Jones Sets Board Interviews For Coaching Applicants

List Of 14 Prospects Screened Down To 5

Supt. Paul I. Jones said Saturday he would present five applicants for the Littlefield head coaching position to the school board at its regular session Monday night.

"I am hopeful the board can reach a decision that night," said the

superintendent, who has been interviewing candidates for the post all week.

"We are very near a new football season," said Jones, "and I think the board will want to act as soon as possible, so that the new coach can line up the assistants he will need."

In five days after the announcement that Raymond Birchfield would leave the head coaching position, Jones received 14 applications for the vacancy.

Jones said he had screened the 14 applicants down to five who have been asked to be on hand for board interviews Monday night.

Of the 14 who applied, six are now head coaches in schools ranging from Class A to Class AAA in size. The others are now assistants, including several who now serve on AAAA or college staffs.

The superintendent said the five who have been asked to meet with the board Monday night include four men who are head coaches and one who is an assistant at present.

Jones said he thought the five men would give the trustees a good field from which to select the new coach.

"However, if he heard 'would like to talk with other candidates, we will certainly get them here for an interview,'" he added.

Stadium Service Slated Tonight

The second annual summer stadium service is scheduled for Wildcat Stadium tonight at 7:30.

The special "shirt sleeve, no coat, no tie" event is being sponsored by First Baptist Church, but is open to all town people, regardless of religious affiliation.

A stadium choir, to be formed of youth and adults, will meet at the stadium at 7 p.m. for rehearsal. Special numbers planned are "We're Marching To Zion" and "Heaven Came Down".

As the religious service is an informal event, persons attending are asked to come comfortably dressed and "bring a pillow and a neighbor."

Cake and ice cream will be served in a fellowship period after the worship service.

Jury Rules 'Not Guilty' In Amherst Assault Case

The jury verdict was "not guilty" in the trial of the State of Texas vs. Ular Johnson, Sudan Negro, accused of assault with intent to murder Doyle Collins.

The trial resulted from a knife stabbing incident that occurred at Collins' Cafe in Amherst Dec. 8, 1968.

Jury members deliberated the case about two hours concluding conflicting stories from the defense and plaintiff.

Absentee Vote Starts On Amendments

Absentee voting for the nine proposed constitutional amendments will begin at 8 a.m. Wednesday, July 16, at the County Clerk's office in the courthouse, according to County Clerk Mary Beth Willey.

Closing time for absentee voting will be at 5 p.m. Friday, Aug. 1. The general election will be conducted throughout the county at the various voting precincts Tuesday, Aug. 5.

Witnesses for the defense said the stabbing took place following a crap game at the plaintiff's cafe. Testimony for the plaintiff said that Collins had gone out to his car to get four quarts of beer to sell. Johnson said Collins hit him with a bottle. Johnson testified that he knocked Collins down and pulled a knife on Collins in self defense.

Witnesses for the State were Collins, Mrs. Collins, Dr. Pearlman, Annie Mae Gilyard who brought Collins to the hospital, O. B. McClendon who drove the car transporting the injured man, James McLaughlin and Homer McLaury.

J. Edward Jennings was foreman of the jury.

Girlstown Event Today

Littlefield Volunteer Firemen are playing a big part in Girlstown, U.S.A.'s 20th Anniversary Celebration today.

They began cooking yesterday for the giant barbecue which will be served to several thousand area visitors at 4:30, following a full afternoon of activities.

The annual open house will begin at 2 p.m., when girls of the home will serve as hostesses for tours of the facilities, which are located nine miles south of Whiteface on Farm Road 1780.

A short program will follow the tours,

when Linda Metcalf reigning "Miss Girlstown, U.S.A." will relinquish her crown to her successor.

Candidates for the new title are Donna Stone of Big Spring; Billye Nairn of Texas City; Beatrice Moody of San Antonio; Linda White of Beaumont; and Patricia Weeks of Midland.

Girlstown, U.S.A. was founded in April of 1949 near Abilene and in July of that year, the late Tom Duggan of Lubbock donated the present 1,425-acre ranch site to the home.

