Junior High building damaged by flooding

The Junior High School building was damaged Sunday night when someone flooded the floor by putting a

flooded, warping several doors and damaging several textbooks. Amount of the damages will be determined when a list can be compiled by the school officials. City police officers are investigating the vandalism.

'Wildcat Mania' strikes Littlefield

"Wildcat mania" has again hit Littlefield. The epidemic is expected to last at least 10 weeks and possibly longer.

The epidemic will reach its peak Friday night when Littlefield squares off against arch-rival Levelland. The coveted "trap" is on the line. The Wildcats brought the "trap" back home last year by edging Levelland 13-6.

The inexperienced 'Cats have their work cut out for them. Levelland strongpoints include their size, speed and quickness. Like Littlefield the Lobos are inexperienced. Only guard Jim Smith returns as a starter for the Lobos.

Wildcat Coach Jerry Blakely said he was "very impressed with Levelland" in their 26-12 thumping of Brownfield Friday night. "They have made tremendous improvement the last three weeks." The Lobos lost their first scrimmage to Slaton 3-1 and then lost to Lockney 2-1. "Levelland beat Brownfield even worse than the score indicates," Blakely added.

The Lobos will operate from the Houston Veer on offense. The attack is open with lots of options and passes.

Lance Anthony will be man under for the Lobos. He was impressive passing against Brownfield and hit tight end Steve Yarbrough several times. Three fast running backs compliment the passing game. The top

backs are Mark Patterson, Ivan Mitchell and Dennis Price.

Billy Haliburton, Smith and Glen Davis anchor the Levelland offensive line.

Leading the Lobos defensive will be Smith, Haliburton and Driver. The secondary has good speed and quickness. The Lobos will line up in a basic 4-3 pro defense.

County among top ten in carrot production

Lamb County ranked among the top ten carrot-producing counties in the state during 1975, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

White noted that Lamb County farmers harvested 200 acres of carrots. Statistics compiled by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service

indicate that Texas remained a leading producer of vegetables and melons, ranking first in the nation in harvested acres for spinach and watermelons.

The state also ranked second in harvested acres for cabbage, cantaloupes, carrots, and onions, and fourth for green peppers.

Fresh market vegetable acreage harvested by Texas farmers, at 149,930 acres, placed the state third in the nation in that category.

Commercial vegetable production in Texas is largely confined to thirteen principal areas, including 105 counties, White noted.

Imported water—hope for the future

While farmers in the Alabama and Mississippi cotton belts often face planting delays due to wet fields, thousands of farmers on the arid High Plains of Texas and New Mexico face dilemmas of not being able to plant due to extreme drought.

And while 1974 and 1975 cotton and grain sorghum surpluses dwindle due to the two extreme weather factors, governmental agencies are taking another long look at several feasible plans of importing Mississippi River system water to irrigate West Texas and Eastern New Mexico.

Transfer of water from water excess areas to water deficient areas could become the great equalizer for southern producers. Proponents say

lower water-logged states would receive flood relief through such importation. The upper Plains would use this excess to irrigate millions of acres of fertile crop land via this cross country bucket brigade.

To some, such transfer of water sounds like produce's and legislators have been chewing fermented cottonseed or grazing on loco weed. One plan calls for bringing water to West Texas and Eastern New Mexico from the Mississippi River—1,400 miles away, uphill 4,000 feet, pumped across Texas in 700 miles of concrete-lined canals, at a cost of \$20.5 to \$40 or \$50 billion.

Another scheme would bring water from Canada. Since this would benefit several states, this plan could get

much federal support.

Yet another plan calls for Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma using the Canadian River to transport water to the High Plains from excess water areas in Oklahoma, Louisiana and Arkansas.

Water Development Board Executive Director James Rose said federal participation will be needed in any such effort, noting that West Texas U.S. Rep. George Mahon is a strong advocate for importing water.

Rose said Oklahoma's "Southern Interconnected System" could produce 2.5 million to 3 million acre-feet of surplus water. An acre foot is 325,851 gallons.

