FOUR CRITICALLY

Wreck Injures Six Early Saturday

Four persons were critically injured and two others received serious injuries in a two-car accident west of Littlefield early Saturday morning.

All six were brought to the Littlefield Hospital, then four were immediately transferred to the Methodist Hospital in Lubbock.

Taken to the Lubbock hospital were Samuel Ferdinand Albus, 23, of Pep, driver of one of the vehicles, and three passengers in the other car, Pete Paredz, Jr., 12, Johnny Paredz, 11, and Eli Ramirez, 20, all from Lubbock. All three Latin American passengers were listed in critical condition at press time.

The accident occurred at ap-

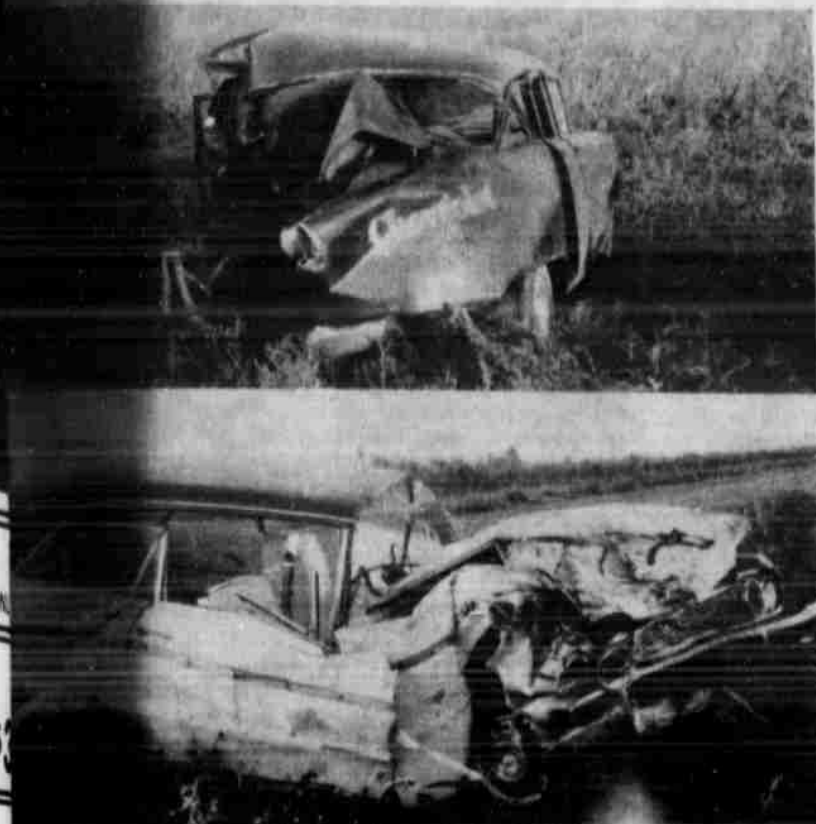
proximately 3:30 a.m. but the accident wasn't discovered until about 6 a.m.

Albus received a broken hip and chest injuries. Pete Paredz Jr. had head injuries and Johnny Paredz and Ray Paredz both received extensive leg injuries.

The driver of the other car, Ray

Rodriguez Paredz, 24, and Eli Ramirez, 20, were in the Littlefield Hospital where Ramirez has a broken back and the driver has head injuries and a broken leg.

According to Highway Patrolman Bill Angel, both vehicles were traveling south 12.6 miles west of Littlefield on F303 when Albus, driving a 1964 Chevrolet, hit the rear of the 1955 Chevrolet occupied by the five persons who were working out of the W. B. Gage Gin at Pep.

WHILE THE recent rains have been blessed by some and yet cursed by others, the people in Littlefield and Lamb County knew exactly what they wanted in June of '72. They wanted rain! And when it finally came, this is the report that was carried in the LAMB COUNTY LEADER, dated Thursday, June 9, 1972.

"Mod, mud, mud, dear old delicious mud! Just what the folks of this section have been hoping for, some of them crying for during the past 60 days that precipitation generally has been withheld over the South Plains of Texas. But same Monday night—A copious show-dampening everything except the appreciative enthusiasm of the citizens this vicinity. Nor was it just a little refreshing drizzle, either. It began shortly after midnight, continuing on all the way hours of morning with a sprinkles about time of for Old Sol to take as Jupiter Pluvius was taking his parture for a pleasant visit to some her section.

