Safe Containing Almost \$1000 and Valuable Papers Stolen Friday

According to an announcement by the Sheriff's Department here, a small safe containing almost \$1000 in cash and valuable papers was taken Friday from the Irving gin office here.

No sign of the safe or clues to the thieves had been found late last night. The safe was removed from beneath the counter of the office of the gin, located north of the Santa Fe tracks here, shortly after dark Friday night. Tickets costing \$1.50 will be available for all interested non-members who wish to attend the barbecue. Castro County Will Celebrate 59th Birthday Anniversary August 12

DIMMITT, Aug. 6 — The Castro County Chamber of Commerce will revive the annual Castro County Birthday celebration August 12 after a lapse of twelve years. The last celebration was held in 1938 and was postponed in 1939 because of the construction of the county's present modern court house, and has not been held since.

The program will get underway Friday night, Aug. 11, with the annual Amateur Rodeo sponsored by the Dimmitt Rodeo association. Registration for old settlers will begin in the lobby of the county court house at 8:00 a. m. August 12 and a home-coming parade at 10:00 a. m. followed by the announcement of parade winners and presentation of prizes. A queen also will be selected from those who participate in the parade. Beginning at 11:30 those who qualify as old settlers and pioneers of Castro county will be honored with a free barbecue sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce.

Beginning at 1:00 p. m. a general assembly will be held at the county fair grounds.

The general assembly program will consist of a short Memorial Service for deceased Castro county pioneers, an address by Laura V. Hamler, of Amarillo, recognition of special guest of old settlers, and election of officers to head the 1951 Old Settlers association. Joseph N. Cowen, local real estate agent and president of the Chamber of Commerce, has been appointed to serve as temporary chairman of the celebration.

Another rodeo performance will be held at 3:00 p. m. and at 6:00 p. m. a water polo contest sponsored by the Dimmitt fire department with other departments participating.

The Birthday celebration will be closed with an old time street square dance which will begin at 8:30 p. m. Aug. 13th, which will conclude the annual rodeo. However, there will be a third rodeo performance held on Saturday afternoon.

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June, 1950, Sets Record For Production of Chrysler Cars

It is announced by Joseph A. O'Malley, general sales manager of the Chrysler Division, Chrysler Corporation, that the month of June, 1950, set an all-time high for the production of Chrysler cars. The figure is slightly over 10 per cent better than that for the previous high month, September, 1949, and approximately 16 per cent over the third highest month, January, 1941.

Another record was set by Chrysler in the week ended July 15, 1950, which brought the largest number of retail deliveries of Chrysler cars ever made in a period of seven days. This new all-time high for retail deliveries is by 5.4 per cent the previous mark set in the week ended May 17, 1941.

Not only was June production a new high for Chrysler cars but it also saw a very large percentage of the more luxurious models come off the assembly line. Saratoga, New Yorker, Imperial, Town and Country and Crown Imperial cars accounted for 26.2 per cent of the total.

"Even with this record production, our dealers are swamped with orders that they have been unable to fill," says Mr. O'Malley. "Every dealer in our entire organization of some 3,500 has asked us to increase his quota. Many have said that they would take all the cars of the current model we possibly could ship them."

"Inevitably, with this tremendous demand, it will be impossible to make immediate delivery to all of our customers. We can assure these customers, however, that care are being allotted to our dealers on a completely equitable basis, and we expect that every order will be filled in its proper turn, with fairness to all. We intend to continue to produce cars to the limit of our capacity, subject, of course, to possible changes in conditions that are beyond our control."

"It should be borne in mind by those who are inclined to be impatient that our dealers accumulated a very large backlog of orders during the three months that our plants were struck early this year. On top of this came the accelerated demand for new cars caused by the unsettled international situation."

ments. Conditions for the county as a whole now are classified as "excellent," and the prospects are that it again will be high among the first 10 of Texas counties in ginnings. Lamb is another county for which Clapp forecast production exceeding 100,000 bales. His present prediction is 95,000 from 105,000 acres planted. Even more dependent upon rain is Dawson. Of the county's 212,000 cotton acres, 211,000 are dry-land. Clapp forecast a crop there of 70,000 based on present conditions. But timely moisture easily could force the total well above 100,000. As a matter of fact, many

observers think Dawson has a better than 50-50 chance of climbing into the 100,000-bale bracket again. Clapp's latest report sounded a warning as to insect dangers. He termed the recent weather ideal for the pests. Leaf and bollworms are increasing. Poisoning is in progress where farmers are able to get into their fields. "I do not anticipate much damage from this first emergence of insects," he remarked. "But the second and third generations could hurt us badly further along in the season, especially with poison short. Only fair supplies of poison are available locally and it is difficult to obtain more."

