This extension will reach from the north part of the county into Castro county, energizing 211 additional homes in Lamb, and 15 in Castro.

Mr. Carl states that materials have begun to arrive at this office, and the work will probably be under way by early summer.

hydration plant. The plant will be ready for opera-tion by about April, 1948. The Santa Fe has also agreed to put in a switch to the plant when it is needed. The dehydration plant will have a capaciof 512 tons per tons per hour. The company wants to enter into con-tract with farmers for 1,000 acres of of Anton, have purchased a tract of alfalfa within a five-mile radius of land, 200x630 feet from W. Stacy, Anton. This territory now has 133 wells in operation.

Mr. Frederiksen stated that farmers should now begin to make preparation to plant alfalfa. Barley may be grown on the land and harvested before the alfalfa is planted, he said.

This plant is an industry that Anton has been needing since the development of irrigation. The company does not expect the farmers to do anything except grow the alfalfa and take the money, as the dehydra-tion company goes out and cuts the alfalfa and hauls it in. About twelve men will be employed in the operation of the plant.




