 months but subsequently rejected and had to be removed in November 1974.

James, a man not discouraged easily, then undertook a new method of treatment of his renal failure, and with enthusiasm and good spirits, started training at the Chronic Home Dialysis Center in early January of 1975. During the intensive training period, James learned the medical and technical

aspects of operating the artificial kidney machine in order that he may manage his own life-saving treatment at home.

Lu Ella, James' wife of 12 years, also received instruction at the center. She will serve as her husband's "back-up", or Chief Assistant, helping out when necessary.

After getting settled at home, James hopes to return to Commercial College in Lubbock where he was enrolled in a computer programming course. He hopes to enter that field when he finishes school.

Lu Ella, formerly employed at the Cooper School in Lubbock, plans to be a housewife for a while, take care of their two daughters, Lucretia, 10, a fourth grader; and Stephanie, 7, a first grader, and she plans to raise a garden. Perhaps in the future she will go back to work.

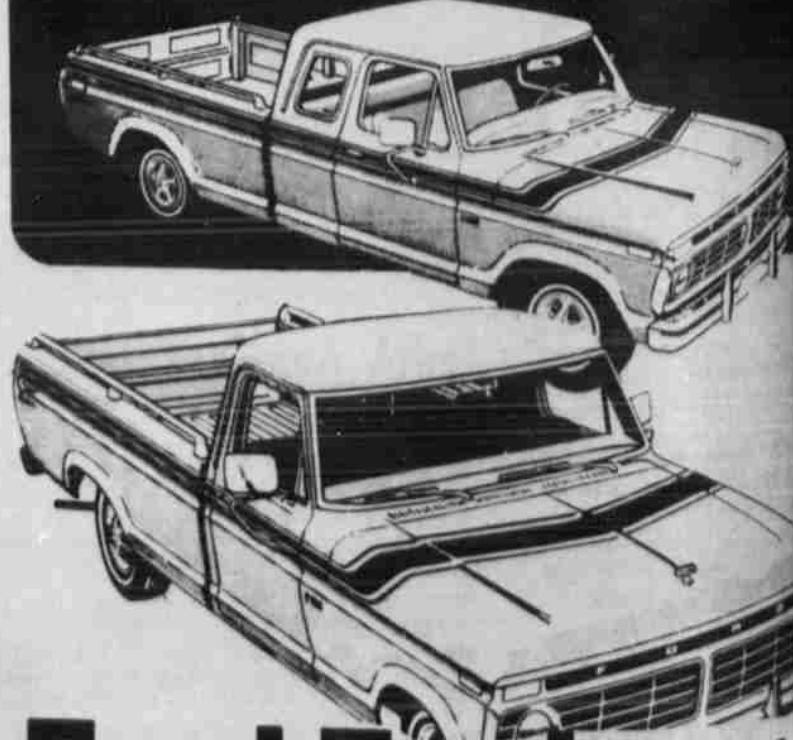

Local 'Texas' Organizers To Celebrate Anniversary

Invitations are in the mail from the Musical Drama "Texas", to the 250 families who helped start the production in the Canyon. To celebrate the tenth anniversary of the show, the Board is honoring those who became interested and helped before the first fund raising campaign, those who enlisted before the spring campaign of 1962.
Those from Lamb County include: Mr. and Mrs. John Milam of Sudan; James O. Norfleet of Olton; and Mrs. W. Vest Terry of Sudan.
These early founders will be guests at the Gala Opening where they will be awarded a special issue of the 10th anniversary medallion of the show which the Canyon Chamber of