Among individual counties, Lubbock leads with 233,000 acres still in cotton, including 188,000 irrigated, and a predicted crop of 170,000 bales. Such production almost certainly would retain for Lubbock for the third year in succession, its position as the top cotton producing county in Texas. Hockley Ranked Second Hockley county, with 161,000 acres including 93,000 irrigated, is ranked second in the forecast table with 120,000 bales. This, in some respects, marks the most remarkable improvement in prospects of any South Plains county. Hockley was one of the hardest hit counties in the area by early season drought. The county was so dry during the planting season that actual plantings were approximately 40,000 acres below allot-

ment. The stalks in the remaining fields have been stripped by boll-stones. The chances are they won't produce much cotton. But, under favorable weather conditions, they still could sprout new growth and could produce profitable crops. Based on weather records of the past, the chances are better than ever that they will do this. So farmers are taking the chance that this will happen. If they get a killing frost later than the average date—which is Nov. 11—their gamble will pay off. If the first killing frost should hit earlier than that—and they have occurred as early as Oct. 19—their hail-damaged friends probably would produce nothing. The later the frost, and they have occurred as late as Dec. 5, the better their prospects will be. This same statement also applies, in lesser degree, to prospects for the entire crop. At least half of it is running two to three weeks behind desired schedule, although it has been catching up during the past few days. But, the later the first crop, the larger will be the crop harvest on the South Plains. Due to weather damage, Clapp reported, irrigated acreage has been reduced from 635,000 acres originally planted to a present estimate of 525,000 irrigated acres harvested last year. The unirrigated acreage has been reduced from 896,000 acres at planting time to a present estimate of 879,000.

Urges Safety Effort On Farms

Were you or some member of your family among the more than one million farm people who were injured last year as a result of a farm accident? A friend or relative may have been included among the 17,500 who met death in some kind of farm accident during this same period. A majority of these deaths and injuries could have been prevented, says E. C. Martin, assistant state agent for the Texas Extension Service and chairman of the State Farm Safety committee, if those involved had only stopped to think.

He says that the latest available statistics reveal that farming has moved up from fourth to third place as the most dangerous way of making a living. In 1948, 55 deaths for each 100,000 workers engaged in agriculture were reported. Only the construction industry and mining and quarrying had higher occupational death rates.

The home is the scene of more accidents than any other part of the farm, and falls lead the list of causes. Animal accidents ranked second in the South and West while machinery accidents held second place in the Northeast and North Central sections of the nation.

Martin points out that time lost as a result of accidents to farm people amounts to the time needed to plant, cultivate and harvest about one-half of the average annual wheat crop of the nation. Records show that an average of 20 working days are lost by each person injured. The cost in dollars for medical aid, time lost, and property damage from accidents and fires affecting farm people approximates one billion dollars per year to say nothing of the cost in human misery.

Rural fire companies have been organized in several counties and extensive educational programs on fire prevention have been conducted by the extension service in cooperation with the department of fire and other interested groups. The families in these communities have organized for the purpose of making their communities better places in which to live and almost without exception farm safety has been one of their first considerations.

4-H club members in many counties have conducted farm safety surveys and have tagged with the "cross bone" signs all accident hazards they found on the farm. Refugio county 4-H members last year were presented a plaque for having conducted the most outstanding program in the state.

Martin believes that farm people must become more conscious of the accident hazards that are present on every farm and in many homes. Corrective measures must be taken and every member of the family must be continually on the alert to see that hazards are removed before an accident happens. When safety on the farm and in the home is practiced every day by every member of the family, the accident rate for farm areas will drop, says Martin.

3. Cabbage is on the plentiful list for July. Use the plentiful foods for lower cost meals.
4. Serve cooked cabbage occasionally for variety's sake, but remember that cooking cabbage destroys most of the vitamin C content.
5. Watermelon is a good source of vitamin C. Vitamin C is important for strong blood vessels, hard teeth and bones muscles.

