Lamb County cotton farmers faced a brighter future this week, potentially richer by an estimated minimum of a half million dollars.

This prospect was brought about by a sharp increase in cotton prices following the action of the United States Department of Agriculture in boosting its emergency quotas on cotton exports.

The 62 per cent boost to make a new quota total of 3,496,000 bakes for the eight-month period ending next March 31 brought an immediate leap in cotton prices ranging from \$3.50 to \$10 a bale. **Reach Highest Peak**

Following the announcement by Secretary Brannan cotton futures reached their highest level in his. tory at the New Orleans exchange, passing the 42 cent mark for March contracts, and in some of the Texas spot cotton markets prices rose to the \$10 limit.

The potential increased return on Lamb county's estimated 75,000bale cotton crop may well reach the half-million mark if the price advance reaches and remains at 17 or more, County Agent D. F. Maton said.

The export controls were set up last month when this year's unusually small crop created a tight cotton supply situation. When announced, the controls were described as a means of preventing runaway prices and forestalling prices controls.
