The successful bidder will be required also to furnish a performance bond for 100% of his total bid.

All pipe, according to City Engineer Ralph Douglass, purchased from Van Doren, Camp Bowie, and a portion from Camp Wallace have been received, and the City expects the pipe from Camp McCain this week.

It is hoped by the City to get started on the water works extension work by May 1.

### Southwest Farm Markets Bring Steady To Stronger Prices

Most southwest farm products brought steady to stronger prices during the past week despite weakness in some cattle and vegetables, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reports.

Very light offerings of Kionmore strawberries held firm at \$6.50 per 24 pint crate in week-end trade at Hammond, Louisiana. Sweet potatoes strengthened under good demand in southern Louisiana as cured U. S. No. 1 Porto Ricans brought \$4.50 to \$5 per 50-lb. crate. Week's trade found beets unchanged in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, but carrots weakened slightly in light demand. Eagle Pass and Winter Garden districts moved cutleaf spinach for packaging slightly weaker at \$1.75 per bushel.

Lighter receipts of livestock at the southwest markets found prices generally steady to strong, although lower grade cows and all grade calves sold

50 cents to \$1 lower at Fort Worth and San Antonio. Oklahoma City quoted vealers to \$27 and choice heavy calves to \$26. Best calves reached \$26 at Fort Worth, \$26 at San Antonio, and \$26.50 at Houston. Good and choice vealers topped at \$32 at Denver.

Hogs brought steady to 25 cents higher prices in Texas and Oklahoma for the week, and 50 cents higher at Denver. Sows held unchanged in Texas, but gained around 50 cents at Oklahoma and Colorado markets. Good and choice medium weight butcher hogs topped at \$21 in Texas, \$21.50 at Oklahoma City, and \$23 at Denver. Sows ranged from \$16 to \$17.50 in Texas and Oklahoma, and from \$16 to \$18 at Denver.

Sheep and lambs scored advances of 50 cents to as much as \$1.50 throughout the southwest. Spring lambs arrives in greater numbers, although overall receipts fell below a week ago.

\$27.50 at San Antonio, and \$29 at Fort Worth, while 84 pound offerings touched \$32 at Oklahoma City. Denver turned good and choice lightweight woolled lambs at \$31 per hundred pounds.

Yellow corn advanced about a nickel for the week, and wheat, oats and white corn a cent or less. Barley and sorghums lost 1 to 2 cents. No. 1 hard wheat closed Monday at \$2.40 1-4 to \$2.46 1-4 in bulk carlots. Based on No. 2 grades, white corn sold around \$1.72 with yellow corn at \$1.63 1-2, and barley \$1.38 to \$1.40. Galveston moved No. 2 white oats at \$1 1-4 to 92 cents. No. 2 yellow milo brought \$2.58 to \$2.63 per 100 lbs.

Eggs and poultry sold firm to higher during the past week. Most current receipt eggs brought around 40 cents a dozen. Heavy hens ranged from 32 to 35 cents a pound at Fort Worth, 34 to 36 at Dallas, 36 to 38 at Denver, and 38 to 43 at New Orleans.

Southwest peanuts held firm during the week, and some unusually early planting started in North Texas. Hay and feeds met seasonally slow trade with a weaker undertone. Rice sold steady to slightly lower with short

grain varieties showing the decline. Heavy rains throughout most of the southern rice belt delayed planting. Cotton sold unchanged for the week. Spot middling 15-16 inch closed Monday at 32.50 cents a pound a Dallas and Houston, 32.45 at New Orleans, and 32.55 at Little Rock.

### AMHERST SERGEANT IS EXPECTED HOME

PARIS, FRANCE, March 21, 1949 — Sergeant First Class Poston H. Tapp, of Route 1, Amherst, Texas, is expected to return soon to the United States, having completed his overseas tour of duty, it was announced today. Sergeant Tapp is currently assigned to the First Zone, American Graves Registration Command, European Area, with headquarters at Liege, Belgium.

The First Zone, American Graves Registration Command, is responsible in northwestern continental Europe for the United States Army's searching and cemeterial operations, and its present program to return to the homeland those U. S. dead of World War II, whose next-of-kin so request. The First Zone area, which includes the battle fields of the 1944-45 Ardennes campaign, covers Belgium and The Netherlands. In these countries were established seven temporary U. S. World War II Military Cemeteries in which 51,155 American dead were formerly interred. From the First Zone were returned the first U. S. dead of World War II from the former European Theater area — 5,600 who left Antwerp on October 4, 1947.

