Soil Building Practices Approved For Lamb County

Prior Approval of County Group Must be Obtained

Performance Must Be Reported Before Expiration Date

Below is a list of Soil-Building Practices approved for Lamb County for 1947. Producers should bear in mind that in order to obtain payment for practices carried out under the 1947 Program they must obtain PRIOR APPROVAL of the county committee before the practice is begun, and performance must be reported before the expiration date shown on the prior approval.

1. Construction of Terraces for which proper outlets are provided.
2. Construction of Diversion Terraces.
3. Leveling for irrigation land for which water is available.
4. Reorganization of a permanent farm irrigation system.
5. Drilling or digging wells for livestock water.
6. Contour furrowing noncrop pasture and range land.
7. Deep plowing of sandy cropland to prevent wind erosion—land must be flat broke—Listing will not qualify.
8. Protecting summer fallowed acreage—Prior approval must be obtained before May 1, 1947.
9. Contour listing or furrowing of cropland or land planted to crops in 1947.
10. Contour farming intertilled crops.
11. Contour farming drilled crops.
12. Leaving on the land as a protection against wind erosion the stubs or stubbles of sorghums or millet.
13. Mowing establishing permanent pastures by seeding perennial pasture grasses.
14. Establishing or improving permanent pastures by seeding adapted pasture grasses, pasture legumes, or mixtures of grasses and legumes.
15. Plowing fireguards on non-crop open pasture or range land.
16. Harvesting legume and grass seed.
17. Establishing a satisfactory cover of winter legumes seeded in the fall of 1946.
18. Growing a green manure or cover crop of summer legumes.
19. Application of potash and phosphate other than raw rock phosphate.
20. Control of bindweed.

A list of practices that will be carried out by producers early in the year will be mailed to each producer in the county within a few days. Each producer receiving this list is requested to carefully study the practices and check the extent of each practice listed which he plans to carry out and bring this to the county office at an early date.

A list of practices not contained in the producer letter will be mailed to producers at a later date, prior to the carrying out of those practices in the county.

Worksheets for the 1947 AAA Program have been received in the county office and are ready to be signed by producers.

Area Organizes To Fight Irrigation Control Bill

W. O. Fortenberry of Monroe, Texas, President of the High Plains Water Use & Conservation association, left for Austin Saturday last in the interests of the High Plains Water, Use and Conservation association.

This association was formed in Plainview Saturday, Dec. 28, for the purpose of opposing the proration of irrigation water in the Permian basin.

At the regional meeting at Plainview, a Board of Directors was elected, composed of President of each County organization, one elected member, and an alternate.

Mr. Fortenberry, who was named President of the association, is also head of the Lubbock County Water Conservation association, one of 14 or more similar local groups joining efforts to fight proposed legislation to control or regulate underground water. Jess Osborn of Muleshoe was named Secretary-Treasurer of the association.

Gus Parrish of Springlake, president of the Lamb County Water Conservation association, was elected a director on the executive board.

The delegation representing Lamb County at the regional meeting included, besides Parrish, T. J.

McFarland, secretary - treasurer of the Lamb County Water Conservation association; Harvey Lee, Arthur Duggan, Jr., Ed Fowler, Ivan Fowler, A. H. McFarland, E. C. Clayton and A. B. Brown.

Following a request from the floor, Duggan, introduced as one who has seen a copy of the proposed control bill, said the measure provides among other things for setting up of water by the state board, and wells would be allowed only on the permit system. Duggan sees in the plan eventual taking over completely by the state of water rights and "sale of these rights" to those who already own the property.

L. A. Howard of Lubbock, who has attended 14 county organization meetings since formation of the first local unit in Lubbock county, warned the group that "control machinery is set and well greased and we must kill this proposal before it reaches the legislative floor, or we are gone." He insisted, along with many others, that immediate action must be taken in an effort to block the proposal.

The group at the Plainview meeting was in unanimous agreement with explanations by officials, to the effect that the organization is not opposing water controls if such

be found necessary. They contend that findings by the state board of water engineers show a definite rise in the water level on the plains the last two years, and they oppose any form of state control unless and until the water level is endangered. When this happens, they agreed, the association will be the first to insist on some form of control.

This Board of Directors met on December 30, and elected as their representatives to attend the Texas State Legislature, which begins its spring session January 14, Mr. Fortenberry of Monroe, Texas; J. H. Lee of Littlefield, and Capt. Holbrook of Plainview.

Arthur P. Duggan, Jr. has named to represent the High Plains Water, Use and Conservation association as attorney, and will leave at an early date for Austin in connection with this matter.

Inasmuch as the above proposed bill for proration of irrigation water, cuts down irrigation to the pumping of a certain amount of water per week, the farmers of this area are concerned with it, and it is reported much opposed to it.

Mr. Fortenberry is also President of the Texas Cotton Ginners' Association.

Work Expected to Get Underway By Early Summer

Reports Indicate 1838 Units As of January 1, 1947

J. H. Carl, manager for the Lamb County Rural Electric Cooperative, is in receipt of a telegram from the Application & Loan division of the R. E. A. in Washington to the effect that \$170,000.00 will be available within ninety days for the extension of 120 miles of approved lines.

