Be Held At 4 O'Clock This Afternoon (Thurs.)

The citizenship of Littlefield were shocked and grieved to learn of the sudden death of Mayor Homer Hall, 60, about 6 o'clock Tuesday morning at his home here.

Mayor Hall had suffered for sometime, at intervals, from stomach ailment. Late Monday night he had felt ill, and had gone, accompanied by Mrs. Hall, to the Payne-Shotwell Hospital, where he had consulted with Dr. C. E. Payne. Disregarding Dr. Payne's advice to stay in the hospital, Mayor Hall re-turned home, but according to the family, only rested fitfully for the balance of the night. About 6 a. m. he arose and dressed preparatory to going to his grocery establishment, the Hall's Grocery and Market, and sat down to listen to the early morning radio broadcast, when he slumped over helpless in the chair. His physician was summoned, but he had passed away before Dr. Payne arrived. A heart ailment is given as the cause of his death.

Mayor Hall was born February 4, 1884. He married Miss Belle Turner at Cartage, Texas, on July 12, 1901.



### **Cottonseed An Essential** Food And Feed Crop

Cottonseed makes cotton an essential food and feed crop and one of the most important economic assets for Texas and the nation, speakers told the final session of the Cotton Research Congress, sponsored by the State-Wide Cotton Committee of Texas, at Dallas on July 14.

"It is a recognized fact that cottonseed meal has been and is today the cheapest and best protein concentrate for livestock in Texas," said E. R. Eudaly, Texas Extension Dairyman. "The roughages in Texas in most cases are too low in phosphorus to meet the needs of our livestock. Cottonseed meal is high in phosphorus. Therefore, cottonseed meal serves a two-fold purpose by furnishing a good, cheap source of protein and phosphorus.'

Pointing out that the 1943 cottonseed crop brought Texas farmers \$47,877,000 cash income, T. H. Hughston, oil mill manager at McKinney, told the Congress that this was more than twice as much revenue as was received from all of the grapefruit raised in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, seven million dollars more than the combined cash income from all feed grains and hays, twice as great as the income from peanuts, and four hundred and twenty-four times as much cash as farmers received last season from Texas-grown soy-

Hughston said that Texas cottonseed, alone, brought more cash to growers last year than all crops produced in any one of the following states: West Virginia, Deleware, Vermont, Wyoming, New Hampshire, Utah, New Mexico, Connecticut, Nevada or Rhode Island.

In employment, expenditures for materials and services rendered to farmers and livestock producers, over 140 operating cotton oil mills rank as one of the major industries of Texas, and are major assets to the 120 Texas towns and cities in which they are located.

Stressing the national importance of cottonseed as a leading source of fat essential in the human diet, A. G. Hopkins, president of a cottonseed oil food manufacturing plant at Sherman, discussed the future significance of cottonseed oil in food production.

A. Cecil Wamble, College Station, cottonseed research director for the Cotton Research Committee of Texas, brought out the importance of research in developing new uses for cottonseed products and extending present uses in a paper, "What Research Is Doing For Cottonseed."

Cotton growers, ginners, oil millers, merchants and other members of the cotton industry, representatives of educational institutions and business and civic leaders from Texas and other states attended the two-day meeting.