While carrying out its program to return World War II dead, the First Zone is assisting in the Command's initial mission of searching the former European Theater area for the remains of United States World War II dead buried in isolated graves—4,913 of which were still undiscovered as of October 1, 1948. During 1947, the Command's personnel travelled nearly 11,000,000 miles through 17 European countries in the accomplishment of searching and repatriation operations and the maintenance of the temporary United States Military Cemeteries of World War II.

During World War II, Sergeant Tapp—who was assigned to the 84th Field Artillery Battalion, 9th Division—saw action in the campaigns of Tunis, Algeria, Normandy, Northern France, the Ardennes, Rhineland and Central Europe. He was awarded the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service in combat against an armed enemy, and the Purple Heart for wounds sustained in action.

Sergeant Tapp is the son of Mr. Camillo Tapp, who also maintains residence at the Amherst address.

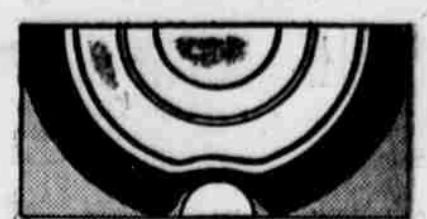
Mr. Gonzales was attended by Mr. Thorton of Lubbock.

### Simplified System Of Reporting On GI Training

Veterans training under the GI Bill—as well as their schools and training establishments—will have less paper work to do under a simplified reporting system which goes into effect April 1, Veterans Administration Regional Manager Robert W. Sisson, said today.

After that date, VA no longer will require monthly progress reports for veteran trainees in job-training establishments and in schools other than colleges and universities.

Instead, reports of conduct and progress will be incorporated in a report

of earnings, which veterans now file and which they will continue to submit to VA every four months.

As a result of the new procedure, VA Regional Offices will process at least 5,000,000 fewer forms a year, with an appreciable savings in clerical work.

### Army Day To Go Unobserved Here

April 6, Army Day, apparently will only be marked in Littlefield with a display of flags and possibly a radio speech. However throughout the nation and at Army installations overseas, there will be parades, exhibits, "open house" at Army posts and National Guard armories, statements by high Government officials and Army officers, radio and television shows. All will follow the basic theme of unity.

The theme of this 1949 Army Day will be "The United States Army — Part of the Team — for Security."

This day is not only set aside by the American people to honor the institution they maintain with their money and their men but also provides an

occasion for the Army to report to the people on its worldwide assignments and activities.

Mayor Chesher issued a proclamation Saturday proclaiming April 6 as Army Day in Littlefield, calling on all citizens to be mindful of the fact that our Army can accomplish its mission, both at home and abroad, only with the constant awareness and generous support of our people.