Tuesday morning when the citizens of Littlefield and surrounding community arose from their nightly umbers the roads were muddy, the lawns were soft, the yards and gardens were green, and refreshed and an overflow of the super-abundance of H2O was quietly reposing in the ditches and on the roadsides, slowly but surely percolating into the soil to bring forth vegetation, rich and luxurious.

Just what caused the God of Rain to look westward beyond the Mississippi valley where, for the past three months, his visitations have been more than a blessing is unknown. Last Friday a prayer meeting of all the churches were joyously answered, when a regular old-smaller, ground soaker and gully washer swooped down upon that territory, extending as far north as Litheral and Lums Chapel and west to the Yellow House ranch headquarter. Astward there was also good rains Sunday afternoon. Lubbock was visited by the liquid elements, the precipitation reaching northward as far as three miles west of Anton where it gradually tizzled out.

Thousands of acres of farm land surrounding Littlefield have been in preparation for seeding for the past month, the farmers resting idly upon their plow handles awaiting the moisture necessary for seed germination. Now it is here, more than enough, and before the week is over the tick and hum of planters will be heard in every direction running from early dawn until late at night. Cotton may be planted in this section as late as June 15th so there is still plenty of time to raise another bumper crop of fleecy wool and with every indication that the time will be much better than that of 60 years."

OVERALL CROP OUTLOOK GOOD

Calf Rope! Yearly Rain Total Passes 19 Inches

Some farmers are ready to yell calf rope on this rainy weather, while others just smile as they go around punching off irrigation wells.

Farmers in the Earth-Springlake, Otton, Spade, Hart Camp, and Fieldton

areas where the crops are extremely good find the recent showers just what they ordered. In other parts of the county, especially where there are large hail damaged areas and farmers have had to replant, farmers would like to see some hot, dry weather until late crops

get some growth. Over the Lamb County area, crops are either looking very good or very poor depending on the weather elements crops have been through.

Most of the hail damaged cotton has

been replanted to milo, soy beans and blackeye peas. A large portion of the damaged cotton which was left on a wait-and-see basis developed wet weather blight during the cold days the first week in July.

Arid conditions the following week helped the blight situation, but continued cool, wet weather gave the blight another foothold and most of the hail damaged cotton has been released to other crops.

A little over half of Lamb County's 2,107 farms haven't been certified. The final date to certify cotton, feed grain, soybean, peanut and set-aside acreages is Aug. 1, and producers are urged to not wait until the last day.

Failure to correctly report acreages can result in loss of farm program payments.

Farm payments under the cotton, wheat and feed grain programs began July 3rd and more than \$1,432,000 was mailed to producers during the first two weeks in July. The total payments in Lamb County in 1972 will be approximately 14.8 million dollars, according to local ASCS officers.

Payments under the set-aside programs are made to farmers who agree to set aside part of their land from production in order to meet a national objective of balancing supply and demand in certain commodities.

The payments help off-set the loss of returns from cropland that otherwise would be used for income yielding production, and on which the farmer is obliged to continue to pay taxes and apply needed conservation steps.

For 1972 approximately 100,000 acres of productive cropland have been set-aside from the production of crops in Lamb County.

Rotarians Accepting Loan Applications For Fall

Littlefield Rotarians are accepting applications now from students who need help in attending college this fall.

The Littlefield Rotary Club Student Loan Fund Committee makes loans to Lamb County high school graduates to enable them to continue their education. Applicants are screened by the committee to be sure students are college material. Those receiving loans must maintain a "C" average to obtain another loan or a renewal. Loans are coigned by an adult, usually a parent.

The Rotary loan fund was started in 1959 by the late Art Chesher, a past president of the Littlefield Rotary Club. Chesher gave \$5,000 to the fund originally, and another \$5,000 was received from his estate for a total of \$10,000.

This figure has been increased to \$12,755 by interest on loans and savings. A total of 187 loans have been made to 98 students thus far. At the present time there are 19 outstanding loans to students.

