

Autopsy Report Delays Action In Alleged Infant Murder Case

Autopsy report, which has been delayed here this past week, has delayed the murder investigation into

the death of 7 1/2-month-old infant, James Franklin White III, who was dead on arrival at Littlefield Hospital

Saturday night. Terrell Earl "Terry" Myers, 23, of Amherst remains in Lamb County Jail

after being arraigned Monday by Justice of the Peace Stanley Doss, and bond has not been set because of the

delay in the autopsy report.

Doss talked with the pathologist Friday and he revealed that the written report would be here Monday.

"The autopsy report is the crux of the whole situation", stated County Attorney Curtis Wilkinson, "and until we get the report, we can't make a decision."

Judge Doss had ordered the autopsy early Sunday, and procedures in the autopsy were continuing through this week.

The murder charges against Myers were filed after he gave officials a statement, and after authorities received a preliminary autopsy report. The preliminary report showed the child suffered a ruptured spleen, and showed evidence of old and new fractures of the

ribs, and internal hemorrhaging.

According to Wilkinson, the suspect, along with the child and his mother, Irene White of Amherst, had been guests Saturday at a Littlefield residence where the ambulance was summoned at 11:12 p.m.

A Littlefield physician recommended that Judge Doss order an autopsy after examining the child's body, according to Doss.

Judge Doss said he probably will conduct an inquest into the case, and call in several witnesses, before he makes a ruling.

Graveside services for the infant were conducted Monday afternoon in the Littlefield Cemetery with Hammons Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Students Return To Books In Schools This Week

Summer time has almost ended for students, and it's back to the books in the classroom. Littlefield students get back to their

books Monday, Aug. 25, at 9 a.m., but registration will be earlier. Registration for junior high school students will be conducted this Friday,

Aug. 22, according to Principal Byron Ford.

Eighth graders will register at 10 a.m. in the auditorium, and seventh graders will register at 1:30 p.m. in the same place.

Ford emphasized, "Students are to dress appropriately for registration." Freshman and sophomore orientation and registration is set for Tuesday, Aug. 19, and juniors and seniors are to register Thursday, Aug. 21.

Sophomore orientation is to be from 9 to 11 a.m. Tuesday in the high school auditorium, and they will register from 11 until noon that day.

Tuesday afternoon, freshmen will attend orientation and have their ID pictures made from 1 to 3 p.m. Registration will be conducted from about 3 to 4 p.m.

Seniors register from 9 to 10 a.m. Thursday, Aug. 21, and juniors register from 11 to 12 the same day.

New students, or those registering late, are asked to go by the counselor's office to pick up registration papers for completion. All new students are asked to register Tuesday, Aug. 19, regardless of classification.

Head Coach Jerry Blakely said before the workout started: "We've really been looking forward to today. The boys are ready. It's time to stop playing tag and start playing football."

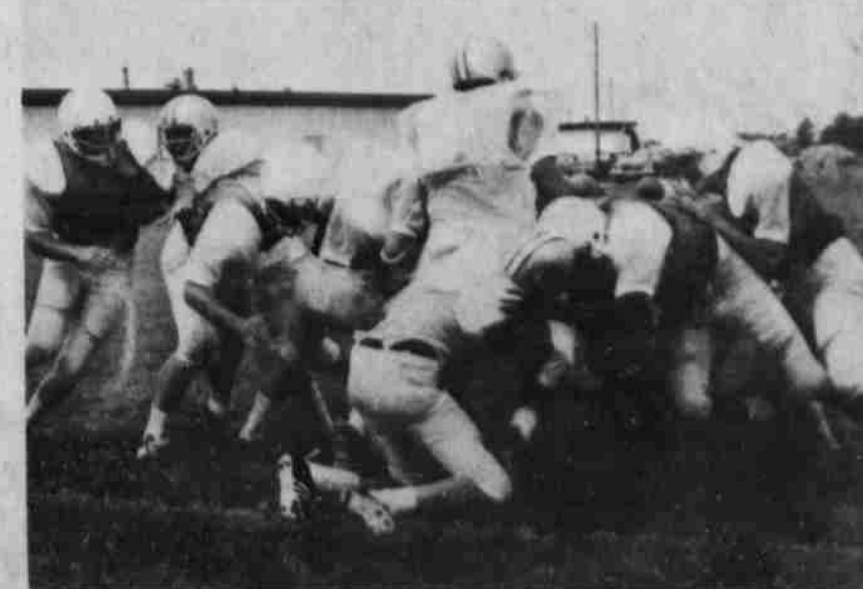

Russian Reminds Us Of Spiritual Aspects

IT IS FITTING that exiled Russian novelist Alexander Solzhenitsyn should remind Americans of the spiritual aspects of the East-West struggle.
The same week as the world commemorates the 30th anniversary of the explosion of the first atomic bomb, Solzhenitsyn stirred a controversy in Washington when he testified before a congressional committee reminding us that detente is a strategy of the struggle from the communist point of view rather than an end to that struggle.
It is easy for Americans weary from the confrontation to forget that fact.

