Court was hit for money from all sides in

their end-of-month session Friday.

City manager Jim Blagg and two city councilmen, Paul Carmickle and Chester Harvey, met with the Court Friday morning requesting the county pay \$200 per rural fire call, rather than the \$50 paid this year, and renewal of the county's contract for ambulance service which is estimated to cost about \$40,000

The Court agreed to pay \$100 per fire run outside the city limits, after some discussion pointing out that a paid fireman can't drive the truck on rural calls. On calls outside the city limits the fire department must wait for a volunteer fireman to come drive the

The ambulance service contract was renewed as is, but commissioners pointed out that it looked like the county would have to budget in about \$40,000 for

Donald Carr and Buddy Logsdon appeared and asked for additional facilities at the new County Ag and Community Center. Among their proposals was a portable show ring, a wash rack, concreted sheep pens, and a four-foot concrete walkway through the steer barn. Total facilities asked for would cost an estimated \$23,000.

After lunch, Herschel Randall and Hubert Henry met with the Court on behalf of the proposed new Lamb County Memorial Library and asked that the Court pledge money toward the building of a new facility. Total cost of the structure is estimated at \$200,000 to \$250,000, and the board members pointed out that government grant would expire if the necessary amount of money and pledges aren't obtained by next summer.

Buddy Logsdon had requested a new pickup and met with the court again concerning competitive bids. Four sealed bids on a trade-in were not opened because Logsdon had not taken the pickup around to all the dealers in the county and bids were not submitted from all prospective dealers.

Frances Turner and Nora Hicks submitted a tentative library budget for the coming year reflecting additional expenditures for shelving, cassette tapes and player, postage and

Due to the many requests and additional expenditures by department heads who submitted budgets for 1976, the Court postponed any budgeting and did not act on the agricultural facilities nor pledge an amount to the library building until more detailed work is done on the budget next month.

senior, has been moved from offensive tackle to tight end. "He had tremendous two-a days," Blakely said, "and he could possibly be the best tight end since I've been in Littlefield. He blocks well, catches very well and has adequate speed and size."

Offensive people returning include Danny Martinez, coming up from the junior varsity. At the present time he has the edge for split end position. He is small at 5'7", 135 pounds, but he has exceptional hands and a habit of making great catches.

Right now plans call for Reginald Payton and Steve Cruz at tailback positions. Payton is 6', 175 pounds, and Cruz is 5'9" and 170. Both are seniors, and both started defensively last year as linebackers. Robert Hall, 5'8", 145-pound junior, and Dean Walden will provide depth in these positions.

Blake Wood is a 5'8", 150-pound junior fullback who should get a great deal of action at that post. While not big, Blakely said Wood is quick and determined.

Defensively, the Cats have changed their basic defense from the split 6 to the Oklahoma 50 defense. The reason for the change is not disatisfaction with the defense used the last four years.

"Our defense has been good and that's one reason we've had success these four years," Blakely said. "However, we did not feel that it best suited our personnel

"We feel like Hopping has to play in the middle of the defensive front. That's the reason for the change. He'll be lined up as a noseguard and should be the best around here." Tony Cowen, 5'9", 150pound junior should do a good job at defensive noseguard. He is exceptionally quick and has the desired knack of pursuing the football.

With experienced linebackers Cruz and Payton, defensive tackels, Mc Donald, Speck and Hall, Blakely is looking for the defensive ends and defensive secondary to be the most improved area.

"The defensive end position has been a pleasant surprise thus far," Blakely added. Banner is the only veteran, but he's looked well in practice thus far. And we have three newcomers who'll see a great deal of action there this year. I'm very pleased with the performance of David Jones, 6'5", 180-pound sophomore, Layne McKinnon, 5'11", 165-pound junior, and Jasper Colbert, 5'11", 165-

Blakely said inexperience in the secondary is a major concern right now, but that he does not doubt the ability of Turner, Durham and Palmer, of three proven hands to do their job.

Blakely said he is pleased to say there are three or four inexperienced football players who look like they will do a good job in the secondary, also. These are Lonnie Twitty, 5'6", 140-pound senior; Rudy Ayala, 5'8", 145-pound junior, Jay Lee a 135-pound junior and Blake Wood.

"It looks like more depth back there than we originally thought," Blakely added. "Add to that three sophomores with the varsity football team this year. While young and inexperienced at this time, they are very determined and their effort has been good in practice. As a result, Jones, Greg Moreland, 6', 150pound, at offensive tight end, and Ronnie Milligan, 5'10", 155-pound offensive center, will figure heavily in our plans this year.

"Our players and coaches are excited about this year.

"Our players and coaches are excited about this year's football team and we think we have an opportunity to have a good team and we're anxious to get started," Blakely said.

