

Lieut. Allan E. Winston Missing Over France

Lot of P-38
Twin-Engine
Fighter-Bomber

Believed To Have
Been Engaged In
Cherbourg Conquest

Lieut. Allan D. Winston, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Winston of Littlefield, is reported missing in action since the 25th of June over France, according to a telegram received by his parents from the War Department Thursday morning last. The message further stated that further details or other information are received, you will be promptly notified.

Lieut. Winston has been in the service since February 4, 1943; was assigned to a P-38 Twin Engine Single engine fighter-bomber plane, receiving his commission at Williams Field, Phoenix, Ariz., on December 5, 1942, previous to which he received training at Cal-Aero Field, Ontario, Calif., and Gardner Field, near Berkeley, Calif.

Lieut. Winston had only been in the service since April 8. His parents received a cablegram from him on April 12, notifying them of his assignment to a fighter bomber, Lieut. Winston was attached to the 9th Fighter Force, which is said to have been created to go with and support the Army. The American troops (Continued on Back Page)

Some Local Races 'Hot'; Office Holders Are Unopposed In Others

In the offices of District Attorney, County Judge, County Attorney, Clerk of the District Court, Assessor-Collector, and County Treasurer, Harold LaFont, I. B. Holt, E. S. Rowe, Herbert Dunn, Frank Cummings, and Mrs. Ann Blythe have no opposition.

For the County Clerk office there are three candidates: Roy Granbery, B. B. Ivie and Treva Jennings.

In the Sheriff's race Sheriff Sam Hutson is being opposed by G. M. (Mack) Vann.

In the County Commissioners' race, H. A. Hysinger, Commissioner Precinct No. 1; Sam Cearley, Commissioner Precinct No. 2; and E. L. Yarbrough, commissioner Precinct No. 4, have no opposition.

W. C. (Buck) Ross is opposing E. E. Bentley, now in office.

S. J. Farquhar, Justice of the Peace of Precinct No. 4, and Robert Wilson, Constable Precinct No. 4, have no opposition.

\$500 Realized From United Shows

As announced by Arbie Joplin, Commander of the local Unit of American Legion, approximately \$500 was realized from the Greater United Shows, whose visit here last week was sponsored by the Legion.

In this connection Mr. Joplin said: "We intend to use this to pay a service officer to take care of claims of disabled men being discharged and coming back to Lamb County. Our intention is to pay some man until we can make arrangements with the County to handle it. Eventually, it is the plan to have a disabled man take over this work, but the law would have to be changed before that could be done, and a World War 2 man could be employed. To hold such a job a man would have to serve as Post Service Officer two years, and we don't have a man available at the present time. However, we think we can get that law changed, for it is obsolete at this time."

The remains were shipped to Blue Hill, Nebr., leaving Amarillo Tuesday morning by train. Details as to funeral services and burial were not available.

Deceased was survived by his parents of Blue Hill, Nebr., and a daughter of Kansas City, Mo.

Lamb County residents will vote in the Democratic Primary election Saturday, July 22.

The polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

It is reported that there are 4189 poll taxes paid, including exemptions.

Little interest has been shown in politics until the past two or three weeks, when considerably more concern is being manifest, and it is expected that as the time of election draws near, more interest will be shown.

County Precinct Chairman Otto Jones urges the taxpayers to all take time out to vote, pointing out that it is an American privilege, and one that should be taken advantage of, so that the choice of the majority of the people may be indicated and the election carried out on that basis.

In Littlefield voting will take place at the Methodist church, where Arthur Jones will be judge; and at the primary school building, where L. C. Hewitt will be in charge.

Mr. Jones announced that considerable absentee voting was taking place; that many absent from the county in the wheat harvest fields, were sending in absentee ballots.

Passes Away Result Of Heart Ailment 6 A. M. Tuesday

Funeral Services To
Be Held At 4 O'Clock
This Afternoon (Thurs.)

The citizenship of Littlefield were shocked and grieved to learn of the sudden death of Mayor Homer Hall, 60, about 6 o'clock Tuesday morning at his home here.

Mayor Hall had suffered for sometime, at intervals, from a stomach ailment. Late Monday night he had felt ill, and had gone, accompanied by Mrs. Hall, to the Payne-Shotwell Hospital, where he had consulted with Dr. C. E. Payne. Disregarding Dr. Payne's advice to stay in the hospital, Mayor Hall returned home, but according to the family, only rested fitfully for the balance of the night. About 6 a. m. he arose and dressed preparatory to going to his grocery establishment, the Hall's Grocery and Market, and sat down to listen to the early morning radio broadcast, when he slumped over helpless in the chair. His physician was summoned, but he had passed away before Dr. Payne arrived. A heart ailment is given as the cause of his death.

Mayor Hall was born February 4, 1884. He married Miss Belle Turner at Cartage, Texas, on July 12, 1901.

To this union were born seven children, four sons and three daughters, one of whom, a daughter, passed away at the age of two years.

