American colonists studied at Anton

The rollicking American colonists were centerstaged at a Study Club meeting tonight. Mrs. S. M. Mrs. Reese Pritchard and Mrs. Everett Butler presented six songs. The first was "Green-

sleeves" which was brought to America by the Pilgrims, and it was one of the very few secular songs frequently sung by our early settlers. Throughout Colonial America's growth this song's popularity maintained itself as one of the favorites among little and big people alike. It was sung lustily by the village blacksmith and more elegantly by the wealthy Virginia families to the accompaniment of violins and the virginal (a small spinet without legs).

Next was "A Frog, He Went a Courting." This song landed in America almost the same time as the Pilgrims although it was first printed in England in 1611 under the title "A Most Strange Wedding of the Frog and the Mouse". Despite the fact that our ancestors treated this song as a folk song it was actually a political satire. It seems the Queen Elizabeth gave her various suitors the amusing nicknames of animals and she called the Duc c'Alencon her "frog" who was very unpopular with her subjects.

Migrating New Englanders (1700) brought this song with them to their new homes in the South Appalachians, and for a long time afterwards the Blue Ridge mountaineers kept this song's popularity alive.

"Yankee Doodle" is perhaps the most outstanding song in the history of America's people. It has been continually popular for over 200 years.

Legend has it that Oliver Cromwell rode his horse and wore an Italian style hat crowned with a long feather known as a "macaroni." In derision his enemies made up a rhyme ending with "stuck a feather in his hat and called it macaroni."

The word "Yankee" was a contemptuous nickname the British soldiers applied to New Englanders.

"The Riddle" was brought to our country around the middle of the 18th century, and for a number of years was known only to the Kentucky mountaineers who followed Daniel Boone westward. However, during America's great expansion period many of these mountaineers migrated further westward, exposing others to the charm of the song.

"Oh Dear, What Can the Matter Be?", which has been popular here for more than 250 years, is really English. Its origin is obscure, but it is known to have been widely sung in England around 1792. Within a couple of years this song made its way to this country along with the many waves of immigration shortly after the American Revolution.

"Billy Boy" is a folk song of the Southern mountaineers. There is good reason to believe that this song made its first American appearance in New England right after the Revolution.

"The Wayfaring Stranger" was originally a deeply meaningful religious song born in the southern Appalachian mountains about the time of the American Revolution. The freedom loving people of this region, chiefly of English, Scottish, Irish, and Welsh stock, endured enormous hardships in their determination to build homes and protect their loved ones. They longed for some reward for their hard labors, in this world or in the next.

The final song was sung by the group— "Auld Lang Syne" which is an ancient Scots folk song. It means for "old times sake."

