

Harvestors are paid on every load and the crew boss is paid as soon as his truck is unloaded and graded. Twelve to 15 trucks are kept on the road to the plant at

The harvest usually lasts about 12 weeks, but this year's crop will be about two weeks short because recent rains caused mildew

The cucumbers are easily grown, don't take much out of the soil, and will net a farmer an average of \$200 to \$250 an acre. Last year was a good year that netted growers around \$400 an acre.

Cucumbers that are good eating size but too large for pickling are considered culls, and these are fed to range cattle.

Pickles grown in the Olton area are considered the best in the country, according to Jack Straw.

Pickles are a tremendous economic boost, considering that these 650 laborers average \$10-\$20 per day over a 12-week period and almost all of this money is spent with Olton merchants.


The 1971 Miss Lamb County will reign over the two days of festivities, and head the parade down Phelps Avenue on Saturday morning, Aug. 28

Merchant Quits Store To Serve Fellowman

Joe Salem got his first taste of retail merchandising when he was 9 years old and peddled goods to Utah coal mining towns for his immigrant father. When his father died three years after coming to the U. S., the family was awarded \$1,500 and this money was used to open a grocery store in Texas. Salem, at age 11, was proprietor, but the store manager let out too much merchandise on credit.

So again Salem sold dry goods house-tohouse to keep the family going. This peddling led Salem into the dry goods business that lasted 39 years, with 23 of these years operating Salem's Dry Goods in Sudan.

Mr. and Mrs. Joe Salem moved to Sudan in September, 1931, and opened the Salem store, but when the freight arrived, they didn't have enough money left to get it out so they could open for business. He took what little money he had and got some merchandise out and peddled door-to-door until he made enough to get his merchandise and open the store.

"We didn't even have enough money to put up a \$10 deposit on the meter so we

nights," Salem said. "After we opened we found out that the electricity hadn't been disconnected and all we'd have had to do to have lights was to turn them on.

Those were the Saturday hey days. The Sudan board walks nearly broke under the weight of the crowds. "The store would be jammed. On Saturdays they'd nearly buy us out," Salem said. "Our inventory was small and everything was cheap.

During the fall, sometimes Salem had as many as 30 clerks in the 25-foot store. "We worked hard," he said. "We worked day and night. Many times I'd be in the window at three and four in the mornings, or be writing signs getting ready for the Saturday rush.

Salem operated his store at Sudan from 1931 until 1954. "The Lord led me to sell the store," he said, his voice breaking. "He sent me a buyer so I'd have more time to serve my fellowman," he added, taking off his glasses, wiping his eyes with his handkerchief, and apologizing. "I can't seem to control my emotions when I mention deity," he said.

Since that day 17 years ago, Salem has dedicated his life to work as a Methodist See MINISTER, Page 10





EDITOR'S NOTE: This guest editorial came from the Friona Star's "Star Lites" column, written by the publisher. Bill

A RECENT ARTICLE in the Mid-Continent Banker magazine dealt with the problems facing small towns, and what town leaders can do to keep the small town from slipping "into oblivion.

The article pointed out that between 60 and 70 million Americans live in towns under 10,000 population. There are some 7.697 communities of under 10,000-and 6,303 under 5,000. This is the bracket into which Friona falls.

THE AUTHOR of the article pointed out that the key to a community's long-range survival is jobs. Friona would seem to have bridged this important problem, with the addition of Missouri Beef Packers, the feedlots and other related industries and businesses.

The availability of jobs should continue to be good, as other industries to service the cattle and packing industries are envisioned for the future.

HOWEVER, the writer warned that without modern retailing facilities, longrange survival for a community may not be possible, in spite of everything else a community may have going for it.

The author posed questions concerning the plans of present businesses to continue, after the present owners and operators

HE ASKED the following questions: (1) How many businessmen in your town are nearing retirement age? (2) How many of these businesses will be continued by second-generation, capable family members. (3) If there are no qualified family successors, do these merchants have anyone working for them who might run the business in the future?

OTHER QUESTIONS asked were the

4) What kind of selection do customers in your area have for products in the following classes: men's, women's and children's clothing; shoes for the entire family: major appliances; hardwarehousewares-sporting goods; drugs; food; furniture?

