after being arraigned Monday by Justice of the Peace Stanley Doss, and bond has not been set because of the

delay in the autopsy report.

Doss talked with the pathologist Friday and he revealed that the written report would be here Monday.

"The autopsy report is the crux of the whole situation", stated County Attorney Curtis Wilkinson, "and until we get the report, we can't make a

Judge Doss had ordered the autopsy early Sunday, and procedures in the autopsy were continuing through this week.

The murder charges against Myers were filed after he gave officials a statement, and after authorities received a preliminary autopsy report. The preliminary report showed the child suffered a ruptured spleen, and showed evidence of old and new fractures of the ribs, and internal hemorrhaging.

According to Wilkinson, the suspect, along with the child and his mother, Irene White of Amherst, had been guests Saturday at a Littlefield residence where the ambulance was summoned at 11:12 p.m.

A Littlefield physician recommended that Judge Doss order an autopsy after examining the child's body, according to

Judge Doss said he probably will conduct an inquest into the case, and call in several witnesses, before he makes a ruling.

Graveside services for the infant were conducted Monday afternoon in the Littlefield Cemetery with Hammons Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.






Conservationists Attend Meeting


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

Russian Reminds Us Of Spiritual Aspects

IT IS FITTING that exiled Russian novelist Alexander Solzhenitsyn should remind Americans of the spiritual aspects of the East-West struggle.

The same week as the world commemorates the 30th anniversary of the explosion of the first atomic bomb, Solzhenitsyn stirred a controversy in Washington when he testified before a congressional committee reminding us that detente is a strategy of the struggle from the communist point of view rather than an end to that struggle.

It is easy for Americans weary from the confrontation to forget that fact.

THE VOICE of a man who spent years in the slave labor camps of the Soviet Union because of his dedication to intellectual freedom should awaken us to the realities of that struggle. Despite Secretary of State Henry Kissinger's qualms about the American image in international politics being affected, the President of the United States should see and hear Alexander Solzhenitsyn's

He certainly does not have to buy it all nor should American foreign policy be fashioned on the fears which drove us to the brinkmanship of the cold war era. The underlying message and challenge of Solzhenitsyn is a call to commitment to the spiritual idealism which is the heart and soul of the controversary.

THE WORKING principle on which this communist society is operating is an atheistic, materialistic dialectic. It has resulted in a totalitarian state.

Solzhenitsyn is an example of the systematic stripping of liberty which comes with that philosophy. If it is to be overcome in our world, it will not simply be by the strategies of international political maneuvering.

As essential as that may be, the basic battle is for the human mind.

The Russian novelist is reminding us that the free enterprise system may become just as atheistic and just as materialistic if we allow it to do so. Our society has been shocked recently with the revelations of how many totalitiarian techniques have been in operation within our free society to strip men of their rights and privileges.

Surreptitious entry, harassment, and deception have been practiced by persons in authority in our system in the name of opposing communism

WE NEED TO BE called to the serious issues that face us. A world of hungry men need to be fed. A deep discontent in the spirit of mankind needs to be solved.

A sagging morality needs to be strengthened. The erosion of human rights is serious.

WHILE WE NEED to hear the call to alertness and preparation to do battle if necessary, we need even more to be called to the spiritual battle which is most essential.

Solzhenitsyn's own pilgrimage back to Jesus marks out a path for a world to

The 'New Math'

FOR SOME TIME now, puzzled parents have had the frustrating experience of trying to help son Johnny and daughter Jane with their mathematics homework, only to find that the schools are now teaching a "new" math which bears little similarity with "ordinary" math.

And any parent who presumed to protest would be hooted out of school as a hopeless old fogey.

NOW COMETH a report by the "National Assessment of Education Progress"- a federally funded project, by the way- based upon a nationwide representative sample of 34,000 17 year oids. And the results of the survey show that the vast majority of teenagers can't begin to solve the most common, every day mathematical problems.

For example: if your property tax is \$29.87 per \$1,000 of assessed value, the tax on your property assessed at \$14,900 would be closest to: (a) \$400; (b) \$420; (c) \$450; (d) \$470? Would you believe that 60 percent of the teenagers were unable to come up with the right answer

Or: a gallon of paint will cover about 250 square feet of surface area. To make the problem extra easy, the questioners specified that this paint is sold in gallon cans only. The question: How many gallon cans are needed to paint an area 48 feet long by ten feet wide? Far less than half-only 41 percent-of our "new math" generation came up with the right answer- two cans.

EVEN ON THE QUESTION: if there are 300 calories in nine ounces of a certain food, how many calories are there in a three-ounce portion of food, 30 percent of the 17 year olds were stumped for the answer (100 calories)!

The National Assessment also found that the vast majority of those surveyed could not correctly figure a taxi fare; could balance a checkbook; and could not correctly calculate the unit cost for a common utility bill.