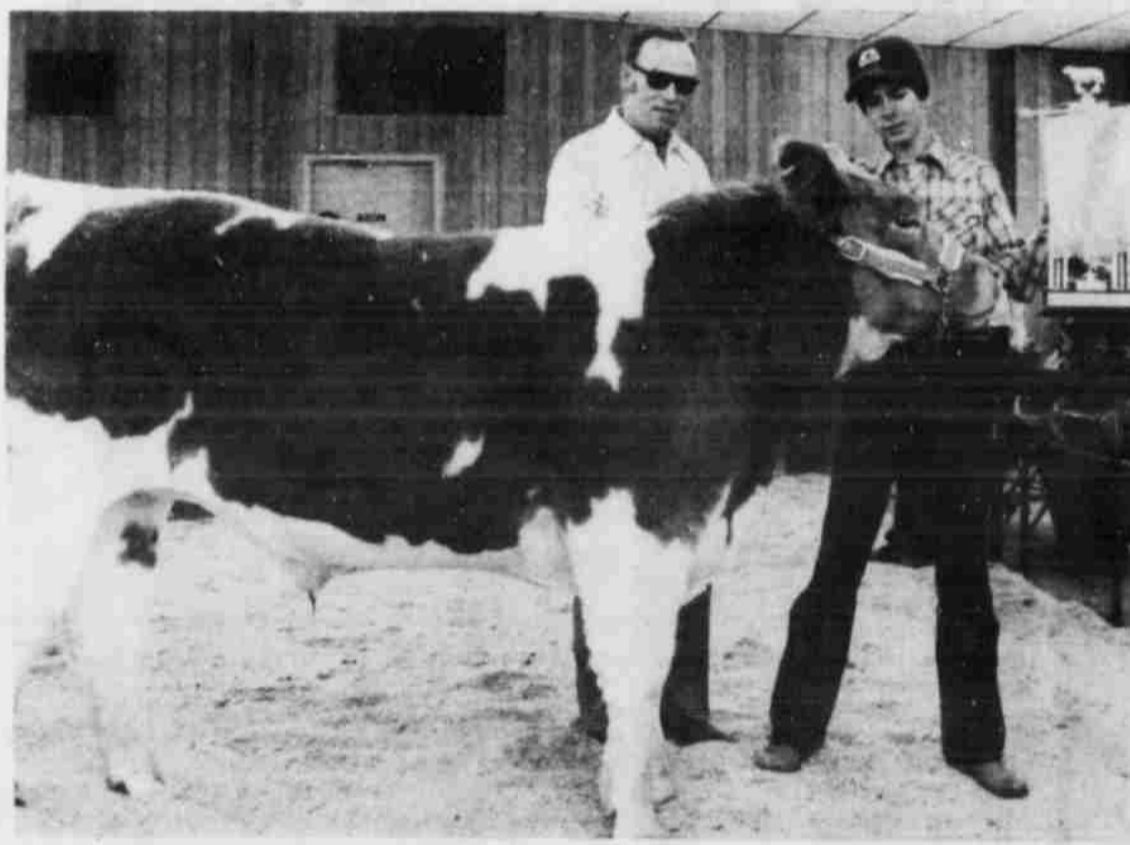

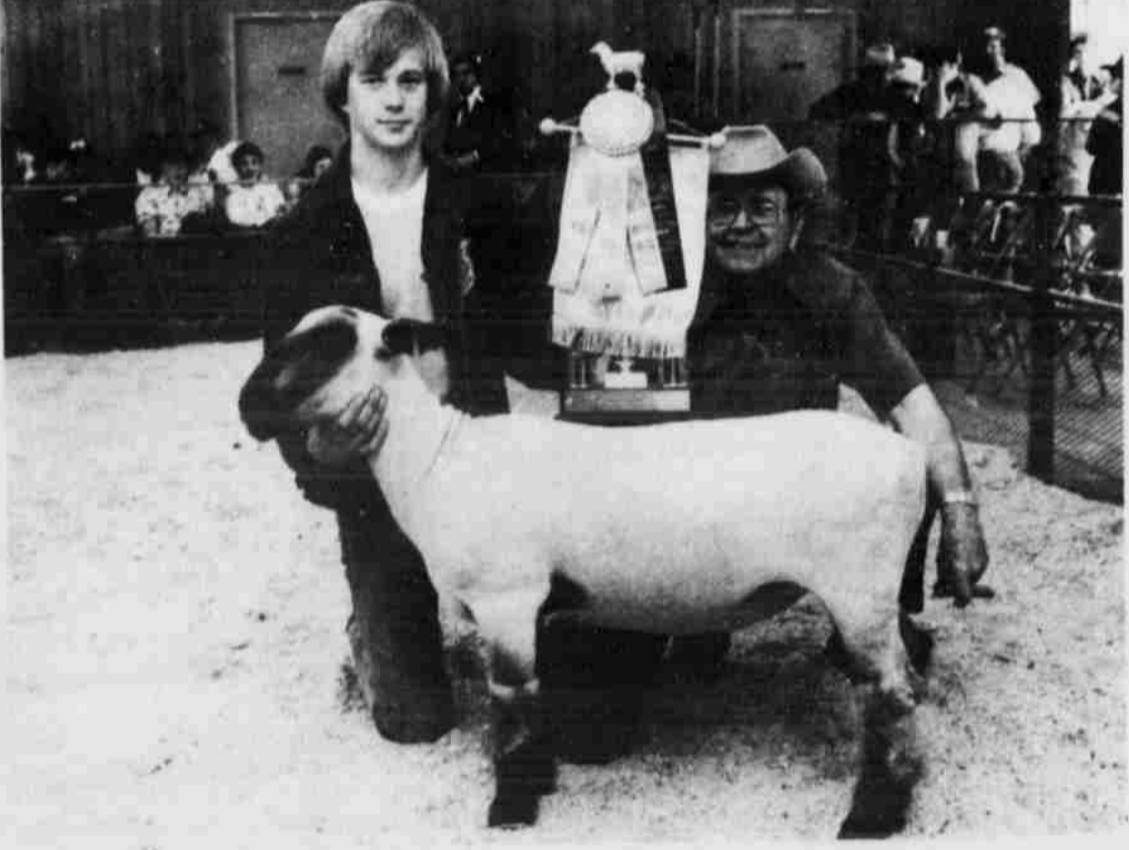

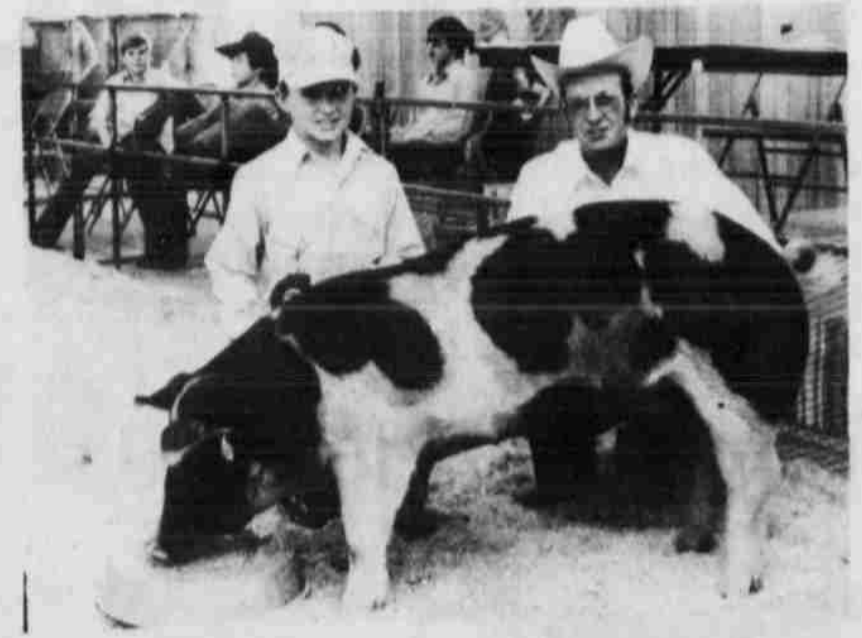

Canning nutritious baby food at home

Many mothers may enjoy canning baby food—and the process is easy and inexpensive, Mrs. Dorothy Powell, County Extension Agent, says. Select fresh, tender vegetables. Cook them in a small amount of water, then press them through a fine sieve or food mill. Use a blender to puree the vegetables.

The puree is thicker and slows the rate of heat penetration, Mrs. Powell added.

Add boiling water if necessary to make the puree about the same thickness as heavy cream. Reheat to boiling and pour into hot half-pint or pint jars, leaving one-half inch head space. Insert a table knife into the jar to remove any air bubbles.

For older babies eating chopped vegetables, the process is even easier. Simply wash, drain and chop the vegetables. Boil three minutes in enough water to cover. Pack, leaving about one-half inch head space. Process as instructed for low acid vegetables.