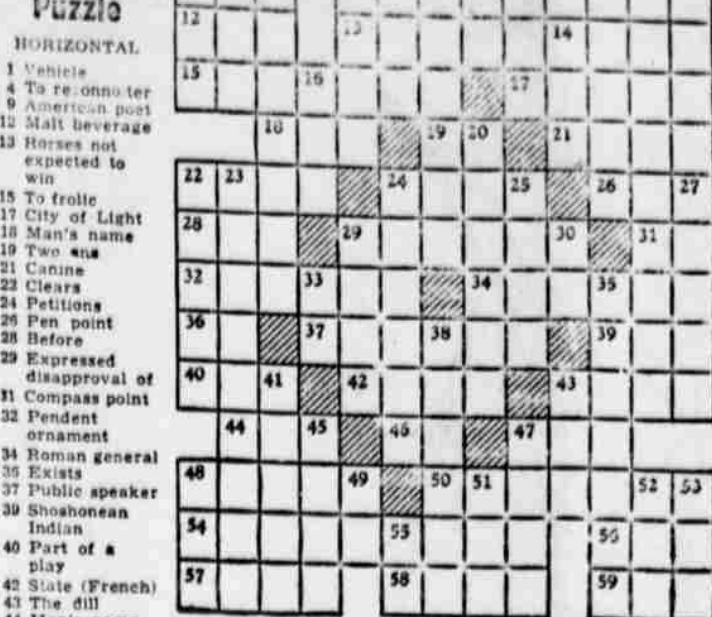

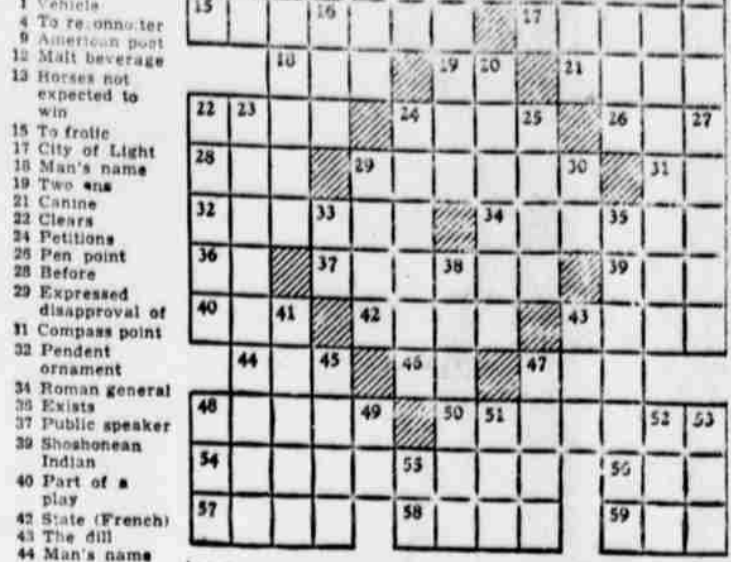

**Safe Supply of
Water For Farm
Home Assured**

A few simple rules, a few checks, and probably a little work will assure a safe supply of water for the farm home at very little expense, says W. S. Allen, extension agriculture engineer-buildings of Texas A. & M. college.

To be safe, Allen warns, water must be protected from contamination by dust, ground water, bugs and animals. He says it doesn't matter that the source of water is — stock pond, well, a spring or cistern — if it isn't properly protected, it may be dangerous to the health of the family.

He says that pit privies, septic tanks, barn lots and manure piles should be at least 100 feet away and down hill from the well, and the septic tank disposal field should be at least 150 feet away from the cistern well.

He cautioned that barn lots and septic tank disposal fields should not be laid out where they will drain toward a stock tank that is the source of water for the household. Surface privies are often a dangerous source of contamination and Allen recommends that they be replaced by sanitary pit privies, or even better with properly constructed septic tank systems.

Giving general precautions to insure the safety of water in a well or cistern, Allen advises making sure that the cover over the well or cistern is dust tight, rodent proof, and insect proof. The well should be lined for about 10 or 15 feet down from the top with some impervious material like concrete to prevent surface water from seeping in.

A good insurance measure to determine the safety of the farm water supply is to take a sample of the water and send it to the State Health department for a bacteriological analysis. However, the well must be chlorinated before the sample is taken, and a specially sterilized bottle must be used. A bottle and specific instructions for taking the sample can be obtained by writing to the State Health department, Austin, Texas, or from the local county health unit.

When surface tanks are used for the home water supply, they should be fenced off from livestock. For watering the stock, Allen recommends the use of a trough set below the tank level with a pipe leading from the tank. This setup protects the water for household use and provides cleaner drinking water for the livestock.

If the tank is filled with silt, the muddy water can be cleared up by using a commercial filter. Plans for making a homemade filter can be obtained by writing to the Agricultural Engineering Department, Texas A. & M. College.

**Catches 210
Buzzards in Trap**

A catch of 210 buzzards in a single day was made by one Freestone county stockman, according to a report submitted by county agent J. H. Pritchard to R. E. Calender, extension wildlife conservation specialist of Texas A. & M. college.

The stockman, Fred Hale, of Oakwood, reported to Pritchard early in June that he had lost 18 baby calves by buzzards killing them. Since other stockmen were having the same trouble, Pritchard met with a group of the ranchers to discuss the situation.