Littlefield firemen are barbecuing three steers—2,300 pounds of beef—for the event, and are preparing 150 pounds of pinto beans, 650 pounds of potatoes, and gallons of iced tea to go with the barbecue.

C-C Needs Reservations

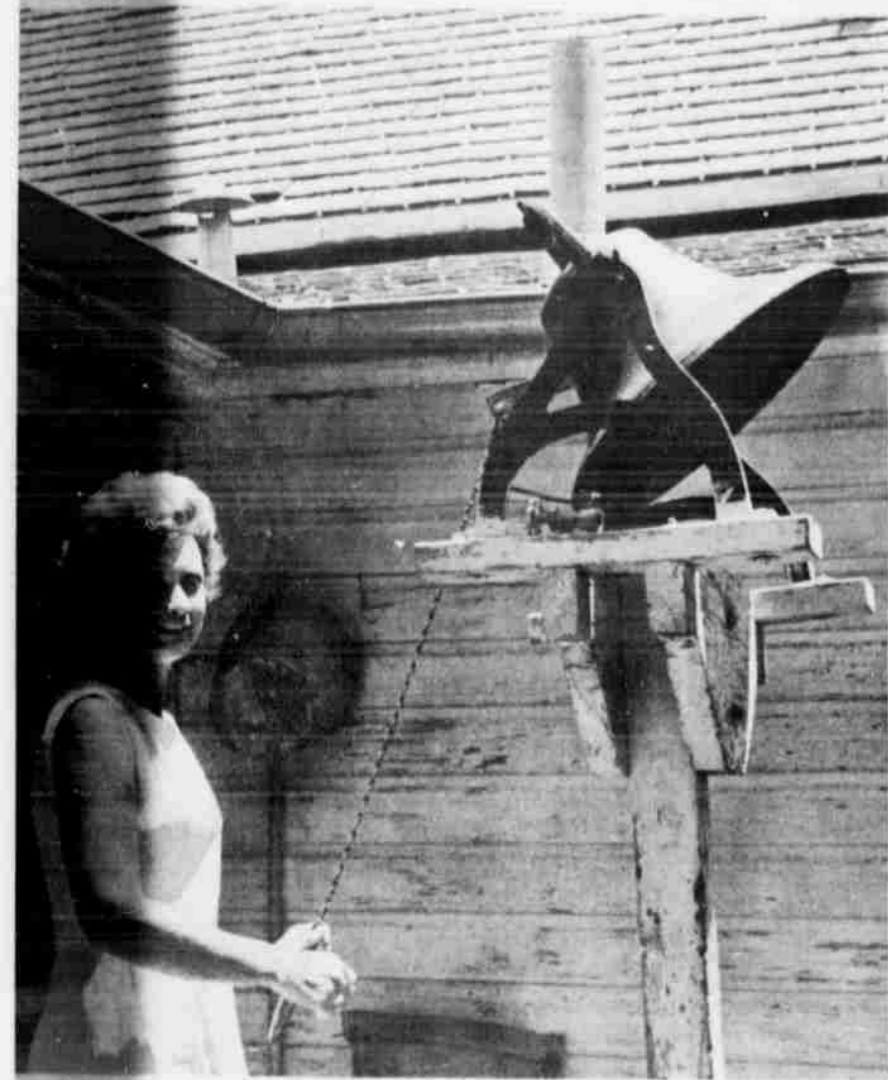
The Chamber of Commerce is still accepting reservations for the bus trip to Palo Duro Canyon and the fourth season showing of "TEXAS".

George White Ranch Still The Old West

The Ross Kennedys have a big dinner just outside their back door, a sturdy chin' rail out front, and they keep snake serum in their refrigerator at times.

Ross Kennedy is ranch foreman at the sprawling 19,000 acres plus George White Ranch, and when there are extra mouths to feed, Mrs. Bonnie Kennedy puts on the big bag for all the guests and hungry hands.

And when Mrs. Kennedy steps out to the big pulley on the dinner bell, she is never sure how many feet will be under her table—especially if it happens to be branding time.

