## County Growers Gain Set At Half Million

This prospect was brought about by a sharp increase in cotton prices following the action of the United States Department of Agriculture in boosting its emergency quotas on cotton exports.

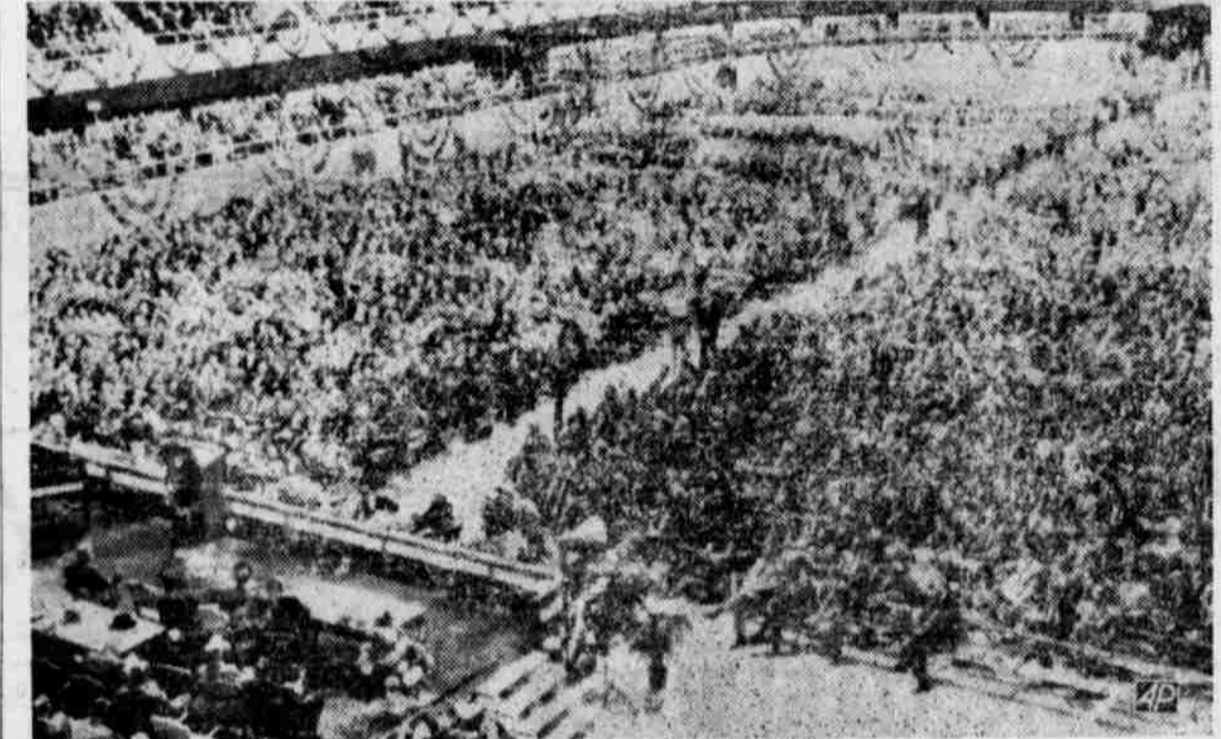

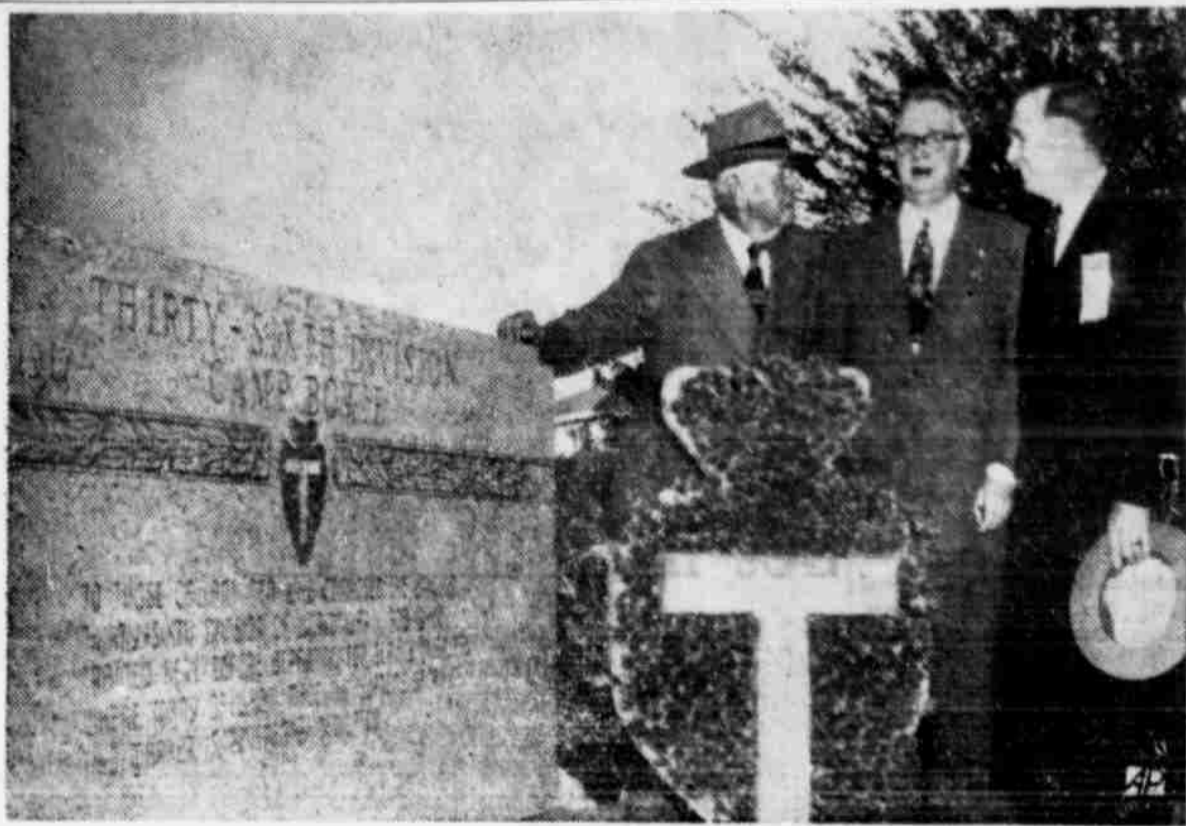

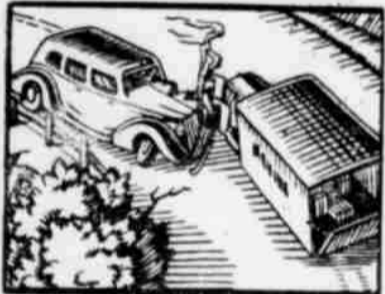

## Marines Seeking Former Corpsmen

DALLAS, Texas—Maj. Edward L. Bale Jr., officer in charge of the Dallas Marine recruiting office, has announced his office has received instructions which permit the reenlistment in U. S. Marine Corps Reserve, in grades up to and including the rank of sergeant for assignment to immediate active duty, in the cases of ex-marines.

By **TEX EASLEY** (Special Washington Service) WASHINGTON.—A Texas couple set up a Mexican restaurant at many of their customers' homes at eating Latin-American delicacies. The operators of Mexican restaurants in San Antonio and Texas, Mr. and Mrs. Edgar L. came to Washington a few days ago at the suggestion of some congressmen.

They said they found no place in the nation's capital where complete Mexican dinners were served. The nearest spot where Texas, New Mexicans, Californians and Latin-American embassy folks could get such food was nearly 20 miles away in Maryland.