### County Trustee Election Saturday

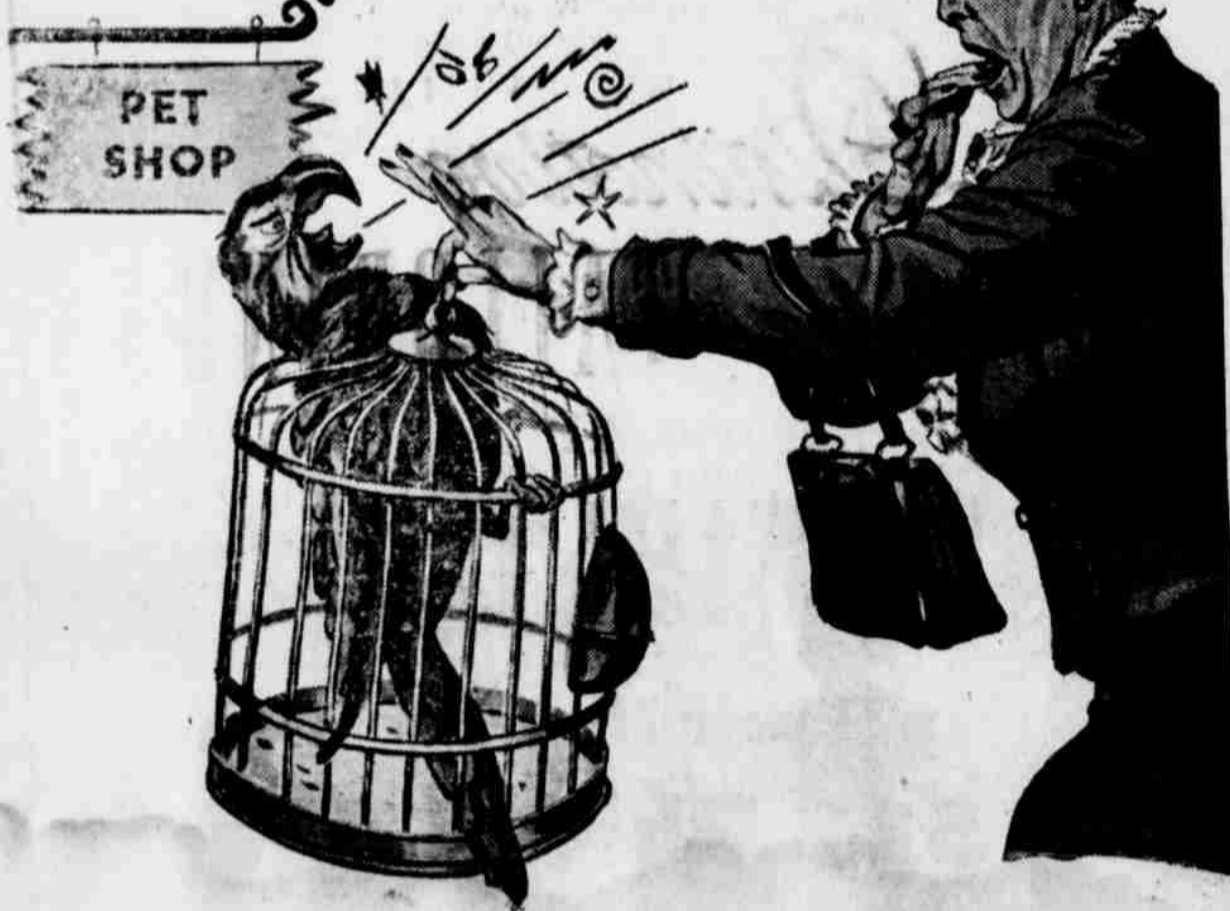

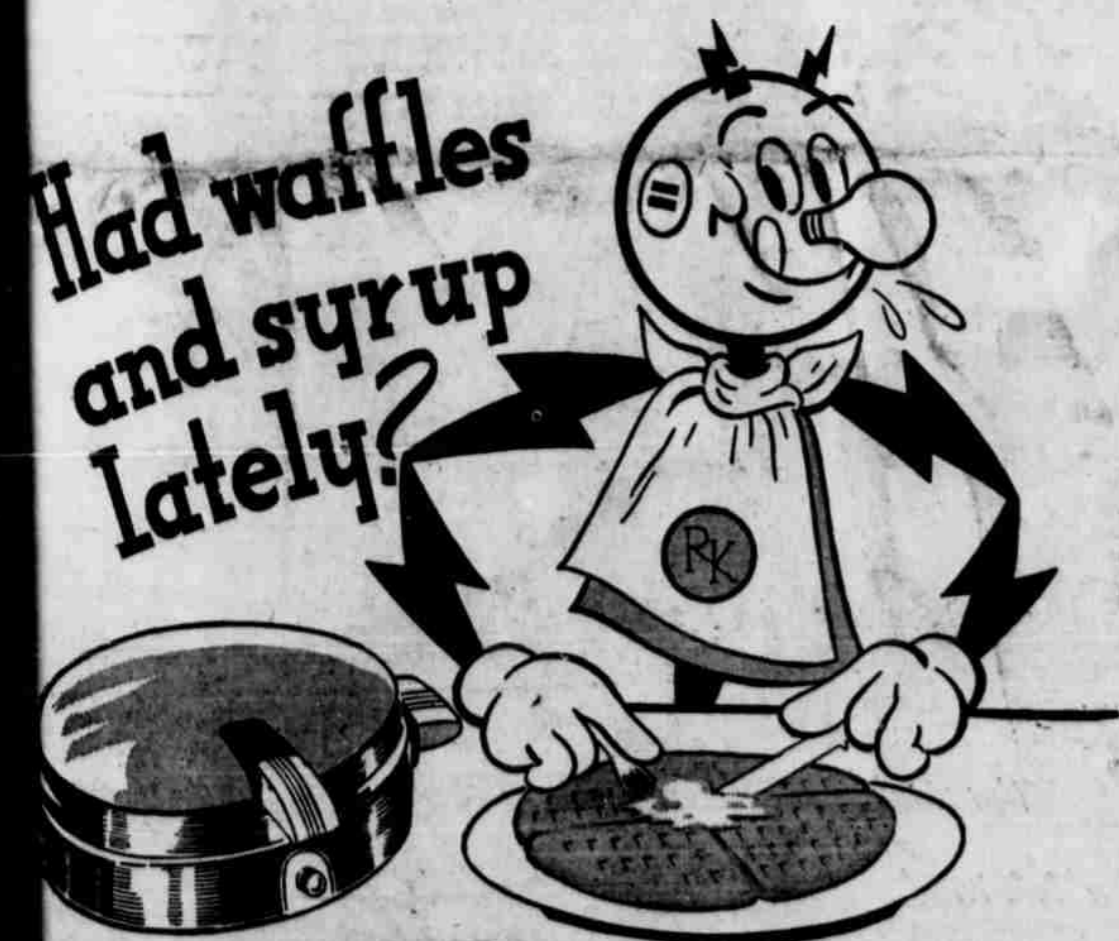

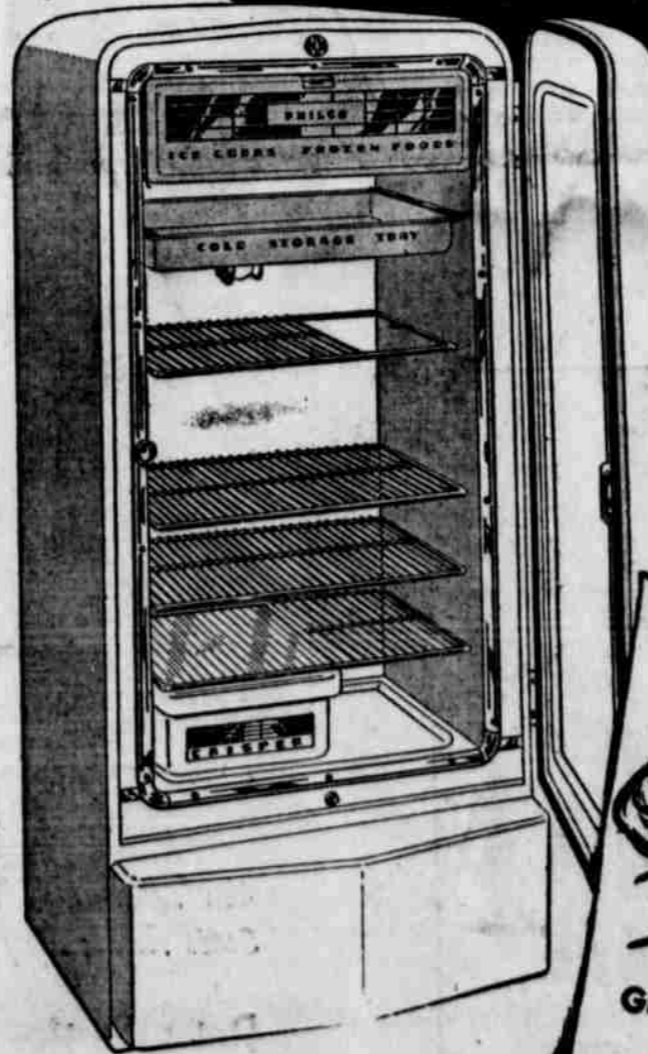

BULL LAKE PHILOSOPHER GETTING TIRED OF BEING ASKED HOW FARMING OUTLOOK IS. SO HAULS OFF AND SAYS

Editor's note: The Bull Lake Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Bull Lake is about the last one we'd ask if we wanted to know what the farming situation is, but he claims people have been asking him and here's his answer. Dear editor:

Every time I go into town about this time of the year, which is every chance I get, the same as any other time of the year, as long as any work is threatening, somebody asks me well how's the farmin' situation? Gonna have a good year this year? Merchants rub their hands, expecting a good crop year, which means a good business year, and so forth. Seems like they want me to tell em now how much money farmers will have to spend with em next fall.

In fact, I been answering this question so much lately I decided to give my answer in your paper, on the off chance a few people at least would see it and stop asking.



The farming situation is this: Ain't no man alive who can tell you what it is. Just as soon try to tell you what Russia will do or what women will say about a third one when she ain't there.

Anybody can put corn or cotton or wheat in the ground with a heart full of hope and confidence, but instead of forty bushels of a bale a acre he may be startin a program of goin up one row and down another all spring and summer for a wash tub full of gibbins or smutty wheat or a tow-sack full of trashy cotton, about enough to pay for the gas to get to town one Saturday afternoon.