This extension will reach from the north part of the county into Castro county, energizing 211 additional homes in Lamb, and 15 in Castro.

Mr. Carl states that materials have begun to arrive at this office, and the work will probably be under way by early summer.

Despite the severe shortages that still exists in wire, transformers, poles and many other items needed in building rural power lines, the Lamb County Rural Electric Cooperative has made steady progress in carrying this program into the rural areas as shown by the figures the past two years.

On January 1st, 1945, there were 1207 units served from this office, with 500 miles of line, as compared with 1487 units 600 miles on Jan. 1, 1946. And a greater increase is shown when Mr. Carl states that on January 1, 1947 there are 1838 units with 972 miles extensions.

Plans are underway to complete 231 additional miles' extension by January 1, 1948.

Ten Below Zero Recorded Here

The lowest temperature in many years was recorded here Friday at between 3 and 9 a. m., when 10 below zero was registered at the West Texas Gas Company's station. However, with continued rising temperatures since Sunday the highways through the South Plains area have become cleared for safer driving, and the inconvenience brought about by the frozen water pipes and stock tanks has been eased up somewhat by the thaw.

With the estimated eight inches of snow throughout the area, the benefit brought to the cotton and wheat farmers, and farming in general is inestimable. According to the West Texas Cottonoil Mill gauge, this area received about half an inch of moisture during the past week.

Snow, which began falling again about 10 a. m. Wednesday turned into rain, which fell throughout Wednesday, adding additional moisture.

Temperatures for the past week are as follows; Thursday, low 2-12 degrees below zero; high 26 above; Friday low, 10 below zero, and high 18 above; Saturday, low 2 above zero and high 16 above; Sunday low 18 degrees above zero, and high 40; Monday, low 24 and high 48; Tuesday, low 30 and high 46; Wednesday, low 30 and high 36.

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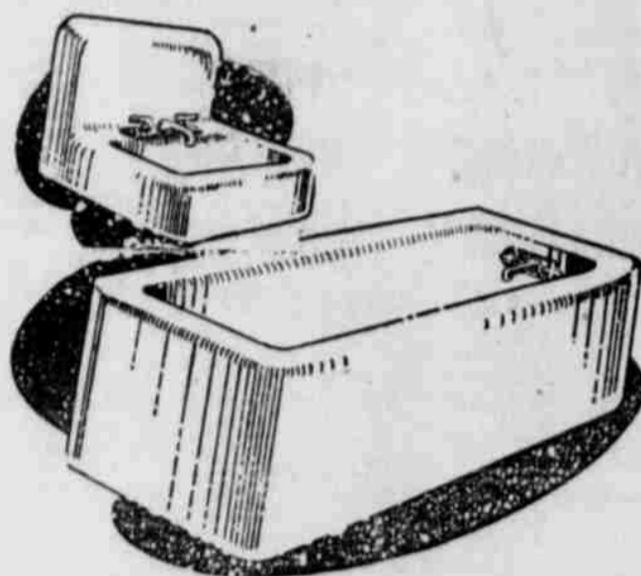

hydration plant.

The plant will be ready for operation by about April, 1948. The Santa Fe has also agreed to put in a switch to the plant when it is needed. The dehydration plant will have a capacity of 5 1/2 tons per hour. The company wants to enter into contract with farmers for 1,000 acres of alfalfa within a five-mile radius of Anton. This territory now has 133 wells in operation.

Mr. Frederiksen stated that farmers should now begin to make preparation to plant alfalfa. Barley may be grown on the land and harvested before the alfalfa is planted, he said.

This plant is an industry that Anton has been needing since the development of irrigation. The company does not expect the farmers to do anything except grow the alfalfa and take the money, as the dehydration company goes out and cuts the alfalfa and hauls it in. About twelve men will be employed in the operation of the plant.

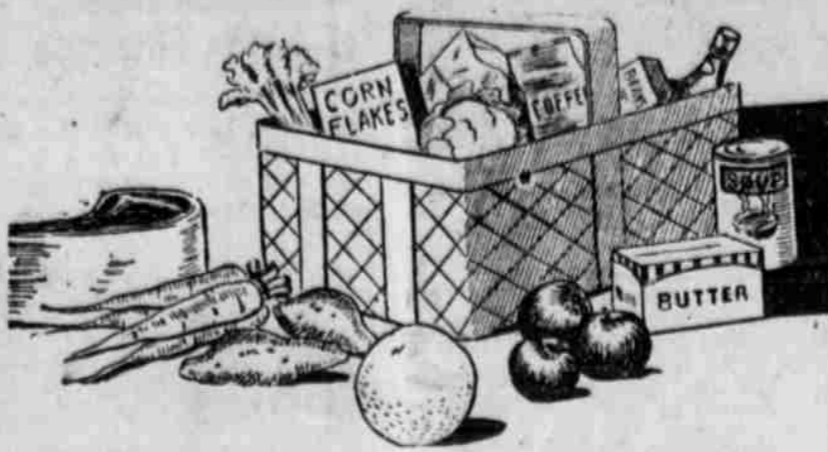