(5) How much shopping for stylish or big-ticket items do townspeople do outside your town? (6) How many local merchants have modernized their shopping facilities or enlarged them) within the past five or

THE WRITER asks one final question which hits Friona right between the eyes: What is happening to presently vacated and deteriorating buildings?

Are they being left as everpresent, ever more ominous eyesores to consumers, discouraging shopping visits and portraying a dying instead of a living community? Perhaps these buildings should be torn down and the sites converted into needed parking areas to supplement that always-limited on-street parking.

THESE ARE ALL problems that face the city of Friona.

Someone in business, or perhaps a committee from the Chamber of Commerce, needs to be working on the problems stated.





lay minister, benevolent causes and other areas of voluntary service.

"You can't take material things with you," he said. "The most we can get out of life is a living - no matter how much we accumulate. Spiritual blessings can't be bought with money.

Salem's mother was a devout Catholic and his father was a Greek Orthodox where they lived near Beirut, Lebanon. Before entering the U.S. with his parents when he was eight years old, Salem was baptised into the Greek Orthodox church 'by dunking under water three times" as

Salem's father died three years after he moved his wife and five children to Salt Lake City, Utah. After his death the family moved to Texas to be near relatives.

Salem attended different churches before joining the Methodist Church in Spur when he was 19. Since that time he has held the highest offices a layman in the

Methodist church can hold, but his fulltime dedication started on a plane flight to Dallas just before he sold the Sudan store.

Salem said he was flying to Dallas to buy more merchandise when turbulent weather hit and the plane couldn't land at Love Field as scheduled. Nine other planes were circling the field, and Salem said he knew the fuel would soon be exhausted. "I promised the Lord that I'd sell the store and try to serve Him in a better way.

A few minutes later Salem said he was downtown in Dallas crossing the street to go to the wholesale district when a man approached him and asked him if he

wanted to sell his store. George Gabriel of Spur came to Sudan two weeks later and bought Salem's inventory.

For many years Salem had tried to render service to his fellowman in church work, civic and social work. Now he could devote full time to spiritual values.

Salem has been elected to four general and jurisdictional conferences. In 1958 he went on a mission into east and western Europe and the Soviet Union. Five years ago he went on an evangelistic mission into six countries in South America. In October of 1969 he went to the Orient, Philippines, Tokyo and Taipei And his last missionary trips were to Seattle, Wash, and Salem, Ore "I'm just trying to serve wherever I can be of service," he said.

But of all the places he has been, and of all the people he has ministered to, the Sudan youth organization "Lowts" is Salem's first love.

The word "Lotws" stands for "love overcometh the world." The word is pronounced with the "t" silent. The "t" symbolizes the cross and lowliness. The s" on the word makes it plural. And the motto is "love in action.

In the eight years the youth organization has been operating, a weekly average of 54 youths from Sudan's total population of 1,000) attend the meetings.

The young people are black, Latin Americans, Anglos-the young people who haven't been ministered to-from the poor to those from the better economic status. The sessions started in "The Shack," a little house behind the Salem house in Sudan, and have been moved to larger quarters twice since then.

The meetings open with a prayer, include a short Bible lesson, and end with a service assignment for boys and a sewing lesson for girls. The boys rake leaves or

mow, work in the park for an hour, or do other tasks to earn pocket change. In past years the boys have raised vegetables for their families. The girls get sewing lessons and take their completed garments home with them after six weeks.

"The program is based on a love of God," Salem said. "And it's needed in every community, not just here. We need to start with the young to instill Christian principles and the importance of hard and honest work, then put these principles into practice."

Last Christmas 200 youths registered for the Christmas program. On June 19th the group celebrated their eighth anniversary when 171 youths registered at the Lotws Center seventh roundup. Then the youths and adult leaders, including 38 who came to help with the barbecue, gathered in the Salem backyard. "There were more than 250 here." Salem said. "They were black, white, poor, rich. God's presence was real. We enjoyed a bit of heaven right here. That's the way it is going to be in Heaven all colors, all classes - they'll all be there. Never has a greater event transpired anywhere than transpired right here in

"I have a picture of a Catholic priest standing beside a Church of Christ preacher right out there," he said, indicating his back yard. "We had three Methodist ministers and a bishop, a Baptist minister, two priests, a Church of Christ minister, Assembly of God and Church of God pastors. They were all here and on the program.