When one of the Kennedy boys says, "Mother, let's eat out tonight," they can eat supper on the long screened-in front porch that runs the entire length of the house.

The ranch, which is part of the original T Ranch and was headquarters for the 7th division, abounds in history. Mrs. Kennedy clips and saves all the articles about the ranch and information on the place.

All sorts of rocks, fossils, arrow heads, and even square nails can be found on the ranch.

The ranch foreman's house, where the Kennedys live, the bunk house (cook shack) and the commissary are all that are left of the original 7th division of the XIXth Cavalry that dates back to the early 1800's.

The Kennedys have picked up hundreds of square nails between their house and the site of one of the old barns that was torn down. Some of these nails out of the original buildings have been donated to museums.

Sometimes rattlesnake rattlers are plentiful, and Mrs. Kennedy makes paper weights, book ends and other objects from these. "We've only got 24 so far this year," Bonnie Kennedy said. "Last year we cut the rattlers off 72."

With rattlers so plentiful, this is the reason for the snake bite serum. "But we've never had to use it," she said, "with all the Scouts and the many people who come out here, no one except a Marine, several years ago, has been bitten."

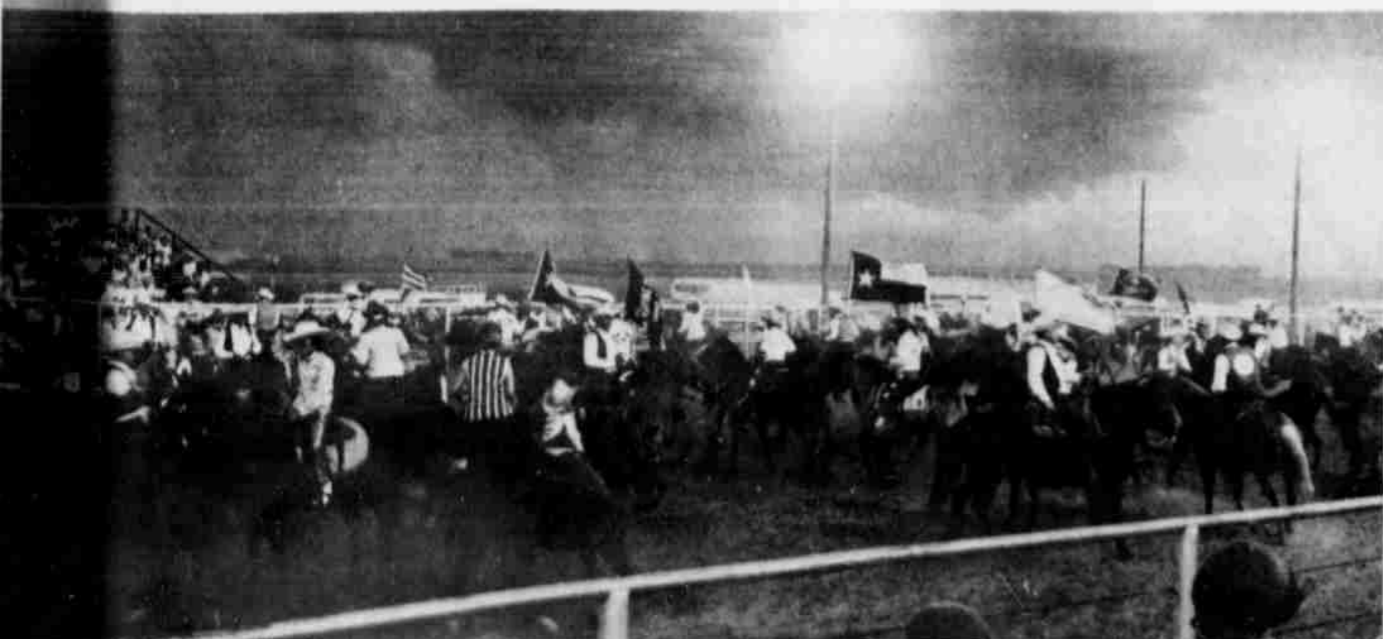
The Kennedy boys especially like to find arrowheads. "I've got 38 now," Randy said, displaying a jar filled with the flints.

