## 3 Point Program Is Recommended

A three-point program for farmers and ranchers under today's "high price conditions" was recommended by officers and directors of five production credit associations in annual conference in Amarillo on July 30 and 31.

First, the group recommended that proper soil conservation practices be followed, Mr. Snyder said. "Good productive land is the best assurance of future income from which to meet expenses and repay debts. The more a farmer or rancher does to protect and build his soil, the better credit rating he will have with his production credit association. The association can go with him further and stay with him longer if he keeps his land highly productive so he can get a greater income from his operations year after year."

Second, the directors recommended that farmers and ranchers reduce debts while prices are high. Figures were sighted showing that in 1919 it took 11 steers weighing 1,000 pounds each to pay a \$1,000 debt. In 1932, it took 24 steers; in 1939 - 15; in 1941 - 12; in 1945 - 8; in 1946 - 7.

Third, the group recommended that production credit associations complete their job of retiring their government capital. Reports showed that on May 31, 1947, the 36 associations in Texas had \$3,856,889 in earned surplus, \$6,227,099 in member-owned capital and the government's investment is down to \$2,455,000.

The Plainview Production Credit Association has 1,007 stockholders, a total earned surplus of \$80,250, and a member-owned stock of \$163,120, with a government capital investment of \$50,000. "Our plans are to repay \$45,000 of this government capital by the end of 1947," Mr. Snyder said.

The association was represented at the Amarillo conference by the following: W. A. Painter, Plainview; W. W. Brancum, Muleshoe; D. T. Northcutt, Silverton; R. A. Ax-tell, Dimmitt, and by W. R. Snyder, secretary-treasurer. A. B. Brown, of near Littlefield, is also a director of the association, but he was unable to attend the meeting.

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### Veterans May Cash Terminal Leave Bonds After Sept. 1

President Truman signed a bill Saturday allowing war veterans holding terminal leave bonds to cash them any time after September 1, but advised them not to do it.

"I wish to emphasize strongly that it is to the veterans' best interest that they keep their bonds if they do not absolutely need to cash them now," his statement said.

"Almost \$2,000,000,000 of bonds are outstanding. If a sizeable proportion of these bonds should be redeemed in the near future, general inflationary pressures, which we have been endeavoring to con-

trol, would receive a substantial boost. Several hundred million dollars poured into the spending stream would exert a strong upward pressure of prices.

"If, on the other hand, veterans choose the wise course, hold their bonds and continue to draw 2 and one-half per cent interest, their dollars will buy more when they cash their bonds after inflationary conditions have eased.

The administration had opposed the bill for cashing the bonds; Secretary of the Treasury Snyder testified against it. But the House and Senate passed the measure without a dissenting vote and Mr. Truman signed it.

The Treasury department is making arrangements with banks and other financial institutions in order that bonds can be cashed in local communities without cost to veterans. Banks, however, will require positive identification of those cashing the bonds, so as to prevent any money going to "sharks," who have purchased the bonds at a discount.

The bonds were issued to some 9,000,000 veterans to compensate for earned but unused leave time as members of the armed forces. They were to mature five years after the date of a veteran's discharge.

# EA Lets Contract for 91 Miles Additional Wiring

## Oklahoma City Concern Is Low Order On Work Add 120 Miles As Amendment To Wiring Contract

Lamb County Electric Cooperative let a contract Thursday for 91 miles of line for K section, which is on labor only agreement.

According to J. H. Carl, Manager, bids were submitted, and the bid was by Basanda Construction Company of Oklahoma City, in amount of \$20,715.39, which is on labor only agreement.

L Section Added The contract was let the County Electric Cooperative L Section, which calls for 120 miles as an amendment to this contract subject to approval of the Rectification Administration, section.

Work To Start Soon Carl stated that work would start as soon as contracts are approved, possibly in two or three weeks, adding that he "hoped to have the holes set within the next few months."

Need More Wire Also added, "The delivery of wire for this extension is still indefinite. We have one car of wire on the ground, but this only wire about 37 miles. However, we are going ahead, and setting preparatory to wiring it so we will receive additional wire in the near future. We also still have considerable work to do on in securing right of way, permits, and any cooperation from the members on this will be appreciated."

## President of International Ass'n of Lions Clubs



Fred W. Smith, Ventura, California, is the new president of the International Association of Lions Clubs. He was advanced by unanimous vote from the first vice-presidency at the 30th annual convention of the Association which closed in San Francisco, July 31. Smith succeeds Clifford D. Pierce, of Memphis, Tennessee.