"But more water would be needed to replace water from the declining

Ogallala aquifer in the Lubbock area," Rose said "We'd need four to five million acre feet more!"

The water-rich state of Arkansas, then, could be the key to the full agricultural development of the High Plains, Rose indicated.

Oklahoma's canal could acquire water at a higher elevation and carry it a shorter distance—at a cost of about \$1.7 billion.

World food and fiber shortages are increasing the Texas and New Mexico High Plains' chances for water importation. "The ability to grow food and fiber will become so important to the world that we will do practically anything to meet this need," U.S. Rep. Mahon said. "This means that the time is coming when water will be

imported."

There is a reason for water importation optimism, Mahon added. "It is clear it would be a tragedy to both the U.S. and the world if the productive capacity of the High Plains were substantially reduced."

"This would mean a loss of up to 25 percent of the nation's cotton, 28 percent of its grain sorghum, five percent of its wheat, substantial corn, the nation's largest cattle feeding area and large amounts of vegetables and sugar beets."

The High Plains offers virtually the only remaining undeveloped land suitable for agriculture. Rose believes that with enough imported water, another 20 million more acres can be put under

-imported water-

cultivation. "We can't allow a water crisis," Rose declared. "Development of coal and lignite in Texas will require more water, and we can recover 300 million barrels of oil with the use of 650 million gallons of water."

The need for water in Texas has led Texas Governor Dolph Briscoe to suggest that Texas trade other states oil for water. Several would like to swap excess water for some of Texas' natural gas, but federal politics prohibit this. And flooding in Arkansas and other states has prompted southern governors to suggest ways of getting rid of excess water.

The water plans get added impetus from new Texas Water Development Board members like chairman A. L. Black of Friona and George McCleskey of Lubbock.

The original Texas Water Plans to bring Mississippi water up to Texas had a projected cost of \$10 billion in 1967. Much of this cost was allocated to pumping water from the Mississippi to the Lubbock area. The trans-Texas canal was both the most dramatic and most controversial feature of the plan. It probably led to the defeat in 1969 of a \$3.5 billion state bond issue to pay for Texas' share of the total water plan.

West Texas' level terrain and scarcity of flowing streams rule out any major reservoirs for storage of surface water. There is no in state surplus sufficient to match the western countries' need.

Houston's urban population actually accounted for the defeat. Adverse publicity from ecologists in the metropolis brought voters out by the droves. Yet in the rural areas which stood to gain most from the passage of the bond issue, farm families and agribusiness people didn't bother to take time to vote.

Now Houston has its own problems with its water table dropping so drastically fresh water supplies are contaminated with salt water. And land is dropping to the point that entire residential areas are dropping into the bay. That part of Texas favors water importation now.

Another hopeful notes comes from the governor of Louisiana. The governor had opposed Louisiana joining in a plan to export water from the Mississippi. On a speaking engagement in Austin, he said he has changed his mind and now favors the project.

Early opponents complained that the importation of water would only lead to crop surpluses and lower market prices. But after 1974's first year of full production with no acreage controls on the basic crops and no surpluses, this theory was dashed.

After no surpluses in '75, the federal government began to realize that it needs to maintain and expand food and fiber production. At long last there was a glimmer of hope on the horizon indicating that national leaders realized that all the High Plains needed to maintain and expand production was water.

From the beginning, proponents' philosophy is that "water should be paid for by the beneficiaries in direct proportion to the benefits. Texas and New Mexico Plains farmers have the ability to produce more food and fiber than any other place in the United States. There is more irrigatable land in one body—an ideal situation for expansion.

Some economists estimate that if secondary benefits increase at the same rate as primary benefits, the ration benefits to cost would be 71 cents to the dollar.

High Plains farmers' egocentric idea of their national value—the notion that only they stand between America and famine—derives from their phenomenal successes in agriculture since high-powered irrigation pumps became available in the 1940's.

