The Kennedys have picked up hundreds of square nails between their house and the site of one of the old barns that was torn down. Some of these nails out of the original buildings have been donated to museums.

Sometimes rattlesnake rattlers are plentiful, and Mrs. Kennedy makes paper weights, book ends and other objects from these, "We've only got 24 so far this vear." Bonnie Kennedy said. "Last year we cut the rattlers off 72."

With rattlers so plentiful, this is the reason for the snake bite serum, "But we've never had to use it," she said, "with all the Scouts and the many people who come out here, no one except a Marine, several years ago, has been bitten.

The Kennedy boys especially like to find arrowheads. "I've got 38 now," Randy said, displaying a jar filled with the flints.

There are many unique places for boyhood pastimes on the ranch. A concrete swimming pool nearly a century old stores water for six stock water tubs.

Just back of the ranch house is the site of the original "tallest windmill in the world" that reached as high as a 10-story building. Water from this mill flowed downhill and through concrete milk troughs in the storage room that still stands and now houses a pressure water

There are numerous lakes on the big ranch, and several dams have been

Supt. Paul I. Jones said Saturday he would present five applicants for the Littlefield head coaching position to the school board at its regular session Monday night.

"I am hopeful the board can reach a decision that night," said the

"We are very near a new football season," said Jones, "and I think the board will want to act as soon as possible. so that the new coach can line up the assistants he will need."

In five days after the announcement that Raymond Birchfield would leave the head coaching position, Jones received 14 applications for the vacancy.

Jones said he had screened the 14 applicants down to five who have been asked to be on hand for board interviews Monday night.

Of the 14 who applied, six are now head coaches in schools ranging from Class A to Class AAA in size. The others are now assistants, including several who now serve on AAAA or college staffs.

The superintendent said the five who have been asked to meet with the board Monday night include four men who are head coaches and one who is an assistant

Jones said he thought the five men would give the trustees a good field from which to select the new coach.

"Flowever, if the world would like to talk with other candidates, we will certainly get them here for an interview."

Jury Rules 'Not Guilty' In Amherst Assault Case

The jury verdict was "not guilty" in the trial of the State of Texas vs. Ular Johnson, Sudan Negro, accused of assault with intent to murder Doyle Collins.

The trial resulted from a knife stabbing incident that occurred at Collins' Cafe in Amherst Dec. 8, 1968.

Jury members deliberated the case

about two hours concluding conflicting stories from the defense and plaintiff.

They began cooking yesterday for the giant barbecue which will be served to several thousand area visitors at 4:30,

following a full afternoon of activities. The annual open house will begin at 2 p.m., when girls of the home will serve as hostesses for tours of the facilities, which are located nine miles south of Whiteface

on Farm Road 1780. A short program will follow the tours, when Linda Metcalf reigning "Miss Girlstown, U.S.A." will relinquish her crown to her successor.

Candidates for the new title are Donna Stone of Big Spring: Billye Nairn of Texas City; Beatrice Moody of San Antonio; Linda White of Beaumont; and Patricia Weeks of Midland.

Girlstown, U.S.A. was founded in April of 1949 near Abilene and in July of that year, the late Tom Duggan of Lubbook donated the present 1,425-acre ranch site to the home.

Littlefield firemen are barbecuing three steers-2,300 pounds of beef-for the event, and are preparing 150 pounds of pinto beans, 650 pounds of potatoes. and gallons of iced tea to go with the barbecue.

What The Leader-News Thinks

If You Want Industry.

Another example of the extent to which a community will go to attract industry these days has come to our attention.

Large headlines announced the other day that Perryton is the first choice of American Beef Packers, Inc., as the site for a huge beef processing plant, "provided the community provides required facilities for the plant and meets certain other requirements.

The \$5 million plant will process an estimated 2,300 head of cattle daily and employ from 450 to 600

Equipment of the plant will be valued at another \$5 million and the allied service companies that will be required to service an industry of this size will bring about a "terrific impact" upon the economy of Perryton.

The Perryton Herald listed seven conditions to be met before the site is placed there. They are:

1. Provide a site of at least 160 acres, free and clear to the

2. Build a sewer plant and provide a water system capable of handling the requirements of this plant. This is estimated at some 2 million gallons per day

3. Secure competitive freight rates and adequate loading facilities from the Santa Fe Railway in Perryton.

4. Enlarge the Perryton airport building a new runway of 12,000 feet length capable of

handling jet cargo aircraft. Insure that adequate telephone communications are

6. Secure feeder airlines or commercial airline connections, as well as additional hotel, motel and eating facilities and recreational

7. Have adequate banking and financial facilities.

The sewer plant and water system will have to be built with revenue bonds voted by residents of Perryton. This is expected to cost around \$1 million, and will be retired from payments made by American Beef Packers without the necessity of tax funds.

Perryton has received assurances from Santa Fe and General Telephone that the city will be able to meet requirements 3 and 5.

But the big item is the enlarging of the Perryton Airport, one that will require the voting of an estimated \$1 million in bonds, to be matched by another \$1 million from the federal government.

The Perryton Herald's article concluded:

"Now it's up to the people of Perryton and Ochiltree County to decide by vote in these bond elections whether they want a major industry located in this community.'

WE HAVE a hunch the people of that area will go ahead and vote the necessary bonds, once the benefits of this new industry are made clear to the voters.


The items asked of Littlefield by the EMV ElectriCar people are small in comparison.

All these people have asked is the use of a site for five years, rent and tax free, and \$100,000 for building of up to 25 test cars here.

Soon the people of Littlefield will be asked if they want to join in raising \$100,000 for the development of the ElectriCar and the future establishment of a manufacturing plant here.

In comparison with the requests made of Perryton, our task is an easy one....and one that we should meet without hesitance, or delay.

Something similar happens even today. How many used-car ads have you seen saying this car has 24,000 actual miles? Everybody understands there's a difference between speedometer miles and actual miles, just as there's a difference between lying and campaign-promising which is in the same category with telling a woman with knobby knees she looks good in a mini-skirt.

Miles on a car or years on a mule are no proper concern of Washington, so long as everybody pays up on time.






