### 8-Inch Rains, Winds Strike

FRIDAY THE 13th made believers of the non-superstitious in the Littlefield area when thunderstorms with winds up to 80 miles per hour dumped more than eight inches in as many hours and lashed the area with hail ranging from pea-size to golf ball size and larger.

Hundreds of thousands of dollars in damage was done as huge acreages of growing crops were wiped out in the storm that drowned three persons.

Raymond E. Sevier, 60, and his wife of six weeks, Roxie Sevier, 67, were drowned when flash flood waters washed their car off a farm to market road near Beck Gin south of Sudan Friday evening. (see separate story for details).

A LUBBOCK MAN was discovered drowned about 10:30 p.m. Friday after rescuers attempted to reach the man for more than 30 minutes.

Archie Copeland, 62, and his wife, formerly Amherst residents, were returning to Lubbock when waters from the flash flood washed the pickup in which they were traveling off U. S. Highway 84. Water rose to the top of the couple's vehicle when the pickup was washed into a draw on farm-to-market road 597 one and one-half miles south of Anton.

Boats were used in the rescue and it took more than 30 minutes to reach the pair. Copeland apparently drowned while attempts were being made to reach him.

His wife was admitted to West Texas Hospital in Lubbock where she was reported in good condition early Saturday.

HUNDREDS OF THOUSANDS of dollars' damages were inflicted in the wide swath of hail that ripped across the county in double jeopardy fashion both Friday morning and evening.

No estimates of damages had been made last Saturday since many of the farms and homes involved were isolated by impassable roads and lakes over roads.

The Spade community was one of the hardest hit areas, with one home reporting 25 smashed windows.

Insurance agents and adjusters were flooded with calls Saturday morning, reporting damage to roofs, windows, and camping trailers and mobile homes.

Farmland was reported virtually wiped clean in an area from north of Sudan to Embury Gin across to Fieldton and north of Spade.

Much of this rich farm land was in the third straight storm and anything left growing after last Sunday's storm was wiped out in one of the two storms that lashed the land again Friday.

LITTLE LAKES and non-existent lakes were big lakes late Friday and early Saturday morning when almost every road in the county was under water at one time or another.

A long stretch of U. S. Highway 385 was covered with water for the first time south of Littlefield.

### CAR SWEEPED OFF ROAD NEAR BECK GIN

## Two Drown In Flood Waters

A Sudan couple was found drowned Friday morning, approximately a mile from where their car was swept off the road by rushing waters some 16 hours earlier.

The bodies were recovered in a joint effort by Littlefield rescue personnel and Hammons Funeral Home to burial arrangements. They were pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of Peace J. N. Bowen.

The couple, officers theorized, was driving home from Littlefield during the night of Friday evening's storm, when the car was washed off the road. A seven-foot ditch had been built at the K. B. Hopper farm to a lake. Water, rushing from an area estimated several sections of fields, apparently swept the car backwards some 400 yards and lodged on a curve in the ditch.

People at the site voiced the opinion that the pressure of the water against the doors kept the couple pinned inside. The rescue team, made up of the Littlefield police department, Littlefield volunteer fire department, and members of the Littlefield Volunteer Fire Department, found the body of the man in the back seat and Mrs. Sevier in

the front, both lying face-down in the water. The car was slightly more than half submerged in the ditch.

The car and victims were found by Wayne Whiteaker, who lives across the road from Hopper.

Whiteaker said he saw a car coming south on FM 303 during the height of the storm, and thought he saw it turn off the road. But visibility was so bad at the time he could not tell for sure. A dike north of his house also impaired visibility.

The Hoppers were not at home. Whiteaker said he went into the field the next morning and saw the car. He couldn't tell at first, whether anyone was in it, but soon discovered the bodies and notified the sheriff's department at approximately 10 a.m.

Sevier was employed by Raymond Maxwell, who farms near the site. Maxwell identified the bodies at Hammons shortly after noon, but could not be contacted for further information.

