BETTER ROADS CAMPAIGN IS UNDERWAY

TAX REDUCTION FOR LITTLEFIELD MAY BE POSSIBLE

MAYOR URGES PAYING OF TAXES AT THIS TIME

Residents of the city will not be required to pay taxes on their automobiles to the city of Littlefield, Texas, until the City Commission meets Tuesday, January 25, announced Wednesday by Mayor T. S. Sales.

In other words, in rendering their property for 1932 they will not be required to include their automobile.

Mayor Sales said that if the great majority of the residents of Littlefield pay their taxes at this time, it may be possible for the commissioners to work out a reduction in the tax rate.

The commissioners are now working on the city budget for this year.

Commissioner Hall reported at Tuesday night's meeting that considerable work is being done on the city's streets and that the waterworks system is functioning satisfactorily.

TWO ARE ARRESTED ON THEFT CHARGES FRIDAY NIGHT; OFFICIALS URGE AID IN WAR AGAINST AUTO PARTS THIEVES

The war against the stealing of automobile tires, parts and gasoline, continues.

Two arrests were made Friday night.

Observing a man in the act of stealing a tire from a car on Friday night, during the basketball games, City Marshal W. P. McDaniel arrested him and placed him in jail. He gave his name as H. R. Loullen.

The automobile from which the tire was being removed was the property of Mr. Nance of Lum's Chapel.

Following up the clue Deputy Sheriff Bob Miller and Mr. McDaniel went to Loullen's home in the Cotton Center community, and there identified a tire taken from Ben Lyman's car the same evening during the game at the high school, and arrested a Mexican, who gave his name as Solomon Garcia.

Loullen and Garcia entered pleas of guilty in City Court, and paid fines in the aggregate amount of \$62.20.

Mr. McDaniel says that the city and county officers are doing all in their power to stop the excessive tire and

automobile accessory thieving going on in this section, and asks that the citizenship assist them in every way possible by using locks on their spare tires, locking their cars, and exercising all possible vigilance in this section.

Vocational Students Testing Cows for Butterfat Production

Thirty-eight cows were started on test in December by members of the class in Vocational Agriculture at Littlefield. These cows are project animals owned by the boys, or cows in the home farm herd, which the boys have chosen to test for butterfat. A test will be run each month, and records will be kept on the production, amount and cost of feed, and value of production. At the completion of the test, these records will be totaled, and the value of each cow on test will be determined.

This job is a part of the regular program of work in Vocational Agriculture, in which the boys are trying to solve the problem of improving their livestock through the selection of high producing animals. The boys who are running these tests expect to earn a certificate of merit in cow testing, which is granted by the Texas Association of Future Farmers of America when a certain degree of skill is reached. Four boys earned these certificates last year. These were James Walden, Roy Jones, Welty Thedford, and Norman Emfinger.

illing a Junior Cow Testing Association for the purpose of testing cows for anyone wishing this work done. Anyone interested should see R. A. Box, teacher of Vocational Agriculture, or Welty Thedford, president of the Littlefield Chapter of Future Farmers of America.

The class expects to have fifty cows on test by the first of February.

'Giant Film Spectacle Comes With New Sound Synchronization; Opens with Midnight Preview at Palace

Once in a lifetime in every field of creative art, a work is produced which not only creates a furor in its own time, but lives through the ages. Such a work is the immortal film classic, "Ben-Hur" which Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer has brought back to the screen augmented with sound, and which will open at the Saturday midnight matinee at the Palace Theatre and run through Sunday and Monday.

The grandeur and accuracy of these scenes as well as of the entire story in its faithful depiction of Roman triumphs, Roman legionnaires and Roman civilization is due the fact that the entire cast of the production, headed by Ramon Novarro, spent a year and a half in Italy where the scenes were filmed on authentic locales. Another year and a half was spent in completing the picture in Hollywood. The chief scene of operations was a great tract of 6,000 acres back of the Esquiline, about eight miles out of Rome. On it were built many of the huge constructions used in the filming.

Strong Love Motif

The picture, however, owes its popular success not only to the grandeur of its spectacle and the absorbing nature of its action, but likewise to the love story of Ben-Hur and Esther and the second love motif between mother and son which is brought powerfully to the fore through the many years of separation of Ben-Hur and his family, by the Romans who condemned him to the galleys and his mother and sister to a forgotten dungeon. The plot depicts Ben-Hur's escape and his return to Judea fired by revenge for the Roman, Messala, who had caused the downfall of his family.

Prominent roles in Novarro's supporting cast are played by Francis X. Bushman, May McAvoy, Betty Bronson, Claire McDowell, Kathleen Key, Carmel Meyers, Nigel de Brulier and Mitchell Lewis. The picture was directed by Fred Niblo.

Better Roads—

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Never," reads as follows:

"The swiftly growing highway sentiment in the Panhandle received tremendous acceleration Monday when a mass meeting of Hereford business men and Deaf Smith County farmers announced a united drive for a county-wide road campaign.

"Following closely on the heels of successful road bond issues in Moore, Hansford, Ochiltree and Lipscomb counties, the announcement from Deaf Smith practically assures closing of another gap in the Panhandle road system, and turns the spotlight of inquiry upon Donley, Armstrong, Dallam, Parmer, Swisher, Oldham and a few other counties where connecting links are needed to give this section complete and proudful highway service.

"All-weather roads at greatly reduced cost through the use of local materials and asphalt has been the stimulant which has galvanized into action the lagging forces of road boosters.

"A thought brought out at the Hereford meeting by Wilbur C. Hawk is worthy of careful consideration by counties now on the fence regarding road construction. Mr. Hawk, who is vice-president for the Panhandle of the County Highway Tax Relief association, an organization formed at Fort Worth about a month ago, reminded his hearers that a state-wide bond issue would be again submitted to the legislature for ratification by the people, and owing to the fact that so many East and South Texas counties desire road bond refunds, the measure was almost sure to be adopted in one form or another in the near future. He sug-

gested, therefore, that counties without road bonds and without all-weather roads might lose out all around themselves helping other counties pay their road bills.

"The idea that now is to vote road bonds and prepare the future while, at the same time, relieving present economic conditions is rapidly gaining in popularity. Prospects were never better than at present for the highway construction program. To handle the state has ever