The greening of the Panhandle and South Plains—in cotton, wheat, corn, and grain sorghum—has been an astronomical astonishment. To the natural advantages of level terrain, good soil and long growing seasons, the plains irrigators have added a high degree of professional know-how and intensive capital investment.

But they've used thousands of years' accumulation of underground water for this 30-year spurt of productivity, also, and the end of the irrigation boom is in sight.

Depletion rates vary from county to

county, as does the aquifer's depth. The Lubbock region's irrigation will decline sharply after 1980. If maximum usage continues, as it has in the past, the region 25 years from now will have water to irrigate only a minor fraction of the six million acres now watered from the Ogallala aquifer.

Irrigated agriculture supports more than half of the region's economy and population. The market value of Plains cotton is estimated at \$800 million, the sorghum crop at almost \$500 million. When other crops and feed cattle are added in, the total value of farm products is estimated at over \$3 billion.

Figures like these make farmers, bankers and businessmen believe that the state and nation won't let this fertile goose and its golden eggs dry up without irrigation.

Nurtured as it is by state politicians, the Plains' hope for imported water lives on—in spite of a finding by the Bureau of Reclamation and Corps of Engineers that it is not economically feasible to transfer water from the extreme lower Mississippi River to the High Plains for irrigating crop land.

Importation projects are in line behind a \$6 billion reclamation project already authorized but unfunded by Congress. The Corps has its own unfunded backlog.

Agriculture Commissioner John White said the federal feasibility study should be disregarded. "If Columbus had asked for a feasibility study we wouldn't be here now," he declared. "He had courage and daring to go ahead. California wouldn't be ahead of Texas today in its state water transfer project if it had asked for a feasibility study when it started."

Although importation prospects are brightening, a number of obstacles must be overcome before such a project is a reality.

Spiraling energy costs have escalated the cost of operating an import system to such an extent that they represent a formidable obstacle. Too, the federal government's fiscal situation must improve before there's any hope of initiating importation.

"Even if the fiscal situation improves, competing claims for federal government funds will be fierce," said U.S. Rep. Mahon who serves as the House appropriations committee chairman. "The federal debt will increase by \$90 billion during this fiscal year, and will increase to \$710.4 billion by the end of 1977."

"Clearly a project of the \$30 to \$50 billion magnitude of a water importation project cannot be undertaken as long as these kinds of fiscal conditions persist," Mahon explained.

"We may not know what a cup of water is worth, but we're going to have to pay for food and fiber production regardless of the price."

The battle for the economic lifeblood in West Texas and Eastern New Mexico isn't over. In time, imported water will irrigate High Plains crops.

IF YOU'RE wondering how to satisfy the teenaged appetite with good nourishing food, rather than "junk," then consider the various shakes and malts that can be whipped in a blender.

These are specialties which they can, and should, make for themselves provided you point them in the right direction.

Since milk and ice cream form the base of most of these sippers, you have two good foods to build on. When fruit is added, that's a bonus, as in the Banana Split Milk Shake.

If mother stocks some of the foods for these shakes, malts and whizes, she can then turn over the project to her teenagers. She supplies them with the recipes, and suggests that they invite friends over for a "fountain snack."

She could run through a preview session to eliminate any mistakes at fun time.

All of these are special snacks, high in calories, but also high in satiety value for the times when teenagers still feel hungry. They may even be used as a good substitute for dessert.

BANANA SPLIT MILK SHAKE

- 1 cup well-mashed ripe banana [About 2 medium bananas]
- 2 cups chilled chocolate milk
- 1 quart vanilla ice cream
- Chocolate curls, optional
- Banana slices, optional

Combine banana and chocolate milk. Cube 1 pint of ice cream; add to milk and beat with hand mixer or in blender until smooth.

Pour into 4 chilled 12-oz. glasses. Scoop remaining 1 pint ice cream into glasses. Sprinkle with chocolate, if

desired. Garnish with banana slices, if desired. Yield: 4 1/2 cups.

