Lubbock won first place in the stock judging, Farwell first in plant production team, while Embert Mueller, of Littlefield was high point man in the poultry judging.

The Littlefield animal judging team, consisting of Lee Pool, Willow with Traivis Baker as alternate received third place in that event.

For his skill in poultry judging, Embert Mueller received a four year scholarship in West Texas State Normal and a \$25 White Leghorn cockeral, donated by the Amarillo White Leghorn Farms, also a year's subscription to a leading poultry journal. This is the second Littlefield boy to win a scholarship on poultry, Stanley Stripe having won a two year scholarship to A. & M. College in the contests of last year.

The boys are now planning to attend the state contest, if funds are available, which contest will be held at College Station, April 20th.

The contest judges came from West Texas sections. County Agent H. Benton of Amarillo, Tisdall of Panhandle, Dunkle of Hereford, Bennett of Tulia, Thomas of Plainviev., Wison of Floydada, and Frank Eaton of Lubbock served as judges. Ted Neely of Amarillo, J. D. Tinsley, Santa Fe Agricultural Agent, and Byron Gist of Amarillo, also did judging work. Superintendent R. E. Dickson of the Spur Experiment Station served as judge in the sheep division and R. E. Karper in the grain sorghum division.

Teams from the following towns participated in the live stock judging contest: Tulia, Canyon, Kress, Olton, Pampa, Silverton, Hale Center, Littlefield, Lubbock, Dalhart and Hereford. Poultry judging teams attended from Muleshoe, Canyon Normal, Littlefield, Lubbock, Hale Center, Pampa and Silverton. There were teams in plant production from Farwell, District No. 10, Farwell, Liberty, Muleshoe, Lubbock, Clarendon, Littlefield, Kress, Happy and Union Hill.

STORE CLOSES DOORS; STOPPED ADVERTISING IS GIVEN AS REASON

Champaign, III.-Withdrawal of all advertising several years ago from Champaign News-Gazette is blamed as the chief contributing cause of the failure of Murdoc's Brothers, for 18 years a leading ladies' ready-to-wear store in the universal city.

The blame is assumed by E. L. Murdock in a signed letter published in the News-Gazette, following the voluntary closing of the doors of the concern to avert being thrown into

The part of his letter toching upon his inability to hold the public's trade without using newspaper space follows:

"Another contributing cause, and perhaps the greatest contributing cause, is the fact that during four years our firm, because we chought the rate was too high, withheld all advertising in the News-Gazette. For two years we were out of the paper. We were inthout proper means of getting messages about our store into the homes of our friends and buyers. The result was they soon forgot us. We tried other forms of advertising to supplant the News-Gazette, but we found none that was effective. Our business continued on the down

Here are some definite ideas on the subject from the Red Cross Nutrition Worker, Miss Esther V. Erick-

First, for all but the smallest children, some kind of meat or a meat substitute. It is better not to have the meat fried. Have a stew, roast, boiled meat or broil it. Did you ever try this? Have you some round steak ground, or use hamburger steak; make into a flat cake with a little flour, put this into a broiler or flat toaster, and cook directly over or under the flame; sear it quickly then let it cook more slowly it will be done in 10 or 15 minutes. Put some butter and salt on it, serve immediately, and see if it does not taste as good as any fried steak. It is far more healthful for the chil-

Instead of meat you may have baked beans or other legumes, an egg dish, clabber, cheese or a dish made with cheese (as macroni and cheese or day night and Sunday, cheese omlet.) Do not serve both, one of these and meat, but have it in place of meat if you like.

Second, a starchy food, potatoes, weet or Irish, and lets not have them fried, rice macroni, grits, or hominy. One of these is enough; it makes the meal too starchy to have both macaroni and potatoes, for instance.

Third, a green vegetable or two. I have heard people say "Vegetables don't count, just an extra, not real food.) Remember that vegetables build red-blood, bones and teeth, prevent constapation, and help keep us in good general health, can you say they are not a good food? So always plan at least one vegetable for dinner, other than potatoes. If you are not going to have two for dinner. One of them might well be salad.

Fourth, milk for the children. rlass every meal is the best rule.

Fifth, Bread and butter of course. Have graham whole wheat or rye bread often.

Sixth, a wholesome dessert. Let's have fewer pies and cakes and more fruits and simple puddings.

With this general plan, it is easy to vary the menu from day to day and still have healthful meals. Especially remember the vegetables, milk and simple dessert.