The site of the drowning is seven miles south of Sudan, a mile north of Beck Gin. Residents of that area say it has always been a dangerous road after hard rains. Water running off the fields for several miles to the north and west crosses the Farm to Market road and into a lake behind the Hopper home.

One man said the residents had complained several times to the Highway Department about the hazard. Another man was swept into the same ditch a few years ago, but escaped.

## Organizational Meeting Set For County Museum

An organizational meeting of the Lamb County Museum Association will be held in the County Courtroom at 2:30 p.m. Thursday, June 26.

Plans were made for the meeting at a regular session of the Lamb County Historical Survey Committee. Mrs. S. D. Hay of Sudan, chairman of the committee which is sponsoring the forming of the museum, said the Museum Association needs the backing of the county to make the project successful.

The primary objective in establishing a county museum is to preserve the county's historical heritage. "The small museum is the 'museum of today'," Mrs. Hay said.

In 1964 there were only 90 museums of this type open to the public. Today there are 280 and 120 additional ones in the planning stage.

Organizations in each town of the county are asked to send representatives to the organizational meeting.

Any interested individual is also invited to attend. Antique collectors, in any field, are especially urged to attend and make suggestions concerning their particular field of interest, Mrs. Hay said. Special displays of articles other than those used solely by Lamb County pioneers will also be needed, she stated.

In emphasizing the importance of small county museums, Mrs. Hay pointed out that many parents take their children to small museums but will not take them to a larger one where they must cope with traffic problems and other disadvantages.

The proposed museum will serve as a visual history program for children over the county.

A museum location will be selected

from a standpoint of parking space, room for school classes to move through freely, economy and a possible tourist attraction.

Mrs. Roy B. McQuatters of Spade is chairman of the planning committee.

By-laws were presented at a recent meeting and officers will be elected and a board of trustees named at the June 26 meeting.

It was learned that Sevier purchased medicine for a lung ailment, saying at the time: "I'm not going to let this lung thing kill me."

### Spade Carrots Stuck In Mud

Approximately 150 acres of carrots that were up and growing and looking pretty good Thursday were wiped out Friday morning.

The experimental crop being grown by about 15 young farmers in the Spade area was cleaned out.

Richardson said the rain, varying from 1.5 to 3.5, and the pea-size hail that came Friday morning "wiped them up—stuck 'em to the ground."

The carrot crop was being raised for the LaMantia, Cullum, Collier and Co. in Dimmitt. The Dimmitt firm furnished a planter and sold the farmers seed which were planted from the tenth to the twenty-third of May.

"The plants were so little it didn't take much rain to pin them to the ground where they'd never make it," Dale Stanley said.

In typical farming philosophy the farmers say prospects for next year are good.

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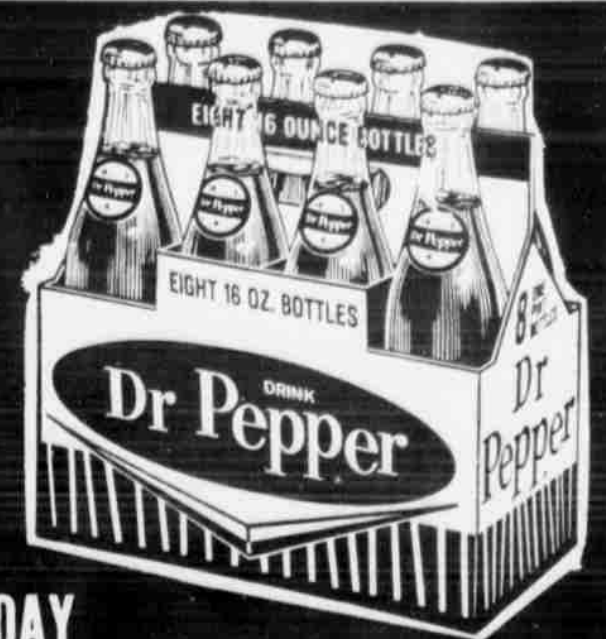