FROZEN CHOCOLATE MALTS

- 3 cups chilled chocolate milk
- 1/2 cup malted milk powder
- 1 quart vanilla ice cream, cubed
- Whipped cream, optional

Mix milk, malted milk powder and 1 pint of the ice cream quickly with hand mixer or in blender until smooth but still thick. Add remaining 1 pint ice cream; mix quickly.

Pour into 4 chilled 12-oz. glasses. Freeze about 30 minutes, or serve immediately, plain or topped with whipped cream. Yield: 6 cups.

CHOCOLATE PEPPERMINT MILK COOLER

- 3 cups chilled chocolate milk
- 1/2 tsp. peppermint extract
- 1 quart vanilla ice cream
- Chopped peppermint stick candy, optional

Mix chocolate milk and peppermint extract. Cube 1 pint of ice cream, add to milk and beat with hand mixer or in blender until smooth.

Pour into 4 chilled 12-oz. glasses. Top each drink with a scoop of remaining ice cream. Sprinkle with candy pieces, if desired. Yield: 4 1/2 cups.

A SMOKY TWIST

Wouldn't a smoky twist with a green salad go well with some of your barbecue favorites? It's easy to add some julienne strips of Provolone cheese to a salad of several kinds of lettuce with escarole, endive and watercress. Serve with your favorite sour cream dressing.

Dogs to be picked up or owners prosecuted

Sept. 6, 1976

To Whom It May Concern:

The City of Littlefield has entirely too many dogs running loose within the city limits.

The month of August we had four dog-bitten citizens in our city. In the last seventh months, there have been approximately 21 dog bites, and that's way too many.

From this day on, dogs running loose will be picked up, or the owner will be fined and fined for violation of city ordinance No. 177, which regulates animals in the city limits.

[EDITOR'S NOTE: The City Council of Littlefield has recommended that law governing stray dogs within the city limits be strictly enforced, and the City Animal Warden has been commissioned to pick up dogs running loose. Some citizens feel that if their dog is properly vaccinated and licensed, that dog has the authority to run loose on the city. This is not so, and we repeat here some of the sections of the city ordinance regulating dogs within the city limits.]

THE AUTHORITY

Chapter 3 of the Littlefield City Code deals with animals, and a portion of Article 1, Section 3-1, designates the duties of the poundmaster or animal warden. "It shall be the duties of the poundmaster and his assistants to take up and impound all livestock found running at large within the limits of the City of Littlefield and to perform such duties as may be directed by the Chief of Police under the terms of the article." (Ordinance 177, which was passed Dec. 15, 1960)

THE LAW

Section 3-5 states: "The owner shall keep his dog or cat under restraint at all times, and shall not permit such dog or cat to be at large off the premises or property of the owner, unless under the control of a competent person."

THE PENALTY

The Penalty is quoted in Section 3-9. It states: "The person who shall violate any of the provisions of this article shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than one dollar nor more \$200 and each and every day of such violation shall be deemed a separate and complete offense."

Section 3-7, regarding fees, states: "A. The poundmaster of the City of Littlefield is authorized and directed to impound all animals subject to provisions of this article which are found to be in violation of this article."

"B. The following fees shall be charged by the poundmaster before any of such animals are surrendered to its owner:

"1. Impoundment fees of animals, excepting fowl, \$2 per day.

"2. \$1 per day for keeping of all animals, excepting fowl.

"3. The fees to be paid on fowl shall be one-half of fees of above set forth.

"C. The fees or monies received by the poundmaster under provision of this article shall be paid to the City Secretary and shall be used for defraying of costs incurred in connection with enforcement of the provisions of this article."

DISPOSAL OR SALE

After the animal warden picks up an animal, Section 3-8 dictates the disposal or sale of animals.

A. Any dog or cat impounded under the provisions of this article shall be kept for a period of five days, and after such period of time, if such animal has not been claimed and fees as above provided paid by the owner of such animal, it shall become the property of the City of Littlefield and be disposed of at the discretion of the City.

B. It shall be the duty of the poundmaster upon impounding any animal under the provision of this article to use due diligence to notify or ascertain the owner of such animal that such animal is impounded in the City Pound.