The farmin' situation right now is this time of the year, as best I can tell after years of experience, is exactly like it is every year I been farm-

in; so uncertain, so unstable, so likely to end up in a bust, no normal man would allow himself to be taken in by such a way of life. The way it looks this spring, which in the way it's looked every spring since some enemy of mankind invented the plow, is that there ain't but one chance to come out ahead this fall, but here is hundreds of chances to come out in the hole. Everything has to be just right to make a crop, but any one of a hundred things can go wrong to bring up at the end of the year as busted as Europe. With such odds as that, I can't figure out why anybody would try it. But you can hear tractors running all over he place out here.

On the other hand, also, there is some jobs in town I wouldn't care for. In fact, there's jobs every where you look I wouldn't care for.

The next time anybody asks you what the farmin' situation is this spring, tell him it's normal, it looks hopeless, but it's goin right on.

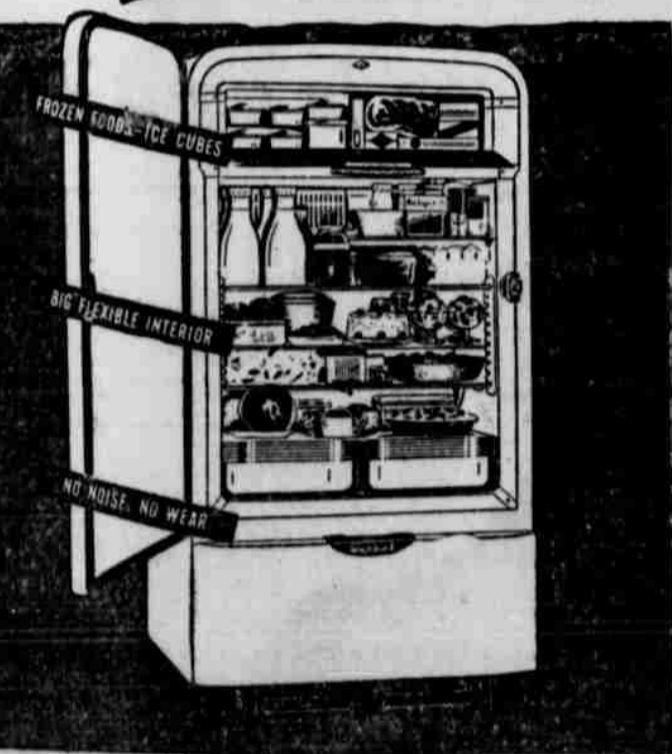

### Kaiser-Frazer Sedan Combines Features Of Four Door And Station Wagon

WILLOW RUN, Mich.—Kaiser-Frazer Corp. is introducing a new lower-priced six-passenger automobile which combines the carry-all features of a station wagon with the comforts and appearance of a deluxe four-door sedan.

Identified as the Traveler, the model is one of two 1949 Kaiser utility models designed for the one-car family which needs supplemental transportation for business or recreational use.

Priced well below standard sized station wagons and most conventional sedans in the 123 1-2 inch wheelbase class, the Traveler retails at the factory for \$2,088. The Vagabond, a luxury companion model styled for the "estate wagon" field, is scheduled for production later in the spring.

The multi-purpose adaptability of the utility models is gained from two major functional design features without

sacrifice of six-passenger comfort and four-door sedan styling.

