Details were still sketchy at presstime, but early Saturday morning, sheriff's officers and an ambulance had been summoned to a residence at Progress.

It was reported that a young woman, who said she had been kidnapped in Clovis, had gone to a Progress residence, asked for an ambulance and "passed out."

She was reported to have been kidnapped from Clovis and apparently beaten before being put out of the vehicle in the Progress vicinity.

Investigation was continuing at presstime.

One was reported to be a first grader.

Entertainment, food, tours and booths will be featured during the two day celebration, explained Watterson, who cited the presentation of a horse to some lucky winner will cap off the celebration.

BDJ-What type of home are you looking for?

RD-I would prefer a home with green pastures.

RD-Sure. I would like my own room with TV. With a remote control of course. I have trouble with the buttons on TV's, they're really too small to work well.

BCJ-Do you have a very special wish?

RD-Yes. I will miss all my friends very much and would really wish that they would all find good homes. But, don't get me wrong, I have enjoyed my stay here. I was petted, pampered and really cared for.

In case you didn't know it, the food is excellent and the living conditions are great. I was born in the wild, and boy, was it hard trying to be on my own out on the range. It was really a big, lonesome world out there near Lovelace, NV where I was before I was brought here.

BCJ-How can someone take you home?

RD-I am to go to someone who will name me, and will write an essay of 50 words or less why they have given me that name. And, oh, yes, I can't

just go to anybody, whoever wins me must meet all the qualifications as if they were planning to adopt a horse. It's not hard, but my people are not about to let me go to just anybody, whoever takes me home must be prepared to really care for me.

And, for real, the red dun will be going to someone during the two day celebration at Carr's Horse Holding Facility on May 3-4.

Stewart Watterson, manager of Carr's Horse Holding Facility (for wild horses and burros) located 15 miles west of Muleshoe on FM1760, announced Wednesday morning, an expansion of the existing facility.

Joe Cearley New Principal For DeShazo

During a press conference in the office of Muleshoe Independent School District Superintendent H. John Fuller on Friday morning, a new principal for DeShazo Elementary School was introduced.

The new principal for the school, with retirement of long-time principal Bill Taylor, will be Joe Cearley, currently an elementary school principal at Olton.

A native of Hobbs, N.M., the new principal has ties to nearby Earth, where his grandparents have lived for many years.

He was reared in Lovington, N.M. and graduated from Lovington High School in 1971.

He received an Associate of Arts degree from New Mexico Junior College, Hobbs; a bachelor of arts degree from Wayland Baptist University in Plainview in 1975 with a major in elementary education and minor in physical education. In May 1984, he received a master of education/administration at Eastern New Mexico University, Portales, N.M.

Joe Cearley taught in Plainview and Portales before moving to Olton to become principal of H. P. Webb Elementary School.

He and his wife, Terri, are the parents of three children, Michael, a sixth grader; Michelle, who is in the second grade; and Mark, age three.

Superintendent Fuller said more than 35 people had applied for the principal's position at DeShazo, but Cearley had the best qualifications.

When asked "Why Muleshoe?" Cearley commented, "It is a privilege to be in a school system with an emphasis on the school improvements I see here. There appears to be an ongoing school assessment and school improvement. I feel Muleshoe has some things going for it."

Cearley said his contract with Olton expires in mid-June, and he expects to assume his new position in Muleshoe in the middle of July. He and his family will be moved to Muleshoe before that time, he explained.

At the local meeting, task force moderators were named, and several critical areas identified and discussed by each of the four groups.

For the 4-H and Youth division, Lyndon Huckaby was named moderator. The group named as the number one priority, youth involvement. This was followed in order by parental involvement and meaningful activities. Other ideas discussed included youth planned activities; goal setting and priorities and self-image.

Charles Moraw was moderator for the Community Development group. This group found water to be the first priority; followed by industrial development; community service facilities; entertainment facilities; city beautification and cleanup and youth employment.

Home Economics was headed up by Linda Huckaby, and this particular group discussed food preservation and nutrition; needs for the elderly; health fairs; recreation/family involvement; resource for home health care; counseling for youth and do-it-yourself repairs.

Max Crittenden was moderator for the Agricultural Group. They discussed budgeting and

said the new corrals will hold an additional 1,000 animals.

By the time the construction is completed in an estimated 90 days, some 10 miles of five-rail fence will have been installed.