"We play a lot of tough teams, but right now our only concern is our first game."



## EDITORIAL

## 'Safety Proof' Your Youngsters

IT'S THAT TIME of year again when parents should attempt to "safety proof" their youngsters- many of whom are entering school for the first

Whether walking, riding in a bus or car, or bicycling to school, plans should be made to ensure the safety of every child, reminds the Texas Department of

Darting across streets without looking, crossing at mid-block from between parked cars, and doing bicycle tricks in traffic are just a few of the pitfalls to be avoided, advises the Health Resources Department.

PARENTS CAN caution their children about all careless practices, and they also can show them. If your child is starting to school- or going to a new school-it's a good idea to make the trip at least once with the child.

If he will be pedaling to and from school every day- often in inclement weather- you'll want to be doubly sure that your child is observing safety rules. If you're a motorist in the vicinity of schools, be especially wary, says the Health Resources Department.

WHAT ARE THE TROUBLE spots for bicyclists and motorists? Collisions between motor vehicles and bicycles occurs about as follows

\*Well over half at intersections. \*Seven out of ten during daylight

\*Most bicycle riders killed or injured in traffic accidents, were violating a

traffic law at the time of the incident. \*Half of the motor vehicle-bicycle accidents involved a violation on the part of the motor vehicle operator.

\*One out of five bicycles involved in accidents had some mechnical defect.

SOME OF THE MOST common traffic violations of cyclists are (not in order of

\*Failure to yield right-of-way. (In most cases, the cyclists did not "see" the car; in some cases he intentionally infringed on the motorist's right-of-

\*Riding in the center of the street. \*Speed too fast for conditions of traffic and road surface.

\*Disregard of traffic control devicessignal lights and stop signs. \*Improper turning.

TO AVOID such situations as just described, here are some safety rules

\*A skillful bicycle rider always has his bike under control. He never drives too fast and he never rides too far. He always has both hands free to steer.

\*The cyclist must develop skill in balancing and pedaling to avoid swerving into traffic, hitting a fixed object, running off the sidewalk or high way. Parents have the responsibility to be certain their child has the skill to cope with traffic before permitting him to ride on the street.

\*Every bicycle driver should be familiar with the laws governing bicycling in his community, or the one in which he is riding. These rules are usually available through the school or

\*Cyclists must ride on the right side of the street with the flow of traffic; not on the left, facing traffic.

"Hand signals should be used by the cyclists, and are now commonly accepted as a safe riding practice.

\*Cyclists should avoid crowding between cars at stop signs, or between an automobile and the curb.

\*Carrying more passengers than a bicycle is designed and equipped for is dangerous and illegal. Two on a bike also increases stopping distances. The polo or "banana" seat, standard equipment on the hi-rise bike, appears designed to carry two. Such is not the case!

\*Never hold onto a moving vehicle nor in any way attach the bike to the vehicle. \*Always ride single file.

\*Trick riding is always dangerous. Drivers of hi-risers are especially cautioned against making the bike rear up and riding on back wheels only, or jumping the bike over obstacles.

## Combine Adjustment Suggested For Sunflowers

**Grain Sorghum Producers**

Seed losses due to improper combine adjustment can result in substantial financial losses to sunflower producers," says Buddy C. Logsdon, County Extension Agent.

To minimize these losses, combine operators need to equip their machines with special sunflower header attachments. In addition, operators should frequently check the performance of their machines and make adjustments as harvesting conditions change.

The agent says that studying the operator's manual is the first step toward efficient harvesting and should not be neglected for this new crop by even the most experienced operators. Most manuals list recommended machine settings and other tips for sunflower harvesting.

The agent points out that combine manufacturers generally recommend that the reel speed should be matched to ground speed. Cylinder speeds of 350-600 r.p.m. are suggested, with the lower speeds being best for dry conditions. Concave clearances range from 1/2 to 1-1/2 inches. It is suggested that an initial concave clearance of 3/4 inch be used, then adjusted as necessary.

The agent cautions that excessive tings break up the heads excessively causing overloaded sieves and difficulty in separation and dehulling of the seed.

Most manufacturers also suggest a chaffer setting of 1/2 to 5/8 inches and sieve opening of 1/2 inch.

The air adjustment must be watched carefully to prevent seed from being blown or carried over the sieves. In setting the air, Logsdon suggests starting with a slow fan speed and gradually increasing the speed until the desired results are obtained.

'Some producers have voiced concern about removing"pops" or unfilled seed during the harvest operation. Removing pops has not been a big problem in other areas," states Logsdon. "A sufficient amount of air to remove chaff usually carries out the lighter unfilled seed."