There are many unique places for boyhood pastimes on the ranch. A concrete swimming pool nearly a century old stores water for six stock water tubs.

Just back of the ranch house is the site of the original "tallest windmill in the world" that reached as high as a 10-story building. Water from this mill flowed downhill and through concrete milk troughs in the storage room that still stands and now houses a pressure water tank.

There are numerous lakes on the big ranch, and several dams have been

The High Plains Library Bookmobile has been broken down the last two weeks and was unable to make the usual routes.

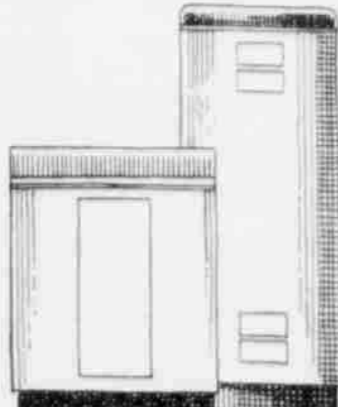

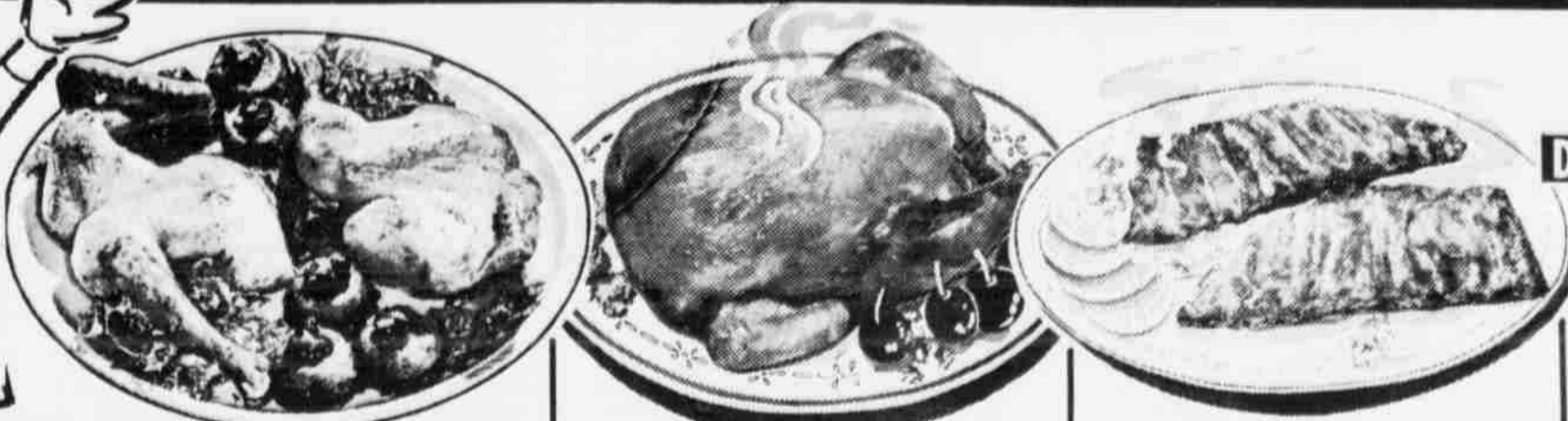

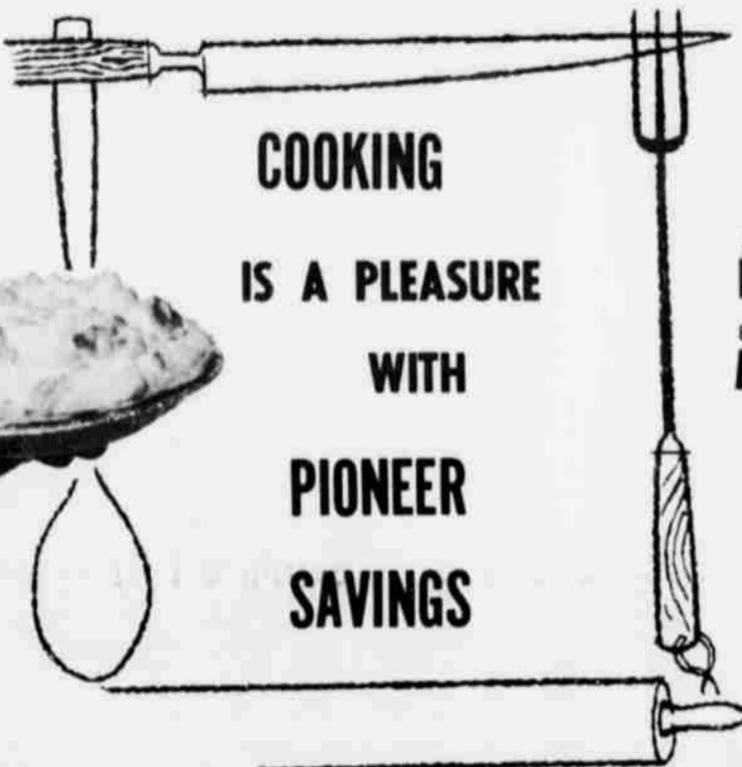

I was surprised to find out Hawaii is not completely a