Commerce is issuing. The founders' medals will be of a different metal from those on sale to the public and will have the word "founder" stamped on the vertical side.
Paul Green, the writer of "Texas", became interested in writing one of his great affirmations of faith in America for this region after receiving a letter from Margaret Harper describing the Canyon and the strong development of the arts in the area. After Mr. Green wrote that he was interested, a group of Canyon citizens raised a thousand dollars to bring him to see the Palo Duro and to discuss the possibilities. Those who gave to this fund, before Mr. Green was ever here, form the first group of early founders to be recognized on the eighteenth of June. Most of them attended a barbecue in the Canyon on April 27, 1961 and met the writer. They heard his

dreams of a great historical show in the Canyon as he talked about the place and the dream, outlined against a huge bonfire of driftwood at the edge of the creek at Cottonwood grove.
These early donors fanned out to interest their friends and associates throughout the Panhandle, and by January of 1962 a development committee had agreed to serve. Lawrence Hagy served as chairman, and Waldes Madden, Jr. accepted

the responsibility for the management of the fund raising campaign.
The members of this development committee form the second group of early founders and will be honored at the opening.

Census Bureau Slates Survey Here Next Week
How many people are supplementing their regular pay check with a second job? How many people are enrolled in adult educational courses or are taking vocational training?
Percy R. Millard, Director of the Bureau of the Census Regional Office in Dallas, has announced that information on these subjects will be collected during the week of May 19 from a sample of households in this area. The questions are in addition to the usual ones asked in the monthly survey on employment and unemployment conducted nationwide by the Bureau of the Census for the U. S. Department of Labor.
Interviewer who will visit households here is Rosemary McNeese of Rt. 1, Amherst.
Results of this monthly survey provide a continuing measure of economic conditions in the country. In March, total employment (as measured by the monthly survey of households) declined by nearly 200,000 to 83.8 million. This marked the sixth consecutive month of employment reductions, which have totaled 2.6 million since last September.
Households in this survey are among the 50,000 nationwide that have been scientifically selected to represent a cross section of all U.S. households. All information they supply is held confidential by law and is used only to compile statistical totals.

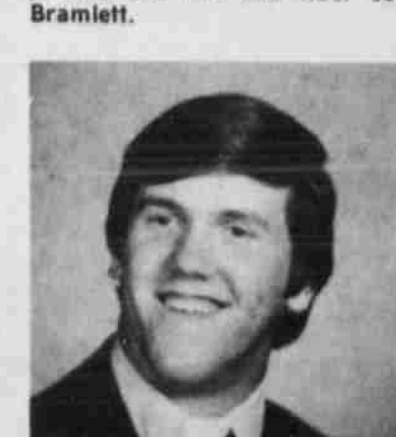

IT'S THAT TIME AGAIN!

THE MONTH OF MAY is one of the worst for tornadoes in a season that normally lasts in Texas from February through June. But the destructive winds don't necessarily follow the rules or the calendar, and an insurance executive advises readiness at all times.

"Whenever and wherever a tornado is spotted," says J. O. (Jim) Smith, Jr., chairman of the Texas Insurance Advisory Association (TIAA), "immediate action can save lives and property."

Texas is a favorite resting spot for twisters—and the penalty comes in lives and property lost. Companions in destruction are lightning, a frequent killer, and flash floods.

Last year in Texas there were 116 tornadoes, the lowest since 1966 but no guarantee there won't be this many or more in 1975. June and October were leading storm months.

Of several already this year, there has been considerable destruction and more deaths from tornadoes than all of last year. Lefors in the Panhandle and Yancey near San Antonio have felt nature's fury and nearly every area of the state has been under numerous watches.

"Last year was bad enough—one only has to remember the wipe out of Xenia, Ohio—but 1975 looks as grim, as the experience in Nebraska suggests," Smith says.

In 1974, there were nearly 1,000 tornadoes across the nation, causing more than \$1 billion in property damage.

In the first three months of this year, about 200 tornadoes have already caused problems nationally—and this is more than twice what occurred in the same period of 1974.

"Knowing what to do before a tornado touches down can save lives and property," Smith says. "Knowing what to do after can reduce damage, too."

In a tornado or other high winds, —Get in a bathroom or closet near the center of the house on the ground floor. At least get under a table or other protective covering to avoid injury from falling debris.

—Avoid buildings having large and relatively lightly anchored roofs, such as auditoriums and gymnasiums.

—In open country, move at right angles to the tornado's path. Lie flat in the nearest ditch, ravine or other depression if trapped.