E. J. Wicker serves as chairman of the loan committee. Other committee members are Houston Hoover, Paul I. Jones, J. D. Hagler and Joe Montgomery.

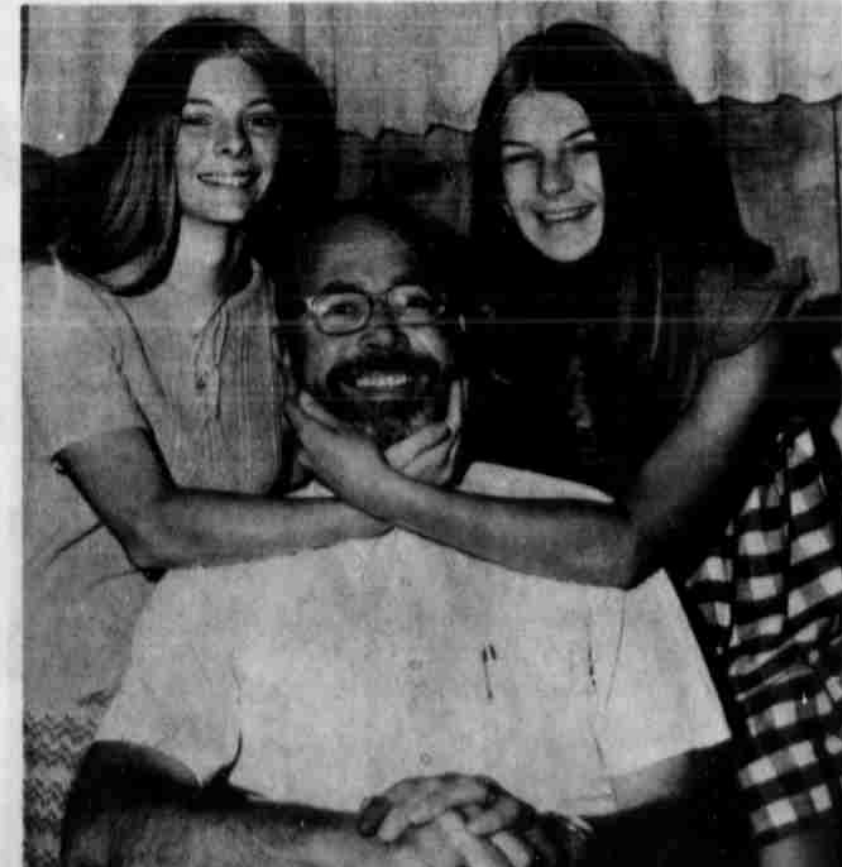
Connie Ham of Sudan is the Lamb County senior division winner and Wendy Branscum of the Earth-Springlake 4-H Club is the junior division county winner.

Art Festival Shaping Up

All artists and craftsmen who have completed work not supervised by an instructor within the last 12 months are invited to get their exhibits ready for the 5th Annual Sidewalk Art Festival in Littlefield.

The Sidewalk Art Festival is sponsored by "We, The Women," the women's division of the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce, the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce, Hart-Thaxton Hardware, Littlefield Glass Works, The Gallery, Perry Bros., and the Art Associations of Littlefield.

The open air exhibits will be Friday, Aug. 25th, in conjunction with Littlefield's annual event, Festivities Days.

There will be two divisions, paintings and arts and crafts which will be broken into the following groups: (1) out of county adults, (2) Lamb County adults, (3) juniors, ages 15-18, and (4) intermediates, 14 years of age and under. Exhibitors are limited to five entries and each must furnish his own display stand.

"We, The Women" will give cash awards totaling \$295, and ribbons, gift certificates for frames and art supplies will be given by the sponsoring merchants. Selections of winners for prizes will be by popular vote and selections for ribbons will be made by judges.

An area will be provided for visiting artists to relax during the showing. Hot dogs, sandwiches, cakes, cookies, homemade candies and soft drinks will be available at food booths. In case of inclement weather, a building will be available for the exhibit.

A separate section will be provided for the sale of works that are not entered in the contest and are not judged so artists will have an opportunity to sell their works (limit of five exhibits per exhibitor). Works for sale must have artists name, address and price on the item.

Registration will begin at 1 p.m. and works will remain on display until 8 p.m. There will be no entrance fee.