C. Within three days after impounding any livestock or fowl, the poundmaster shall post two notices, one at the City Hall and one at the police station, giving a full description of such animals so taken up and impounded and stating a day and place of sale of such animals, which date of sale shall not be less than five days from the date of posting notice, and said animals shall be sold at public auction to the highest bidder for cash.

D. The City of Littlefield is authorized to transfer title of animals sold

under the provisions of the purchaser.

E. After deducting the impounding, keeping and sale of animal, the Chief of Police shall balance of such sale. If the owner fails to claim the said amount within 15 days of date of sale then he shall pay over to the City Secretary.

F. The Chief of Police shall book in which he shall describe of all animals impounded, dates of impounding, disposal amount realized from the sale and expenses due for impounding, keeping the animal, the owner, if known, and the purchaser.

G. The term "person" herein shall be construed to include both singular and plural and mean and embrace any individual, corporation, association, partnership, or society, and their agents and employees."

RABIES CONTROL

Every animal which bites a human should be promptly reported to the City Health Department. The animal will be securely quarantined in the direction of that department for a period of 10 days, and shall be released from that quarantine by written permission of the Health Department. Such animal may be on the premises of the owner at the city pound, or, at the option and expense, in a hospital of his choice.

In the case of stray animals the case of animals whose owner is not known, the quarantine in the city pound.

If any person, either as a keeper, fails to comply with provision of this section, the Health Department will quarantine animal at the expense of the keeper.

Section 3-4B, states: "The report of the State Health Department or a laboratory examination made by the Health Department positive diagnosis of rabies, the Health Department shall require city-wide quarantine. No animal be taken into the streets, or to be in the streets, or off the premises of the owner or keeper during quarantine."

"C. During such period of quarantine as herein mentioned, animal bitten by an animal which is to be rabid shall be destroyed. The owner's expense and option be treated for rabies infection, licensed veterinarian, or held six months' quarantine by the in the same manner as other animals are quarantined."

D. No person shall kill, or attempt to kill, any rabid animal, or suspected of having been exposed to rabies, or any animal biting a human, except as herein provided, nor same from the city limits without written permission from the Department.

E. The carcass of any dead animal exposed to rabies shall upon request be surrendered to the City Department.

The unusual evangelistic thrust will feature a youth talent show Tuesday night after the general session. Tryouts will be held at 5 p.m. Tuesday in Harral.

Much of the special music for the sessions will be arranged through Wayland's music department. However, general session music will be

under the direction of J. E. James of Amarillo.

Byrant emphasized that the area youth rally is not a revival as it commonly associated with churches, but involves individual commitment. "We will be dealing with discovering how God can work through our lives and with coming to grips with ourselves in light of the fact."

