# LIEUT. ALLAN WINSTON FREED, ENROUTE HOME

Lt. Allan Winston, a prisoner of the Germans since June 25, 1944, was liberated by the Russians on May 2, and is now enroute home. This information was contained in a five page letter from Lt. Winston to his parents, dated May 19, written from a port on the coast of France where he was awaiting a ship home, and received here on Tuesday, which was the first message received by the parents since January 15th last. In this letter he said he had been in a German camp hospital for two months suffering from sinus. He was liberated by the Russians from Stalag Luft 1 camp, located at Barth, which is in the northern part of Germany, and evacuated from there to France on May 13, and then on to the coast. He stated in his letter that he expected to arrive in New York about the 5th of June. Needless to say how happy the Winston family have been made by the receipt of this letter.

Lieut. Winston reported his plane was shot down early in the morning of June 25, 1944, by a ME-109, which he said was identified as one of the U. S. P-51 planes. He said the cannon from the plane set his "belly" tank on fire, and then he bailed out. He was free about an hour, and was on his way to a French hideout when he was taken prisoner near Paris, just after the invasion of France. He spent six days in Chartres hospital and two days in Paris hospital. During the following nine days, during which time he was interrogated at Frankfurt he lived on four slices of bread and a small bowl of soup daily. He was then sent to Barth and to the Stalag Prison Camp. The first letter he received from home was on December 8, 1944, and the first package he got from home was in April, 1945, although the Winston family had sent a number of packages. Lieut. Winston, in his letter,

mentioned a food famine, which extended from the middle of November and reached its climax in March last, when they were living on bread and soup. Lieut. Winston said in his letter also that the German Luftwaffe had charge of all prisoners of the U. S. Air Force, and he believed that "if there were any gentlemen in Germany, they are in the Luftwaffe," intimating that Air corps prisoners received better treatment in the prison camps than servicemen from other branches of the U. S. Service. Lieut. Winston said in his letter that the Nazi Gestapo Chief of Heinrich Himmler was credited with the disobeying of Hitler's orders to shoot all prisoners of war, and allowing of Red Cross packages to reach the prisoners. In March last Himmler announced he was in favor of Red Cross, and after that many packages of food and medical supplies went through.

The park association is offering prizes to those who secure the most members as follows: 1st prize—\$25.00 war bond; 2nd prize—\$10.00 in cash; and third prize—\$5.00. Any civic organizations or clubs, which wish to enter the contest, may secure a booklet or membership blank at the office of the Secretary-Treasurer of the park association, C. O. Stone. Each club will appoint its own committee to work in the drive. Officers and directors of the park association are: Fred Wright, President; C. O. Stone secretary; Dr. Ira Woods, vice-president, and Mrs. C. E. Payne, Mrs. Roy Wade, Mrs. Evelyn McKinley and Mrs. Cecil Barker, directors. The park association are also planning a celebration for the 4th of July, when a picnic will be held. Considerable cleaning up and trimming of trees have been carried out at the city park recently by H. L. Lewis, employed by the association. Fred Wright, President, stated Tuesday that any improvements made at the park would be maintained as a permanent improvement, and that as soon as water was available, grass would be set out and the park beautified further. Mr. Wright pointed out the great benefit it would be to Littlefield to have a nice park, stating it would bring to the city many visitors. He also said it was the plan to secure Junior baseball soft ball or other games to be held at the park.

THE STATE OF TEXAS (COUNTY OF LAMB) TO THE RESIDENT QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 4, OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID ROAD DISTRICT AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

TAKE NOTICE THAT AN ELECTION will be held on the 20th day of June, 1945, within said ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 4, OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, to determine if said Road District shall issue bonds, and if an annual ad valorem tax shall be levied annually on all taxable property within said District sufficient to pay the annual interest and provide a sinking fund to pay the bonds at maturity in pursuance of an ELECTION ORDER made and entered by the Commissioners' Court of Lamb County, Texas, on the 19th day of May, 1945, and which order is in words and figures as follows, to-wit:

ORDER OF THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT ORDERING BOND ELECTION TO BE HELD IN ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 4, OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS.