The convention concluded the most successful year in the history of Lions International, according to the report made by the Secretary-General and Founder, Melvin Jones, of Chicago, Illinois. He reported the formation of 853 new Lions clubs and the addition of 47,332 men to the roster of the Association in the twelve-months period ending June 30, 1947, for a total of 6,117 clubs and 326,448 members. ADRIAN PELT

A former newspaperman, with 20 years experience in international organization heads U.N.'s largest and most complex Department, the 1500-strong, jack-of-all-trades Department of Conference and General Services.

He is a 55-year-old white-haired native of The Netherlands who has the unusual distinction of having been a top official both in the former League of Nations and, now, in U.N. His name is Adrian Pelt, and his field of activity covers everything from the procurement of typewriter ribbons to the record-breaking remodeling of a former war-plant into the present interim headquarters of U.N. at Lake Success, New York.

Born in Koog-aan-de-Zaan, in the Province of North Holland, in 1892, Mr. Pelt began his career as a journalist when only 17, serving on the editorial staffs of several Amsterdam newspapers and later becoming a foreign correspondent for both Dutch and French newspapers in London. He then served, successively, as editor of several Dutch newspapers and, in 1916, began to prepare himself for his second major field, diplomacy, by enrolling in the Ecole Libre des Sciences Politiques of Paris. He was graduated in 1919.

Mr. Pelt joined the Information Section of the former League of Nations in 1920, soon after the League was founded, and served with distinction until 1934, when he became its Director.

After the German invasion of The Netherlands, Mr. Pelt went to England and organized the Netherlands Government Information Bureau, which he directed until shortly before the defeat of the Nazis by the Allies.

Mr. Pelt attended the San Francisco Conference on International Organization as an alternate delegate from The Netherlands, thus helping to establish what is today the United Nations.

The Assistant Secretary-General for Conference and General Services speaks four languages fluently and has a special interest in history, literature and Dutch - XVII Century painting. He is married to Andree Bernard, an English born Frenchwoman, and is the proud father of four children.

**Dental Service Given to World War II Veterans**

Dental services of the Veterans Administration regional office at Lubbock has announced that it would immediately authorize dental treatment, at VA expense, for World War II veterans with dental deficiencies who have been out of service less than one year.

VA said that dental difficulties of veterans who were discharged less than a year ago are presumed to be service-connected, and treatment in most cases can be automatically authorized without reference to the veteran's medical service record. This saves considerable time and gives the veteran the advantage of much quicker dental care.

It was emphasized, however, that he must, in all cases, secure authorization before going to a local dentist for treatment, otherwise VA cannot pay the bill.

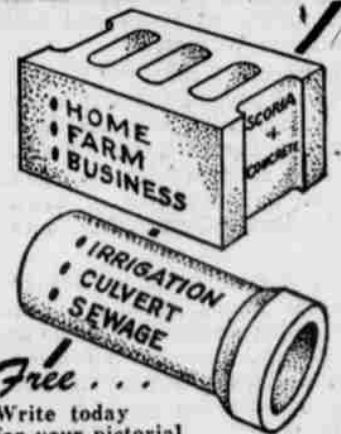
The veteran should indicate his choice of dentist at the time he makes application for treatment. The Veterans administration will, in most cases, authorize treatment by a hometown dentist when the veteran does not reside conveniently to a VA dental clinic. Clinics are located in Amarillo, Lubbock and El Paso. If he has never filed a claim with the VA a certified copy of the veterans' discharge should be included with the application.

Dental care is available to all veterans whose dental deficiencies are the result of service in the armed forces. Any veteran who attributes his dental condition to his military service is privileged to make a claim for treatment.

When applications are filed later than a year after discharge, the claim must be adjudicated and rated on the basis of medical evidence as service-connected before any dental treatment can be authorized. Such claims require a longer time before authorization can be granted than those filed within one year of discharge, VA officials said.

## Wheat Nets Slight Advance; White Corn Also Shows Gain

Cattle, sheep, and cotton netted sharp losses last week, and some southwest farm products found rather dull demand, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Large world requirements strengthened wheat last week, while cool weather unfavorable for corn tended to offset July estimates of increased production. Wheat netted a slight advance, and white corn gained a cent or two. Oats held firm, influenced by scarcity of good grain from the new crop. Offerings from the current harvest of barley and grain sorghums held prices relatively unchanged.