Adjust the caps and process according to the recommended time for pureed vegetables at 10 pounds pressure. Processing time for strained vegetables is longer than for chopped or canned whole, because

She noted that baby fruits such as peaches and apricots should be cooked. For strained fruits, follow recipes for fruit puree.

Extension publication "Home Canning-Fruits, Vegetables"-194, contains a section on canning purees which is applicable to canning baby food. This publication can be obtained from the county extension office in the Lamb County Courthouse.

A Banker's Viewpoint...

Some of the pistol toting badmen of the early American west shot from the hip, it is said. Those are the ones who didn't live long enough to make the history books. They were promptly gunned by more careful, deliberate men, both good and bad, who spotted their targets clearly and took good aim before they pulled the trigger.

There is a similarity between the impetuous and short-lived badmen of the old west and some of our more politically oriented lawmakers in Congress who, impatient to accomplish some aim or another and staging what they think is a good show for their constituents, shoot before lining up their sights or, sometimes, before their target is clearly in view.

Such, we feel, is the case with a proposed law passed by the Senate last December 11, labeled as the Financial Institutions Act (S.1267). Obviously, many of the Senators who voted for this bill either hadn't studied it or didn't understand its far-reaching implications.

It is a complicated bill; so we won't bore you with all its details. But there is one sure way this proposed law would affect you if you are an average bank or savings-and-loan depositor: It would cost you money.

The bill proposes to expand competition in banking by letting savings-and-loans handle demand deposits, like banks do and by permitting both savings-and-loans and banks to pay interest on demand deposits—the money in bank that you write your everyday checks against.

The average depositor seldom keeps enough in his checking account to earn an appreciable amount from such interest. But he would have to pay his share of the increase in banking costs brought on by payment of interest to larger business accounts, along with the increased accounting the interest payments would make necessary. Further, because of these increased costs to the bank, this average depositor would have to pay a higher rate of interest, more than likely, any time he had to borrow money himself.

There are many other so-called "reforms" in the Senate bill. Some of them might have value, but each item is so far reaching on its own that we feel it should be brought up as an individual bill, not dropped into a shotgun measure like S.1267.

We think the Senate has fired from the hip and scored a tragic miss—tragic, that is, if the House should happen to follow along.

We believe in this country and its people. Like the writers of our Constitution, we believe that the strength and the real intelligence of government originates with the people. So we urge all our citizens, here and elsewhere, to do our part—keep up with public issues and send our opinions about them to our elected representatives.

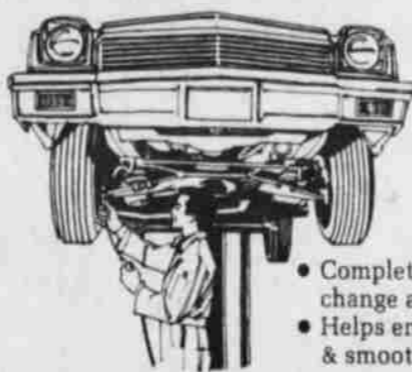

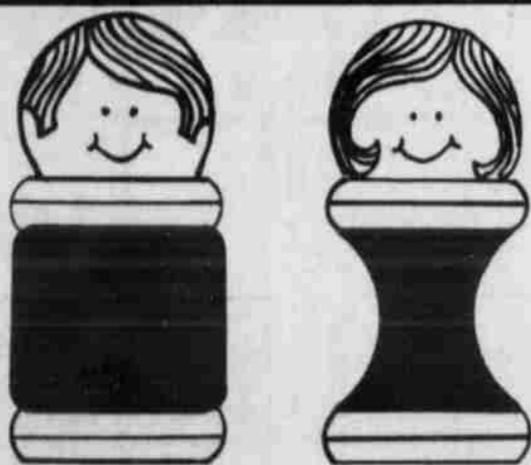

THE MAN
 Ewing Halsell Land of Amherst opened in the newly built Hotel, big things happen. Prospective businessmen came

