Dry Year Continues, **More Seen For April**

One of Lamb County's driest years in history is being followed by predictions of an even drier year for 1971, especially if the little over one-half inch moisture for the first three months is any indication of what's in store.

Moisture here thus far this year was .40 on February 20th and .15 of an inch on March 2.

This unusually dry winter follows only 10.61 inches of moisture recorded in Littlefield for 1970.

Add to this persistent westerly and southwesterly winds that have whipped up more than average number of dust storms,

ASCS Certifies **Cotton Count**

Lamb County ASCS Manager Lamar Aten said all farmers in Lamb County finished certifying this week, allowing the office to make its official 1970 bale count. County farmers produced 59,476,894 net pounds after poundage for bagging and ties was subtraced. This lint came off 160,603 acres. Figuring 500-pound net bales, this is 118,953 bales.

"That's 370 pounds of cotton per acre," Aten said, "and that's not very good." Aten said about 85 per cent of all farms in the county had to be adjusted this year because of the weather situation. "And it certainly lowered the payment rate," he added.

Farmers who plan to participate in one or more of the 1971 set aside programs have only until Fridated and is a state only until fridated and is a state of the get signed up in order to be eligible for program benefits in the wheat, cotton or

feed grain programs. Through closing time Friday, about 2,100 county farms had been signed up, and it is estimated about 400 more will be signed up before the deadline.

All wheat acreages should be reported on all farms having a wheat allotment. These allotments must be reported to the ASCS office by May 1 to certify. This holds whether the farm is participating in the wheat program or not. There are about 6,000 acres of wheat in Lamb County, but and the picture is pretty gloomy for area farmers and ranchers.

After the last bad dust storm one farmer quipped that all he had left of his farm were the mineral rights. Other farmers claim that the ducks on their farm are carrying their own water bags and the frogs they've seen this year have canteens.

A sense of humor helps, considering the April forecast calls for higher than usual temperatures and less than normal rainfall

Irrigation motors are humming all over the area with farmers applying pre-plant moisture to dry fields.

Moisture is all but non-existent in dryland areas. Records show that Lamb County's

average rainfall over the past 60 years is 18.85.

Farmers began last year's crop with a good underground season after 25.21 inches of rainfall in 1969. But the first month when more than two inches of precipitation was recorded in 1970 was September, too late for most growing crops. Few cover crops were planted last fall due to the lack of moisture, and this is one of the reasons for worse than usual sandstorms this spring.

Many early settlers compared March sandstorms to dustbowl days of the 1930's A check of the total rainfall for Lamb County shows that less moisture was received here during 1970 than any of the years since 1933 and 1934, when 10.31 and 9.27 fell

Prior dry years were 1927 with 9.59 inches, 1924 with 9.45 inches and 1917 with 8.73 inches of moisture recorded.

If it is any consolation. Lamb County and the High Plains aren't the only areas needing rain. The entire state is well below average rainfall, and it is estimated that two million acres of Texas land has sustained wind erosion damage this year.

In any case, the beginning of the year fails to indicate the total precipitation picture for the year to come. May and June have been the months for

this county to receive its largest rains, and a marked increase in shower activity during late spring can be expected according to the 60-year rainfall record. Severe weather can also be looked for along with the thundershowers. By this time most farmers are willing to take the bad along with the good, if there is enough rain

Fifteen-year-old Chris was just a baby when Pope took the circulation management, and twelve-year-old Tracy and seven-year-old Kerry were born into the business. Now that the two younger boys are big enough to work, Mrs. Pope (Barbara) doesn't help every press day.

"We're down to our last one," Mrs. Pope said, indicating Kerry, their third grader. "When he gets out of school we won't be able to do the press work any more. We'll be too old," she laughed.

The Pope's job begins after all other work there is to getting the paper out is finished and the paper is printed. This means some late hours for their three school boys, because the circulation job usually starts around bed time.

So the Popes have an early supper on Wednesday and Saturday, and all the boys are required to go to bed and sleep until the papers arrive back in Littlefield from the printing plant in Hereford.

"The hours are the hardest part about the job," Mrs. Pope said, "and getting the boys awake after they've been sleeping awhile."



THERE ARE MANY obstacles to serenity, and until we know what they are we cannot ovecome them.



Whenever something is being hotly argued and somebody says there are two sides to it. I start looking for a third side so I can get on it and avoid the cross-fire, but it doesn't always work.

Take the situation in Laos

I have searched every newspaper I could get my hands on and listened carefully to television news and not once have I found anybody who has taken the side of the Laotians in the big squabble over the recent battles fought there.

Laos has no designs on North Vietnam. none on South Vietnam, and yet here the two warring nations are shooting up its countryside and the argument around the world is over whether North or South Vietnam is right, not whether Laos is getting the burnt end of the stick.

I have no way of knowing, but I have a notion the Laotians might agree with an idea I've been promoting.

A while back some government officials were proposing an international con-ference to ban all instruments of war from the moon, saying that space should be used for peaceful purposes only and any plans

The Sandhills to put weapons on the moon by any nation

They've got it exactly backwards. Of all the places I can think of, the moon is the perfect spot for a war.

Up there, two countries could fight to their heart's content without hurting anything else. No trees to defoliate, no villages to burn, no farms to over-run, no buildings to be destroyed, no civilians to be hit, no left-over orphans, no borders to violate, no cities to be bombed or shelled, and the lack of much gravity would made it easy to carry the wounded.

Furthermore, after the war was over, the moon would be in no worse-looking shape than it is now. You could hardly tell what had been going on, and as soon as one war was over, start another, without having to re-build or even ask the United States for foreign aid.

Naturally, only one war at a time should be scheduled, as the television expense of covering more than one at a time is too great. Summer would be the best time, so long as the war ended before the professional football season started.



According to Louis J. Battan, Ph. D. in his book "Harvesting The Clouds", Airborne silver iodide seeding of convective clouds has produced mixed results. Seven summers of testing clouds over the Santa Catalina Mountains in southeastern Arizona failed to demonstrate an increase of rainfall. There actually was less rain on seeded days.

The area over or in which equipment may be operated shall include all or portions of the Counties of Crosby, Floyd, Briscoe, Swisher, Hale, Lubbock, Hockley, Lamb, Castro, Parmer, Bailey and Cochran. The equipment, materials and methods to be used in conducting an operation within this area of ap proximately 2,000 sq. miles include a 3 cm radar system, cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide ice nuclei, hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation of clouds or weather systems. The program will be operational during the period from May 1, 1971 through October 30, 1971. Any person who feels they may be affected in some adverse way by this program may file a formal complaint to the Texas Water Development Board, P. O. Box 12386, Austin, Texas, 78711.



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