Rice buyers generally awaited the new harvest last week rather than pay prevailing prices. Practically all feeds advanced \$2 to \$10 per ton, and good quality hay held up fairly well. Peanut crops need rain in most southwest areas, but have not suffered much as yet. Scarce fine scoured wools found strong demand.

Late-week cotton losses liquidated early gains, and spot prices closed mostly \$1.00 to \$7.00 lower. Current ginnings in South Texas sold freely in good demand. Quality held up well at mostly strict middling grade.

Liberal to heavy supplies of tomatoes, cantaloups and watermelons found dull trading at most southwest markets. Bulk truckloads of fair quality cantaloups brought 75 cents to \$1.00 per bushel at Ft. Worth late last week. Black Diamond and Cletex watermelons of 35 to 45 pounds average sold mostly at \$1.25 per hundred pounds. Elberta peaches started moving from Arkansas at steady prices.

Good quality candied eggs held fairly firm last week, but lower grades and current receipts met dull demand, and some markets quoted lower prices. Fryers and broilers continue in good demand. Liberal supplies of hens moved slowly, and some went into storage. Prices dropped at Denver early and at Dallas later in the week.

After showing strength on some classes early last week, cattle eased later to close mostly steady to 50 cents or more lower on most classes. Common to medium steers and yearlings sold from \$14 to \$20 at Houston; while medium kinds

### VETERAN'S

#### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. I am a World War II veteran taking a school course that requires three hours per week. Am I entitled to receive subsistence allowance under the G. I. Bill?

A. If you are taking an undergraduate course at a college or university, you are eligible for one-quarter of the full subsistence allowance, but if it is high school or vocational school course of less than 6 hours per week, you are not eligible for any subsistence allowance.

Q. I am a veteran-amputee, am I entitled to a service card and what is the limit on repair service costs allowed?

A. Yes, if you are a veteran wearing an artificial limb, you are entitled to repairs at government expense and may obtain a Prosthetic

Service Card. This card enables veterans to get immediate repair service up to \$35 without prior approval from the Veterans Administration.

Q. I am a disabled veteran and have completed my on-the-job training course, but have not been able to get a job. Am I entitled to receive unemployment compensation under the G. I. Bill?

A. Yes. The Servicemen's Readjustment Act (G. I. Bill) provides that you can draw adjusted unemployment compensation up to a maximum of 52 weeks, provided that you are able and available for work at the time. The number of weeks of readjustment allowance payable to you is determined by the length of your service. The service must have been 90 days or more between Sept. 16, 1940 and the end of World War II.

Q. As a World War I veteran with a nonservice-connected disability, which does not permit me to work regularly, am I entitled to a pension?

A. Your only pension relief is through the law which gives you the right to a pension of \$60 per month, provided you are permanently and totally disabled and unable to follow a substantially gainful occupation. This pension is not payable if

your income exceeds \$1,000 if single, or \$2,500 if married or with minor children.

Q. I have a blue discharge from the Army. Am I entitled to any of the benefits under the G. I. Bill?

A. If you have other than an honorable discharge, you may request Veterans Administration to review the circumstances under which it was issued. If it is found that your discharge was issued under conditions other than dishonorable, you will be eligible for benefits under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act (G. I. Bill).

Q. I am an American Indian and a World War II veteran. Am I eligible for a G. I. Loan?

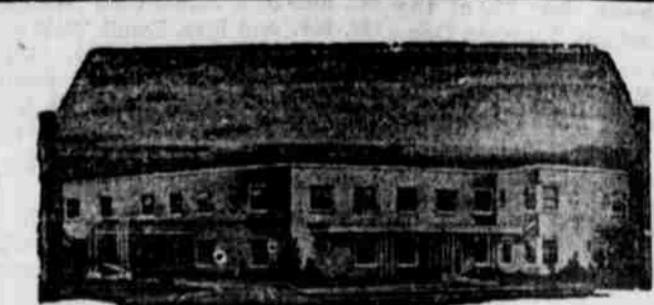
A. Yes, but it must be on property you own or plan to own outside the reservation. You cannot secure a G. I. loan to build a home on tribal land.

Q. Will Veterans Administration accept collect telephone calls made by physicians who wish to ascertain whether they will be paid for emergency treatments given veterans?

A. Yes.

Q. I am a World I veteran and I was married in June, 1945. Is my wife entitled to receive a pension when I die?

A. A widow of a World War I veteran is entitled to receive a pension if she was married to the veteran before Dec. 14, 1944, or 10 or more years. Consequently your wife would not be eligible for a pension if you died less than 10 years after your marriage.