BE IT REMEMBERED that on the 19th day of May, 1945, the Commissioners' Court of Lamb County, Texas, convened in special session, held at the Courthouse in the City of Olton, Texas, and being the regular meeting place for said Court, there were present and in attendance the following members, namely:

I. B. HOLT, COUNTY JUDGE, presiding; and H. A. HYSINGER, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 1; SAM CEARLEY, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 2; E. C. ROSS, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 3; E. L. YARBROUGH, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 4; and, among other proceedings had, were the following:

There came on to be heard and considered the petition of J. R. Dean and seventy-six other persons, as resident property taxing voters of ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 4 OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, praying this Court for an order for an election to determine the following proposition:

WHETHER OR NOT the bonds of the said Road District Number 4, shall be issued in the principal sum of TWO HUNDRED FORTY-EIGHT THOUSAND (\$248,000.00) DOLLARS for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, and which bonds are to bear interest at a rate not exceeding Four Per Centum (4%) per annum, and are to be issued in such denomination and payable at such times as may be deemed most expedient, by the Commissioners' Court, but not exceeding twenty-five (25) years from the date thereof; and that at such election there shall also be submitted to the qualified property taxing voters of the said Road District Number 4, the question as to whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied on all taxable property within the said Road District Number 4, for the purpose of paying the interest on the said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption or payment thereof at maturity."

AND IT APPEARING to the Court that said petition was presented to this Court, and filed with this Court on the 3rd day of May, 1945, and that it is duly signed by more than fifty (50) resident qualified property taxing voters of said Road District Number 4, of Lamb County, Texas; and

IT FURTHER APPEARING to the Court that on said date, to-wit, May 3rd, 1945, by order duly passed and entered of record, this Court set said petition down for hearing before the Commissioners' Court, at a session thereof to be held in the Commissioners' Court Room in the Courthouse in the City of Olton, Texas, on the 19th day of May, 1945, at ten o'clock A. M., which was not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days, from the date of the aforesaid order setting such petition down for hearing; and

IT FURTHER APPEARING to the Court, and the Court so finds from the evidence submitted, that the Clerk of this Court, pursuant to the order setting said petition down for hearing, posted and published the notices of such hearing in the time and manner required by law; that is to say: (a) The County Clerk and Ex-Officio Clerk of the Commissioners' Court of Lamb County, Texas, executed said notice by posting true copies thereof in the following three public places within ROAD DIS-

TRICT NUMBER 4, OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, to-wit: ONE COPY on the Bulletin Board in the City Hall at Sudan, Texas; ONE COPY at Ted Walker's Store located in the Beck Gin Community about seven miles south of Sudan, Texas;

ONE COPY at O. W. Testerman's Store in the Friendship Community about five miles south and three miles west of Sudan, Texas. (b) That the said County Clerk also posted a true copy of such notice at the door of the County Courthouse of Lamb County, in the City of Olton, Texas. (c) That each and all of the three copies of the notice of this hearing were posted by the County Clerk at the three public places in said Road District, above described, on the 7th day of May, 1945; that each of said places was a public place in said Road District; that each of the notices posted at said places was posted in a conspicuous position; that each of said places was accessible to the public; and that each of said notices so posted at each of said places was posted so as to be easily visible to the public.

(d) That the copy of the notice of this hearing, posted by the County Clerk at the Courthouse door, as aforesaid, was posted on the 7th day of May, 1945, and that such notice was posted at said place so as to be easily visible to the public; and, (e) That the said County Clerk also caused said notice of this hearing to be published in the Lamb County Leader, which is a newspaper of general circulation in the said County, and which said notice was published in said newspaper on the 10th day of May, 1945, which date was at least five days prior to the hearing set for the consideration of such petition; it appearing to the Court from the evidence submitted herein that no newspaper of general circulation is published in the said Road District Number 4, of Lamb County, Texas.

AND WHEREAS, on this 19th day of May, 1945, and being the date fixed for hearing said petition, the same came on to be heard in due and regular order; and, WHEREAS, it appearing to the Court at this hearing that the following roads are to be constructed and improved with the money to be received from the sale of such bonds, if voted; that is to say:

A road beginning at the Northeast Corner of Labor No. 22, in League No. 222, of the Collingsworth County School Land; thence south to a point of intersection of the east line of Labor No. 19, in League No. 223, of the Collingsworth County School Land and the extension of North Main Street of the city of Sudan, Texas; thence southwest along North Main Street of the city of Sudan, Texas, across railroad to State Highway No. 84.