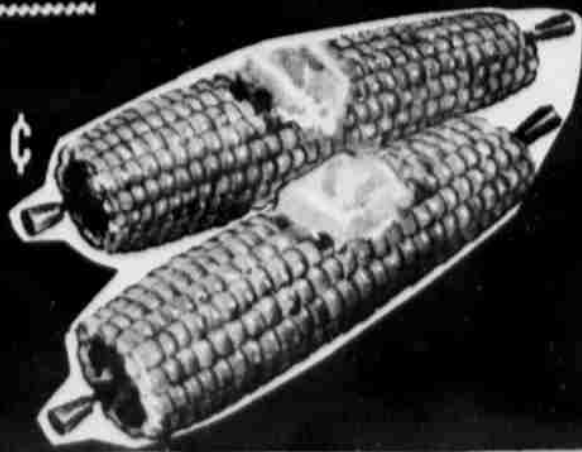

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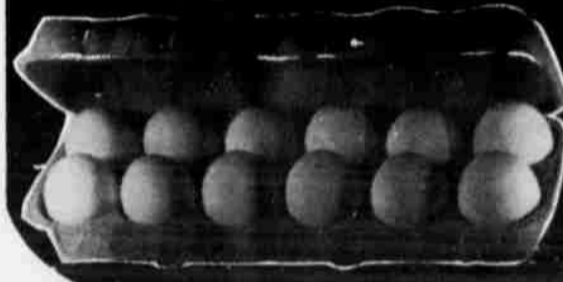

# God Is At Both Ends

THE STORY IS TOLD of a farmer boy who was hauling his first load of hay to town. Perched midway up the mountain of hay which rose high above the wagon—and which bulged far on either side—he guided his horses along a few miles of country road until he came to a covered bridge.

The bridge was long. And, being walled in on both sides and covered with wooden rood, it had the appearance of a darkened tunnel.

Pulling his horses to a stop at the very entrance to the bridge, the boy peered along its inside walls which seemed to close in funnel-like as they converged on the small patch of light at the other end. Then he took an appraising look at the broad load he was carrying.

After a moment's deliberation, he shook his head and said: "Nope, I'll never make it. The other end's too narrow." And so he backed up, turned his horses around, and headed toward home.

The boy, of course, was the victim of an optical illusion. Had he gone on, he would have found that the enclosed bridge was just as broad at the far end as it was at the end where he was standing.

LIFE IS FILLED with optical illusions! At the entrance of many a new day, as we looked along the inside walls of the hours before us, we

wondered how we would ever be able to haul our burden past the evening end of the same Lord who was with us at the beginning of the day was still with us at its close. Again, as we experienced the fulfillment of the prophet's words: "At that time it shall be light." (Zech. 14:7).

And how often in the middle of the road we looked down the dark corridor of the hours before us, has our weak faith almost failed us that the sun would never dawn—lest our morning light bring our problems and sorrows to a close?

AND YET WHEN MORNING came we experienced the truth of the psalmist's words: "When I awake, I am still with Thee" (Ps. 139:18), or our heart was lifted by the assurance: "His mercies are new every morning." (Lam. 3:23).

No matter which end of the bridge we are standing on, we can be sure: Our God is at BOTH ends! And through Christ we have learned that He is not only the God of power and might and wisdom but also the God of love, grace and mercy.

On whatever end of the bridge we are standing at this moment, let us put our feet on His—and go courageously forward.

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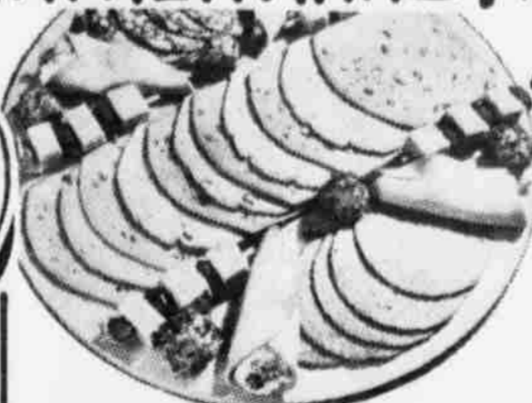