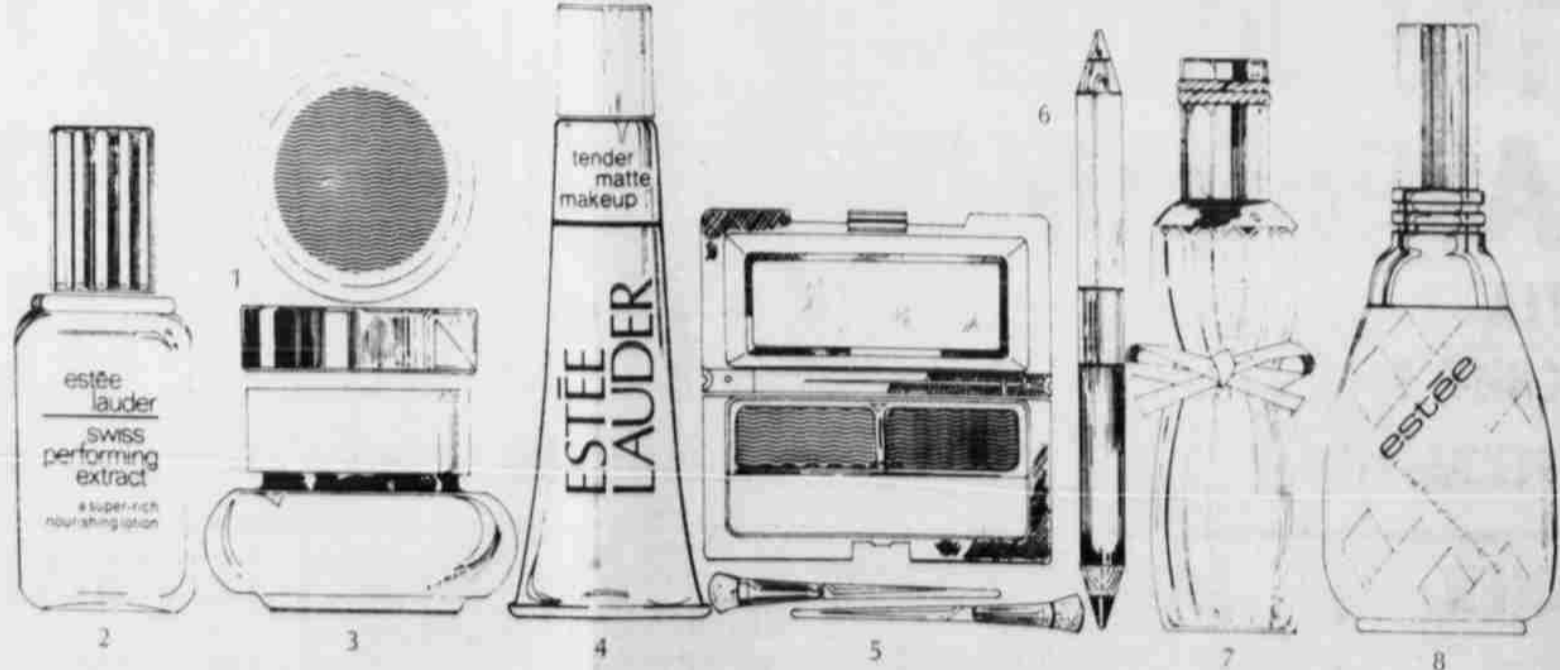

Pioneer Days

By V. M. [Pete] PETERMAN



REFRIGERATION

Folks who lived in Lamb County before 1913 didn't have any ice or refrigeration of any kind.

Most everyone had a milk trough at the windmill where the cold water from the well pumped into a water barrel, and then overflowed into the milk trough and on through from there to the horse trough.

There were usually a few flat rocks or brick bats laid in the trough to set the butter on. Shallow dishes or left overs were taken to the milk trough to be kept cool in the summer time.

Of course, this milk trough always had a shade of some kind to keep the sun off.

Many women had a cage or contraption out of the kitchen window where she could raise the window and set milk or left over foods covered with a

damp cloth to keep it cool. Many ideas helped to keep the housewife happy and feed the family. Beef was plentiful, but fresh meat just wouldn't keep in the summer time.

But after the first heavy frost, nearly everybody got ready to butcher.

Many families would go together and kill a beef and hang a quarter up under the shady side of the house, or hang it high on the windmill tower.

The beef, if placed in a good flour sack or sheet to keep the flies and dust off, would last a long time. It might have a little rind or dry portion on the outside, but you could just peel it off, and have good beef.

Bob Smith says that his father and family was here a long time before they had any ice cream.

Bob says the first, or about the first ice, that ever came to Littlefield was hauled here from Plainview by him and his brother. They hauled it in wagons headed by four and six horses.

This ice came in 300-pound blocks, and had to be wrapped in several heavy blankets and sheets to keep it from melting. They delivered their ice to Bill Street's daddy, who had the main merchandise store in town.

Street's store had an insulated box to put it in, and folks could come get a portion for home use. Bob says that's where we got our first ice cream.

When the farmers began to come to Lamb County, and lots of folks needed ice, a fellow built a small ice plant up on the northeast part of town, and

he could provide some ice to those who could afford it.

Ice routes were established on the rural areas, and once or twice a week the ice man could deliver the country folks some ice.