comes with that philosophy. If it is to be overcome in our world, it will not simply be by the strategies of international political maneuvering.
As essential as that may be, the basic battle is for the human mind.
The Russian novelist is reminding us that the free enterprise system may become just as atheistic and just as materialistic if we allow it to do so. Our society has been shocked recently with the revelations of how many totalitarian techniques have been in operation within our free society to strip men of their rights and privileges.
Surreptitious entry, harassment, and deception have been practiced by persons in authority in our system in the name of opposing communism.

THE VOICE of a man who spent years in the slave labor camps of the Soviet Union because of his dedication to intellectual freedom should awaken us to the realities of that struggle. Despite Secretary of State Henry Kissinger's qualms about the American image in international politics being affected, the President of the United States should see and hear Alexander Solzhenitsyn's message.
He certainly does not have to buy it all nor should American foreign policy be fashioned on the fears which drove us to the brinkmanship of the cold war era. The underlying message and challenge of Solzhenitsyn is a call to commitment to the spiritual idealism which is the heart and soul of the controversy.

WE NEED TO BE called to the serious issues that face us. A world of hungry men need to be fed. A deep discontent in the spirit of mankind needs to be solved. A sagging morality needs to be strengthened. The erosion of human rights is serious.

THE WORKING principle on which this communist society is operating is an atheistic, materialistic dialectic. It has resulted in a totalitarian state.
Solzhenitsyn is an example of the systematic stripping of liberty which

WHILE WE NEED to hear the call to alertness and preparation to do battle if necessary, we need even more to be called to the spiritual battle which is most essential.
Solzhenitsyn's own pilgrimage back to Jesus marks out a path for a world to follow.
The Scripture says, "When we read in the scriptures of the endurance of men and all the help that God gave them in those days, we may be encouraged to go on hoping in our own time." (Romans 15:4-5)

The 'New Math'

FOR SOME TIME now, puzzled parents have had the frustrating experience of trying to help son Johnny and daughter Jane with their mathematics homework, only to find that the schools are now teaching a "new" math which bears little similarity with "ordinary" math.
And any parent who presumed to protest would be hooted out of school as a hopeless old fogey.

A great uproar recently followed President Ford's veto of a multi-billion dollar education bill, on the theory that Federal control and disbursement in the field of education is somehow beneficial. The fact is, there is no evidence to show that Federal education policies have been an aid to education. On the contrary, as the amounts of Federal money have increased over the year, the scholastic ability and achievement of the school children have gone down.
The message seems clear; let control of the schools, including the disbursement of money to support the schools, return to the local community where the people—both parents and teachers—know what is best for the children in their care.

NOW COMETH a report by the "National Assessment of Education Progress"—a federally funded project, by the way—based upon a nationwide representative sample of 34,000 17 year olds. And the results of the survey show that the vast majority of teenagers can't begin to solve the most common, every day mathematical problems.

For example: if your property tax is \$29.87 per \$1,000 of assessed value, the tax on your property assessed at \$14,900 would be closest to: (a) \$400; (b) \$420; (c) \$450; (d) \$470? Would you believe that 50 percent of the teenagers were unable to come up with the right answer (c)?
Or: a gallon of paint will cover about 250 square feet of surface area. To make the problem extra easy, the questioners specified that this paint is sold in gallon cans only. The question: How many gallon cans are needed to paint an area 48 feet long by ten feet wide? Far less than half—only 41 percent—of our "new math" generation came up with the right answer—two cans.

EVEN ON THE QUESTION: if there are 300 calories in nine ounces of a certain food, how many calories are there in a three-ounce portion of food, 30 percent of the 17 year olds were stumped for the answer (100 calories)!
The National Assessment also found that the vast majority of those surveyed could not correctly figure a taxi fare; could balance a checkbook; and could not correctly calculate the unit cost for a common utility bill.