in great numbers to purchase this new and virgin land at prices that the common man could afford. Mr. Ewing Halsell, living at Venita, Okla., selected several of the best and most competent men he

could find and sent them to Amherst to sell land and keep the books.
 Among this group was Bill Rowland, Frank Rogers, Lester LaGrange and Lee Payne. They stayed in the new hotel and made their home there for several years. Bill Rowland, manager, married a local school teacher and lived there the rest of his life. Frank also married a teacher, and later became one of the leading businessmen in the county. Les LaGrange carried the mail for the rest of his active life. Les died August 13, 1968, and his wife lives in the old family home in Amherst, loved, honored, and respected by all that know her. Lee Payne! "The Man"

Lee Payne was "an Oakie from Muskogee." Lee got his schooling at Ada, Okla., and was one time champion speed typist of Oklahoma, 131 words per minute. He met Ewing Halsell in Tulsa, Oklahoma, while working for an oil company doing business for Mr. Halsell. Now, Ewing knew right away that Lee Payne was just what he needed in his land office in Amherst. So a deal was made, and the young man soon landed in the Amherst Hotel.

Lee made a good hand, and with his wonderful personality soon became known as The Man at Amherst. He opened an office of his own, was hired as City Secretary, and held this position from 1925-1946.

His insurance, land, and many other activities kept this young man busy. But Lee never gave up his loyalty to Ewing Halsell, and assisted the Land Company whenever

he was needed.
 Now, Lee, like many others, married a guest of the Amherst Hotel. In the beginning Mr. Halsell built a lumber yard in Amherst to help promote the town. After a couple of years he ordered Lee Payne to sell the yard. Lee soon found a buyer, the Panhandle Lumber Company.

Hood representing the company, came to Amherst and brought along his beautiful and talented daughter as his secretary. Now, Lee the gay young man that he was, met the nice young secretary, and a beautiful romance began. They were married the next year in Muleshoe, and soon moved to their beautiful home on main street in Amherst. Lee and Marie Payne celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary at their home May 22, 1975.

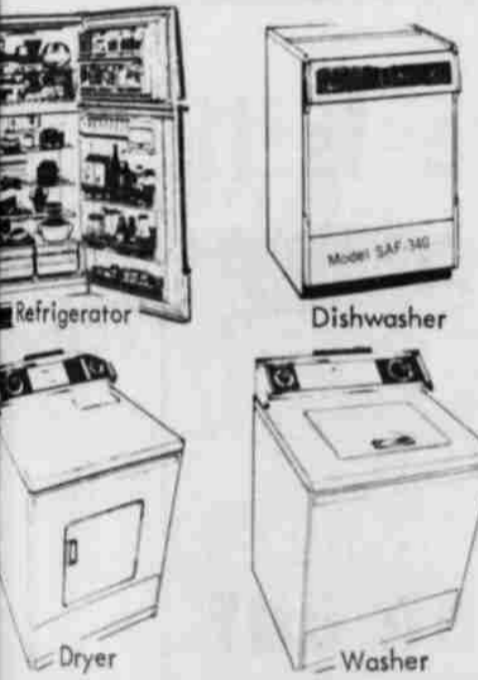
Lee was a charter member of the Amherst Lions Club, built the first picture show in town, was active in formation of the South Plains Hospital. Then several years ago he established the Payne Funeral Home and established a very successful operation.