A road beginning at the Southwest Corner of Labor No. 20, in League No. 224, of the Collingsworth County School Land; thence due north to State Highway No. 84.

A road beginning at the Southeast Corner of Labor No. 1, in League No. 232, of the King County School Land; thence West along the south side of Labors Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5, of League No. 232, of the King County School Land, and continuing West along the South Line of Labor No. 1, in League No. 223, of the Collingsworth County School Land, to a point being the Southwest Corner of said Labor No. 1, in League No. 223, Collingsworth County School Land.

A road beginning at a point the Northeast Corner of Labor No. 3, in League No. 231, of the King County School Land; thence west along the north line of Labors Nos. 3, 4 and 5, in said League No. 231, of the King County School Land, and continuing west along the north line of Labor No. 1, in League No. 224, of the Collingsworth County School Land, to a point intersecting State Highway No. 84.

A road beginning at the Northwest Corner of Labor No. 15, in League No. 222, of the Collingsworth County School Land; thence south along the west lines of Labors Nos. 15, 16 and 25, in League No. 222, of the Collingsworth County School Land; and continuing south along the west lines of Labors Nos. 5 and 6, in League No. 223, of the Collingsworth County School Land, to a point intersecting State Highway No. 84.

Said roads being in all a distance of approximately thirty-five (35) miles. AND NOW, THEREFORE, on this 19th day of May, 1945, the Commissioners' Court of Lamb County, Texas, by reason of investigations carefully made, and from all facts found and evidence submitted at this hearing, finds, AND IT IS THE ORDER AND JUDGMENT OF THIS COURT:

(1) That the petition for said bond election is signed by more than fifty (50) of the resident qualified property taxing voters of ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 4, OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, and who had duly rendered their property for taxation.

(2) That due notice of the hearing had on such petition has been issued, made and given in the time and form and manner required by law.

(3) That the proposed improvements will be for the benefit of all taxable property situated within the boundaries of said ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 4, OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS.

IT IS, THEREFORE, FURTHER CONSIDERED AND FOUND AND ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS: 1. That an election shall be, and it hereby ordered to be held within ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 4, OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, on the 20th day of June, 1945, and which date is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"WHETHER OR NOT the bonds of said Road District Number 4, shall be issued in the principal sum of TWO HUNDRED FORTY-EIGHT THOUSAND (\$248,000.00) DOLLARS for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, and which bonds are to bear interest at a rate not exceeding Four Per Centum (4%) per annum, and are to be issued in such denomination and payable at such times as may be deemed most expedient, by the Commissioners' Court, but not exceeding twenty-five (25) years from the date thereof; and that at such election there shall also be submitted to the qualified property taxing voters of the said Road District Number 4, the question as to whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied on all taxable property within the said Road District Number 4, for the purpose of paying the interest on the said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption or payment thereof at maturity."

The roads to be constructed and maintained with the proceeds of the sale of said bonds are hereinabove described.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that said election shall be held under the provisions of the laws of the State of Texas, particularly Chapter 16, of the General Laws of the State of Texas, passed by the Thirty-ninth Legislature, at its First Called Session in 1926.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that all persons who are legally qualified voters of this State, and of this County, and who are resident property taxing voters in ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 4 OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, and who have duly rendered their property for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots, the words: "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVY OF AD VALOREM TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

VALOREM TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF.

IV. The polling places and the Presiding Officers of said election shall be, respectively, as follows: At the City Hall in the City of Sudan, in Lamb County, Texas; and Clyde W. Robertson, Presiding Judge, and W. W. Carpenter and W. E. Love, assistants.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED, that the manner of holding such election and canvassing and making returns thereof, shall be governed by the General Laws of this State, when not in conflict with the provisions of Chapter 16, of the General Laws passed by the Thirty-ninth Legislature, at its Called Session in 1926.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order in the LAMB COUNTY LEADER, a newspaper published in Lamb County, Texas, for three successive weeks before the date of the said election, and, in addition thereto, there shall be posted other copies of this order at three public places in said ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 4, and also at the door of the County Court House, in the City of Olton, Texas, and all of which notices shall be posted for three successive weeks prior to said election.

The County Clerk is hereby authorized, ordered and directed to post and publish notices of said election as hereinabove directed, and further orders are reserved until the returns of said election are made by the duly authorized election officers and received by this Court. The duties herein imposed upon the Clerk may be performed by said Clerk or by Deputy, as provided by law for other similar duties.