## U. S. Army News

### Texas Capital 10,000th Officer Commissioned in National Guard

Captain Joseph O. Harlan, an attorney in Amarillo, Texas, is the 10,000th National Guard officer to be granted Federal recognition. A veteran of both the North African and Far East theaters of operation in World War II, the 34 year old Captain will serve as intelligence officer for the 2nd Battalion, 142nd Infantry, 36th Division of the Texas National Guard. He resides at 4014 Hayden Street, Amarillo, with his wife and mother.

### War Crimes Investigators Vacancies Are Filled

The War Department announced today that all position vacancies for commissioned personnel to serve as war crimes investigators have been filled. Consequently, applications from persons desiring either direct appointment in the Army of United States or recall to active duty as war crimes investigators are no longer being accepted.

### New Arctic Troop Shelter

A pre-fabricated temporary Arctic shelter for troops, capable of providing an interior temperature of 70 degrees Fahrenheit while the outside thermometer reads 70 degrees below zero, and also capable of withstanding the impact of 125 mile-an-hour wind, is being designed by the Corps of Engineers. Present plans call for a building light enough in weight to be transported by airplane or glider and so simple in construction that it can be erected quickly by unskilled men wearing Arctic clothing, including gloves.

### Summer Training For National Guard Troops

Approximately 80,000 National Guard troops will receive summer training this year, the first time training has been held since 1940, it has been announced by General Jacob L. Devers, commanding general, Army Ground Forces.

### Southern Guard Units May Carry Battle Streamers of 1861-65

The sons of those who fought on the Southern side in the War Between the States will carry battle streamers in memory of the battles in which their fathers fought, if congress passes legislation introduced by Senator Tydings of Maryland. "Authorization for the battle streamers would give visual evidence of the traditions of these Southern regiments which now join with the National Guard of all the States in making this country strong and secure," Major General Butler B. Miltonberger, chief of the National Guard Bureau, said in approving the bill.

The War Department has announced that General Wainwright will doff his uniform on August 31, 1947 and General Handy will assume command the following day.

## Banks To Cash GI Terminal Leave Bonds

The Treasury Department Thursday completed arrangements for banks throughout the country to cash GI terminal leave bonds beginning Sept. 2.

It said banks have been "specially cautioned against cashing the bonds for anyone other than the person whose name is inscribed on the bond".

To protect the bond owners, it also has "asked that banks require presentation of original discharge or separation papers as a means of identification".

In cases where the original papers are not available, banks have been asked to "exercise extra care and diligence to see that the right person gets the money", the treasury announced.

The banks will not charge the veterans for cashing the securities. The Treasury will pay the institution small fees, varying according to the volume of bonds handled.