Corn Fields Pose Danger

The West Texas custom of friends helping themselves to a mess of roasting ears out of their neighbors' corn patches can be a dangerous custom.

Again this year, many farmers are spraying their corn fields with potent and lasting chemicals. Fresh corn patches that have been treated with pesticides are considered unsafe for eating up to 40 days. This means most corn fields will be too hard for corn on the cob by the time the safe period is past.

Unless persons know whether fields have been sprayed or not, it is a wise decision not to help yourselves.

Lettuce And The Democrats

"The delegates from the Great State of Ohio will not eat lettuce!" Thus the intonation typical of many Democratic delegations during the recent national convention.

What has lettuce go to do with a Democratic convention? Well, one of the planks in the party's platform is the vigorous endorsement of the unionization of farm workers.

A couple of years ago Cesar Chavez and his United Farm Workers union henchmen finally coerced the grape growers of California into forcing his union on their workers in self-defense, largely through the efforts of the Great Grape Boycott, solidly backed by Beautiful People. It worked very well through threat and fright, though no election ever showed the workers really wanted a union and though any election held was infiltrated by Chavez goons, bleeding-heart priests and duped students. (It's all a part of the record and incorporated in a book, "Little Cesar" by Ralph de Toledano.)

At any rate, union greed, once having tasted the manna of victory, never stops. And Chavez has moved on, this time to the lettuce fields. Now the liberals who believe his propaganda about slave labor, stoop labor, suffering migrants, etc., etc., are about to bend the lettuce growers to their will by boycotting the cheapest food in America for its nutritional value.

Lettuce, like grapes, is one of the earliest foods cultivated by man. It dates from before the Christian era in

the Middle East and today's lettuce is important to every diet because of its lack of calories, bulk and high concentrations of Vitamins A and B. Whereas grapes are not a part of the daily fare of most Americans, lettuce assuredly is. It is grown and harvested the year round to embellish the salads of the nation.

There are a lot of misguided folks who will consider that not eating lettuce is a great service to farm workers. In the end, if the boycott works, they will only discover they've raised the price of a daily staple out of bounds. As to helping lettuce pickers — don't believe it.

They will be replaced gradually by machines. (Lettuce can be harvested by machine, whereas grapes cannot.) Fewer people will be making more money, less union dues of course.

If unionism cannot be a voluntary business, from from the Chavez kind of coercion subsidized by state and federal laws, then it becomes compulsion of the worst sort. Few of Chavez' recruits are there because of choice. The rest are there through fear.

So if the Democrats of the Great State of Ohio, or anywhere else, choose to reject lettuce they do themselves a disservice — not to mention an army of truck drivers, freight handlers, lettuce growers, grocery men, consumers and the lettuce pickers as well.

essential to the greatest good concerned.

"Thank you" expressed because it is good etiquette as helpful and meaningful as you" because we are honestly and sincerely wish to make our gratitude. When we try, in other words, to show our regard for our fellow men, we must choose between acting for their sake, and acting from an honest sincere respect for and appreciation of them.

"THE TRUE ART of being polite is to appear well pleased with company, and rather to seem entertained with them than to be entertained by them. A man disposed may not have much to say, but if he has common sense and something friendly in his mind, it conciliates men's minds more than the brightest parts without this disposition." — Addison.

Right attitudes of consideration for other people, and the disposition to be helpful to them as if they are somebody, if they are somebody, will produce behavior that is fundamental manners.

GOOD MANNERS are the most politeness. They are the manifestations of a wholesome attitude for self and for others. The groom graduated from Whitharral High School and attended Texas Tech and South Plains College. The groom is engaged in farming while completing a degree in agricultural economics.

