The same week as the world commemorates the 3oth anniversary of the explosion of the first atomic bomb,
Solzzenitsyn stirred a controversy Washington when he testified before congressional committee reminding us
that detente is a strategy of the struggle rom the communist point of view rather
than an end to that struggle It is easy for Americans weary fron
the confrontation to forget that fact.
THE VOFCE of a man who spent years in the slave labor camps of the Sovie
Union because of his dedication to in tellectual freedom should awaken us to qualms about the American image in President of the United States should see message. He certainly does not have to buy it all
nor should American fore fashioned on the fears which drove us to the brinkmanship of the cold war era. The underlying message and challenge to the spiritual idealism which is the eart and soul of the controversary. THE WORKING principle on which
this communist society is operating is an theistic, materialistic dialectic. It has
resulted in a totalitarian state. Solzhenitsyn is an example of the
systematic stripping of liberty which
comes with that philosophy. If it is to be
overcome in our world, it will not simply
be by the strateris. be by the strategies of international As essential as that may be, the basic The Russion human mind The Russian novelist is reminding us
that the free enterprise system may become just as atheistic and just as materialistic if we allow it to do so. Our
society has been shocked recently with the revelations of how many

operation within our free society to strip men of their rights and privileges. Surreptitious entry, harassment, and
deception have been practiced by persons in authority in our system in the
