Coach Deverelle Lewis will take 14 Littlefield trackmen to the District 1-AAA meet at Amarillo Saturday with Wildcat sights set on one of the best Littlefield showings in years.

"We'll enter just as many as we can in every event," Coach Lewis said. "We may not win many firsts, but we ought to place enough to get our share of the points."

Lewis' 1959 track team has already done something no other Cat cinder team could do. They brought home the school's first track trophy with a 440-yard relay championship at the Panhandle relays.

WHITHARRAL — W.M. Roberts, superintendent of Whitharral schools, resigned at a meeting of the school board here Monday night.

He has accepted the superintendency of Farwell schools, effective July 1.

Roberts is finishing his second year at Whitharral. He was principal of Oklahoma Lane School which has since consolidated with Farwell, and was high school principal at Farwell from 1949 to 1955.

The Roberts have two children, James, who with his wife, Karen resides in Amarillo, and Charles Roy at home.

He is superintendent of the Sunday School at the Whitharral Baptist Church and is affiliated with the local Lions Club.

7th Graders Here To Get Tests In Math, Science

Littlefield seventh grade students will be among 124,000 in Texas whose abilities in math, science and foreign language will be tested next month, Dr. Ralph Schilling, superintendent, said this week.

The Littlefield district is one of 375 in Texas who will be administering tests under terms of the National Defense Education Act. School boards which authorize the tests will be reimbursed by the federal government for the expense of giving the tests.

Each of about 130 students in Littlefield's seventh grade will receive two tests, Dr. Schilling said. These will be given some time in May.

Pupils will be tested in one exam for their ability, and on the other exam for their achievement in the scientific, mathematical and linguistic fields.

Dr. Schilling said the two tests will have nothing to do with the students' present course of work. The tests are part of the federal government program which is designed to point out students who are adept in these fields.

Board OK's Another Coach, Extra Teacher For 1959-60

Byron Douglass Named New Board President

Littlefield school trustees, beset by problems of wanting more than they feel like they can afford, Monday night approved employment of an additional coach and another primary teacher for 1959-60.

The action broke a precedent in that it was the first time for the board to authorize employment of more teachers than the number for which the school receives state aid.

The move is not a new one, however, because many other schools of Littlefield's size have done it for some time.

The board okayed the two new positions after long discussion, then handed its decision to Dr. Ralph Schilling, superintendent, to find a place in the budget for it.

Dr. Schilling told the board it would be hard to do, but that he and School Secretary Sid Hopping would investigate every possibility.

Earlier, the board had elected Byron Douglass as its new president and Jake Armstrong as vice-president. Douglass succeeds Dr. B. W. Armistead.

One new member, Weldon Findley, sat in on his first meeting, and the board treated him to a long one — a session that lasted from 7:30 p. m. Monday to 1:30 a. m. Tuesday.

Much of that time was spent on money matters. Other than the action on the new coach and teacher, the board:

1. Re-organized for the year after canvassing the votes in the April 4 trustee election. Douglass, the new president, and Findley, were named in that vote.
2. Accepted an invitation for dinner from the homemaking department at the high school. The dinner is set for May 5 at 7 p. m.
3. Raised the number of credits required for graduation to 29, starting with the class of 1962. This change does not affect the course requirements now in effect.
4. Authorized a new plan for teaching of driver education in which class work will be done in the school year and actual driving will be offered in the summer only, starting the summer after this coming one.
5. Named President Douglass as a member of the school study committee and appointed several citizens to sub-committees of the study. These sub-committees will be completed and announced at the next meeting of the study committee next Thursday night in the school library.
6. Appointed Forrest Moore as school bus foreman.
7. Heard recommendations from members of the business development committee of the Chamber of Commerce in regard to the survey the group made of students recently.
8. Gave a citizens committee from the Flats section of town permission to use the old school building for a community center.

Griffin Sells Half Interest Of Addition

Sid Hopping, school secretary, has purchased a half-interest in Cannon Terrace, the city's newest residential development, Clint Griffin, developer of the addition, announced this week.

Griffin and Hopping hope to have paving and water and sewer line installation completed by May 1.

The new 38-lot addition is located on the west side of town, just off Highway 54.

Sale of lots in the new addition is scheduled to get under way in full force about May 1. Prices on the lots have been set at \$20 per front foot, including all paving and water and sewer costs.

Workers were busy in the addition this week pouring curb and gutter. Sewer work is completed and water lines will be laid by the end of the week, Griffin said.

Restrictions in the addition call for all homes to be built of brick, stone or natural wood, ruling out stucco, asbestos or composition exteriors.

School 'Fiesta' Slated Here; 1,000 Expected

"Buenos dias." That's Spanish for "hello," but translated literally it means "good day."

