Payne reported that the office has received 100 replies to advertising in newspapers in the "snow belt"-with some

of those being second and third inquiries.
Payne made a report for Jerry Tunnell, which stated that the C-C in the past has had a lack of communication with the farming people in the area, and that the C-C is working on ways to involve and help the farmer.

A committee is now discussing new ways to help farmers, and thinking of new industries that would utilize products the farmer may grow in the area. Expansion the livestock industry is being discussed, and continued support of getting imported water to our area is urged.

Plans are also in the making for a farmer appreciation day, to be sponsored by Littlefield merchants.

'See' Tornadoes On Television

can "see an approaching tornado in time to give viewers adequate time to seek

About four years ago a self-taught electronics expert in lowa discovered it possible to tune in a tornado on a tv. This means of tornado detection is called the Weller Method because Newton Weller

worked out the system. The Department of Public Safety found the method dependable enough to issue a bulletin on this method of detecting tornadoes.

Detecting a tornado by this method has gained national acclaim. When a tornado watch or warning is broadcast, follow

How to tune your TV in on a tornado

1. Turn on your television set and let it warm up briefly.

2. Turn to Channel 13. Adjust the brightness control knob so the screen is aimost

3. Turn to Channel 2. Make no further adjustments.

4. Lightning appears on the screen as horizontal streaks or flashes. (A color TV

produces colored lightning.) These flashes do not indicate a tornado. 5. The tornado signal is an increasingly steady and bright white light over the entire screen. Or, if you are receiving a program on Channel 2 at the time, the darkened

picture will become visible and remain visible as a tornado approaches. 6. The bright light over the entire screen is your clue to seek shelter fast. Don't become entranced by what you see and fail to seek cover. 7. A cave or the southwest corner of your basement are the safest places to go in

time of a tornado. If you have no basement, take cover under heavy furniture in the A radio, preferably battery-operated in case the electrical power fails, can

augment your TV detection system. The procedure 1. Set the radio near the TV set.

Turn the radio to the low end of the dial - around 550 kilocycles. 3. A tornado is not far away if the radio makes a steady, staccato sound (continuous

static.) Take shelter fast

What is known as a pulse generator, actually a tornado still aloft, radiates pulses that can be picked up at about 55 megahertz. That frequency corresponds to Channel 2 on television sets.

The approaching tornado funnel 'Signal' overwhelms the normal tv signal at that frequency, and produces the brilliant white light on the screen.

It doesn't matter whether your set is

Even though a radio signal is less dependable, it is suggested that a batterypowered transistor be used along with a tv set. Then if there is a power failure, the transistor will give important weather bulletins and pick up late warning signals if a tornado is approaching.

He Walks Away From Bad Drivers

Weldon Menzer has had so many weird and funny things happen to him in his seven years with the drivers' license division of the Texas Department of Public Safety that he has trouble remembering specific cases.

Some of the incidents have been traumatic, however, and he remembers several times when he left riding and returned walking.

Menzer, with his polite, soft spoken voice and infectious smile, recalled walking back from a driver's test he was giving to a "little old lady from Muleshoe

'She ran three stop signs, then pulled

The patrolman said she took the test three times and failed each time. One day his lieutenant came over. The lieutenant asked why the woman hadn't passed after so many tests. Menzer told his superior it was alright with him if the lieutenant wanted to ride with the woman.

The shaken lieutenant failed the woman. too. "And he never did come back to check on me, again," Menzer recalled.

At least two Littlefield residents made indelible impressions on the patrolman. One man gunned his vehicle and ran the







No Time To Second Guess

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is an editorial from the Castro County News following the recent tragic traffic accident which killed 10 young people. A great deal has been said recently, concerning high speed chases involving law enforcement officials and law violators. This item gives new insight in the worst two-car accident in Texas'

'For God's sake, stop them before they get into town or they're going to kill somebody

Police Chief W. W. Jones said this was the plea which Sheriff Jack Cartwright radioed to him at 9 p.m. Saturday, just before the 1963 Chevrolet came hurdling out of the darkness into the western city

Officers weren't rying to pursue the car. They were trying to get it off the road.