jungle. In fact, it is very modern such as Los Angeles or Miami and there are no snakes or reptiles on these islands either. Rain fall varies greatly among these eight islands. On one of the islands it averages 0.7 inches a year and on another 250-400 inches yearly.

As for the Hawaiian people, all were friendly and helpful. Dorothy Mosat, our Unitous guide, greeted us at the airport. Her personality touched each one of us individually. From her expressions and actions, she instantly became a lasting friend. The bus drivers were also friendly. They were eager to answer any question we had and they would help the girls off the bus at each stop. At the conclusion of each daily tour the driver would bid us a safe journey back home and a farewell with his warmest wish that Hawaii would always be a part of us forever. 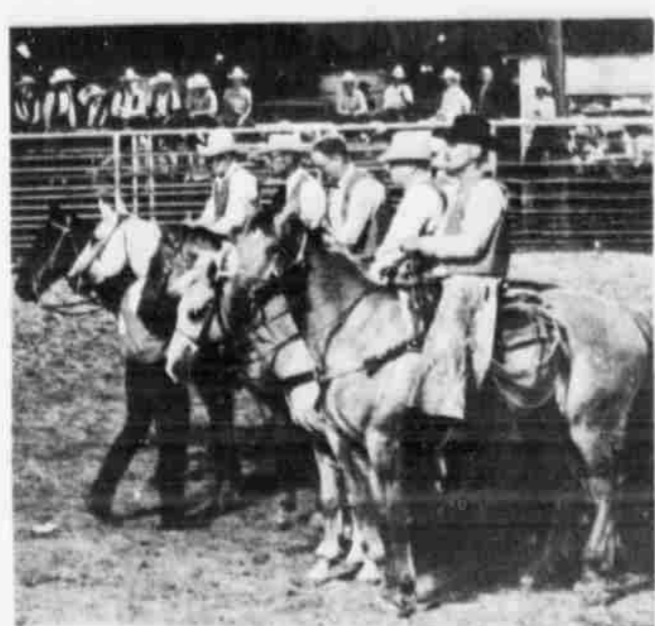

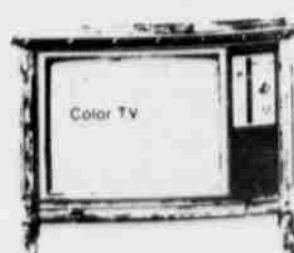
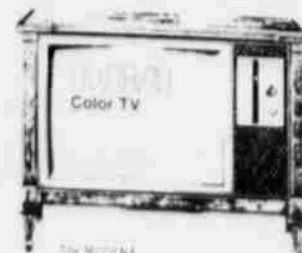