—No matter what, don't stay in an automobile.

—Anchor or tie down mobile homes, frequently victims of the worst damage.

—Keep a battery-operated radio on hand for the latest advisories.

—High winds cause the most damage by pushing in walls and windows and tearing off roofs. Flying debris is also deadly.

THE A-MAIZE-ING HISTORY OF POPCORN:

If popcorn had a family tree it would have a million branches.

And though it sounds a bit fanciful, some of the leaves would tell that this humble kernel was once used in ancient religious ceremonies and worn as Indian ornaments. In fact, popcorn, as we know it, is a least 5,800 years old.

One of the latest chapters in popcorn's "a-maize-ing" history has been made by Orville Redenbacher through development of his gourmet popping corn. His 35 years of work and research in the popcorn field have brought him a solid knowledge of his favorite food and it's fascinating past.

According to Redenbacher, the white man's first recorded encounter with the fluffy stuff came with the discovery of the New World. Columbus was surprised to find West Indies natives wearing decorations of popped corn as corsages. Spanish Conquistador Cortez got his first taste of popcorn when he invaded Mexico in the 16th century, where he found Aztec Indians using popcorn to decorate ceremonial headdresses and to make necklaces for the statues of their gods.

A century later, French explorers discovered the American Indians in the Great Lakes region popping corn in pottery vessels over heated sand and using it in preparing popcorn soup and other dishes.

Popcorn even was present at this nation's first Thanksgiving celebration. The Iroquois Indians surprised the

colonists when Quadequina, Chief Massasoit, brought a deerskin pouch of popped corn for the first feast. Later, both and Indians enjoyed popcorn during treaty and peace negotiations.

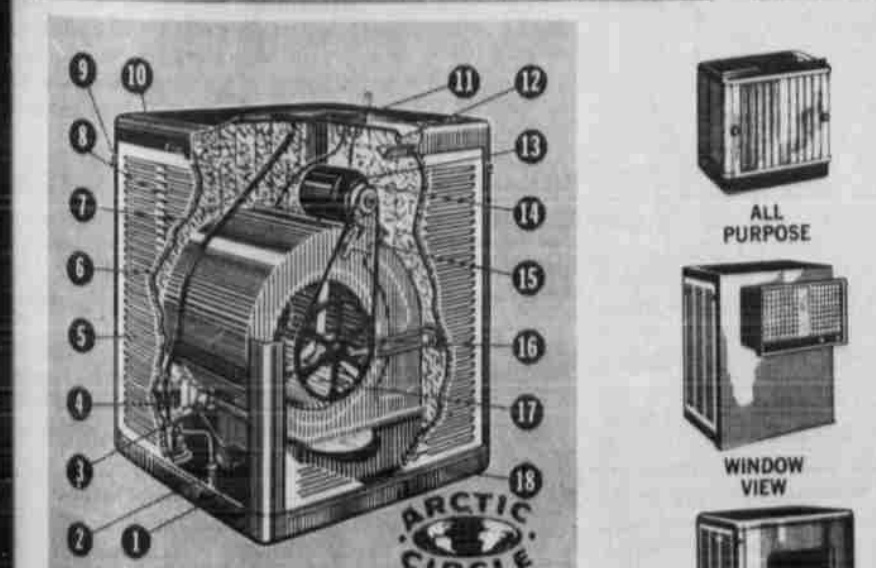

Carlsbad Area Boasts Newest Park

A gigantic limestone reef bolts toward the clean West Texas sky from the brown desert. One can see green conifer trees riding the uppermost crests and, in season, see snow caulked in deep fissures. The sight is breathtaking.

It is Guadalupe Mountains National Park, a combination of mountain and forest located between Carlsbad and El Paso. It is one of the nation's newest national parks and offers visual delights not available anywhere else in the world.

The core of the park is the southern point of the Guadalupe Mountains from the New Mexico state line into West Texas. The range continues north to the park, but is lower and less dramatic.

