Mrs. Marshal Kelley of Earth, who is president of the Pioneers this year, is a genuine pioneer. She came with her husband as a bride to Lamb County in 1926 from Sayre, Okla. Her husband was postmaster in Earth for more than 34 years.

He was president of the Pioneers in 1968, and Mrs. Kelley is the only woman who has succeeded her husband as president with the exception of Mrs. G. M. Shaw of Jacksonville, Fla. who succeeded her husband, G. M. Shaw, who was the founder of the organization.

Mrs. Kelley has seen Earth grow from six small houses when they first arrived, to a thriving agricultural community with many large farm homes, and a thriving community. She has been involved in many types of pioneering.

One of her favorite stories is about the depression years when she and Kelley had a bumper corn crop in the early 1930's, but many foods were scarce, as was money. They brought a huge quantity of the corn to Littlefield where the only grinder was located and after their corn was ground they left many bushels of it to be given to those on relief.

Mrs. Kelley is a charter member of the First Baptist Church in Earth.

Feeding Holds

Health Hazards

Feeding of corn, peas, beans and other crops from fields can be a health hazard.

When these crops are being grown to be harvested fresh, most are sprayed with insecticides like methyl parathion and diazinon, two potent poisons.

People who help themselves to the crops are taking a chance on becoming sick if the produce has been recently sprayed.

Many of the fields have signs posted warning that corn or melons have been sprayed.

When the crops are being grown for seed, most of them are, the chances are at least 100 percent that insecticides have been used and there is a health hazard involved.

Authorities Don't Expect Problems With Lowering Of Adult Age

Effective tomorrow, 18-year olds will be legally recognized as adults.

On August 27th, 18, 19 and 20 year olds can go out and buy liquor legally. Eighteen year old boys can get married without parental consent. The 21-year-olds can serve on juries, buy property and finance it, become notaries, be named election judges and be elected as precinct judges.

All these things will seem extremely important to the newly enfranchised.

What effects do officials think some of these privileges and opportunities will have locally?

Will there be more or less minor violation cases filed? Will there be more driving while intoxicated charges? Will the 18, 19 and 20-year-old vote affect the upcoming liquor election in Lamb County? These are some of the questions posed to various authorities.

Chief of police James Cox doesn't

think that legalization of 18, 19 and 20-year olds' right to buy liquor will make any significant difference in his department.

"There's only a small amount of minors in possession now that are filed on," the police chief said. Cox said charges of minor possession usually follow traffic violations or some kind of disturbance. "It's really only a small amount we catch," he said. "First, they have to do something to be stopped. Usually they're drunk."

Cox doesn't believe the city's problems will increase with the legal age limit lowered. Cox said a bootlegger doesn't care what age a person is who buys liquor. "He doesn't have any license to lose," Cox added. Cox said a good portion of those charged with minor possession are under 18 years old, with a good percentage 16 to 18 years old.

When it comes to the younger people's voting in local option elections, authorities said they don't expect the young vote to be too significant one way

or the other, judging from the last election.

Sheriff E. D. McNeese doesn't anticipate any problems with the lowering of the age limit. And if a portion of the county should go wet, McNeese said he didn't think the young people would buy any more liquor than they do now. Liquor license are so expensive, he said, operators are very careful not to sell to anyone below age. "I don't think they will buy any more if it's legal," he said.

Lowering of the adult age has already affected the district clerk. When the jury wheel was refilled this week the names of all the 18, 19 and 20-year olds who have already registered went into the wheel as prospective jurors for the first time. Instead of the 6,600 names which went into the wheel last year, 8,000 names were put in the drum for this session of court.

As far as criminal cases are concerned, 18-year-olds were already considered adults.

Mary Beth Willey said 18-year-old boys can be married without parental

consent. Until the 27th, young men under 19 must have a parent or guardian sign their marriage license.

The lowering of the age may mean that younger people will fill some appointive and elective positions. Mrs. Willey said as far as she knew, after next Monday 18-year-olds can be named election judges by the commissioners court and can be elected as precinct judges by the public.

County judge G. T. Sides said lowering of the adult age will affect his court very little except when it comes to DWI cases. "And I've had only three driving while intoxicated charges filed against minors in five years," he added. "I don't look for any significant change, if people want to drink they can whether they buy it legal or otherwise."

Judge Sides said he doesn't expect block votes in any election because of younger voters. "I've questioned a few about the liquor election," he said, "and I find them about equally divided for and against it."

Local Option Signatures In

Petitions asking for a local option election in justice of peace precinct 4 were turned in just before 5 p.m. Friday.

A spokesman for those circulating the petitions said the 70 petitions contained a total of 915 names and, according to their estimate, 877 would probably certify.

Before a vote can be called, at least 743 voters signatures will have to be certified.

Following certification, the petitions will be presented to the commissioners' court at their next regularly scheduled meeting. An election must be called no earlier than 20 days nor later than 30 days from the day the commissioners canvass the votes.