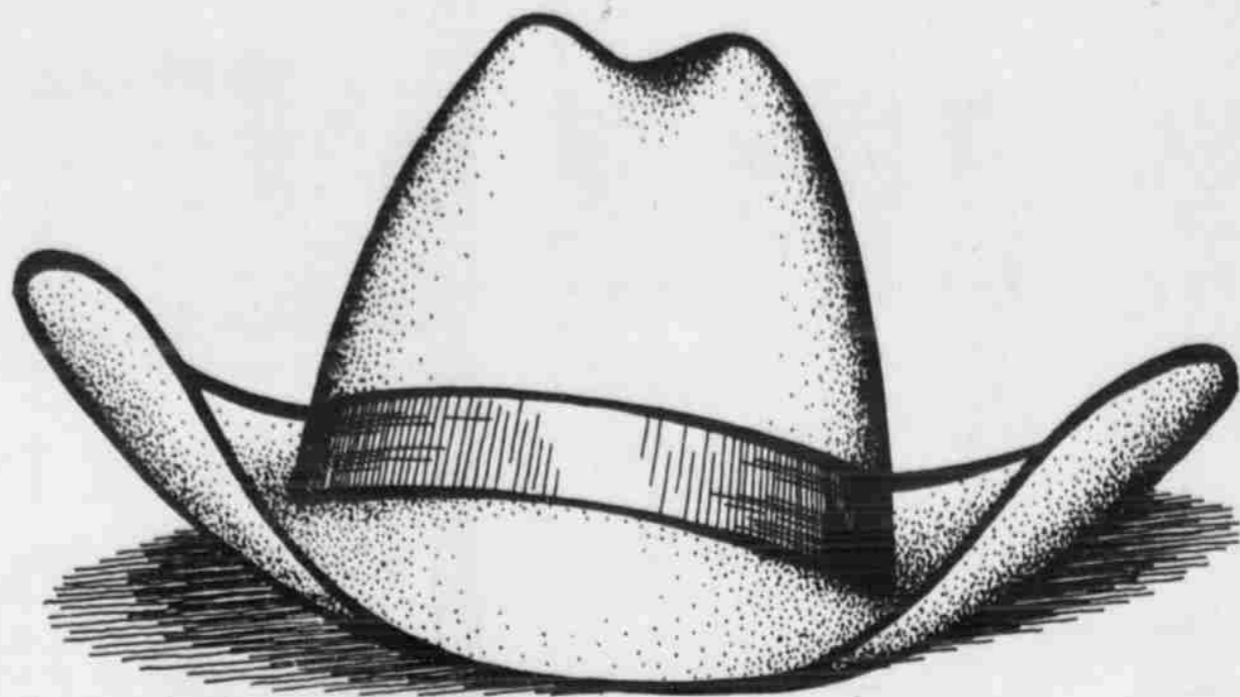

A Woman's View

A FEW NIGHTS AGO I listened to a talk show on the KOA radio station in Denver. It was carried on by the announcer and a preacher, denomination unknown.

The questions they were asking were, "Should we talk about death? Should we be afraid to die? Should we talk about death to young people? Should we allow young children to attend funerals?"

I was very interested in the discussions that followed from people who called in. One eighty-five year old woman who was bedfast and blind said she didn't believe in life after death. She believed the only thing that would be left of her after death would be what people remembered about her, so she was dictating her life story on tape and a niece was typing it for her.

They asked this woman if she was afraid of death feeling as she did about the hereafter. She said yes, she was afraid at times and she hated the thought of the nothingness that she would become. That was why she was trying to project her thoughts into the future after she was gone.

An elderly man called and said he was looking forward to death with great anticipation. He had been a Christian since 1928 and had read through the new testament 97 times since then. When asked if he didn't dread dying, he said he did not dread

death itself, but sometimes he dreaded what might lead up to death such as a long stay in the hospital and the pain, or being cooped up in a nursing home. He thought it would be beautiful if he could go to sleep some night and wake up with the Lord.

One sixteen year old girl called in crying, and talked on the question of youth facing the fact of dying. One of her teenage friends had died recently from a drug overdose. She said some of the dead boy's friends were devastated—they had never faced death before and suddenly their friend had died. Death became very real and they were not ready to face it. She thought children should be allowed to attend funerals and learn about the fact of death.

One woman said she was not a Christian, but when she looked around at some people who claimed to be Christians and when she read of the wars in Ireland and Lebanon she didn't see how Christianity helped much. It seemed hypocritical to her.

My father used to say if you could hide behind hypocrisy you were pretty small yourself.

