Wednesday Truck Crash Fatal To Amarillo Man

A 137-day string of deathless days on Lamb County highways, came to an end early Wednesday morning when a grinding, sliding, one-vehicle accident, 100 feet north of the Littlefield city limits on U.S. 385, took the life of R.V. Pennington, Jr., 33, of Amarillo.

Pennington, driving an empty 30-foot rig for the Carter Trucking Company of Stratford, Texas, was pronounced dead-on-arrival at Littlefield Hospital at 4:15 a.m. Wednesday. A hospital spokesman said the truck driver had numerous broken bones, and a large laceration on the left side of his scalp. Exact cause of death was not determined, but the hospital said any of the numerous injuries received by the victim could have been fatal.

Investigating officers, Weldon Parsons and Bill Angel, said Pennington was driving south on 385 and apparently fell asleep. The truck veered to the right knocking out a driveway culvert and plowing a 150 foot furrow in a bar ditch before coming to rest in a field 40 feet from the highway.

The grinding flipping action of the big rig separated the International Cabover from the van, allowing the empty trailer to pass over, and flatten the cab. The front axle of the tractor was severed from the cab and left standing 20 feet from the major part of the wreckage.

Highway patrolman Bill Angel said Pennington was found about 6 feet from the cab, and alongside the van.

An official of the Carter Trucking Company told investigating officers Wednesday morning, Pennington had left Amarillo around 1 a.m. Wednesday morning and was enroute to Andrews. He was carrying a load of cattle for transportation back to Amarillo. According to the official, Pennington had reported in about midnight, unloaded a small load of cattle, and then departed for Andrews.

Services for the accident victim are pending at LaGrone Funeral Home in Canyon. A trucking company spokesman said Pennington is survived by a wife and several children, but efforts, by the highway patrol, to reach the family have failed.

Downtown Project Enters Second Phase

Littlefield's grand downtown "Park-and-Shop" project moved into, what could be called, its second phase this week as the Pioneer Natural Gas completed the installation of their new 6-inch main and the Southwestern Public Service Company began to set the standards for Phelps Avenue's new 54,000 lumen mercury vapor lighting system.

Early in the week, according to Southwestern's Littlefield manager Ken Rotan, crews started the removal and change-over of the existing system, and have now started to set the bases for the new fixtures, which will be serviced from underground.

Rotan said the lights on the east side of Phelps would remain on, and furnish lighting for the main street until the new lights were installed and connected, then the changeover procedure would be repeated.

Charlie Duvall, manager of

Pioneer Natural Gas said crews have completed the installation of the mains and are now working on changing out the feeder lines, and will soon be installing the new flush mount meters. "In all," Duvall said, "our work is considerably ahead of our anticipated schedule, and we feel we will be through along with the other phases of the project."

General contractor Hugh Bledsoe has indicated on numerous occasions that his crews are still ahead of schedule and feels a big part of the reason lies in the co-operation they have received from the businessmen of Littlefield. Bledsoe said, "When you get the type of co-operation we have received it makes work a real pleasure, and goes a long way in helping get the job completed."

Bledsoe still maintains his portion of the project will be complete by the first of July, with an estimated opening date of the completed project still set for mid-September.

The convention will close at three Sunday afternoon following a business meeting and an auxiliary meeting set to start at 1:30 p.m. in the Post home.

Cotton Meeting Scheduled At Lubbock Starting May 28

"Reducing the Cost of Cotton Production" is the theme selected for the 26th annual session of the American Cotton Congress which opens at 9:30 a.m. Friday, May 28 in the KoKo Palace, Lubbock. Hosting the one-day affair is Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., cotton producer organization which represents 23 High Plains counties surrounding Lubbock, and PCG is urging all area farmers to attend.

First topic for the morning session will be titled "Textile Mill Views on Need for Cutting Cotton Costs," given by E.W. Webb, Director of Cotton Service Corporation, a Dallas based division of Hanes Corporation. He will be followed on the program by Claude Welch, Division of Production and Marketing, National Cotton Council, who will speak on "National Research for Cotton with Emphasis on Cost Reduction." Jasper E. Jernigan, Agronomist with the Federal Extension Service, will speak on "Specialized Extension Education Pro-

gram with Emphasis on Cost Reduction," followed by a question and answer period.

Chairman of the morning meeting will be Dr. Gerald Thomas, Dean of Agriculture at Texas Technological College; welcome address will be given by Donald A. Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, and Burris Jackson, Chairman of the American Cotton Congress, will deliver the keynote address.

A free lunch will be served at noon, joint courtesy of Plains Cotton Growers and the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, with Frank Lowenstein, noted USDA Economist as the luncheon speaker. Lowenstein will be introduced by Dusty Rhodes, President of the New York Cotton Exchange.