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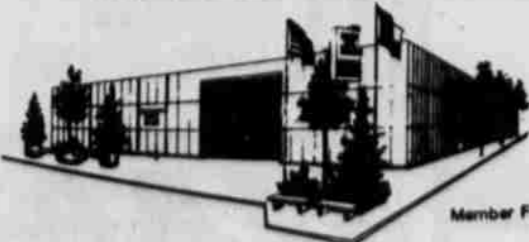
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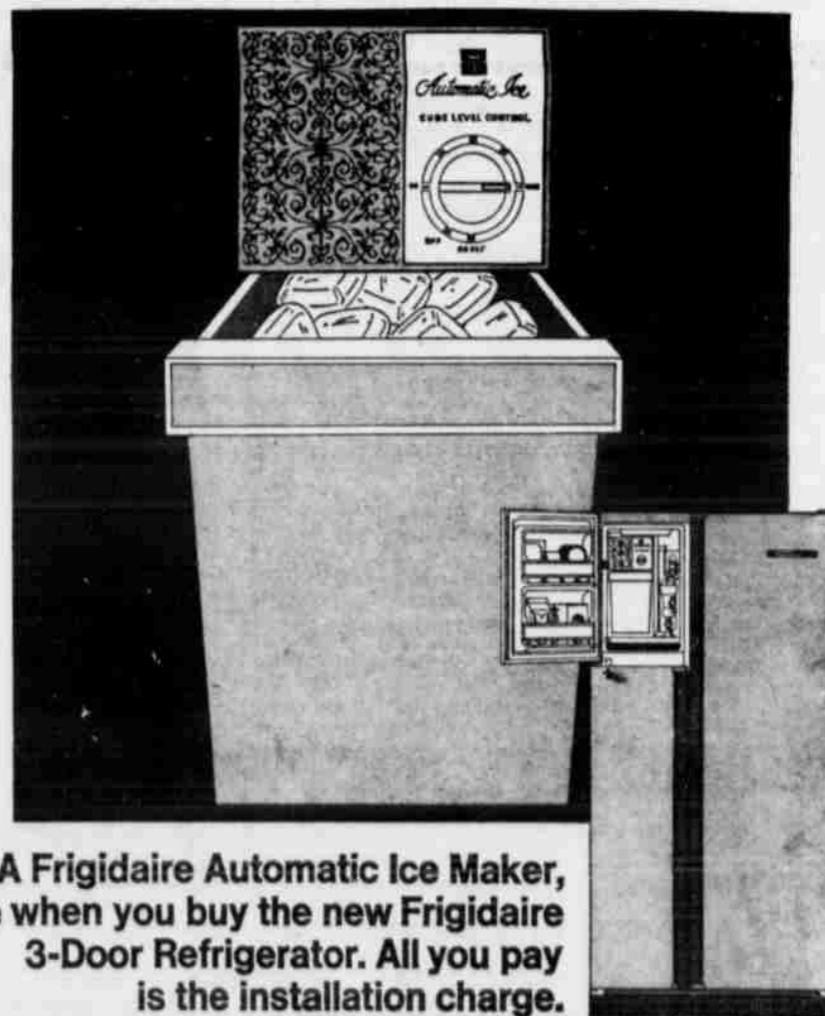
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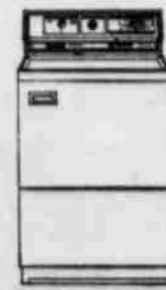

Meet The Minister



Rev. Joe James

From working on a ranch to pastoring a church is a pretty long leap.

Rev. Joe James, pastor of the Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Littlefield, worked on his father's ranch through his high school years and did general ranch hand chores during summers until graduation from college.

Before going into theology, Rev. James received his BA degree in philosophy and English from St. Thomas College in Denver in 1954.

Following graduation he studied theology at North American College in Rome and was ordained a priest on Dec. 15, 1957 in a Roman ceremony.

His first assignment was as associate pastor in Borger in 1958. Following a year in the Panhandle, Rev. James was assigned as associate pastor at Christ the King in Lubbock for a year.

He pastored a church in Tulsa a year, then attended Marquette University in Milwaukee where he received an MA in counseling.

For the next five years he taught at St. Lucian's, an Amarillo high school prep school for boys. During the

summers he continued studies in liturgy at the University of Notre Dame, receiving a master's in religious education at Loyola University in Chicago.

Rev. James was coordinator of religious education for the diocese of Amarillo in 1968-69 until he moved to Littlefield.

He is an active worker in Littlefield community affairs. He is a member of the local Lions Club, and served as president of the ministerial alliance the past year. He has served on committees of the Chamber of Commerce and has been in charge of helping transients who come into the Salvation Army as one of his duties as a member of the Salvation Army board.

