Present at the meeting Thursday night were five representatives from General Telephone. Rad Richardson of Littlefield, district manager for General Telephone, introduced Rex Bailey, vice president of revenue and earnings for General Telephone, who served as spokesman for the group, and who introduced Dick Hawkins. Ted Coker and Wayne Goodrum.

Following the introductions, Bailey stated, "The reason for us requesting to be on your agenda tonight- we have just, in the last day or so. received a request from you requesting additional information regarding

the Joe Nall presentation made here before the city council.

"I guess, in our way of thinking, this is kinda the straw that breaks the camel's back, as far as we're concerned, and we want to express this concern to you. I guess it evolved from the most recent court case- and what have you - and the negotiations we've had with the city council here.

Bailey continued, "We have spent \$18,800 with Joe Nall in trying to get you all the information for your city. What has happened, you sent us an interrogatory before with 17 questions and we sent that back to Joe Nall and

said, 'OK, you answer this information for the cities' - of which we did, and that cost us an additional \$3,600.

'You have more questions here than you had on the last one. So I've got a feeling that this is going to cost us another \$3-, \$4- or \$5 thousand

"To be very frank and candid with the mayor and councilmen tonight, we just can't afford to continue spending money, unless we're actually talking about getting down and doing some serious rate case negotiations.

"We certainly don't want to be spending money in a community where we're not making money, and we feel like we're NOT making money.

'I guess the position we wanted to take tonight as we come to talk to you, is, we want to ask you, as we asked the city of Brownfield today, 'are you folks really interested in negotiating a schedule of rates for your community that both the city can live with and General Telephone Company can live with? On the premises that we can sit down and do that tonight, you'll have your representative or your consultant to make arrangements to come down to talk to you.

"I'd like to ask the mayor and council, where are we? You're talking about 60 days more now on this, and I'm confident that probably at that time, if I know your consultant, he can think of a few more questions to ask us. Then we're talking about another 60 days.

"Sept. 1 is the day the Texas Public Utilities Commission takes over jurisdiction over rates and services. You're home free!

Bailey continued, "Also on Sept. 1, you don't have to worry about the rate question. We do! We've got 37 rate cases on file in Texas and we'll be filing approximately seven more in metropolitan areas. And from a financial point of view, in terms of saying what we call financially viable, we've got to get those cases settled. We've got to have that money flowing by the time we go under the umbrella of the Public Utilities Commission.

'And I guess that's where I'm at Mayor, and I'd like to have some kind of indication from you folks as to where we are.

Mayor J. E. Chisholm responded, 'As you know, the case is filed against Amherst and Anton, along with Littlefield, and so we met with them, and the three towns are working together- yes, I think we would be willing to sit down and talk to you as soon as we get the information you have. But we must have those towns because we could not- say like tonight- sit down and discuss rates with you without having them present. when they have joined with us in negotiating the rates.

Then Bailey stated, "I think you can appreciate- as far as tonight is concerned- we are primarily interested in THIS town, and I recognize how the thing has evolved.

He continued, "Are you telling me Mayor, that if we at sometime in the near future could get those two cities together with you, that we could sit

down and talk about negotiations?" The mayor responded, "I think we

City Attorney Ted Sansom reminded, "As long as Bill McMorris is here! I don't think we can get to first base without our engineer.

Bailey stated that he thought it would be appropriate to have Mc-Morris there and revealed that Mc-Morris had worked with them in successful negotiations Thursday in Brownfield.

Bailey then emphasized getting the meeting set at the earliest possible time to get the matter settled.

He continued, "Economically, we can't continue- and you all have a pretty aggressive thing going on in





Despite the fact that our ancests treated this song as a folk song it was actually a political satire. It seems the Queen Elizabeth gave her various suitors the amusing nicknames of animals and she called the Duc c'Alencon her "frog" who

"Yankee Doodle" is perhaps the most outstanding song in the history of America's people. It has been continually popular for over 200 years.

Legend has it that Oliver Cromwell rode his horse and wore an Italian style hat crowned with a long feather known as a "macaroni." In derision his enemies made up a rhyme ending with "stuck a feather in his hat and called it macaroni.

The word "Yankee" was a contemptuous nickname the British soldiers applied to New Englanders.

'The Riddle' was brought to our country around the middle of the 18th century. and for a number of years was known only to the Kentucky mountaineers who followed Daniel Boone westward. However, during America's great expansion period many of these mountaineers migrated further westward, exposing others to the charm of the

'Oh Dear, What Can the Matter Be?", which has been popular here for more than 250 PERRY years, is really English. Its Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Perry of origin is obscure, but it is known to have been widely sung in England around 1792. Within a couple of years this song made its way to this country along with the many waves of immigration shortly after the American Revolution.