The afternoon session, with State Agricultural Agent V.G. Young as chairman, will open with a report on "Needed Support for Cotton Research in Texas" by Charlie Scruggs, Editor of Progressive Farmer Magazine. Those in attendance will then hear an outline of "Plans for Cotton Cost Reduction in Texas" by Billy Gunter, District Agent, Lubbock. And closing out the annual event will be a panel discussion of "Farmer Views on Cotton Cost Reduction," with John Seibert, Area Farm Management Specialist of Lubbock serving as moderator. Three area farmers will be included on the panel.

According to Johnson, "Current conditions in the cotton industry make it imperative that every known means of cutting the cost of producing cotton be utilized, and producers in attendance should come away with some good ideas."

Fires Damage Country Club, Guts House In Spade

A fire Monday morning that broke out in the snack bar area of the Littlefield Country Club caused damage estimated at over \$3,000 to the interior and roof of the building.

The fire, believed to have been caused by the grill in the snack bar was brought under control by the Littlefield fire department within minutes of their reaching the scene.

The entire interior received smoke damage and the area including the main dining room will need repainting. The ceiling of the dining area was also damaged to such an extent that

it will have to be replaced. Damage was also done to portions of the building's roof from the fire which spread between the ceiling and the roof.

In another fire a house located at the main intersection in Spade was gutted by fire at approximately 4 a.m. Sunday morning.

The house, owned by Mrs. Mamie Davis, Spade, was being rented by Mrs. Connie Moya. Three daughters and a three-week old granddaughter were living in the house.

The Moyas were visiting with a daughter in Littlefield at the time of the fire which destroyed the furniture in the three room house.

Tax Returns Over 91 Per Cent

More than ninety-one percent of the 1964 taxes have been collected according to Charlotte Lightsey of the Littlefield City Tax office.

A total of \$149,850.50 in real estate, personal property and oil taxes have been paid by Littlefield residents, with approximately \$12,000 delinquent taxes still outstanding. The \$12,000 raised the figure of uncollected taxes to almost \$35,000 over the past forty years with some dating back as far as 1925.

A penalty of ten percent plus an interest rate of one-half of one percent per month starting March 1, is charged on the delinquent taxes and in some cases, especially where the taxes have not been paid for years the penalty now far exceeds the total taxes due on the property.

McDonough Named Bus Driver Of Year

Allen McDonough, who was asked to serve as a substitute bus driver for "two or three weeks" in 1936 and has been driving a bus in the Littlefield school system ever since was selected as the Bus Driver of the Year for Lamb County. At ceremonies held in the Littlefield School Superintendent Glenn Reeves office, Texas Department of Public Safety officer, Mr. C.A. Dempsey, presented a scroll for his being selected Driver of the Year for 1964-65.

During the past 29 years McDonough has driven over 1,750,000 miles of accidents free driving for the school, counting numerous co-curricular activities trips.

MDTA School Nears Reality

The Manpower Development Training Act school moved closer to its final stages this week when the Littlefield School district and the Texas Employment Commission decided on tracts of land and proposed buildings to house the students.

A prepared budget has been forwarded outlining the cost of the project of approximately \$22,000 to the government and State.

The proposed building to be used for classroom instruction for the approximately 30 students is located at East 5th and Hall with two rooms, one 42 by 75 feet and the other a 30 by 30' room to be used for classroom.

Approval has also been gotten to use the 88 acre tract of land near the James Steffy property. Though the land is now in soil bank, permission has been received to use the land with the understanding that the land will be replanted at the end of the six month school and no crop raised on the land.

The school, designed to teach farm hands how to drive and service tractors and other farm implements as well as irrigation practices. Though the 88 acres is dryland, the irrigation can be taught by using water from the Steffy wells.

The Littlefield school system is sponsoring the project in conjunction with the Texas Employment Commission who will provide housing for the students during their stay here.

City Council Meets Tonight

The Littlefield City Council will meet tonight at 7 p.m. in the council room with six items on the agenda at press time. Minutes of the previous meeting will be read for approval and bills paid.

Approval of Bill Weige as assistant fire marshal will be voted on and lights for the colored addition will be discussed.

The next item to be discussed is the purchasing of equipment for the city dog pound. Bob Hill has been appointed as the poundmaster for the city effective Thursday.

Another item on the agenda will be possibility of employing additional persons on the city police force during the summer months while regular members are on vacation.

In other council action, Jack Christian has been appointed as a member of the Littlefield City Planning Commission in an announcement made yesterday by mayor J.E. Chisholm.

Christian's appointment is for five years and he replaces "Pop" Hodges, whose term on the commission expired the first of this month.

Insecticide Fatal To Lfd. Child

Calvin Earl Holmes, four-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Holmes, Sr. of Littlefield, died early Monday night at Medical Arts Hospital from an apparent dose of insecticide which was taken internally.