The above order having been read in full, it was moved by Commissioner Sam Cearley and seconded by Commissioner E. C. Ross that it be passed. Whereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Court voted "AYE": Commissioners Hysinger, Cearley, Ross and Yarbrough; and the following voted "NO": None.

S. J. R. No. 8 A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members; prescribing their qualifications; and providing for their election, tenure of office and compensation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Article 5, Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; provided, that when the business of the court may require, the court may sit in sections as designated by the court to hear argument of causes and to consider applications for writs of error or other preliminary matters. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this state, and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty-five years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer, or a lawyer and judge of a court of record together at least ten years. Said Justices shall be elected (three of them each two years) by qualified voters of the state at a general election; shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified; and shall each receive such compensation as shall be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of any Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for state officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the state. The Justices of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Judges of the Commission of Appeals who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall become Associate Justices of the Supreme Court and each shall continue in office as such Associate Justice of the Supreme Court until January 1st next preceding the expiration of the term to which he has been appointed and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

Sec. 2. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1945, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members"; and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot:

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this State.

H. J. R. No. 11 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of Ten Dollars (\$10) per day during their

tenure of office. In addition per diem the members of said Legislature shall be entitled to mileage to and returning from the government, which mileage shall exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for each twenty-five miles, the distance to be traveled by the nearest and most direct ways or water routes; and to preserve a table of distances from each county seat, now established; and by which the mileage of each member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any session that may be held one day after the adjournment of any regular or called session.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the Saturday in August, A. D. 1945, which all ballots shall have thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for continuous per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office."

Each voter shall mark on said clauses on the ballot, the one expressing his vote proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The provisions of a Constitutional Amendment shall be in effect, and if a majority of the same the Governor shall, thirty (30) days after said issue a proclamation declaring Amendment to be a part of the Constitution of Texas.

With South Plains Men In The Armed Forces

The following is a letter from Glenn Daugherty, in France, to his mother, Mrs. Mirty Daugherty, of Olton:

'May 9, 1945 'Dearest Mother, 'I wonder how you are, this morning of the final peace in Europe. I don't have words to express the reaction of Paris on this occasion. Paris has really gone wild. They gave us a holiday and I am writing to you today. Paris is still celebrating as tonight is supposed to be a bigger night than last night if that is possible. Tell Curly it was a mixture between a Santa Rosa rodeo, a Dallas style show and the Fort Worth Fat Stock Show with a little more added to each. I didn't drink a drop but I didn't see too many that were so sober.

'The French are a very emotional people, and it is their custom to kiss on one cheek and then on the other. So affectionate were they last night that when any American soldier got on the electric car they not only kissed each one of our cheeks but everything in between our cheeks. It seemed that a people who had witheld their emotions for five years just let them burst out in one mighty surge. Flood lights were everywhere, cannons booming, and shouts and screams all night. We stay in what used to be a large department store right in the heart of Paris. I went up to go to bed about 11 o'clock, but the noise was such that I just got up and watched them parade in a continuous stream the whole night through. I guess they celebrated in the U. S. too, but as long as I live I will never see anything like this. The first thing I did when I got to the barracks was to say a prayer of thanks to God for the country that I have. Germany is completely destroyed,

and Berlin is only a heap of crushed and shattered stone and steel. I thought how many years will it take for these people to build back and the world to build back what the ruthless hand of Hitler has destroyed. How many widows and orphans will feel the hand of the grim reaper. I only thank God that he has given us what he has. 'Your loving son, Glen.'

ABOARD A U. S. BATTLESHIP OFF OKINAWA (Delayed). —J. C. Crawford, steward's mate, second class, USNR, whose wife lives at Littlefield, Texas, is fighting aboard this veteran battleship which poured 1,500-pound shells onto Okinawa for six days to clear the way for troops taking part in the greatest amphibious landing of the Pacific war.

His ship, which saw service in World War I, and has blasted the Japs through five previous campaigns of this war, underwent numerous air attacks during the last few days before the landings. Two torpedoes launched against her never reached their mark.

Before dawn of "Love Day" she was brought into position to give the beaches a final working over. The men were up at 2:30 a. m. and at their battle stations soon afterward, undaunted by three Jap suicide planes which made futile runs against the ship.