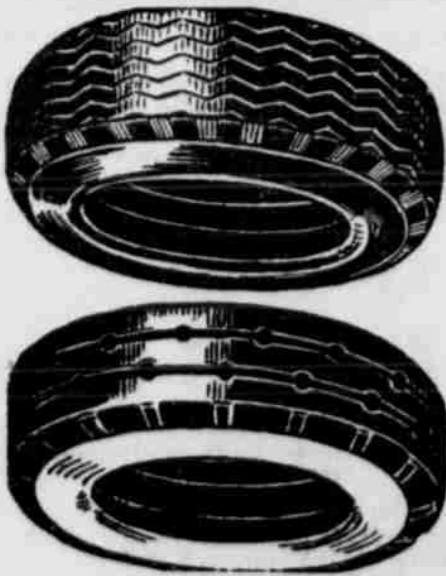

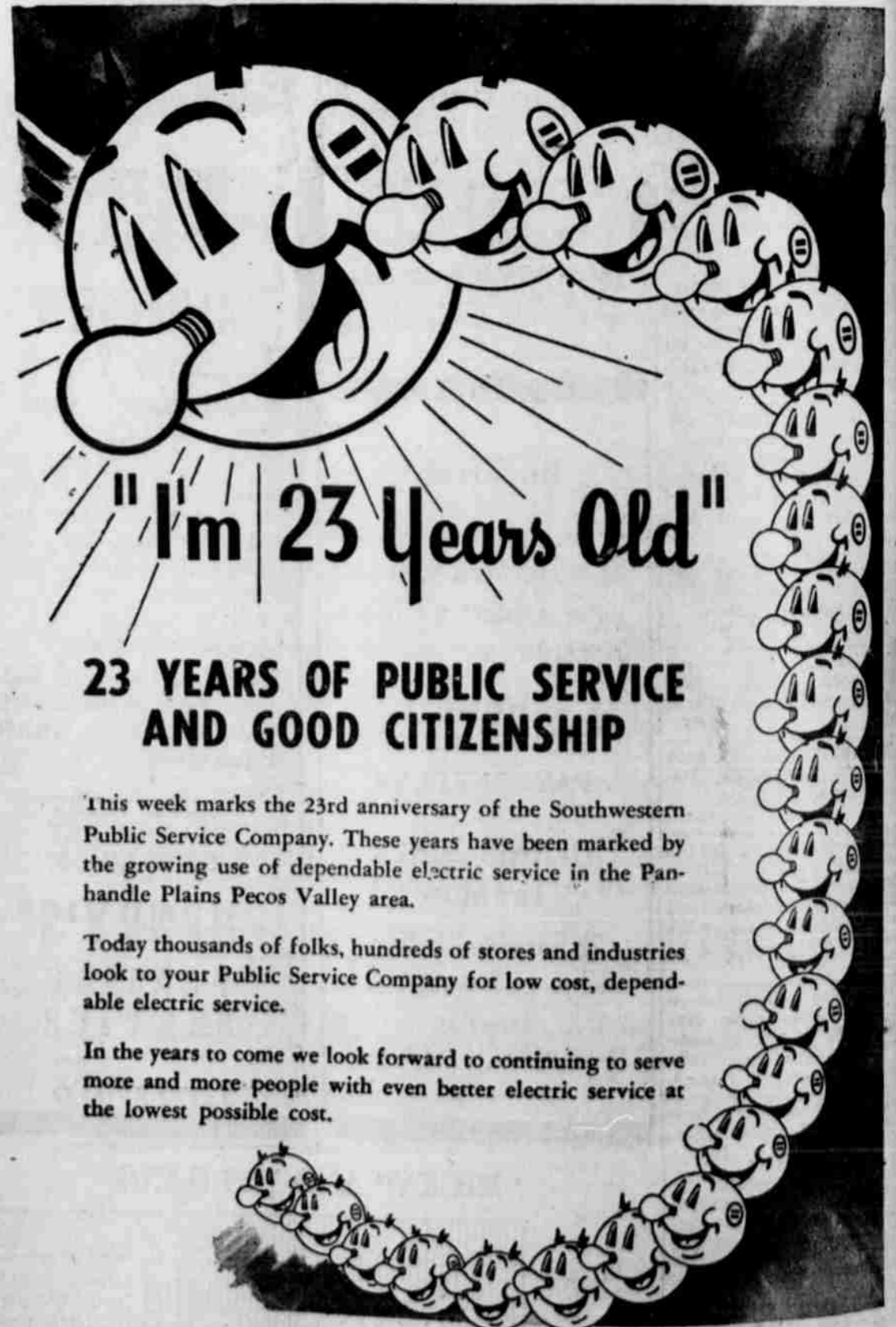

### Unemployed Seamen May Receive Insurance

Unemployed seamen who worked for the Shipping Administration during the past 18 months may receive unemployment insurance through the Texas Employment Commission, J. D. Jordan, manager of the Littlefield office said today. The new reversion unemployment program for seamen begins on Monday, July 21 and will extend for the next two years, Jordan said. It is financed through federal funds and administered by the state employment security agencies. Jordan said that some 800 Texas seamen were currently out of work and registered for berths with union

hiring halls. He estimated that upwards to 5,000 Texans who served on government ships during the war might be eligible for unemployment insurance under this program. Claims should be filed promptly at the local office at Littlefield, Jordan said, since seamen who have been beached for some time may find their rights to benefits due to expire soon. Seamen filing a claim should bring his identification papers with him to help speed payment of benefits. These identification papers may be discharge papers, union registration cards, U. S. Merchant Mariner's Document or Merchant Seamen's Certificate of Identification. To be eligible for unemployment compensation, an unemployed merchant seaman must have worked on a ship operated by the War Shipping Administration during the

past 18 months and register for work with the Texas State Employment Service, Jordan said. If no suitable job can be found for him in the area with his reversion, he may receive reversion benefits under this program on the same scale as other unemployed workers in Texas, Jordan stated. If wages have been earned in other jobs covered by state unemployment insurance laws, these wages may be combined for credit with the wages he earned in Federal maritime employment. Unemployment compensation insurance for maritime workers has been authorized under the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act since January, 1946, and this two year federal program will serve as an interim measure until sufficient wage credits have been built up in shipping establishments to handle the program.