According to a spokesman for the hospital the child was brought in by his parents about mid-afternoon Monday complaining of stomach pains and cramps. The child's parents told the attending doctor they had found the boy and his five-year-old brother playing in an area where the insecticide, which contained DDT, had been applied. Both children, according to the parents, had the powdery poison on their hands and clothes, but the younger child appeared to be the only one which had put any of the poison in his mouth.

Official cause of death of the child is unknown pending an autopsy. The family returned to the hospital with the older child Tuesday afternoon, but according to the hospital spokesman, the child was released after several hours of observation.

The board composed of Hill, Richey, Bennett, Jerry Sanders, Mrs. T.L. Dunlap, Boyd Allen, Mrs. I.T. Shotwell Jr., Warren Birkelbach, and Carl Pillion met again yesterday to formulate plans for the coming year.

A committee was assigned to publicize the development of the City of Littlefield, and the committee headed by John Richey with Mrs. Shotwell and Mr. Birkelbach as members will have signs erected on all highways leading into Littlefield describing the development of the entire city.

Mrs. Dunlap was named as the representative from the BCD to sit on the joint committee of the Chamber of Commerce and City Council on the planning of the downtown improvement opening in September.

Pillion, Allen and Bennett were named to represent the board to work with the City Council and Chamber of the annual spring clean up project.

The County Library will be closed from May 24 through May 28 it was announced yesterday by Mrs. Hicks, librarian. The library will re-open on May 31 following the closing during which period, books in the library will be mended.

Littlefield Women Return From Trip By Banana Boat

In this fast-moving mechanical world of ours, there are many modes of travel and so very many places to vacation. But how many persons do you know that have visited the Panama Canal and Florida, traveling by fruit boat? Three Littlefield women returned last week from just such a vacation.

Mrs. E.G. Brunson, Mrs. D.C. Lindley, and Mrs. J.R. Coen, accompanied by Mrs. Bill Clayton, Sr. of Springlake, traveled to New Orleans by car. They were joined there by Mrs. Lindley's sister, Mrs. Jewel Banks-ton of Picayune, Miss., and Mrs. Zella Yowell of Stanford, Ky., for the fruit boat trip.

Embarking on the steamship, SS Yaque, at New Orleans, the group began their trip, which they describe as very carefree and enjoyable. They weren't worried about hotels or restaurants, as they ate all meals and slept on the ship. The ship had accommodations for 12 passengers.

The first stop was at Kingston, Jamaica, where one and one-half days were spent sight-seeing, while freight was being unloaded. The next stop was at Cristobal, where more freight was unloaded. Then one of the most exciting and enjoyable parts of the vacation, that of going through the canal zone. The trip through the zone took eight hours and was so fascinating the passengers never left the deck, except to eat. The thing that made it so interesting was observing how the locks took care of the passage of the ship and the beautiful scenery.

At Armuellas, Panama, which is on the Pacific side of the canal, the party toured a banana plantation and box factory. They observed how bananas grow, are cut, processed for packing, labeled and packed in boxes. Thirty-six thousand boxes of bananas weighing about 40 pounds each were loaded on the ship.

At Balboa, more freight was unloaded and the group did more sightseeing. Mrs. Brunson says the flowers in Panama and Jamaica were very beautiful and they were of all varieties. They also saw many, many birds and animals.

On the return trip through the canal zone, the ship docked at Almirante, which is on the Atlantic side of the canal. While sitting on the deck, thousands of parakeets flew over and lighted on the coconut trees that lined the docks. Mrs. Brunson said they were beautiful but very noisy. "They all talked at once". Another 36,000 boxes of bananas were loaded at Almirante.

The ship was then on its way to Florida where some of the

bananas were unloaded in Tampa, and then to New Orleans, where the rest were unloaded. The passengers left the ship there and toured the city before

leaving by car on their return trip home. They visited Mrs. Lindley's sister and family in Pacayune, Miss., and a brother in Brooksville, Miss., before leaving for Texas.

Plans for this trip have been made since last November when their reservations were made. On a trip of this kind, the passengers don't know ahead of time where the ship will go. It depends upon the stops the ship makes to pick up or unload freight.

FRESH APPLE CAKE
2 eggs
2 cups sugar
1 1/2 cups wesson oil
1 tsp. soda
1/4 tsp. salt
3 cups fresh apples
1 tsp. cinnamon
3 cups flour
1 cup pecans.
Mix in order. Dough will be thick, mix well. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 1/2 hours.

SOAPAPILLA
2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 teaspoons baking powder
2/3 to 3/4 cup milk
Mix all ingredients as you would for biscuits. Knead for about 1 minute. Roll pie crust thin and cut in triangle and fry in very hot deep fat til golden brown. Serve with honey and butter.