After discussing the problem, the group decided to encourage the killing of buzzards by any means at hand. One of the methods of control decided upon was the building of traps.

Hale constructed a trap and baited it, but he did not catch any buzzards immediately. After several days, he finally caught one in a steel-trap and placed it inside the regular buzzard trap. From about 4:00 p. m. one afternoon, when Hale placed the first buzzard in the trap, until late the next afternoon, 210 buzzards were caught in the trap.

Hale reports that he has caught about 525 buzzards in his trap, and says that they are fairly well thinned out around his place now. Several other ranchers in Freestone county are also building traps.

Red Cross Is On Duty In Korea

General George C. Marshall, President of the American National Red Cross has announced that 11 American Red Cross Workers, including 3 women, are now in active duty with the American troops in Korea as of July 21, 1950.

Two more field directors were en route to the battle zone with combat outfits and three others were waiting transportation from the west coast. The 8 men in Korea are field directors attached to combat units, the 3 women are hospital workers.

General Marshall announced also that a quarter million trained Red Cross volunteers already are in service in this country and that reserves can be mobilized for duty immediately.

"The American people, and particularly the families of men in the armed forces, can be assured that the Red Cross is on the job in Korea and that its volunteers are already at work at home," General Marshall said.

Mrs. Lyle Brandon, Executive Secretary of Lamb County received information this week that the Department of Air Force has established, as a special measure to assist the dependents of such personnel reported missing in action of prisoners of war in Korean conflict, a procedure whereby personal visits will be made to Dependents of such personnel residing within the United States by Air Force Chaplains. Under this plan, chaplains at air force bases are asked by the Chief or Air Force Chaplains to visit dependents living within a radius of 50 miles from the station, for the purpose of expressing condolence, informing dependents of their rights and privileges under current laws and assisting to arrange to meet family problems. Such visits are made only after the family has been notified officially that the airman is missing or captured. In unusually urgent situations Air Force Headquarters arranges for the dispatch of a special allotment payment pending the establishment of Class E allotment or arrangement to increase the amount of an allotment previously established. The amount of such allotment payments cannot exceed the amount of airman's pay even though there is a need for additional funds.

Air Force Headquarters has asked the American Red Cross to assist in the plan outlined above by providing the same type of assistance to dependents who live at a considerable distance from air force bases as is given by the air force chaplains. The Red Cross chapter will also handle any refer-

SOME 17 YEARS AGO Robert T. Herz, Chicago, was placed in charge of a project that had gone out of control. A group of 300 merchants had made down payments amounting to \$30,000 for participating in a sales campaign involving free trips to the World's Fair. An additional \$10,000 had been invested by promoters. The money had all been spent when a fatal weakness in the plan developed.

Now it was up to Robert Herz to make a decision between two actions:

- 1—Ask the promoters to take the loss, and also refund the \$30,000 (which was impractical if not impossible.)
- 2—Stand on their legal rights, make no refunds, but possibly face expensive and dangerous civil and criminal action.

There was the alternative of salvaging the entire project and sinking another \$50,000 in the project, but they would then be that much more involved.

Robert had a week in which to work out a solution. Seven days! Of course he was in a dither. He says it was the worst week of his entire life. How he envied the day laborer or the clerk who does what he is told and has to solve no problems, make no important decisions.

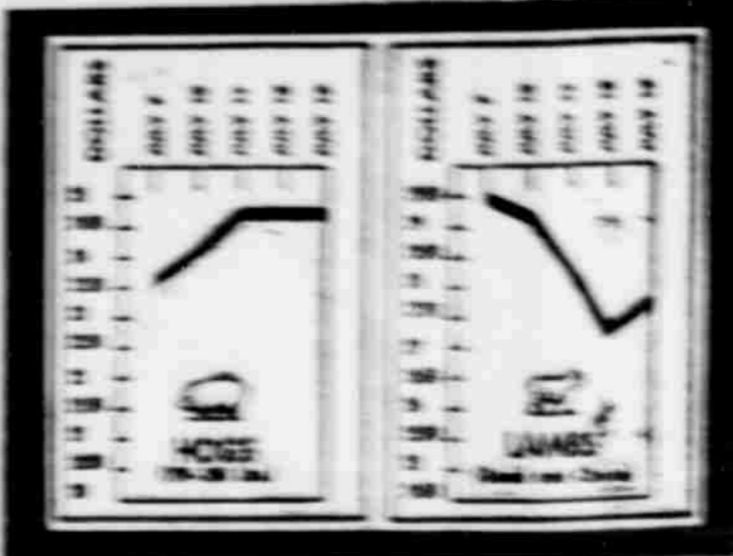