And that's just what more than 1,000 visiting students plan to have here Saturday when the 12th Annual Fiesta Pan-Americana will be held at Littlefield High School.

Students of Spanish and Portuguese from 23 schools over much of West Texas and part of Eastern New Mexico are expected for the event.

Highlights of the fiesta will be the appearance of the Wayland Choir, a just-for-fun spelling contest, a pronunciation clinic, dance team performances and a market place, all climaxed by the feature of the day, the coronation of the fiesta king and queen.

Host for the fiesta is the Los Hidalgo Spanish Club of Littlefield High School, in cooperation with the Llano Estacado Chapter of American teachers of Spanish and Portuguese.

Littlefield will be represented at the coronation by Princess Freddie Gerlach and Prince Thomas Montoya. Both are students of Spanish and members of Los Hidalgos.

The fiesta will start at 8:30 a.m. with registration in the school library.

The morning program will be featured by a talk by Joe Salem of Sudan, who has traveled over much of the world.

The welcome will be given by Jack Lucy Jr., manager of the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce.

The market will be opened following Salem's address and students will take part in all sorts of merry-making in the school gym.

Before the coronation in the afternoon session, the Wayland choir and student musicians and dancers will perform.

At the coronation, each school will be represented by a prince and princess. They will be dressed in authentic native costumes and will give short descriptive speeches on legend, history or interesting facts about their wear.

'Chicken Village' Roads Closed: Votes Canvassed

County commissioners closed several public roads in "Chicken Village" west of Littlefield and canvassed school election returns in a regular meeting here Monday.

The court ordered Farr, Sighi, DeKaib, Ames and Hyline streets in the Farr Subdivision closed after receiving a petition from A. C. Chesher and seven others. The streets are in a caged layer project about a mile west of the city.

Commissioners also canvassed returns in the county school board election and certified Pat Boone Sr. as county-at-large trustee, N. Ray Kelley as precinct 2 board member and Albert Lockwood as precinct 3 trustee.

They also canvassed votes at Amherst and Spade, both of which have less than 500 scholastics. Clarence Black, Everett Lightner and Charles Hinds were elected at Amherst and Luther Woods, Harvey Neel and Otis Elder were named at Spade.

Only other activity saw the court approve a \$6,000 final payment of Plains Machinery Co. on a recently purchased motor grader for precinct 2, and approve the monthly extension service reports and the quarterly county treasurer's report.

County Judge Pat Boone Jr. said the court still has not received an appraisal of right-of-way costs on Highway 84 from Homer Robbins, the Lubbock appraiser. The court is waiting for the appraisal in connection with a proposed highway widening project.

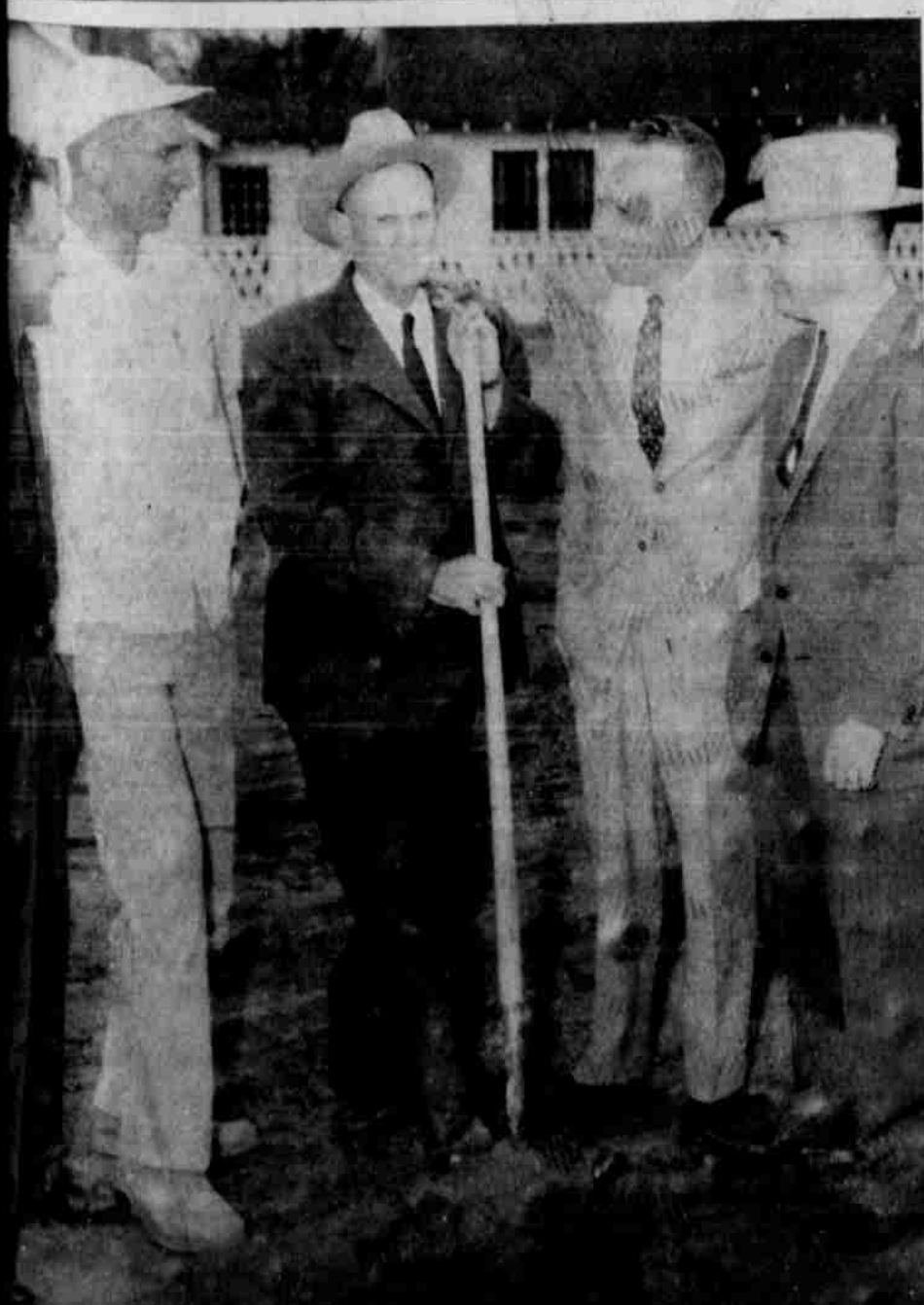
Hallford To Play When Wayland Meets Red Teams