At 6:30 a. m., along with other ships of the task force, the battleship began her final bombardment on pillboxes, airplane revetments, observation posts and caves. Scores of Navy planes struck at inland targets at the same time, while to seaward landing craft were moving in.

By 7:30, smoke from the intense barrages screened the island. In a lull that came an hour later, some of his mates were able to watch through the smoke with binoculars as the first waves of Marines hit the beach.

Anxiously awaiting reports of the Marines' progress over the ship's loud speakers, he and the crew sent up a cheer at the news that strategic Yontan airstrip had been taken. The ship's bombardment had paid off.

Lee A. Stanton Is Promoted

WITH THE FIRST CAVALRY DIVISION ON LUZON — Lee A. Stanton, son of Mrs. Lana Stanton, Littlefield, Texas, has been promoted to the rank of Technician Fifth Grade in the Eighth Cavalry Regiment, now in action in the Philippines. Announcement of the promotion was made by Colonel Charles E. Brady, commanding officer of the regiment.

Corporal Stanton has fought in two major Pacific campaigns, the Admiralty Islands and the Philippines, for which he wears two bronze stars and a bronze arrowhead on his Asiatic-Pacific ribbon.

In addition, he wears the Philippines Liberation ribbon with two bronze stars, signifying he was among the first troops to land in the Philippines, and the Combat Infantryman's Badge.

