# **Voters Favor** Briscoe, Tower

Lamb County voters turned out 3,035 strong to vote in Saturday's first general election primary and joined the statewide trend of general political housecleaning by voting overwhelming disapproval of the incumbent governor.

Dolph Briscoe won the popular vote thumbs up over Gov. Preston Smith and hopeful Ben Barnes, polling 1,856 to Smith's 366 and Barnes' 437.

Barefoot Sanders polled an even 400 more votes than Ralph Yarbrough in the Democrat's U.S. Senate race.

Eighty-three of the 92 Republican votes cast favored John G. Tower. Albert Bel Fay received a simple majority vote as governor on the Republican ticket.

Lamb County Democrats showed their disapproval of forced busing of public school children to achieve racial balance almost seven to one.

Republicans expressed more disapproval over daylight savings time than on the busing referendum, with 61 to 13 against the time change and 58 to 17 showing disapproval of forced busing

There were 6,696 qualified voters in Lamb County eligible to vote in the first primary. Heavy rains Saturday afternoon and a severe thunderstorm warning over the county were blamed for a lighter turn-out than was

# **Board Closes** School Cafeteria

Littlefield school board members voted to close the Littlefield High School cafeteria, named head coach Jerry Blakely athletic director of both boys and girls' athletics, and discussed extensive repairs needed at all five public schools during the regular school board meeting Monday night.

In view of future repairs, board members suggested that a bond issue might be needed, and Superintendent Paul I. Jones was instructed to get the costs down in black and white

ALL SCHOOL BOARD members agreed to discontinue the cafeteria service in the high school after a lengthy

The high school cafeteria will be closed effective with the 1972-73 fall term, but the snack bar in the cafeteria will remain open. High school students who wish to eat in the cafeteria and those on the free lunch program will be transported to the junior high cafeteria

The reason for closing the high school because so few students use the cafeteria facilities. Of those eating cafeteria meals, it was noted that half received free lunches

LYNN REAMS, maintenance superintendent, Ed Jennings, the school's insurance representative, and all five school principals met with the school board.

Reams detailed maintenance problems faced this summer and in the future on all school buildings, school grounds and the football stadium. He prefaced his report by stating that "first of all we need more maintenance

The 1971-72 maintenance budget is

Reams and the school principals pointed out the following needs

LITTLEFIELD PRIMARY - the old section built in 1924 needs remains in the immediate future. At least your rooms and the restrooms need painting. Plaster around radiators in nine rooms need repairing. Desks and chairs need refinishing, and help is needed for flower beds and grass upkeep.

ELEMENTARY I - needs roofing repairs, four rooms need painting immediately. Principal James Settle suggested removing a partition in the teachers' workroom to provide more classroom space.

AT ELEMENTARY II, Principal Jack Christian said the wiring is a serious problem and presents danger to students. He said the first floor which See BOARD, Page 4

Severe thunderstorms dumped several inches of rain and pecked portions of Lamb County with hail Saturday afternoon, and again Tuesday evening. The additional threat of tornadoes was added Tuesday.

Thunder clouds that topped 42,000 fee: pounded Amherst with baseball size hail. Lamb County highway patrolmen who were watching clouds in the Amherst area about 4 p.m. Saturday said side mirrors and headlights on their patrol car were broken by hail in the storm that dumped three inches of rain on the Amherst area.

Saturday, rains and hail were heaviest toward the Lamb County, Bailey County line where hail piled up on Highway 70 so deep that road graders were called into service to clear the road around Nichols Gin west of Earth

Hail on Highway 168 one-half mile south of Olton caused a traffic accident Saturday afternoon Doris Chaney McGill came over the rise on F 168 just south of Olton and hit hail piled on the highway, lost control of her late model car and went into the left ditch and through a fence.

Royce Turner of Pleasant Valley is recovering from a freak accident caused by a hail storm in the Earth area Friday afternoon. Turner was taken to the Methodist Hospital in Lubbock after he was hit in the eye by a hail stone.

Turner was turning into his driveway at his farm in the Pleasant Valley community when his vision was obstructed by blowing dust and rain. He rolled down his pickup window to look out when he thought his vehicle was about to touch a highline wire, and a hail stone struck him in the eye.

Rainfall totals for Thursday, Friday and Saturday varied widely. In the Bula community residents reported not more than a half inch total, while as much as 4.5 inches were recorded between Springlake and Olton

An additional .30 to .45 were recorded in Littlefield tuesday, bringing rainfall in the city limits of Littlefield to more





THE SPIRALING COST of welfare in Texas has leveled off, and no reduction in grants will be necessary this year, according to reports reaching Gov. Preston Smith

Welfare demands are slowing down for the first time in a decade, and expenditures for 1973 may be less than in 1972, the Governor said

Smith's reports indicated the cost of programs in fiscal 1973 may be \$75 million less than the \$347 million estimated a year ago.