At the present time Rev. James serves on the Diocesan grievance and appeals committee for the Amarillo Diocese. Most of his time is spent in working with church members in active scripture study groups and in counseling with people here.

His hobbies include making tapes of speeches, recording conferences and music for his tape library, and relaxing with his woodworking hobby.

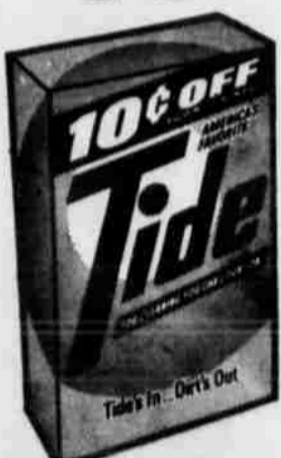

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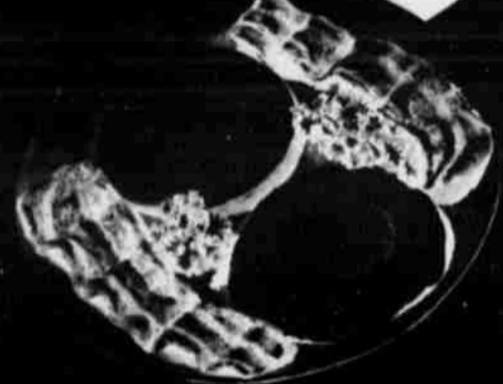

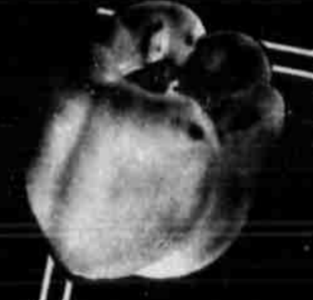

Although the "new look" in highway signs is not as revolutionary as the miniskirt- Texas Highway Department engineers hope it will be as eye-catching.

In many cases, symbols, shapes and colors are substituted for words. It is hoped that this will give the message to motorists at a glance and remove language barriers.

The new symbol signs and pavement markings adopted by the Texas Highway Commission are from the revised "Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices" released by the Federal Highway Administration.

The new prohibitive signs are probably the most important. These signs all have a red circle with a slash cutting diagonally through the center which means "DO NOT" or "NO". The symbol inside the circle shows what is prohibited.

For example, a sign showing a black left turn arrow with a superimposed red circle and slash designates "NO LEFT TURN."

The yellow diamond-shaped signs still stand for a warning, but some of the symbols showing hazards are new. In addition, most warnings signs continue to have the word message, but the message is located under the sign on a plaque.

For example, "MERGING TRAFFIC" is replaced by a smaller black line under the sign with the word "MERGE". This will minimize as to which stream merging traffic.

School signs are a schoolhouse, cartoon silhouettes of two children for a yellow background. Color is a key in the system. Red indicates prohibition; green movement permissive; directional guides; yellow indicates warning; and black used for regulatory as those for speed for most guide and signs.

There has been some question in reference to who pays social security on hoe hands. According to an official publication of the Social Security Administration, generally the crew leader is the employer of the crew workers he furnishes, and he is responsible for making the social security reports. However, the farmer is the employer in some cases-for example, when the farmer and crew leader have a written agreement stating that the crew leader is the farmer's employee.

The law provides the following guides for determining who is the employer of a crew of workers furnished by a crew leader to do farm work.

If the crew leader is the employer of the crew workers, if there is no written agreement between the crew leader and the farmer stating that the crew leader is the farmer's employee and the crew leader pays the workers (either for himself or for the farmer).

The farmer is the employer of the crew worker if there is a written agreement between

the crew leader and the farmer which states the crew leader is the employer.

Either farmer or crew leader may be the employer if there is no written agreement that the crew leader is the farmer's employee and the farmer pays the workers in this situation, however, the final right to control the members in the performance of their work is the

No special form is required for preparing the agreement, but it must be signed by both the farmer and the crew leader, and include (1) the name and address of the farmer, (2) the name and address of the crew leader, (3) the farm and the approximate dates of the work, (4) a statement that the farmer will furnish the workers to do agricultural work for the farmer, and (5) a statement that both the farmer and the crew leader are responsible for paying the social security taxes due on the wages of the crew leader and workers.