Save The Postal Service, Free Press

SOME RATHER STARTLING recommendations were made recently by the administrative law judge of the Postal Rate Commission concerning future postal rates. If followed, these recommendations could spell disaster for the United States Postal Service itself and for freedom of the press as we know it.
Among other things, the judge proposes reducing the price of a first-class stamp from 10 cents to 8 1/2 cents. Sounds fine from the consumer's point of view, doesn't it? Well, it's not.
And the reason is that the judge wants to make up the loss in first-class revenues by inordinate increases in the costs of mailing magazines, newspapers, books and packages. Actually, his plan would wind up costing the consumer more—not less.
AND WHAT DOES his plan do to the USPS? It means a reduction of \$900-million in first-class revenues, and the doubtful prospect that this will be made up by the certain reduction in usage of

Controlling Destructive Persons

The tragic death of nurse Mary Margaret Moran who was abducted, raped, and ultimately died after four days of suffering in an open field has created a stir of indignation in the San Antonio community and across our state.
It is the kind of heinous crime which stirs vengeance in the souls of men. It is a crime repeated over and over across our nation. It brings the sharpest kind of challenge to find some way to control destructive persons in our community.
One of the gravest dimensions of that situation is that the alleged killer who is yet to be tried in court has a pattern of convictions and problems of destructive behavior against women open for all to see. Someone's negligence or the system under which we are operating has not provided the protection essential in a crowded urban community.
The cry is being heard for application of capital punishment. The eye for an eye and tooth for a tooth vengeance is deep in the heart of humankind. We are eager to get at the people against whom our pent up anger is justifiably centered for destructive behavior.
Yet history proves that the passions of a community rise and fall. It shows that oftentimes injustices are done. Basic to our American way of life is the fact that the wheels of justice do indeed grind slowly. It is to be hoped that they will in a far more effective fashion to be able to "grind exceedingly fine."
The statistical studies reveal that capital punishment simply is not a deterrent to capital crime yet in emotion-laden hours we find ourselves swept by the passions of desire for vengeance which sweep away all those studies and reasoned arguments. Several things stand out in that situation.
One of the bright notes of the tragic hour is to see the compassion in the hearts of citizens as they moved to give time and energy in the search for the victim of the crime. The anxiety level of

human hearts seems to beat together in a community and draw people together in an unusual way. The sympathy and support for the victim and family encouraging reminder of the power of passion and love in the heart of a man.
Another lesson is the necessity of evaluating the systems which allow people to walk the streets who are obviously capable of and prone to destructive crime.
Some people simply function within institutional settings and are unable to handle the freedom which provides the occasion for destructive behavior. Recent studies have revealed that time often solves that problem: prisoners in penitentiaries are usually many become less destructive after reach a certain age.
We do not know the reasons for this. We simply know it's a fact. Some are able to produce in factories and kinds of ways in creative behavior then become destructive when they are in communities.
Our laws need to be altered to provide for an indiscriminate sentence would allow an unbroken period of for those who are unable to function outside the walls of an institution, not need to have automatic time served for folk who are going to repeat crime and destroy life.
A city is in mourning. When one mourns, other towns and cities are destroyed. A life has flickered and been destroyed.