Jones and Patrolman Fred Moulton set up a road black in the city, "but they didn't even slow down." the police chief said. They were running it wide open and were weaving all over the road."

The driver, Tony Guia, evidently had been "running it wide open" long before he knew he was being tailed by law officers. Mr. and Mrs. Juan Martinez reported the speeding car had run them off the highway five miles west of Dimmitt - two miles before Guia encountered the first patrol

second-guessing yourself on these two questions: (1) If our officers had backed away and let the speeding car go through town until it caused the same kind of accident, what would you have said? (2) If our officers had shot out a tire on the speeding vehicle and caused a wreck that undoubtedly would have killed all five passengers, what would your reaction have been?

Lawmen don't have the luxury of second guessing, or canvassing for popular opinion before making a decision that could affect the lives of others.

In this case, officers knew what they needed to do: they needed to stop the speeding car and get it off the highway. This they tried to do. They had it stopped once, but the car roared off again before officers could get the driver out of it.

The chase had little to do with any nebulous "pursuit policy." No such policy can be applied to each individual case. In this case, for instance, the driver of the speeding car was on probation for burglary, was reported to officers to have been intoxicated, faced possible kidnap and assault charges, knew he had probably been reported to the law, and knew he would go to prison if he were

As one local official summed it up: "He knew he was in for it if he got caught, and he was determined not to get stopped."

Our city has witnessed the worst two-car accident in the Texas Panhandle's history It has been an irreparable loss for the families of all 10 persons killed in the accident, and has cast a pall over our neighborhood, county and region.

We will be a long time getting over the consequences of this terrible accident. But we should not create ugly consequences of our own by pointing fingers irresponsibly Our law officers laid their lives on the





survey appeared unusual in that the junior class seemed to rival the faculty for conservativeness. On the other hand, sophomore and senior classes appeared quite liberal in ideas

filling out the questionnaire were asked to answer "yes" or "no" as to

should be allowed. In many instances, students indicated they did not think something was "appropriate", but they said they thought it "should be allowed". Along with this idea, in a space provided for comments or opinions, many students stressed the idea of personal freedom in dress and a majority felt that students

should set their own dress code. On the other hand, faculty members felt that parents should be the judge of the dress code. This was a second choice of students. Only a very few felt faculty members, principal, school board members, or the superintendent should set a dress code for the

Specific items on the survey were the following: long hair for boys, any kind of moustache, trimmed moustache only, beards, girls' shorts of any kind, girls' coordinated short suits only, midriffs, boys' shorts, girls cut-off jeans, boys' cut-off jeans, grasshopper and scooter skirts, shorts with long blousy shirt, girls' sun dresses, girls' tank tops, boys' tank tops, boys' ear and neck jewelry, no boys' socks, no girls' socks, and no

A total of faculty and student responses showed that the following were not considered appropriate for school wear: moustache of any kind itrimmed moustache was

approved), beards, girls' shorts of any kind, midriffs, girls' sun dresses, boys' ear and neck jewelry, and no shoes. Of these, however, the majority felt that girls' shorts of any kind, girls sun dresses, and boys' neck and ear jewelry should be allowed, even if not appropriate.

Faculty responses were quite different from the totals, however. Of all the items listed, LHS faculty disapproved all except grasshopper and scooter skirts, girls' coordinated short suits and no girls' socks. They did, however, indicate that although long hair on boys was not appropriate, it should be allowed.

The junior class came closest to agreeing with the faculty as they only approved long hair on boys, girls' coordinated short suits, grasshopper and scooter skirts, both girls' and boys' tank tops, and the absence of socks for both boys and girls. All other items were vetoed. Of these, however, they did feel that any type of girls' shorts should be allowed, as should boys' shorts, shorts with long blousy tops, and sun dresses

Seniors were the most liberal, only disapproving beards, girls' midriffs, boys' ear and neck jewelry and the lack of shoes. All else was felt to be appropriate, and they felt that the boys' jewelry should be allowed







These crashes resulted in no one killed and four persons


The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1972 shows a total of 21 accidents resulting in one person killed, and 18 persons injured.