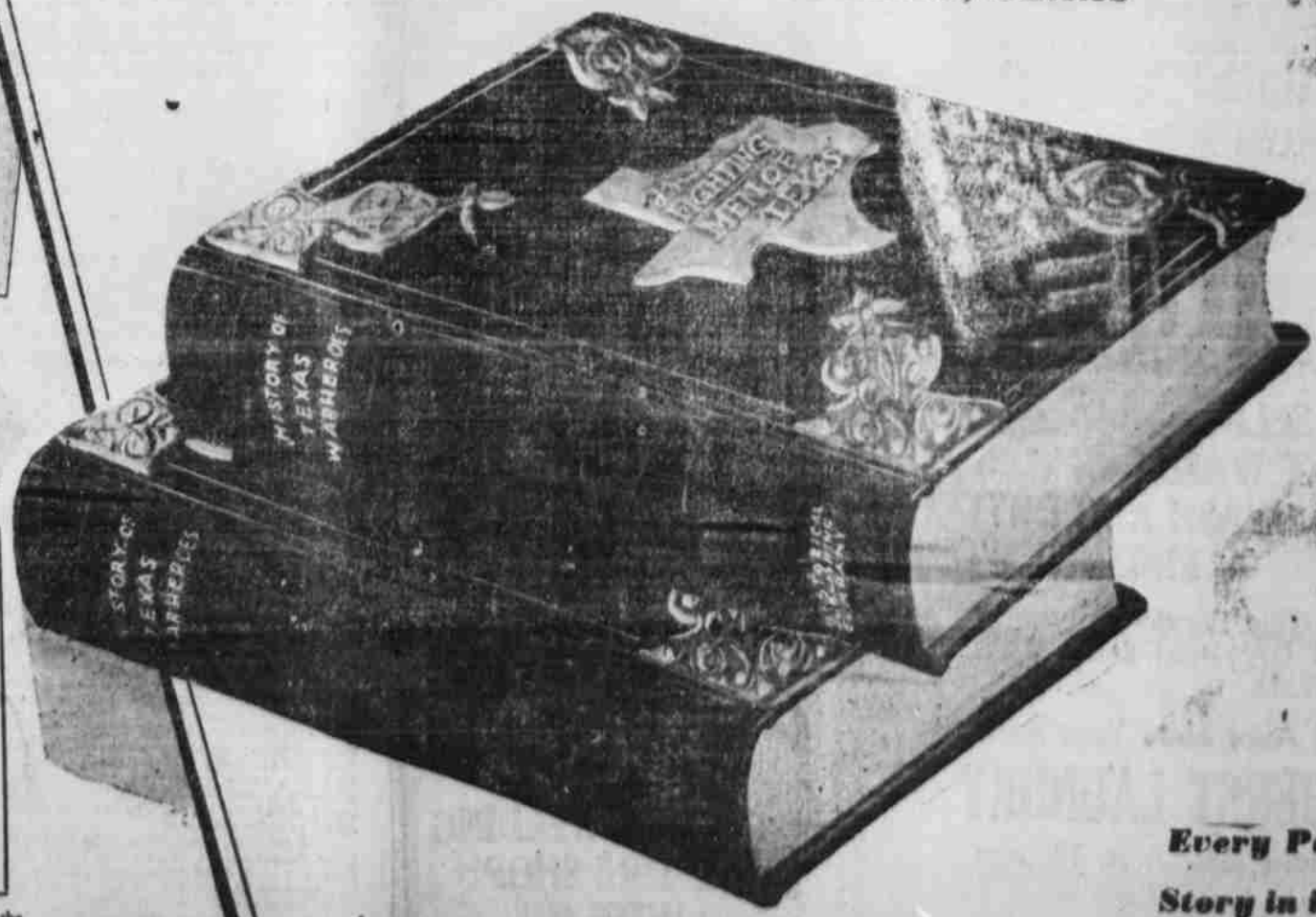

### Donald Vaughn Takes Part In Okinawa Naval Bombardment

ABOARD A U. S. BATTLESHIP OFF OKINAWA (Delayed).— Donald M. Vaughn, 20, seaman, first class, USNR, whose parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. S. Vaughn, live at Littlefield, Texas, was aboard this veteran battleship when she poured a withering torrent of high explosive shells into the Okinawa beaches as a unit of the greatest naval bombardment force in history.

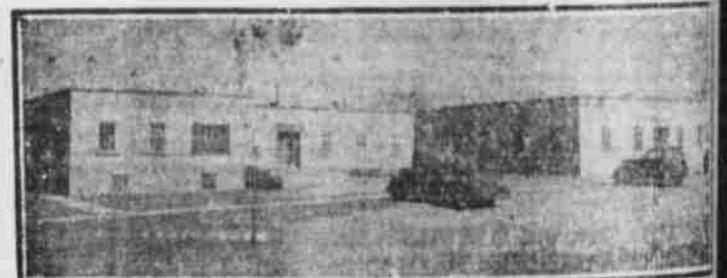

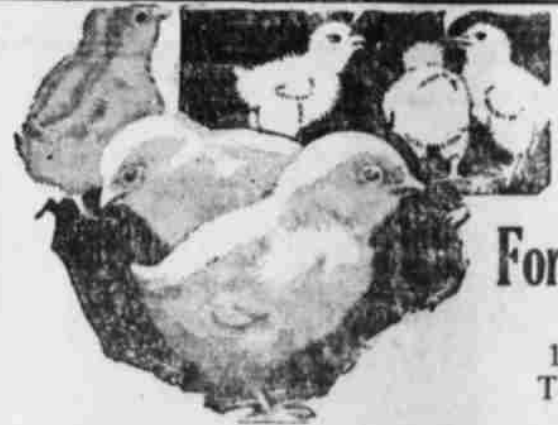

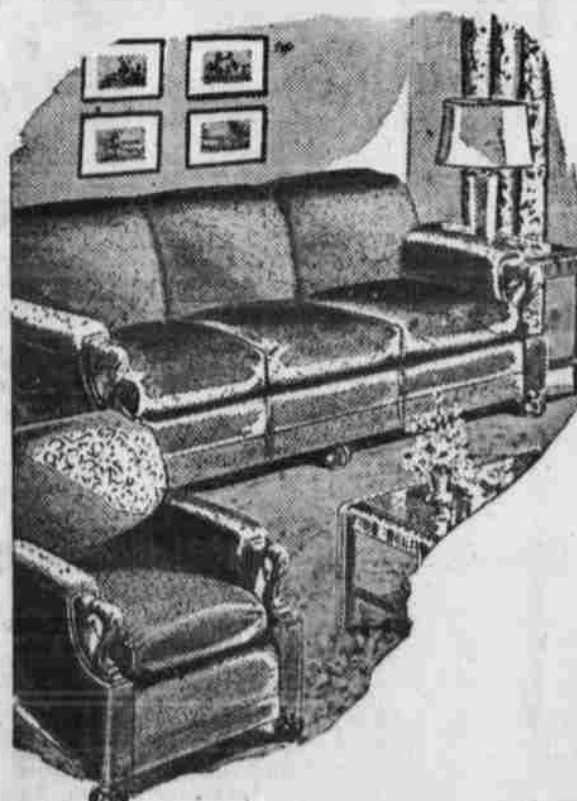
