**Existing Lunch Room Contracts To Be Carried Out**

384 Children And Three Schools In Lamb Taking Part In Lunch Program

In response to numerous inquiries from folks in Lamb County resulting from the recent action by the House of Representatives turning down 1944-45 School Lunch Program, J. Ernest Jones, county superintendent of schools, said he was informed by WFA's Office of Distribution that all existing contracts and those made prior to the end of June will be carried out and local sponsors will be fully reimbursed.

"Congress has not made final decision in connection with the Community School Lunch Program for the next fiscal year, but in any event funds already appropriated through June of this year will not be affected," Jones explained.

He said at present there are three schools and 384 children participating in the Community School Lunch program in Lamb County.

WFA's financial assistance to local schools is based on the type and number of meals served. For a complete type A lunch, which provided one-third to one-half of a child's daily nutritional requirement, the government's aid may be up to a maximum of nine cents per meal. Type B lunch, which requires less facilities for preparation, but still provides at least one-third of the daily food requirements has a maximum reimbursement of six cents.

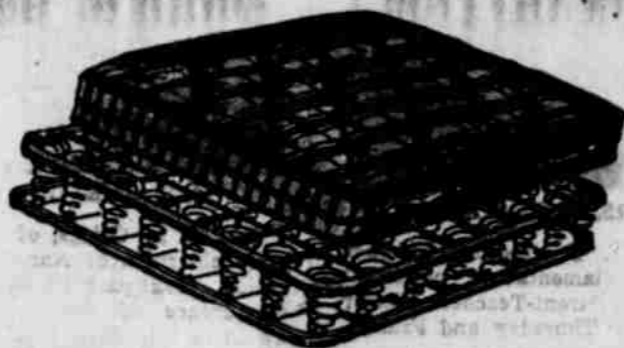

Congressional District. "On the day of election this coming July, I will be 38 years of age. This coincident will afford every voter in the District an opportunity, individually, to present me a most welcome birthday present—their vote.

"My Uncle Sam has said that I am too big for the Armed Forces, and I have, therefore, been classified as 4-F. If I am too big to serve my Country in a uniform, then surely I am big enough to serve this District in the Senate of Texas.

"Having never run for public office before, I cannot be classified as a professional politician.

"I was born in Crosby County and lived there until 1923, at which time my father, Pink L. Parrish, moved the family to Lubbock. I am a former student of Texas Technological College.

"Often I am asked why I am running for the Texas Senate. My answer is as follows: I cannot get into the Armed Services of my Country. In this time of war I believe every man should give his best somewhere. I trust, also, I will be forgiven for having the ambition to walk in the footsteps of my Daddy, who served this District in the same position I now seek.

"Some of the problems to which Sterling J. Parrish will give his attention, if elected, are as follows:

- "1. Re-districting of this State for legislative purposes.
- "2. Support the public institutions of this District, including Texas

Technological College and the Hospital for the insane at Big Spring.

"3. A fair distribution of the Rural Aid money to the rural schools of West Texas.

Because of the shortage of gasoline and tires, making it impossible for me to campaign as otherwise I might do, I shall appreciate every effort made on the part of my friends throughout the District in my behalf.

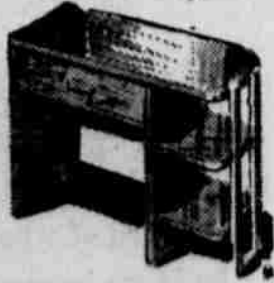

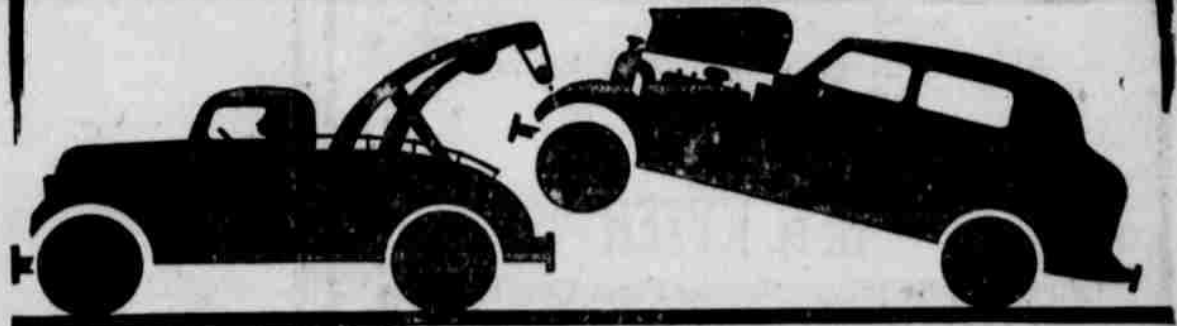

The Southwestern Public Service Company was organized in New Mexico in 1925 and, before acquiring the electric facilities in Littlefield, and in neighboring cities and towns, it served principally the Central Panhandle of Texas and the Pecos Valley area of New Mexico.

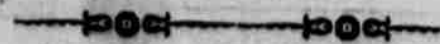
Soon after its organization, the Company established a general policy of operation which has been continued through the ensuing years.

This policy consists principally of the following:

- (1) The best possible service to the public with friendly and courteous handling of our customers dealings with us.
- (2) The fair treatment of our employees, supplemented by a continuous program of training them in an eager willingness to serve the public and in good citizenship in their communities.
- (3) A program of voluntary reduction in our rates to the public, made periodically as business conditions permit.

As a result of the repeated rate reductions made during the period of our operations from 1925 until the outbreak of the war, the average rate per kilowatt hour for all lighting and power sold by the Company, in the original territory served, was reduced to less than one-third of what it was in the beginning. These reductions in rates were accompanied by large increases in electric plant and line investment, to provide adequate service at all times.

This is the program of service to the public which we bring to the people of Littlefield. Although we are handicapped along with all others by war conditions, it is our purpose to put our operating policy in full effect in the years of peace ahead. These matters will be amplified in later statements, and additional information will be presented to you, in order that you might become better acquainted with the Company and the service which it renders.
