Townsley reminded that beginning in 1975. Texas will change over to the 5year license plate. "We're already manufacturing the '75 plates. That's how much leadtime we have to give

In 1976, instead of buying a new license plate, motorists will purchase a 1- by 2- inch adhesive-type sticker that will be placed on the upper left corner of the plate," said Townsley. "In 1977, the sticker will be stuck to the upper right corner, then alternated for the following years."

According to Townsley, the 5-year plate will feature an entirely new design, including the use of vowels for the first time. Since 1965, when the three-letter system was adopted, only consonants were used. However, with an every-increasing number of motor vehicles, the entire alphabet will now be employed. As an example, the first 1975 license plate will be AAA10.

Townsley says the 5-year license plate will save Texas taxpayers an estimated \$10.5 million over a four year period, since annual license plate production will no longer be necessary

Man Charged With Assault, Guns Stolen From Gibsons

An Earth man, Sam Stubbs, is out on a \$3,000 bond, following a charge of assault with intent to murder his wife. Kathy Stubbs was taken to the Muleshoe hospital after being shot in the chest Thursday. She was transferred to Methodist Hospital, and has now been dismissed, according to authorities.

Two have been jailed on grand jury indictments. Manuel DeLeon of Plainview was indicted for forgery, and Obie Roberts of Lubbock was indicted

Four others were arrested this week A Littlefield man was charged with driving while intoxicated, an Olton man for drunk and disturbance, an Earth man for DWI, and a juvenile from Boys Ranch on a runaway charge.

Included in city police activity this week was the report of the theft of nine guns from Gibson's Discount Center. The guns included a .38 pistol and eight 22 caliber pistols valued at \$230.

The state winner will be honored at Texas Christian University at Fort Worth at a banquet May 3. Regional Awards Banquet for 51 High Plains districts will be held at Plainview May 7.

Meeting On Ambulance Service Joint Commissioners-Council

Since Hammons Funeral Home gave notice that ambulance service will be discontinued, city and county governing bodies have continued to express concern over finding and financing an emergency ambulance service for Lamb County.

In a second meeting of city and county officials Thursday night, all attending were unanimous in a decision that ambulance service is a necessity, and since funeral homes are discontinuing ambulance service, it will be necessary for the cities and county to provide this essential service

No details of work were outlined in the Thursday meeting, but it was pointed

out that it will take more tax money to provide ambulance service.

Littlefield city councilmen, city representatives from Olton, Springlake, Earth and Sudan, the Lamb County Commissioners Court, representatives from both Littlefield hospitals, and the health planning coordinator from SPAG

Another joint commissioners court and city council meeting is set for Thursday, Commissioners will convene at 3 p.m. to discuss proposals. The court will be joined at 5 p.m. by Littlefield city councilmen. Then councilmen will go into their regular meeting at 7 p.m.

Past Political Races Close, 1974 May Set Another Record

Lamb County has a history of closely contested political races, and some speculate 1974 will be another record for the books.

The county judge's race in 1966 is probably the closest primary win in this area. In that election incumbent judge J.B. Davis was ousted by Jim Mangum by only six votes. Davis had been elected to that post in 1962 when he drew two candidates, one a Democrat and one a Republican.

In the '62 May primary, Davis polled 2773 votes. Truitt Sides lost out to Davis in the Democratic primary, and Ray Keeling ran on the Republican ticket.

Several memorable runoffs have occurred in offices with more than two candidates. Longtime county clerk Charles Jones drew two candidates in 1954. Vaneta Stovall and Max Hulse made bids for the office and Jones won over Hulse in the runoff.

There was a close commissioners race that year with Bill Jeffries, Roy Gilbert and Ray Brock running. Jeffries and Gilbert were on the general election ballot due to less than 55 votes difference in the first go-round. Jeffries won that

The present county treasurer was one of four candidates for that office in 1958 when Lucy Moreland beat Mrs. Bill Pass by 18 votes in the second primary. Other hopefuls on the first primary ballot were L.D. Stanaford and S.S. Pete Parrack.

Ray Lynn Britt gained her position as district clerk in the first primary in 1966 when she narrowly defeated incumbent Ernest L. Owens by 27 votes. Former sheriff Dick Dyer won a

majority of the votes in the May 1964 primary when he edged out three candidates, W.A. Dick Ratliff, Loy Dalton, and V.S. Smith Jr.

Present Sheriff E.D. McNeese won a majority in the first Democratic primay

in 1968 when he won over W.A. Hatfield, S.H. Russell and Don Hatley.

This year, most elective county posts have drawn opposition. For county judge, incumbent Truitt Sides has drawn Bill Angel as a candidate for that

Three seek the post of county clerk Mary Beth Willey filed for re-election. Candidates for that office are Mrs. Willey, Kathryn Day and Betty Ann

Lucy Moreland, county treasurer, is seeking re-election. Fannie Rogers has filed for that office.

Two of the four county commissioners have expiring terms, and both have drawn opposition candidates. T. L. 'Buddy" Free at Earth is opposed by Clarence Kelly. Hubert Dykes is opposed by Eugene Young for commissioner of precinct 4.

For justice of peace precinct 4. Jerry Collins has filed for the office now held by Stanley Doss. Norman Humphreys has filed for the JP precinct post at Sudan where W.P. "Toby" Vereen is incumbent.