Located in the sandhills west of Muleshoe, the wild horse and burro operation replaces the former alfalfa fields in that area, and the new expansion will be to the east side of the facilities that were constructed a year ago.

One interesting aspect explained by the manager of Carr's Horse Holding Facility is that some \$60,000-\$70,000 per month is presently being spent for feed and supplements in Bailey County. "Most of the money is being spent in Muleshoe," said Watterson. "We feed alfalfa cubes mostly, with some oats. However, since oats are not grown in Bailey County, we have to go out of the area to purchase them."

With the expansion, \$20,000-\$30,000 more is expected to be spent for maintaining the wild horses and burros. The current full time crew of eight will also be expanded, providing a definite 'boost in the arm' for this area, added the manager.

He stated that the quality of care given the horse of burro at the horse holding facility is much higher than the normal 'backyard' horse. They receive the best in medicine and food, and overall care, he said.

Watterson also said that horses are shipped in and out constantly from their location. A load of horses is brought in to be conditioned, and a load will be shipped out to an adoption center. The manager said adoption of the colt-mare pairs is the most popular at any adoption center.

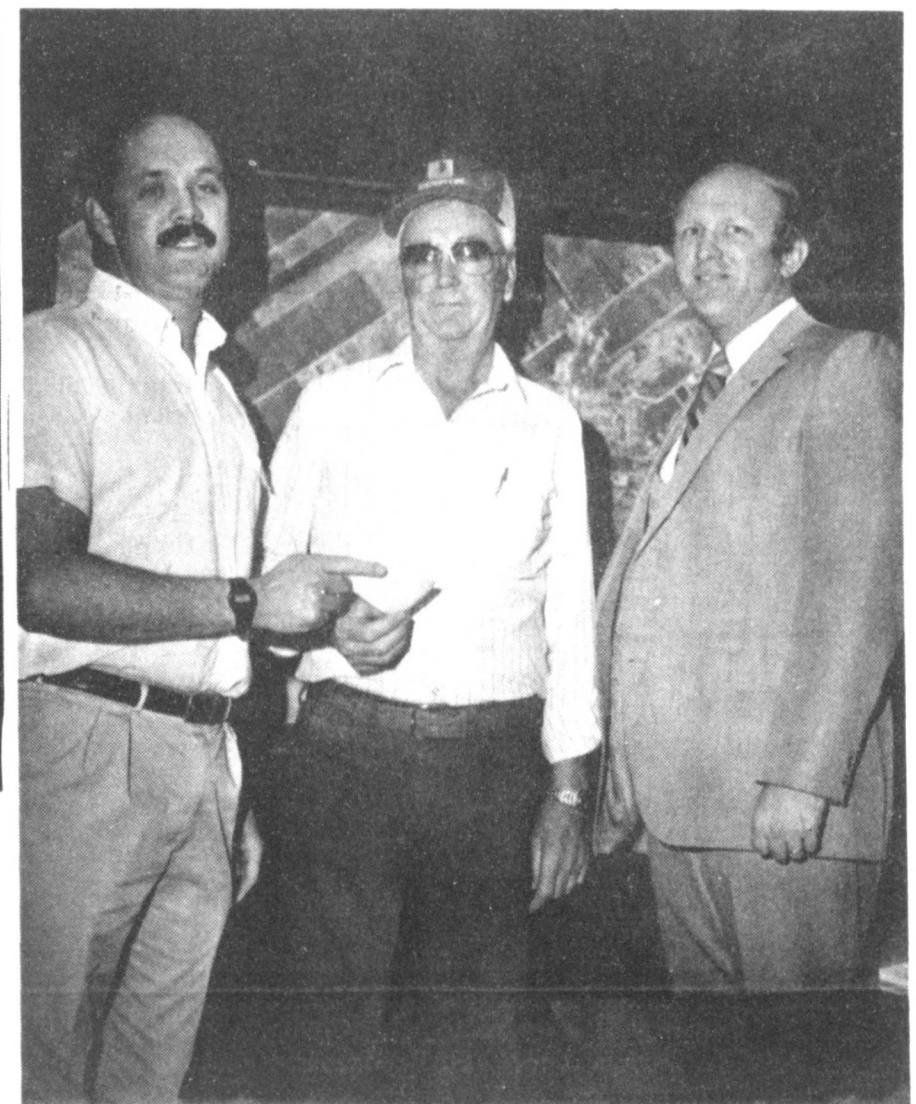

Know The Weather

Why is it said that lightning is caused by updrafts? Is that true?