Rising from the surrounding desert floor, the Permian marine limestone reef is one of

the most extensive and significant fossil reefs in the world. It resembles a huge "V" pointing south. At the point of the "V" is El Capitan Mountain, which with its sheer 1,000 foot cliffs, is visible for over 50 miles.

Directly north of El Capitan, rising from a base of about 4,000 feet to a height of 8,751 feet above sea level, is Guadalupe Peak, the highest point in Texas.

Placed between the arms of the "V" are two other major features: a pincovered highland, including the bowl, and deep-cut McKittrick Canyon. These views are hidden from motorists driving U.S. Highway 62-189.

National Park Service officials say climatic differences within the park "are remarkable". Summer temperatures can be hot at lower elevations while the highlands

and moist canyons are cool by contrast.

The most accessible area for tourists is McKittrick Canyon. Steep-sided and narrow, both north and south McKittrick Canyons contain streams and communities of hardwood and pines.

While the area's wildlife once included desert bighorn sheep, wolves and Harlequin quail, park experts say the region still contains an abundance of mule deer, black bear, mountain lions and eagles.

The canyon contains an unusual mixture of both mountain and desert plants, including alagator juniper, agave, sotol, Texas walnut, madrone, bigtooth maple, ponderosa pine, resote brush and cholla.

Prior to federal acquisition of the park, almost all of the

acreage comprising McKittrick Canyon Peak tract had solidified under the Wallace E. Pratt Hunter, Sr.

In 1959, Pratt offered an acre ranch, including South McKittrick Canyon, to the National Service.

In the fall of 1960, a feasibility study was made with a favorable recommendation. In 1962, create the park was authorized in Congress by U.S. Ralph Yarborough, D-Texas, on October 10, 1960, the bill was passed by both houses.

On Oct. 16, 1960, Lyndon Johnson signed the bill authorizing establishment of the park.

Observance Of Safety Rules Aids During Tornado Season

Strict observance of a set of basic tornado-safety rules could result in a significant drop in windstorm-related deaths and injuries.

Weather service spokesmen emphasize the need for understanding the various rules and tornado statements issued by NWS.

A "Tornado watch" indicates that weather conditions may produce severe thunderstorms or tornadoes in the area. Individuals should begin formulating plans in the event that conditions worsen.

When a "tornado warning" is issued, a funnel cloud has been sighted in the area visually or has been indicated by radar. When a warning is issued, it is time to prepare to carry out plans on seeking safety.

Other safety rules to keep in mind are:

IN OFFICE BUILDINGS—Go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor, or to the designated shelter area.

IN FACTORIES—Workers should move quickly to the section of the plant offering the greatest protection in accordance with advance plans.

IN SHOPPING CENTERS—Go to a designated shelter area—not to your parked car.

IN HOMES—The basement offers the greatest safety. Seek shelter under sturdy furniture if possible. In homes without basements, take cover in the center part of the house, on the lowest floor, in a small room such as a closet or bathroom, or under sturdy furniture.

Keep some windows open, but stay away from them! Mobile homes are particularly vulnerable to destructive winds.

Proper tie-downs to prevent overturning will minimize damage.

A warden should be appointed in mobile home parks to scan the skies and list to radio and television for warnings.

There should be a designated community shelter where residents can assemble during a tornado warning. If there is no such shelter, do not stay in a mobile home during a tornado warning.

Seek refuge in a sturdy building or a ditch, culvert or ravine.

IN SCHOOLS—whenever possible, follow advance plans to an interior hallway or the lowest floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums or other structures with wide, free-span roofs.

If a building is not reinforced construction, go quickly

to a nearby reinforced structure of a ravine or open ditch.

IN OPEN COUNTRY—there is not time to find shelter, lie flat in the depression such as a ditch.

KEEP LISTENING—radio and television stations broadcast the latest information watches and warnings to inform you when the danger is over.

WATCH THE SKY—tornadoes come and go so fast there may be no time to warn. During a watch, be alert for the appearance of violent rain, hail or funnel clouds.

When in doubt, take cover. Tornadoes are often observed in rain or dust. Some are night.
