



LOOKING AHEAD AT THE WEATHER

About this time of the year, as the Old Farmers' Almanac used to put it, look for the first crop of weather forecasts for the Winter. The long-range predictors are at it again, and are trying to tell us that we are going to have a severe Winter with plenty of cold, lots of snow

to have a severe Winter with plenty of cold, lots of snow and some heavy rains. So anyone who is inclined to be-lieve the weather prophets might as well get a fur coat and a pair of rubber boots and be prepared. Seriously, the chief of the United States Weather Bureau lends a little color to this attempt at long-range forecasting. Dr. W. R. Gregg, whose nickname in Wash-ington is "Old Probabilities," in his annual report des-cribes the development of new methods of foretelling the weather by the use of radio, "air-sounding," by means of balloons sent up to high altitudes and practicularly by the study of previous weather cycles. If there is anything in the weather cycle theory, then we may be in for a long the weather cycle theory, then we may be in for a long series of cold, wet winters, succeeding the 25 years or so of generally mild, open Winters prior to the last one. The science of meteorology, however, has not yet

reached the point, in Dr. Gregg's opinion, where a great reliance can be placed upon efforts to tell the weather child also sustained burns. Their for more than a week or two ahead.

Sometimes in this big country of ours the western part will suffer under a very severe Winter while the East is hardly affected. Sometimes it is the other way about. Nobody knows yet why the cold air currents from the North Pole which sweep southward sometimes comes down east of the Rocky Mountains and sometimes west of the mountains. Nobody is sure yet what effect sun spots and other disturbances outside of the earth's atmosphere have upon the weather. The only thing we can be sure of is, as the old couplet has it:

We shall have weather, whether or no."


Attainment of the administration's objective, the secretary said, centers around some method of controlled producted, crop insurance, the ever normal granary and other subjects
