He was president of the Pioneers in 1968, and Mrs. Kelley is the only woman who has succeeded her husband as president with the exception of Mrs. G. M. Shaw of Jacksonville, Fla. who succeeded her husband, G. M. Shaw, who was the founder of the organization.

Mrs. Kelley has seen Earth grow from six small houses when they first arrived, to a thriving agricultural community with many large farm homes, and a thriving community. She has been involved in many types of

One of her favorite stories is about the depression years when she and Kelley had a bumper corn crop in the early 1930's, but many foods were scarce, as was money. They brought a huge quantity of the corn to Littlefield where the only grinder was located and after their corn was ground they left many bushels of it to be given to those on relief.

Mrs. Kelley is a charter member of the First Baptist Church in Earth.

"There's only a small amount of minors in possession now that are filed on," the police chief said. Cox said charges of minor possession usually follow traffic violations or some kind of disturbance. "It's really only a small amount we catch," he said. "First, they have to do something to be stopped. Usually they're drunk

Cox doesn't believe the city's problems will increase with the legal age limit lowered. Cox said a bootlegger doesn't care what age a person is who buys liquor. "He doesn't have any license to loose," Cox added. Cox said a good portion of those charged with minor possession are under 18 years old. with a good percentage 16 to 18 years

When it comes to the younger people's voting in local option elections, authorities said they don't expect the young vote to be too significant one way or the other, judging from the last election

Sheriff E. D. McNeese doesn't anticipate any problems with the lowering of the age limit. And if a portion of the county should go wet, McNeese said he didn't think the young people would buy any more liquor than they do now Liquor license are so expensive, he said, operators are very careful not to sell to anyone below age. "I don't think they will buy any more if it's legal," he said.

Lowering of the adult age has already affected the district clerk. When the jury wheel was refilled this week the names of all the 18, 19 and 20-year olds who have already registered went into the wheel as prospective jurors for the first time. Instead of the 6,600 names which went into the wheel last year, 8,000 names were put in the drum for this session of court.

As far as criminal cases are concerned, 18-year-olds were already

Mary Beth Willey said 18-year-old boys can be married without parental consent. Until the 27th, young men under 19 must have a parent or guardian sign their marriage license

The lowering of the age may mean that younger people will fill some ap-pointive and elective positions. Mrs. Willey said as far as she knew, after next Monday 18-year-olds can be named election judges by the commissioners court and can be elected as precinct judges by the public.

County judge G. T. Sides said lowering of the adult age will affect his court very little except when it comes to DWI cases. "And I've had only three driving while intoxicated charges filed against minors in five years," he added. "I don't look for any significant change, if people want to drink they can whether they buy it legal or otherwise.

Judge Sides said he doesn't expect block votes in any election because of younger voters. "I've questioned a few about the liquor election," he said, "and I find them about equally divided for and against it."

Highway Patrolman Vincent Ponder said he thinks there will definitely be more open drinking among the younger people when 18-year-olds can buy liquor legally. "But I don't think DWIs among the young peple will pick up much. Up until now I haven't had a minor charged with DWI," Ponder added. "I think they will be pretty wise about it."

Ponder said the biggest part of the public doesn't realize what it takes to come under the influence. "Most people come under the influence of alcohol before they know it," Ponder said. "Very few charged with DWI think they are drunk

Many of those charged with liquor violations in Lamb County go through the justice of peace court presided over by Stanley Doss. Doss said he doesn't expect his work load to pick up because of 18-year-olds being considered adults. "They can get liquor when they want it like it is," he said. "If the legislature had expected much abuse of adult privileges, they wouldn't have passed on lowering the age."

Local Option Signatures In

Petitions asking for a local option election in justice of peace precinct 4 were turned in just before 5 p.m. Friday.

A spokesman for those circulating the petitions said the 70 petitions contained a total of 915 names and, according to their estimate, 877 would probably

Before a vote can be called, at least 743 voters signatures will have to be certified.

Following certification, the petitions will be presented to the commissioners' court at their next regularly scheduled meeting. An election must be called not earlier than 20 days nor later than 30 days from the day the commissioners canvass the votes.

Right Turns On Red Light Legal

The measure permitting ght turns on red traffic ignals under certain circumstances went into effect last Friday

This is the way the new law

Vehicular traffic facing steady red signal alone shall stop at a clearly marked stop line, but, if none, before entering the crosswalk on the near side of the intersection, and may then turn right or, if the intersecting streets are both one-way streets and left turns are permissible, may turn left, after standing until the intersection may be entered safely, yielding right-ofway to pedestrians lawfully within an adjacent crosswalk and to other traffic lawfully using the interesection.

Traffic not so turning shall remain standing until an indication to proceed is shown.

The State Highway Commission, municipal authorities, and Commissioners Courts, within their respective jurisdictions, may prohibit such turns on a steady red signal by posting a notice that turns of that type are prohibited. Such notice shall be erected at such intersection giving notice





For example, north of Littlefield there are several acres of melons that are raised for seed only. These fields have been sprayed with methyl parathion-a deadly poison-and corn is being sprayed with disyston.

Warning signs have been put up on these places, but in some cases they have been destroyed Guess the best way to keep from getting sick or poisoned is to stay out of all melon and corn patches, or contact the owner before you go in.

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
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