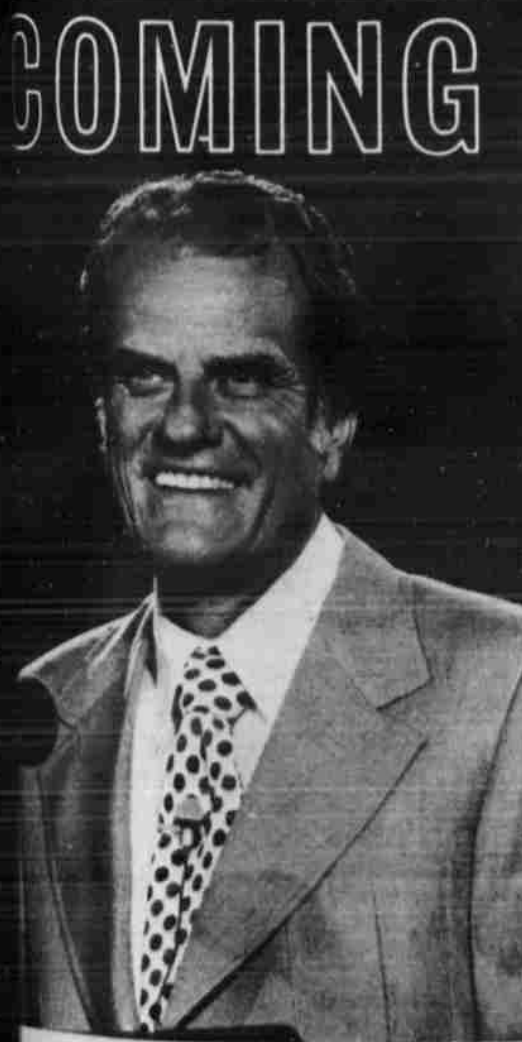

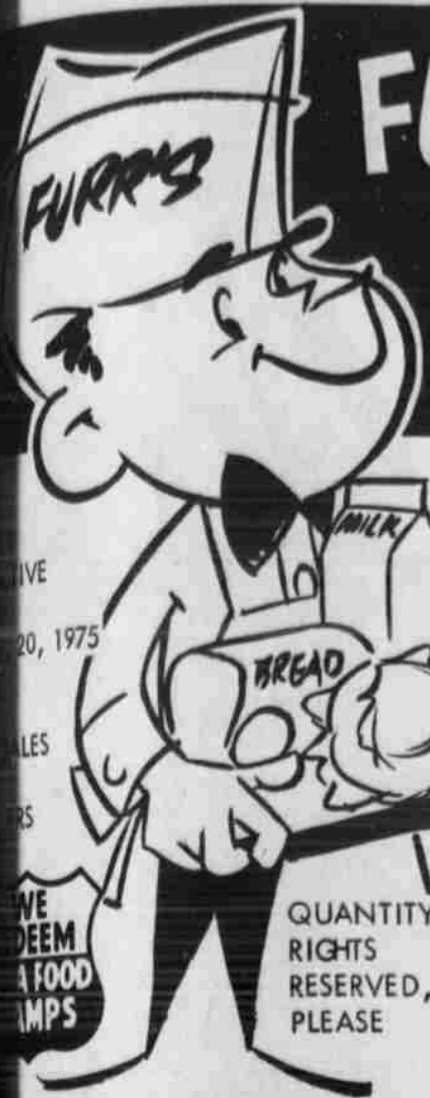

SVA Classes To Begin Soon

The Amarillo College West campus School of Vocational Arts will conduct registration for students interested in five trade preparatory programs beginning Aug. 25. Students may enroll in air conditioning/refrigeration, auto mechanics, commercial electronics, diesel mechanics and welding starting at 8 a.m. for full-time students and 6 p.m. for half-time students. Registration will remain open through Sept. 2.

Full-time students will attend classes six hours per day for 30 hour of instruction per week while half-time students will attend classes three evenings per week from 6 to 11 p.m. for 15 hours of instruction.

Course length of these programs is 18 months for six quarters and upon satisfactory completion of the requirements an associate in applied science degree and a certificate of completion will be awarded.

"Classes are held in modern buildings using the latest equipment available," said Nat Neal, SVA dean.

"The graduates of our programs have never had trouble getting employment," he added. "One hundred per cent of our students find jobs in respective fields."

Game Surveys Valuable As Management Tools

A select group of Texas hunters will have the opportunity to make a large contribution to wildlife management this year.

Wildlife biologists and data processing experts at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department have so far mailed out some 57,000 hunter-survey cards to hunting license holders. These cards request specific information on whether the license holders plan to hunt mourning doves, ducks or geese this fall.

Those who respond are the basis for a more complete questionnaire which asks hunters to keep a log during the dove and waterfowl seasons on how many birds they kill, where

taken, date of hunt and number of doves or waterfowl bagged.

Later on, a deer and turkey harvest questionnaire will be mailed to another group of hunters.

Statistics from a random sample of licensed hunters are a source of valuable information, say Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials. The data will help to estimate the harvest of doves, waterfowl, deer and turkey and keep up-to-date on game populations.

Thus far, 38 percent of those contacted by mail have responded.

A great deal of time and effort has gone into these surveys, says P&WD officials.

Sportsmen who spend a few

moments completing the cards will help tremendously in the survey.

The officials suggest:

-Don't throw away the questionnaires. Even if you don't hunt the game species mentioned in the survey, fill out the card and mail it; negative responses are just as valuable.

-Return the questionnaires promptly, unless the instructions request that you retain it throughout the season.

-Information filled in on the cards should pertain only to the individual surveyed. If the card is addressed to the lady of the house, she should complete it, not her husband. Do not include volunteered information from

relatives and friends as it gives an inaccurate picture of the overall harvest.

-Preprinted numbers on the questionnaire cards should not be torn off or marked through. The numbers are used to identify a rate of response and not individuals.

-Reply forms are postage-paid but Texans can save the Parks and Wildlife Department a sizable amount if they use a stamp to mail their cards. Money saved on postage will be channeled to other game management work. P&WD officials say that some 17 percent of those questioned so far have used their own postage.