In analyzing the program it seemed to me those who said they were Christians did not fear death like those who said they were not believers in God.

Now I will give my views on the subject of death. It is inevitable—we must all die. We face it from the cradle to the grave. It is no respecter of person, young or old.

I think young children should be taught about death. Members of their families die, their pets die, and believe me it hurts a child for a pet dog or kitten to die.

I think children should be allowed to attend funerals of loved ones and grieve along with the rest of the family.

Death is very good for those who have lost their usefulness and are in pain. If they have faith in God they feel they are being released from old, tired, worn-out bodies.

It is hard for us to accept death for the young, they haven't had chance to live, but we know God is the Great Seer, that death to Him is not the same as it is to us. He can see the whole picture.

Christ died and arose again, to show us we would do the same. He was a young man.

I remember a few lines of an unknown writer. The youth said, "Hello death, aren't you a little early coming for me? The Lord hath need of thee," said death.

School board candidate guidelines published

"So You Want to be a School Board Member: A Candidate's Guide" is available for veteran and potential school trustees through the Texas Association of School Boards, Austin.

The guide includes procedures for running for office, filing for office, and complying with the Texas Election Code. Two bills passed during the

64th Legislature, HB 4 and HB 275, amended the Texas Election Code with regard to campaign disclosures and election dates, respectively. The candidate's guide explains the implications of both for school board elections.

Generally, school trustee elections are the first Saturday in April. Candidates must file 30 days prior to that date.

Therefore, citizens in most counties interested in filing for a school board position must file on or before March 5 for the April 3 election.

The candidate's guide is a result of action taken by the TASB Delegate Assembly at its annual meeting. The Assembly adopted a resolution

providing for an information campaign on school trustee elections. Members of the Association agreed that in order for qualified citizens to continue to seek offices of school trustee positions an explanation of the duties and requirements was needed.

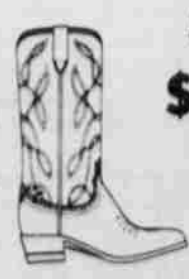

Large spending increases causing state-wide surge

Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that large increases in personnel, education and welfare costs are leading a 29 percent state spending surge this year over fiscal 1975 levels.

In his monthly financial statement, Bullock said salaries and wages have increased 26 percent, medical care for the needy 32 percent, foundation school program grants 43 percent and grants to higher education 33 percent.

But the Comptroller announced at the same time that tax revenues are 19 percent ahead of last year so far. "The biggest jumps are in the natural gas tax, which is up 40 percent, the motor vehicle sales tax, up 27 percent, and insurance occupation

Insecticides for gardens

Before planting your vegetable garden this year, take precautions against harmful insects, advises Birch Lobban, Assistant county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Wireworms, white grubs, mole crickets, cutworms, flea beetle larvae, fly larvae and maggots are among the insects that feed on the seeds, roots and other underground parts of vegetables.

Lobban says that areas which have been in sod for over two years, that have had the same crops every year, or areas that have large amounts of organic matter are most susceptible to soil insects.

"It's important to use the right kind of insecticide on your garden," stresses the county agent. "Many insecticides may be harmful to certain vegetables and only a few can be used safely." Diazinon and chlordane are

two commonly used insecticides that are safe for gardens. However, root crops should not be planted in soil treated with chlordane.

Apply the insecticides about two to four weeks before the garden is to be planted, says Lobban. Work the insecticide into the top four to six inches of soil and make sure it is evenly distributed.

To cover 1,000 square feet of soil with diazinon, use six fluid ounces of 25 per cent emulsifiable concentrate, says the county agent. Mix it with enough water to cover the entire soil area. If you use powder, use 1/2 cup of 50 per cent wettable powder mixed with adequate water.

To cover 1,000 square feet of garden area with chlordane, use two fluid ounces of 72 per cent emulsifiable concentrate mixed with water or 1/4 cup of 40 per cent wettable powder mixed with water.