Mr. and Mrs. Hall located at Henderson, Texas, where Mr. Hall operated a general mercantile business, and where the family made their home for several years, later moving to Cottle County, near Paducah, where Mr. Hall operated a general dry goods and grocery store for about 11 years. The Hall family then moved to Slaton, where they made their home and operated a general mercantile store until 1927, when they located in Littlefield, where they have continued to make their home, and where he has continuously carried on the Hall Grocery & Market, with the assistance of his son, Jake.

Mr. Hall had served as mayor for the past five years, taking office April 15, 1939. Prior to that time he served as City Commissioner on two occasions: the first time from April 11, 1931, for one term and until April 10, 1933; and later from April 19, 1937, until he took office as Mayor on April 15, 1939.

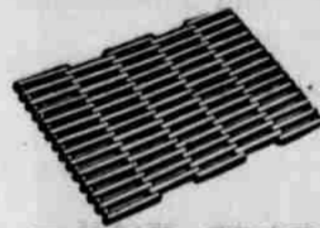

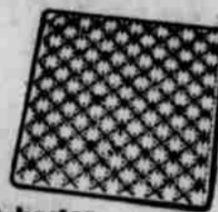

were about to take Cherbourg on June 25, and it is believed to have been in this area that Lieut. Winston is missing.

In an interview with the boy's mother Saturday she stated that in the last four letters they had received from him that he reported very narrow escapes. While stationed at Santa Maria, Calif., last January he miraculously escaped death when his plane was in collision with a Marine Corsair plane at an altitude of about 7000 feet. Both planes exploded and the Marine was killed instantly. At that time Lieut. Winston escaped with slight burns to his eyes and was able to parachute to safety, landing on the high spot in the middle of a swamp.

Lieut. Winston was one of the first group of Littlefield business men to take up flying here, and had been operating a plane from the local field several months when he entered the U. S. Air Corps.

The Winston family are feeling very optimistic about the report of Lieut. Winston being missing, and still believe they will hear that he had been grounded, and worked his way back to his base, or that he is a prisoner of the Germans.

Lieut. Winston, since being overseas, had been awarded the Air Medal with one Oak Leaf Cluster, and two Stars to his ETO ribbon, signifying that he had participated in the fight before the invasion, and also taken part in the invasion itself.

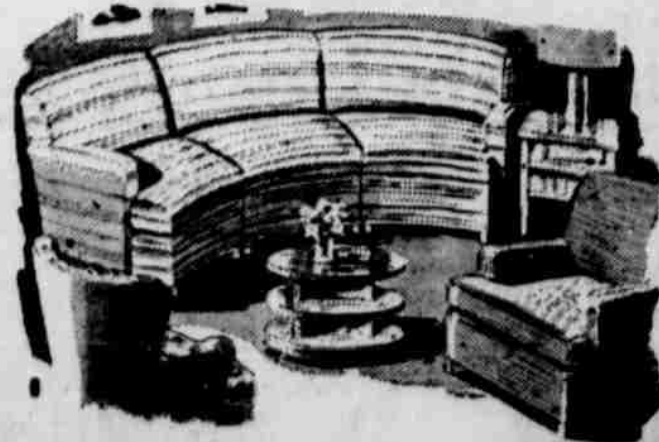

Cottonseed An Essential Food And Feed Crop

Cottonseed makes cotton an essential food and feed crop and one of the most important economic assets for Texas and the nation, speakers told the final session of the Cotton Research Congress, sponsored by the State-Wide Cotton Committee of Texas, at Dallas on July 14.

"It is a recognized fact that cottonseed meal has been and is today the cheapest and best protein concentrate for livestock in Texas," said E. R. Eudaly, Texas Extension Dairyman. "The roughages in Texas in most cases are too low in phosphorus to meet the needs of our livestock. Cottonseed meal is high in phosphorus. Therefore, cottonseed meal serves a two-fold purpose by furnishing a good, cheap source of protein and phosphorus."

Pointing out that the 1943 cottonseed crop brought Texas farmers \$47,877,000 cash income, T. H. Hughston, oil mill manager at McKinney, told the Congress that this was more than twice as much revenue as was received from all of the grapefruit raised in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, seven million dollars more than the combined cash income from all feed grains and hays, twice as great as the income from peanuts, and four hundred and twenty-four times as much cash as farmers received last season from Texas-grown soy-

beans. Hughston said that Texas cottonseed, alone, brought more cash to growers last year than all crops produced in any one of the following states: West Virginia, Delaware, Vermont, Wyoming, New Hampshire, Utah, New Mexico, Connecticut, Nevada or Rhode Island. In employment, expenditures for materials and services rendered to farmers and livestock producers, over 140 operating cotton oil mills rank as one of the major industries of Texas, and are major assets to the 120 Texas towns and cities in which they are located. Stressing the national importance of cottonseed as a leading source of fat essential in the human diet, A. G. Hopkins, president of a cottonseed oil food manufacturing plant at Sherman, discussed the future significance of cottonseed oil in food production. A. Cecil Wamble, College Station, cottonseed research director for the Cotton Research Committee of Texas, brought out the importance of research in developing new uses for cottonseed products and extending present uses in a paper, "What Research Is Doing For Cottonseed."

Cotton growers, ginners, oil millers, merchants and other members of the cotton industry, representatives of educational institutions and business and civic leaders from Texas and other states attended the two-day meeting.