A great uproar recently followed President Ford's veto of a multi-billion dollar education bill, on the theory that Federal control and disbursement in the field of education is somehow beneficial. The fact is, there is no evidence to show that Federal education policies have been an aid to education. On the contrary, as the amounts of Federal money have increased over the year, the scholastic ability and achievement of the school children have gone down.

The message seems clear; let control of the schools, including the disbur sement of money to support the schools, return to the local community where the people- both parents and teachersknow what is best for the children in

Save The Postal Service, Free Press

SOME RATHER STARTLING recommendations were made recently by the administrative law judge of the Postal Rate Commission concerning future postal rates. If followed, these recommendations could spell disaster for the United States Postal Service itself and for freedom of the press as we

Among other things, the judge proposes reducing the price of a firstclass stamp from 10 cents to 8 1/2 cents. Sounds fine from the consumer's point of view, doesn't it? Well, it's not.

And the reason is that the judge wants to make up the loss in first-class revenues by inordinate increases in the costs of mailing magazines, newspapers, books and packages. Actually, his plan would wind up costing the consumer more- not less.

AND WHAT DOES his plan do to the USPS? It means a reduction of \$900million in first-class revenues, and the doubtful prospect that this will be made up by the certain reduction in usage of the other classes of mail. Not to mention the fact that there is

already a \$1.6-billion deficit facing the postal service. Bankruptcy? Certainly a possibility.

MOREOVER, the judge's proposals could also cause an intellectual bankruptcy in the land, for they could force many of our valued periodicals to go out of business- unable to absorb or pass along the hugh increases in mailing

Newspapers and magazines would be hit by a minimum of a 121 per cent rise (weekly newspapers by as much as 250 per cent); books by 96 per cent, and packages by 67 per cent.

The single greatest tragedy in all of this as far as the American public is concerned is that the public-service function of the postal service in the dissemination of informational and educational material- as clearly recognized by our founding fathershas not even been considered in the recommendations made by the law

judge in this case.

IF HIS REMARKABLE recommendations are followed, we may live to see the day when the thoughtful, provocative and beautiful magazine is relagated to the role of coffee table decor for the very rich- as opposed to an informational and educational natural resource for all to enjoy.

The tragic death of nurse Mary Margaret Moran who was abducted, raped, and ultimately died after four days of suffering in an open field has created a stir of indignation in the San Antonio community and across our

It is the kind of heinous crime which stirs vengeance in the souls of men. It is a crime repeated over and again across our nation. It brings the sharpest kind of challenge to find some way to control destructive persons in our community.

One of the gravest dimensions of that situation is that the alleged killer who is yet to be tried in court has a pattern of convictions and problems of destructive behavior against women open for all to see. Someone's negligence or the system under which we are operating has not provided the protection essential in a crowded urban community.

The cry is being heard for application of capital punishment. The eye for an eye and tooth for a tooth vengeance is deep in the heart of humankind. We are eager to get at the people against whom our pent up anger is justifiably centered for destructive behavior.

Yet history proves that the passions of a community rise and fall. It shows that oftentimes injustices are done. Basic to our American way of life is the fact that the wheels of justice do indeed grind slowly. It is to be hoped that they will in a far more effective fashion to be able to "grind exceedingly fine."

The statistical studies reveal that capital punishment simply is not a deterrent to capital crime yet in emotion-laden hours we find ourselves swept by the passions of desire for vengeance which sweep away all those studies and reasoned arguments. Several things stand out in that situation.

One of the bright notes of the tragic hour is to see the compassion in the hearts of citizens as they moved to give time and energy in the search for the victim of the crime. The anxiety level of



was told the premiums on an insurance policy could be deducted from my income tax. Is this true?

Fifty percent of the premiums on hospitalization insurance may be deducted from your income if you itemize deductions. A corporation may deduct the premiums for group insurance and are not taxable to the employee unless the amount of life insurance exceeds \$50,000 on any individual. For several years there have been plans such as "split dollar, posit," and recently, the "IRS Section 79." These plans, when properly used, following specific IRS rules and regulations, will allow legitimate deductions of life insurance premiums. These plans, however, require the counsel of a qualified life underwriter and accountant and generally are applicable only to the few and not to the average taxpayer.



SVA Classes To Begin Soon

The Amarillo College West campus School of Vocational Arts will conduct registration for students interested in five trade preparatory programs beginning Aug. 25.

Students may enroll in air conditioning/refrigeration, auto mechanics, commercial electronics, diesel mechanics and welding starting at 8 a.m. for full-time students and 6 p.m. for half-time students. Registration will remain open through Sept.

Full-time students will attend classes six hours per day for 30 hour of instruction per week while half-time students will attend classes three evenings per week from 6 to 11 p.m. for 15 hours of instruction.

Course length of these programs is 18 months for six quarters and upon satisfactory completion of the requirements an associate in applied science degree and a certificate of completion will be awarded.

"Classes are held in modern buildings using the latest equipment available," said Nat Neal, SVA dean.

"The graduates of our programs have never had trouble getting employment," he added. "One hundred per cent of our students find jobs in respective fields."
