Early in the week, according to Southwestern's Littlefield manager Ken Rotan, crews started the removal and changeover of the existing system, and have now started to set the bases for the new fixtures, which will be serviced from under-

Rotan said the lights on the east side of Phelps would remain on, and furnish lighting for the main street until the new lights were installed and connected, then the changeover procedure would be repeated.

"Reducing the Cost of Cotton Production" is the theme selected for the 26th annual session of the American Cotton Congress which opens at 9:30 a.m. Friday, May 28 in the KoKo Palace, Lubbock. Hosting the one-day affair is-Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., cotton producer organization which represents 23 High Plains counties surrounding Lubbock, and PCG is urging all area farmers to attend.

First topic for the morning session will be titled "Textile Mill Views on Need for Cutting Cotton Costs," given by E.W. Webb, Director of Cotton Service Corporation, a Dallas based division of Hanes Corporation. He will be followed on the program by Claude Welch, Division of Production and Marketing, National Cotton Council, who will speak on "National Research for Cotton with Emphasis on Cost Reduction." Jasper E. Jernigan, Agronomist with the Federal Extension Service, will speak on "Specialized Extension Education Pro-

Wednesday Truck Crash Fatal To Amarillo Man

days on Lamb County highways. came to an endearly Wednesday morning when a grinding, sliding, one-vehicle accident, 100 feet north of the Littlefield city limits on U.S. 385, took the life of R.V. Pennington, Jr., 33, of

Pennington, driving an empty 30-foot rig for the Carter Trucking Company of Stratford, Texas, was pronounced deadon-arrival at Littlefield Hospital at 4:15 a.m. Wednesday. A hospital spokesman said the truck driver had numerous broken bones, and a large laceration on the left side of his scalp. Exact cause of death was not determined, but the hospital said any of the numerous injuries received by the victim could have

Investigating officers, Weldon Parsons and Bill Angel, said Pennington was driving south on 385 and apparently fell asleep. The truck veered to the right knocking down a driveway culvert and plowing a 150 foot furrow in a bar ditch before coming to rest in a field 40 feet from

The grinding flipping action of the big rig separated the International Cabover from the van, allowing the empty trailer to pass over, and flatten the cab. The front axle of the tractor was severed from the cab and left standing 20 feet from the major part of the wreckage.

Highway patrolman Bill Angel said Pennington was found about 6 feet from the cab, and along-

Services for the accident victim are pending at LaGrone Funeral Home in Canyon. A truck-Pennington is survived by a wife and several children, but efforts, by the highway patrol, to Tax Returns reach the family have failed.

The school, designed to teach arm hands how to drive and service tractors and other farm implements as well as irrigaton practices. Though the 88 acres is dryland, the irrigation can be taught by using water from the Steffy wells.

The Littlefield school system s sponsoring the project in conunction with the Texas Employnent Commission who will provide housing for the students during their stay here.

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