First, it's true that updrafts are the cause of lightning. So that's why this statement is heard. Warm updrafts are the most usual producers of this spring's light-noise electrical discharge.

Warm air rises and when it rises fast, and cools quickly, it builds up an electrical charge, which is eventually dissipated with a flash and a bang.

The cumulonimbus (thunderhead) cloud is the source of strong updrafts and lightning and thunder.

After the first big drops, then the heavy rain, and after the low, dark leading edge of this giant cloud passes above you, at that time the danger of lightning striking you on the ground is greatest.

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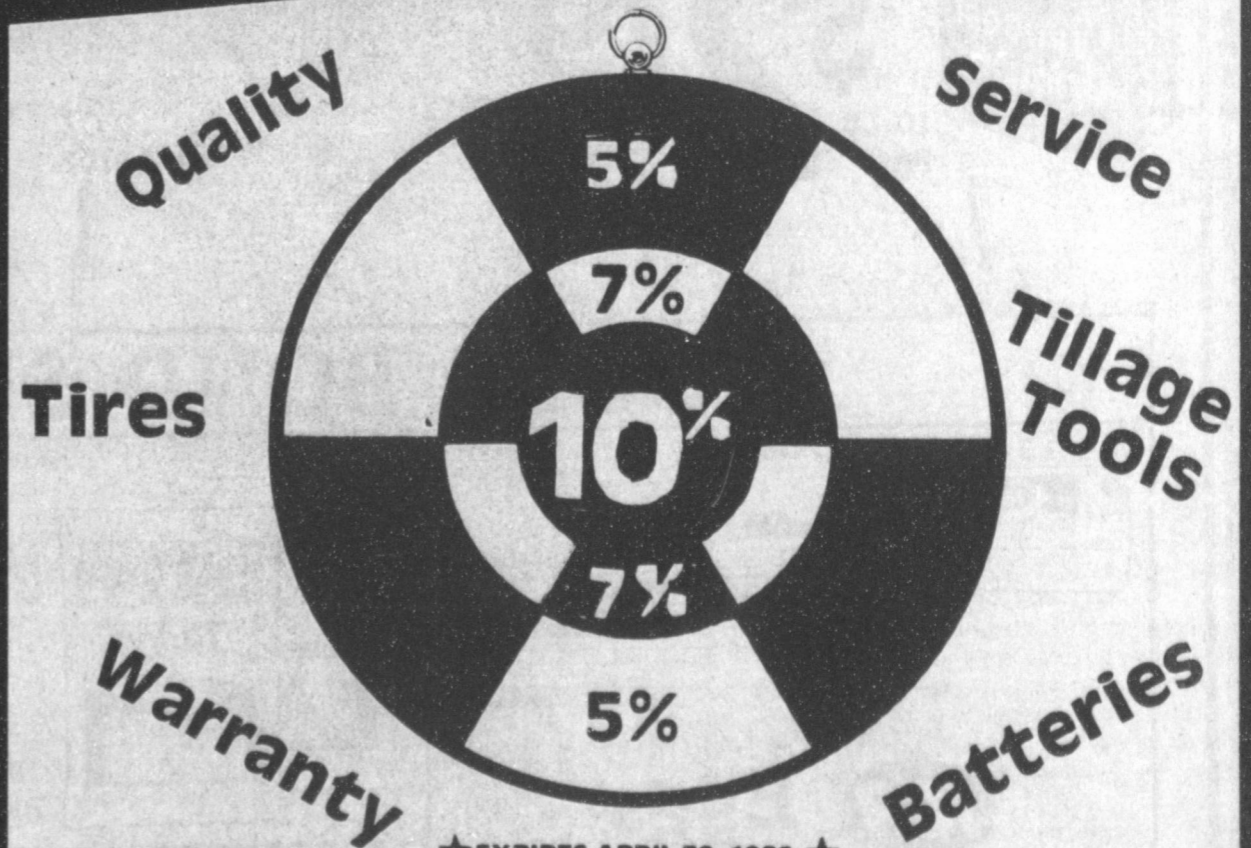
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