Annual Legislature Meet? We Just Couldn't Pay It

It may come as a shock to tax-burdened Texans to learn that there are 66 different tax bills in the House revenue and taxation committee, where such bills must originate. If the taxpayers needed any jolt to call their attention to the trend of the times, this should do it.

The state is running a deficit of about \$65,000,000 during the current fiscal year. A deficit of more than \$150,000,000 is expected during the next two years, if present revenues are not augmented. This is under the current rate of spending. But legislative leaders have said they expect the spending rate to be increased at least \$30,000,000 to \$50,000,000 for the next two years.

That means the legislators are looking for taxes which will bring in \$200,000,000 additional during the next two years.

Is it any wonder that Texans last year defeated by a big margin the proposed constitutional amendment to hold annual session and raise legislators' pay? A reasonable pay raise for legislators probably would be approved by voters, but the annual session provision is enough to give taxpayers a nightmare.

If every session of the Legislature is going to be as disastrous for the taxpayer as the present one appears to be, it is fortunate that the Legislature meets only once every two years in regular session.

Texas taxpayers just can't afford annual sessions.

Sandhills Philosopher

New Trend To Destroy Science In Government?

Editor's Note: The Sandhills Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm may have his tongue in his cheek this week, although you can't tell. It may be his foot.

Dear editor: A new fad is developing among politicians that has me worried and it ought to be worrying everybody else. If it keeps going, the science of government will be destroyed.

It works like this: a delegation of citizens, say school teachers wanting a raise, a Chamber of Commerce wanting a new project, etc., goes before Congress or a state legislature committee or the city government or some other government outfit and lays out its requests.

Then some official pops up and says all right, you want us to spend this money, we're willing, but where would you like us to raise it? Name the tax you'd like us to vote to cover this new expense.

As far as I'm concerned, this undermines the whole idea of democratic government. Thunderation! If we have to tell a politician what we want, and then tell him where to find the money for it, what's the use in having politicians nominating votes?

Young Democrats of Texas, currently controlled by leftwingers, in the Legislature, the House declared the senator should pay more attention to the party platform. J. Ed Connally, chairman of the state executive committee, quickly announced the Young Democrats did not speak for the party. He called them "immature extremists."

Democrats of Texas, unofficial liberal organization, announced it would have a convention in Austin in May. DOT, also, has "fallen out" with Sen. Johnson. In the Legislature, the House elections committee approved a bill that would allow Senator Johnson to run for president and re-election as senator in the same general election.

INVESTMENT BOARD URGED: A bill by Sen. Hubert Hudson of Brownsville would create a new board to handle investments of three large state trust funds. 83 Making up the nine member board would be the governor, attorney general, comptroller, chairman of the two retirement systems, chairman of the State Board of Education and three bank presidents.