'Billy Boy'' is a folk song of the Southern mountaineers. There is good reason to believe that this song made its first American appearance in New England right after the Revo-

"The Wayfaring Stranger" was originally a deeply meaningful religious song born in the southern Appalachisn mountains about the time of the American Revolution. The freedom loving people of this region, chiefly of English, Scottish, Irish, and Welsh stock, endured enormous hardships in their determination to build homes and protect their loved ones. They longed for some reward for their hard

The final song was sung by the group- "Auld Lang Syne" which is an ancient Scots folk song. It means for "old times sake."

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



A Banker's Viewpoint....

Some of the pistol toting badmen of the early American west shot from the hip, it is said.

Those are the ones who didn't live long enough to make the history books. They were promptly gunned by more careful, deliberate men, both good and bad, who spotted their targets clearly and took good aim before they pulled the trigger.

There is a similarity between the impetuous and short-lived badmen of the old west and some of our more politically oriented lawmakers in Congress who. impatient to accomplish some aim or another and staging what they think is a good show for their constituents, shoot before lining up their sights or, sometimes, before their target is clearly in view.

Such, we feel, is the case with a proposed law passed by the Senate last December 11, labeled as the Financial Institutions Act (S. 1267). Obviously, many of the Senators who voted for this bill either hadn't studied it or didn't understand its far-reaching impli-

It is a complicated bill; so we won't bore you with all its details. But there is one sure way this proposed law would affect you if you are an average bank or savings-and-loan depositor:

It would cost you money.

The bill proposes to expand competition in banking by letting savings-and-loans handle demand deposits, like banks do and by permitting both savings-and-loans and banks to pay interest on demand deposits - the money in bank that you write your everyday checks against.

The average depositor seldom keeps enough in his checking account to earn an appreciable amount from such interest. But he would have to pay his share of the increase in banking costs brought on by payment of interest to larger business accounts, along with the increased accounting the interest payments would make necessary. Further, because of these increased costs to the bank, this average depositor would have to pay a higher rate of interest, more than likely, any time he had to borrow money himself.

There are many other so-called "reforms" in the Senate bill. Some of them might have value, but each item is so far reaching on its own that we feel it should be brought up as an individual bill, not dropped into a shotgun measure like S. 1267.

We think the Senate has fired from the hip and scored a tragic miss - tragic, that is, if the House should happen to follow along.

We believe in this country and its people. Like the vriters of our Constitution, we believe that the strength and the real intelligence of government originates with the people So we urge all our citizens, here and elsewhere, to do our part-keep up with public issues and send our opinions about them to our elected representatives.

PEARL BRANDON

A FEW NIGHTS AGO I listened to a talk show on the KOA radio station in Denver. It was carried on by the announcer and a preacher, denomination unknown.

The questions they were asking were, "Should we talk about death? Should we be afraid to die? Should we talk about death to young people? Should we allow young children to attend funerals?"

I was very interested in the discussions that followed from people who called in. One eighty-five year old woman who was bedfast and blind said she didn't believe in life after death. She believed the only thing that would be left of her after death would be what people remembered about her. so she was dictating her life story on tape and a niece was typing it for her.

They asked this woman if she was afraid of death feeling as she did about the hereafter. She said yes, she was afraid at times and she hated the thought of the nothingness that she would become. That was why she was trying to project her thoughts into the future after she was gone.

An elderly man called and said he was looking forward to death with great anticipation. He had been a Christian since 1928 and had read through the new testament 97 times since then. When asked if he didn't dread dying, he said he did not dread

death itself, but sometimes he dreaded what might lead up to death such as a long stay in the hospital and the pain, or being cooped up in a nursing home. He thought it would be beautiful if he could go to sleep some night and wake up with the Lord.

One sixteen year old girls called in crying, and talked on the question of youth facing the fact of dying. One of her teenage friends had died recently from a drug overdose. She said some of the dead boy's friends were devastated- they had never faced death before and suddenly their friend had died. Death became very real and they were not ready to face it. She thought children should be allowed to attend funerals and learn about the

One woman said she was not a Christian, but when she looked around at some people who claimed to be Christians and when she read of the wars in Ireland and Lebanon she didn't see how Christianity helped much. It seemed hypocritical to her.

My father used to say if you could hide behind hypocrisy you were pretty small yourself.

In analyzing the program it seemed to me those who said they were Christians did not fear death like those who said they were not believers in

Now I will give my views on the subject of death. It is inevitable- we must all die. We face it from the cradle to the grave. It is no respecter of person, young or old.

I think young children should be taught about death. Members of their families die, there pets die, and believe me it hurts a child for a pet dog or kitten to die.

I think children should be allowed to attend funerals of loved ones and grieve along with the rest of the

Death is very good for those who have lost their usefulness and are in pain. If they have faith in God they feel they are being released from old, tired, wornout bodies.

It is hard for us to accept death for the young, they haven't had chance to live, but we know God is the Great Seer, that death to Him is not the same as it is to us. He can see the whole

Christ died and arose again, to show us we would do the same. He was a young man.

I remember a few lines of an unknown writer. "The youth said, "Hello death, aren't you a little early coming for me? The Lord hath need of thee, said death.