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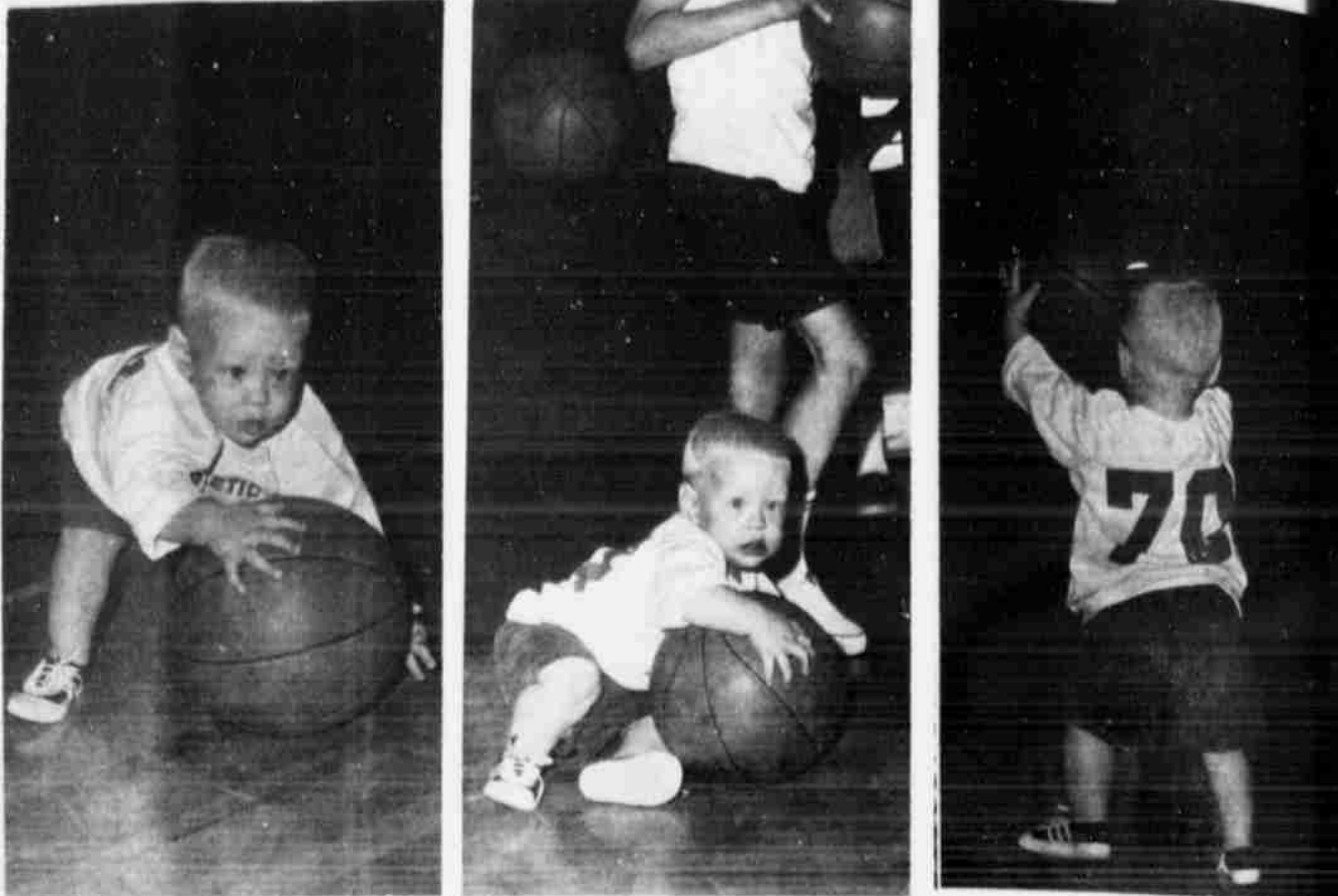