Investment in corporate stocks and bonds would be permitted by Hudson's Measure. Altogether the three funds total \$830,000,000. NO AGGIE WOMEN - U. S. Supreme Court has upheld state court rulings that women are not entitled by law to enter Texas A&M College.

A&M officials were pleased, but Bryan-Brazos County citizens, for the most part, took a dim view of the enrollment restriction. Their feelings were reflected in Bryan Sen. William T. Moore's prediction that "if the A&M Board continues its present policies, the time will come when A&M will have a classroom for each student enrolled there."

There is fear that when Arlington College, an A&M branch which admits women, advances to senior college status, it may eclipse the parent institution.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN, Tex. - Whichever way the ball bounces, Texans can look forward to a hefty increase in state taxes for 1960-61.

House of Representatives passed a general appropriations bill calling for spending of \$332,000,000 from general revenue. Senators took a more economical approach, began their work with a bill calling for \$30,000,000 less than the House measure.

Even so, the Senate proposal would spend some \$21,000,000 above the present level and require an estimated \$117,000,000 in new money.

House bill includes longevity pay raises for long-time state employees and increases in welfare checks to the aged, blind and dependent, all added during floor debate. House also accepted committee recommendations for boosts in the appropriations for higher education, state hospitals and special schools and the prison system.

GASOLINE TAX VIEWED - Gov. Price Daniel says he's ready to support a 1-cent hike in the state gasoline tax if it will be used to improve public schools, raise teacher salaries.

Neither the House nor Senate appropriations bill included public school teacher raises. Lawmakers seemed to think this, if it were done, should be handled in a separate bill.

Texas still would have a lower gasoline tax than other states, said Daniel, even after the 1-cent raise. He said he felt sure service station operators would "go along" with it if it were for the purpose of better schools.

Opponents say that, with practically everyone having to use a car these days, the gasoline levy is about as "general as a sales tax can get."

HEALTH CHIEF RESIGNS - Recent target of lawmakers is the State Health Department where Commissioner Henry A. Holle stepped out of his \$16,000-a-year post under the glare of legislative disapproval.

Dr. Holle said he felt the department would be better off with another commissioner who could get more support in the way of legislative appropriations.

Meanwhile, both House and Senate launched inquiries into Health Department spending practices. FLEXIBLE RATING OFF - State regulation of Texas auto insurance rates apparently will continue for at least another two years.

Senate Insurance Committee refused to approve a flexible rating plan, sent it to the sub-committee "graveyard."

Backers of the bill, mostly large out-of-state companies, claimed it would save Texas auto owners millions. Careful drivers would be rewarded with lower insurance, they said.

Opponents, including most Texas companies, fought the bill, said it would "take the lid off" rates. They said a merit rating plan, being considered by the State Board of Insurance, would take care of rewarding safe drivers.

LENDING BILL FILIBUSTERED - Senate disagreement over how to improve loan shark regulation brought on the first filibuster of the session.

Sen. Abraham Kazen of Laredo sponsored the House-passed measure which would, if approved by a vote of the people, amend the constitution. It would allow the Legislature to license lenders and set maximum interest rates. Present 10 per cent ceiling, widely ignored, would be abolished.

Sen. Frank Owen III of El Paso led a long-winded assault on the measure. He and other senators insisted such regulation should be limited to loans under \$500 to \$800. Senate gave Kazen's measure

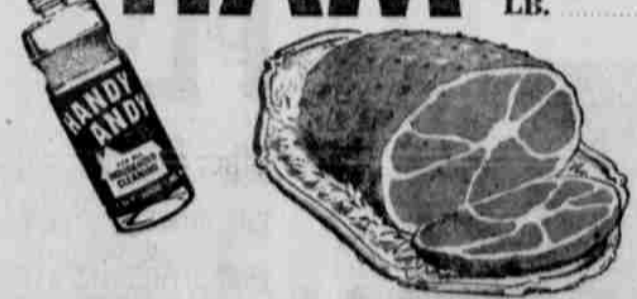

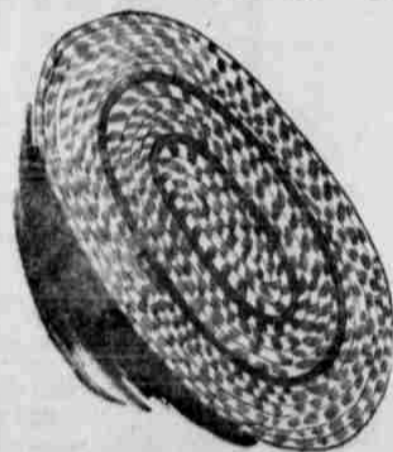
