Texas Heritage Observance Held By Anton Study Club

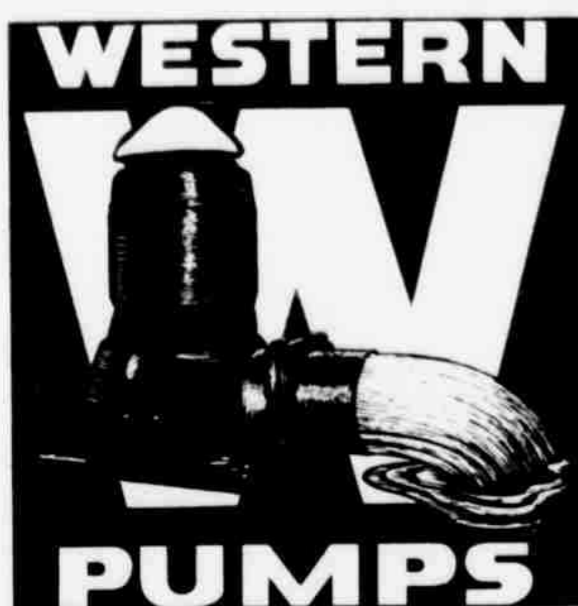

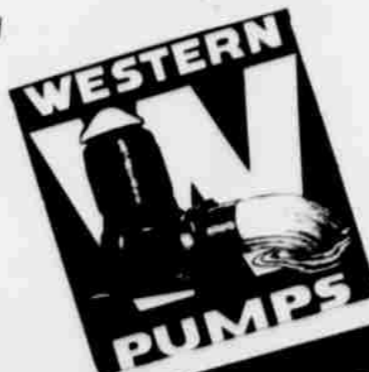

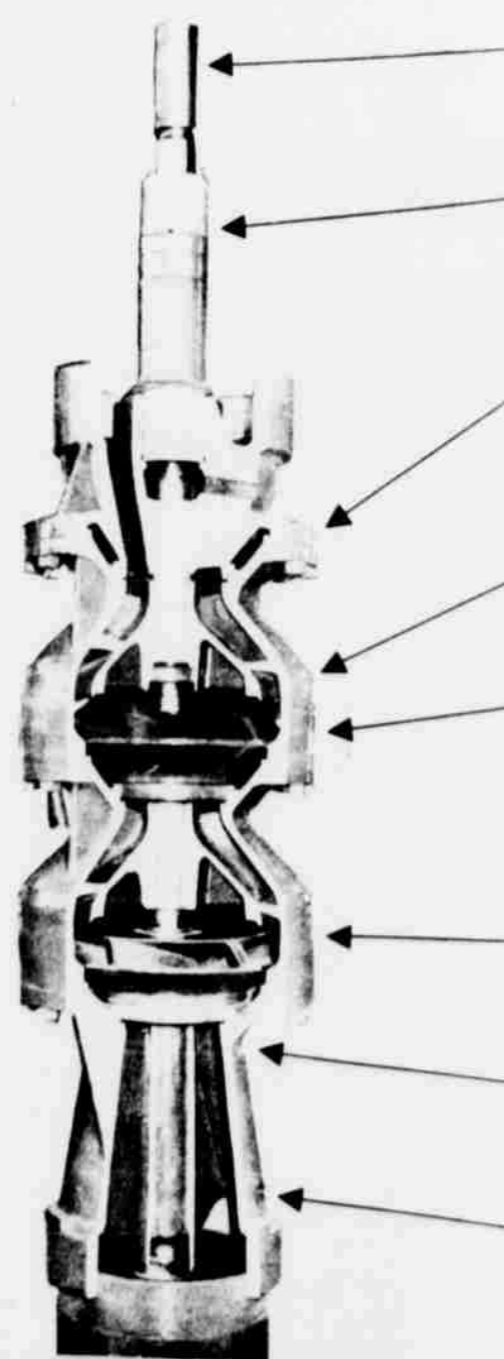

IMPELLER SHAFT

Large diameter stainless steel impeller shaft is precision turned and ground to provide maximum life and durability.

TUBE ADAPTER

Standard assembly provides extra long tubing connection of heavy steel tubing and bronze bearings provide rigid support for top end of impeller shaft.

DISCHARGE MANIFOLD

Discharge manifold contains extra long bronze bearings for runner shaft. It is cast of fine grained gray iron and has two cored bleeder ports to relieve pressure in the tube-line.

SEAL UNIT

Special seal unit in top bowl prevents sand and water from entering top bearing and tube during pumping.

IMPELLERS

Deluxe impellers are fully enclosed and are designed with an extra long neck to eliminate need for critical lateral adjustment. They are cast of bronze, iron or other special alloys and may be given a porcelain-enamel surface treatment to meet special pumping conditions.

EFFICIENT BOWL DESIGN

Bowls are cast of fine grained gray iron and machined by skillful craftsmen to insure smooth operation and proper flow of water.

TAPERED IMPELLER COLLETS

Impellers are securely mounted on shaft by means of special split steel tapered collets. Thus there are no key-ways in the shaft.

SUCTION MANIFOLD

Extra long bearings have been placed in the suction manifold. A large grease chamber is factory packed with non-soluble lubricant to last the life of the pump. A sand cap is located in the upper end of the manifold, preventing sand and other foreign material from entering the bearings and grease chamber.