It now appears most likely that grant payments to welfare recipients will not have to be cut, and we will still be able to stay within the constitutional limitation on spending," the Governor said

Due to a state constitutional ceiling on general revenue state expenditures for welfare assistance, a reduction in grants beginning September 1 had been regarded as unavoidable

Main reason for the slowdown in welfare's cost climb is a decline in old age assistance rolls and the fact that the increase in Aid to Families with Dependent Children eligibility has not

been as large as anticipated. AFDC rolls, expected to expand by 10,000 a month, actually grew about 5 000 monthly

There is still much work that needs to be done, but for the first time in recent years. I believe we now have a handle on the problems and have finally brought them under control. Smith stated.

He credited these factors as contributing to the cost leveling:

New controls over medical assistance expenses; improved management techniques, a program utilization review, more effective use of electronic data processing and a reduction of program abuse

#### STARTS ALL OVER AGAIN

With the hard-fought first primary election just behind them, some candidates plunged right into the June 3 runoff campaign.

Of one thing they can be sure: the cost of campaigning, like everything else, is

A hasty total of first primary expensecontribution reports indicates spending by the statewide candidates in contested races totaled more than \$5 million. There is no telling how many millions were spent by congressional, legislative and local-county candidates in the rush to be first at the ballot box.

#### INSURANCE PLAN SUBMITTED

A personal injury protection plan for the motorist is proposed by State Insurance Board Chairman Larry Teaver as an alternative to controversial no-fault auto insurance.

Teaver will unveil his plan officially at the Board's annual hearing on auto insurance in July. It would eliminate uninsured motorist coverage and medical payments section of standard auto policies. It would substitute a provision giving policyholders, without regard to fault in accidents, unlimited medical expenses, life insurance in event of fatal accident and income replacement guarantees.

Governor Smith, meanwhile, called on Teaver to intensify efforts to bring lower insurance rates for responsible young and elderly drivers. A reduction in rates for drivers under 25 would encourage

them to drive safely and curb the accident toll. Smith contended.

#### DEATH RATE LOWER

Department of Public Safety reports the death rate from auto accidents last year was the lowest since 1972.

The number of deaths per 100 million travel miles was 5.1. This is the best figure since 1962's 4.9 per 100 million

Still, 4,594 died in traffic accidents in 1971. Ninety-five per cent. DPS noted. wore no safety seat belts.

#### UNEMPLOYMENT DROPS

Texas Employment Commission noted a modest increase in the number of labor force participants during March and the lowest unemployement level since May, 1970.

The March unemployment figure was 167,000, representing 3.5 per cent of the work force - 20,000 fewer than for the same period last year.

Employment for the period increased 29.100 All segments reported gains, and the number of jobholders was up 2.2 per cent over the March a-year-ago figure.

#### COURTS SPEAK

The U.S. Court of Appeals in New Orleans asked the U.S. Department of Justice to prepare a plan involving minimum busing of pupils which could be applied to the Austin Independent School District integration appeal.

Texas Supreme Court held a Lubbock nursing home with paying patients only is not entitled to a tax exemption as a charitable institution.

Court of Criminal Appeals reversed convictions in Dallas and Kinney County murder cases and overturned a 35-year prison sentence assessed a Dallas County man for possession of marijuana

#### SHRIMP SEASON CUT

Gulf Coast shrimpers must cease operations 15 days earlier under seasons ordered by Parks and Wildlife. Commission.

The brown shrimp closed season set by PWC is the earliest since 1967. May 17 is closing day. Length of the period remains at 45 days - from May 17 to

The early season is primarily aimed at giving young shrimp protection while they are in transit to the Gulf.


#### STATE NETS \$1.5 MILLION

First School Land Board oil and gas lease sale of 1972 brought to the state bonus payments of \$1.593,719. Seventy four high bids were accepted

on 40,946 acres of state-owned land Revenue boosts the Permanent School Fund to an all-time high of \$925,395,386 according to Commissioner of Public Lands Bob Armstrong.

Bulk of the bonus money came from lease of 22,928 acres of submerged lands. much of it in Aransas, Calhoun, Nueces, Kenedy, Matagorda and Kleberg

## We Have Faults

JUNIOR HIGH needs include a heating problem in the north wing, the replacing of two space heaters and the addition of an exhaust ventilator in the gym. Window guides are worn out and the frames are too delicate for the expanse of glass. Hall lighting is bad and hall tiles will need to be replaced soon.

Stage and auditorium lighting is needed, and floor tiling in the auditorium is breaking. Parts and tools for the outside door locks and panic bars are no longer made, and locks need replacing. Door locks and repainting of six classrooms are needed in the immediate future.

Junior High Principal Tommy Brawley cited these additional needs: Stage lighting needs to be dropped or a winch supplied for changing bulbs. Two urinals are needed in the boys' restroom. Some shades need replacing. The fieldhouse dressing rooms need benches and a place for hanging clothing. Venetian blinds and drapes in the library need to be cleaned and/or replaced. Lockers are needed in the girls' dresssing room. The auditorium needs air conditioning and the auditorium speakers need to be

Brawley pointed out that he thought the sealing of all windows and the installation of air conditioning would pay for itself over a period of years.