"Be alert to refining adjustments to match the machine, moisture conditions and other crop conditions. To do a good job of harvesting," Logsdon urges, "combine operators need to frequently check their machines and make adjustments as necessary."



In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If you have such children living with you and wish to apply for such meals for them, please notify us or indicate it on the application that you bring to school.







parent assumes that his child will be normal ahead or underdeveloped. This is dangerous because it makes the parent begin setting standards for the child which might be unat-


This kind of situation can be avoided by remembering each child is an individual, developing at his own pace.

Parents can make the child's surroundings more stimulating and motivate him more to try new experiences. But it's still a matter of the child's own in dividual timing for when development takes place.

Parents have responsibility to be sensitive to stages infants should go through to develop socially, mentally and physically. Subtle guidance can be applied to help the child direct his energies, but overcontrol will fail.

The parents can remember to view his child as an individual growing according to his own game-plan. He can also provide varied experiences and changing surroundings that motivate growth.





within the next 30 to 60 days for public hearings and comment prior to publication. According to Commissioner Rowland, a series of hearings will be con ducted at several locations around the State in order to invite the broadest participation by interested parties.

After these hearings, the rules of the Commission will be published. After issuance of these rules, the 75-90 day process outlined above will be required before decisions on applications

## Texas Vegetable Production Worth About \$52,566,000

and excessive rain in others, Texas vegetable production during the 1975 spring quarter is expected to be worth \$52,566,000, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

According to recently released Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service figures Texas will lead the nation in production of can-

Total value of the 1975 Texas cantaloup crop is expected to be \$15.9 million, up from last year's \$11.2 million crop. Production will be approximately 1,020,000 pounds per hundredweight, compared with last year's production of 855,000 pounds per hundredweight. Harvested acreage is 8,500, down only slightly from last year. At the same time, yield per acre has jumped from 95 pounds per hundredweight last year to 120 pounds per hundredweight this

In addition, Texas is expected to rank second in production of watermelons, green peppers and carrots.

Harvested acreas of Texas watermelons in 1975 is predicted to be 24,000, down 3,000 from last year. Production is 1,680,000 pounds per hundredweight, down 750,000 pounds per hun dredweight from 1974. The smaller crop was caused by drought in some areas and hail in others, Commissioner White said. Value of the crop is placed at \$9,677,000 this year.

Production of green peppers is expected to be approximately 142,000 pounds per hun dredweight, down slightly from 1974. Harvested acreage remains the same this year, at 2,000 acres. Value of this year's crop will be \$3.7 million, compared with nearly \$4.2 million in

Expected value of this year's carrot crop in Texas is \$5,379,000, compared with only \$4,471,000 last year. Harvested acreage has decreased from 5,100 in 1974 to 3,600 in 1975, yet yield per acre this year is 170 pounds per hundredweight, an increase of 20 over last year.

If someone asks you to join a money-making plan involving chain letters and U.S. Savings Bonds, you'd better refuse. You aren't likely to make any money- it's more likely you'll lose your "investment" to get in on the deal- and it's possible violation of federal, state or local laws.

Since the membership lists to develop genuine savings were originally prepared by the promoters- with their names and addresses or those of their associates heading the lists-the scheme would provide Bonds for the promoters long before- if ever- new members reaped any harvest.

The promoters of that plan used two variations- the "Six Pack", involving lists with only six names, and the "Century Club", which used \$100 Bonds, in lieu of \$25 Bonds.

The California Attorney General, Los Angeles County District Attorney and the Los Angeles City Attorney cooperated in the investigation, arrests and convictions of the promoters, who were held in violation of the California Penal Code concerning endless-chains and lotteries.

Rather than circulate the lists or the Bonds through the mails, those promoters relied upon meetings in private homes to further their schemes. Had the mails been used, the promoters would have been in violation of the U.S. Code, Title 18, Section 1302- the "lottery" statuewhich proscribes the mailing of material concerning a lottery promotion. It establishes criminal sanctions of a \$1,000 fine or imprisonment for not more than two years, or both, upon conviction. They would also have been in violation of Section 1341- the "mail fraud" statute.

Most of the "bottom-liners" involved in such schemes are relatively innocent of wrongdoing. They have no intention of perpetrating a fraudulent scheme or otherwise using the mails illegally. In addition to the promise of a dollar reward, they are often persuaded that they are being "patriotic"- helping their government's Savings Bonds Program.

Over the years, the Department of the Treasury has advised the public that chain-letter schemes involving Savings Bonds- which are essentially get-rich-quick endeavors- do a distinct disservice to the Savings Bonds Program. In stead of encouraging individuals

plans, they create the illusion that participants are both aiding their government and them selves. Even in the rare case where an individual receives a large return, it is likely that he would quickly redeem the Bonds,