Housewives had an insulated box, or place to put the ice, and they put a card in the window with the amount they wanted.

They were usually glad when the ice man came.

But times soon changed and a lot of families had a refrigerator. Before electricity came to the farms, a lot of folks used windchargers and home electric plants to operate the refrigerators and ice boxes.

When electricity became available to all rural and city folks, that fixed it all. With deep freezers and automatic refrigeration, the ice man soon went out of business.

Today, packaged food and modern wrapping and processing have made Lamb County a better place to live.

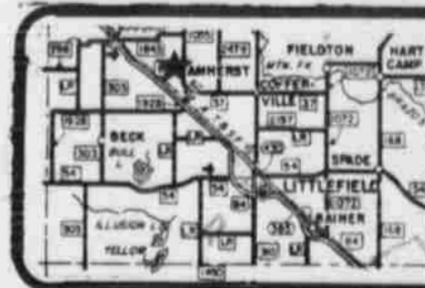

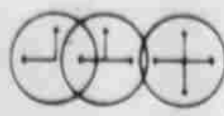

Irrigation farmers form organization

A new umbrella organization of consumers of natural gas, named the North Plains Energy Consumers Association, was launched at a planning session in Littlefield.

The effort to unite irrigators was led by leaders of four gas groups which met separately in the past.

At the meeting to form the national unity group, 100 representatives from the North Plains Energy Consumers Association, Plains Energy Consumers, the Southwest Gas Association, and Southwest Kansas Energy Consumers Association were present.

"Our response was strong, and we are going to get everybody together again in November to plan for the national convention," says Jim Dowdy, president of North Plains Energy Consumers, who hosted the Amarillo meeting.

The national strategy session will be held in brief sessions by two irrigation organizations. State Representative Alan Sherman of Amarillo and Congressman Jack C. Carr of Vernon are expected to attend.

Addressing the farmers were John Aikin of Littlefield, attorney for the Texas Users Association, and Graham, of Abilene, N.M. Southwest Energy Consumers' attorney.

Power Commission, and the urgency of national organization.

"There is an awful lot of money for natural gas, and it's not much around. It's not as that, and if you don't go for your wells, farmers are going to have to fight," Graham declared.

"It's absolutely essential for farmers all across the state to organize so they can have an impact on federal energy policy. Our experience thus far has shown that irrigation farmers will have to wage this fight alone," he added.

"It is not so today, but in 10 years we will have severe supply and price problems with electricity. So converting our wells is not the answer," he warned.

Hereford attorney Aikin, a long-time irrigation spokesman reported on the status of pricing policies adopted by the Texas Railroad Commission.

"The Railroad Commission has practically given up its authority to regulate prices on natural gas, and irrigation gas will be going up about two cents per MCF every month for the rest of this year," he declared.

"Our hopes cannot rest on getting the Railroad Commission to change its outlook. We've got to get gas regulation moved over to the jurisdiction of the new Texas Utilities Commission," Aikin urged.

In committee sessions late Friday, the convention delegates voted to maintain regional organizations, which will support the national grouping with per-capita contributions. A financial committee report approved late Friday called for raising some \$25,000 in funds by November, when the National Federation of Irrigation Farmers will be formally chartered.

Antlerless permits issued for archery

Antlerless deer permits for the special October archery season will be issued in seven Central Texas counties Sept. 10 by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Permits are necessary for hunting antlerless deer in these Edwards Plateau counties during the special archery season, Oct. 1-31. Antlerless permits are not required in most counties during the October archery season, but a 1965 law still requires them in these few.

Season dates for the special archery hunt differ in the Trans-Pecos and Panhandle regions of the state, as well as in some Northeast Texas counties. There, season length varies from five to 30 days, depending on the length of the regular season.

Most Texas hunters, however, will have a 31-day ar-

chery season. All archery seasons begin Oct. 1, regardless of length, except those on state wildlife management areas.