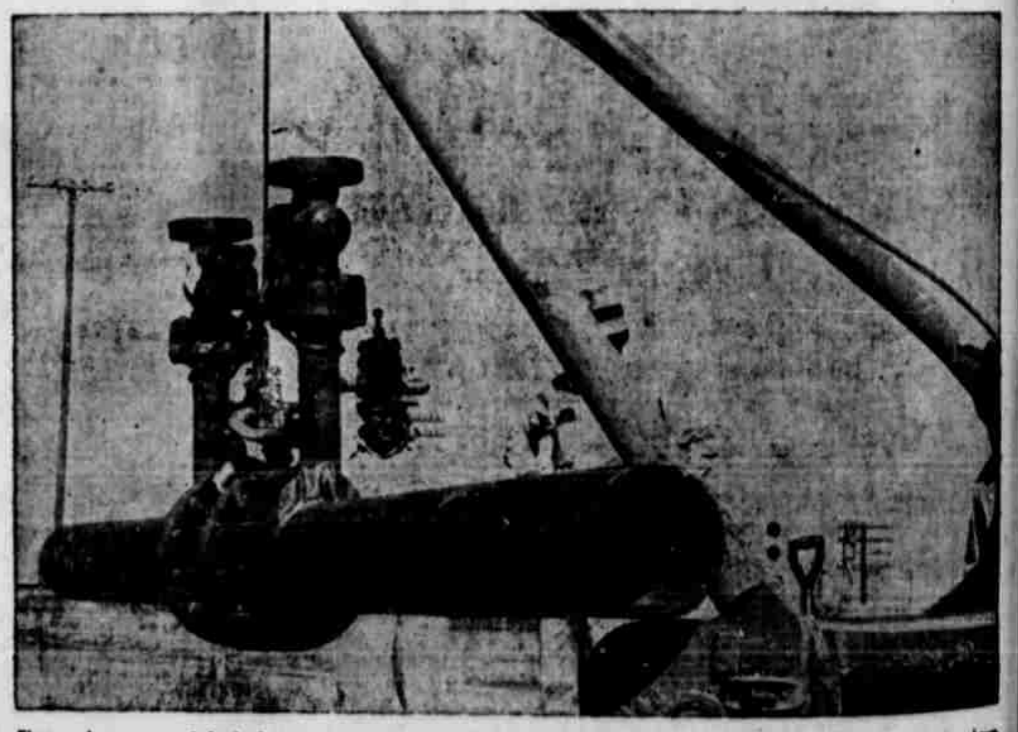

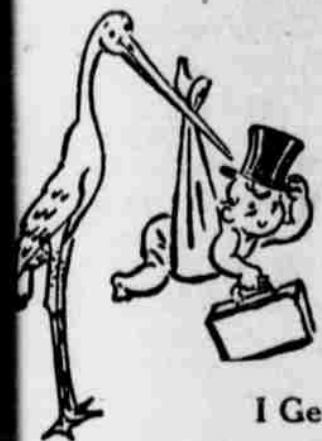

## Oil Well Completed In Anton-Irish Field By Stanolind

A commercial oil well has been completed in the Hale county portion of the Anton-Irish field. It is Stanolind Oil & Gas Company No. 4 C. A. Rice, 1,900 feet from south and 660 feet from west lines of the lease in section 19, block DT, EL&RR survey.

The well finished for a 24-hour pumping potential of 141.73 barrels of 29-gravity oil, with a gas-oil ratio of 111-1. Total fluid recovered has a shakeout of 30 per cent water.

The pay section at 5,594-6,137 feet was previously acidized with 10,000 gallons.

Also in this area of the pool, a new location has been staked as Herman Brothers No. 3 Hufstedler, a 5,000-foot rotary tool exploration starting at once.

The drillsite is 2,196 feet from north and 386 feet from west lines of section 33, L&SV survey.

Over in the Lamb county sector of the Anton-Irish pool, anton Oil Corporation completed its No. 5-A Leftwich for 215 barrels of oil per day. The potential test followed a 25,000-gallon acid treatment in the pay zone at 5,510-6,007 feet.

This new producer is in section 32, block 1, Thompson survey.

Active operations in the Anton Irish field:

Gulf No. 8-T, Hufstedler was testing open hole at 5,833-6,020 feet after acidizing with 10,000 gallons. Last gauge showed 242 barrels of oil in 51 hours of pumping.

Gulf No. 9-T Hufstedler was beyond 3,677 feet, drilling anhydrite.

Stanolind No. 6-A Rollingsford Savings Bank was bottomed on 6,042 feet in lime, running a lane wells survey prior to setting pipe.

### West Texan's Per Capita Share Of Debt Amounts To \$1,917 According To C-C

West Texas paid more for its share in the operation of the federal government in 1948 than the entire operating expenses for the United States was in 1900, according to information received from the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce.

The Public Expenditures and Taxation Commission of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce released the information to the local Chamber following a compilation prepared by the Research department.

Lamb county's share of the United States budget is \$5,633,920 and the county's share of the U. S. debt is \$33,750,702.

The cost of government for the entire U. S. in 1900 was only \$457,451,000 (M) while the West Texas share alone in 1948 exceeded 600 million dollars.

Quoting from the W. T. C. C. President's News Letter, "We were amazed to find that the West Texas share of our budget today is greater than the cost of the government of the entire United States in the year 1900. Of course, we all realize the tremendous growth and the demand for services and appreciate that the cost of government should increase. We also believe that more business principles applied to the government will reduce our annual budget, our per capita share in the debt and the total outstanding debt of the United States.

"We hope you will study these figures as they apply to your county and call them to the attention of your representative in Congress. He will be inter-

ested in knowing how you feel also." Based on the last official U. S. Census each person is paying \$320 a year toward operating expenses and his per capita share of the national debt is \$1,917.