**Many Can't Take It** "These are our regular customers," says Whitley, "but the ones we get a kick out of are the people from back East who never ate

anything hotter than an onion.

"Take the poor drunk who came in and ordered a meal. After a bit we discovered the fellow in tears, sitting there finishing up a bowl of pecosa, that hot pepper sauce we serve only for seasoning. He thought it was soup."

The Public Roads Administration reports that as of Sept. 30, there was 1,442 miles of federal-aid highway construction under way in Texas. Although this was the most mileage of any state, the 53,513,000 (M)

SYDNEY — (AP) — Melbourne, Australia's second city, had only a skeleton crew fire-fighting for 15 days of October, but did not have a serious fire. The 520 firemen of the city of 1,200,000 people were on strike. Only 76 fire brigade officers were on duty.

The strike was over a new press button alarm system which called for a button in fire brigade stations to be pressed at intervals. The firemen went back to work after an arbiter was appointed to determine the rights and wrongs of the "press button" dispute.

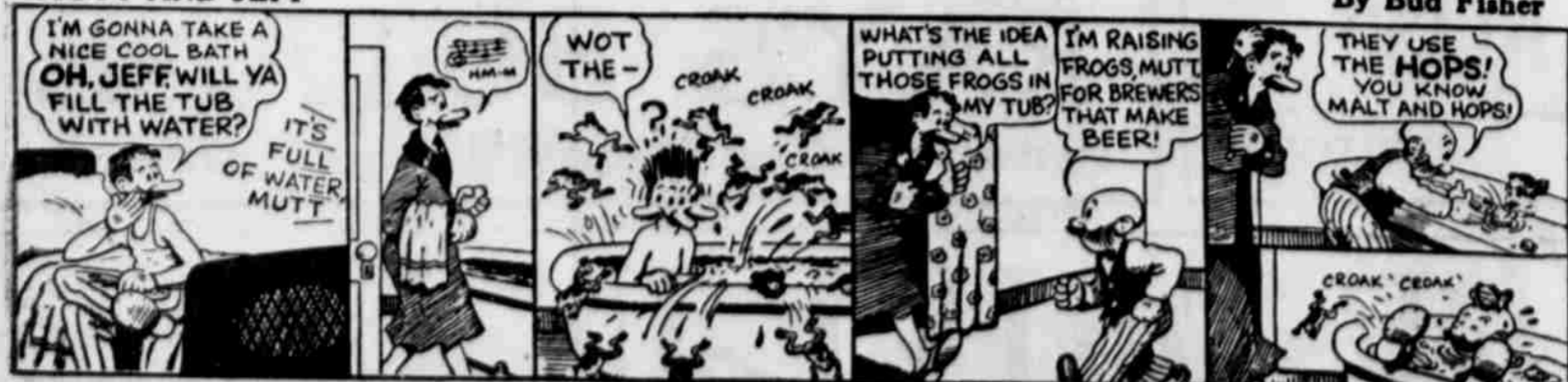