Permits will be issued in the seven counties at: Burnett County, in the Burnett courthouse; Gillespie County, in Fredericksburg in the courthouse; Llano County, Llano, in the P&W office; Mason County, in Mason, at the Chamber of Commerce; McCullough County, Brady, at the Chamber of Commerce; San Saba County, San Saba at the courthouse; and Travis County, Austin at the courthouse.

Persons who intend to bow hunt in these counties must secure their antlerless permits Sept. 10, 8-12 a.m. and 1-5 p.m. Antlerless permits for the archery hunts will be available in those counties on Sept. 10 only, officials stressed.

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Cannon AFB open house set

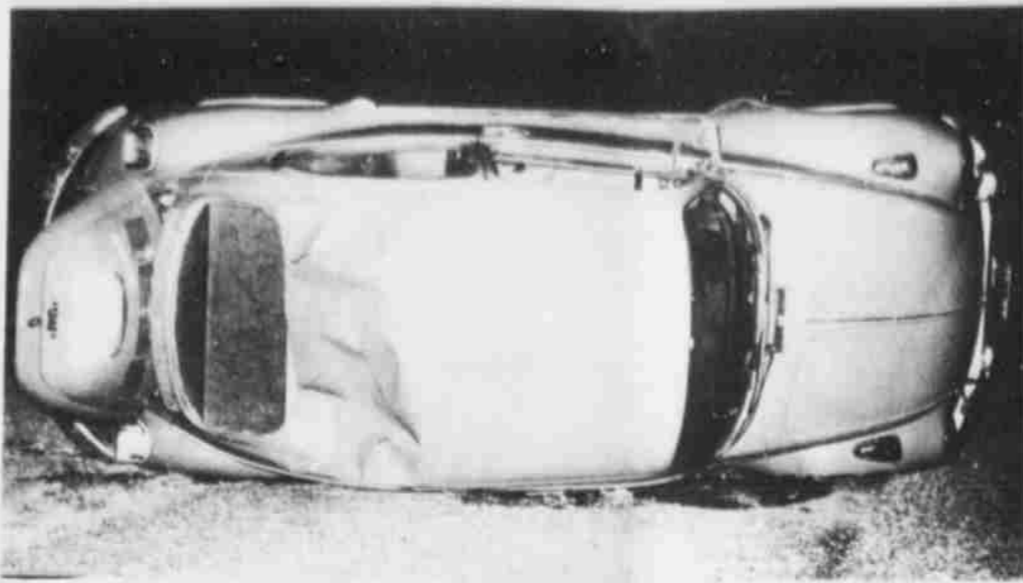

Greenbug resistant sorghums to be featured

Greenbug resistant sorghums are among several featured research highlights of this year's annual field day of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

The event will be Tuesday, Sept. 14, at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Halfway, east of Olton on Highway 70.

Dr. Charles R. Ward, research entomologist, and Dr. Jerry Johnson, sorghum breeder who has been instrumental in developing greenbug resistant breeding lines, will be on hand to discuss this year's studies. Booth Ward and Johnson are research scientists based at the Lubbock Experiment Station which is co-hosting the special occasion.

Several experimental greenbug resistant hybrids produced by Johnson as well as numerous commercial hybrids will be available for public viewing during the field day, says Ward.

Gene Latham, Hale County Extension Service entomologist, and Dr. William (Pat) Morrison, area entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Lubbock, also will be on hand to discuss greenbug resistant sorghums. They will be stationed three miles down the road (Highway 70), east of Halfway, at a research demonstration-planting of greenbug sorghums. These sorghums are located on the north side of the road, Ward says.

"During our stops of the station's research plots, results from nine studies conducted to find alternative chemicals for controlling the greenbug in sorghum will be discussed," says Ward. "The excellent performance of Lorsban, a new chemical insecticide used in ground and aerial tests against the greenbug, also will be featured."

Ward adds that attention also will be focused on another major sorghum pest, the

Banks grass mite. In several control studies, mites failed to damage the grass mite with registered products. The mite control tests add, stresses the station, that several locations of research being conducted on sorghum and corn for resistance to
